IN CALEB POWERS TRIAL.

Must Increase Working Balance-May Make a Call on the Banks.

Washington, Dec. 30,-With a working cash balance in its vaults of only a little more than \$3,000,000, it has become almost imperative for the Treasury to devise some means whereby it may defray the current expenses of the government. A deficit of nearly \$7,000,000 has resulted from December operations. It is apparent, therefore, that unless receipts are suddenly and unexpectedly increased the treasury's vaults will soon be bare of a working balance. This is the situation that makes it imperative that something be done promptly.

Three measures are possible. One is to meet the government's obligations with checks on banks holding government deposits. Another is to continue to borrow money, while the third is to make a call on banks holding government money for a return of such percentage of the deposits as the secretary thinks necessary.

There is reason to believe, at inquiry at the treasury today, that the last named policy has been decided on. It may be, indeed, that the call on the banks has already been made. The president, it is understood, has peremptorily forbidden the issuance of any more bonds or certificates of indebtedness. This-leaves the secretary the alternative of paying the government's obligations in checks or calling on the banks for a return of some of the government's money. There is no law to forbid the use of checks; there are, in fact, many men who advocate the practice of this method now and at all times. GOV. SPARKS WIRES PRESIDENT THAT HE IS PREPARING A PROCLAMATION.

Nevada Legislature Will Be Asked to Provide Means of Remedying Conditions at Goldfield.

By Associated Press.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 30.-Governor Sparks of Nevada today wired President Roosevelt that he is now preparing a proclamation calling the legislature of Nevada into an extra session. According to the president's last communication to Governor Sparks. the troops will now be allowed to remain at Goldfield for a period of three weeks.

Changes Goldfield Situation.

Coldfield, Nev., Dec. • 29 .- The announcement made here today that Gov. Sparks had telegraphed to President Roosevelt that he will call the Nevada legislature together in special session as soon as possible has put an entirely new aspect upon the labor situation here. At least a portion of the Federal troops, it is thought, will remain in Goldfield for an indefinite period and any fear of any serious disturbance growing out of the dispute has van-

BURIED IN CEMENT.

The Story of an Arab Boy Who Rekounced Mohammedanism.

According to history, there was born about the year 1520 an Arab boy named Geronimo. He was captured in infancy by the Spanish garrison at Oran, and when about eight years old he escaped from his captors and went back to his family, living as a Mohammedan until the age of twenty-five. He then volutarily returned to Oran and resumed the Christian life which he had adopted previously when in the hands of the Spanish authorities. A few years later he went on a coasting raid with a party of Spaniards, but the raiders were themselves captured by a Moorish corsair and brought to Algiers. Here the attempt was made to convert him to Mohammedanism, but he persistently refused to embrace that faith, so that he was tried and condemned to die. His hands were tied behind his back, and he was cast alive, face downward, into a block of concrete then being prepared for the Fort des Vingt Quatre Heures, then building. Careful note was taken of the spot by Haido, a Spanish Benedictine missionary to Algiers, who prayed the time might come when the Lord would pave the way for his exhumation and Christian burial. In 1853 the French found it necessary to destroy the fort, and the data left by Haldo were found to be correct, for the designated block of concrete on being cut open disclosed the bones of Geronimo and the cavity left by his body. The bones were removed Dec. 27, 1853, Everything in HARDWARE and given Christian burial, and they now rest in a massive stone sarcophagus in the cathedral. A plaster cast was made of the cavity and afterward photographed.-Cement Age.

TO USHER IN NEW YEAR.

anuary 1st Will Mark Inauguration of New Enterprises and Laws.

New York, Dec. 28.-Nineteen hundred and seven, old, decrepit and staggering to its grave, will pass out of existence this week and the new year will be ushered in with the usual rejoicing in all Christian lands. - iThe inception of 1908 will be officially announced by the click of the time signal instrument in the United States naval observatory at Washington,

At the White House on New Year's day, between the hours of 11 a. m. and 1:30 p. m., President and Mrs. Roosevelt will hold the customary reception. Members of the diplomatic corps, officers of the army and navy, representatives of the national and district governments, congressmen and citizens of the capital generally will attend, and each caller will be given a cordial handshake by the president. Last year the chief executive grasped the hand of 8,g00 persons, and this record is likely to be exceeded at next Wednesday's reception. New York will greet the new arrival with the usual enthusiasm. Everyone in the greater city will keep open house and there will be the customary festivities and merry-making. Similar celebrations will be held in all cities throughout the land, and in London and Paris, Berlin, Rome, St. Petersburg and other European capitals.

Eclipse in South America.

A total eclipse of the sun, visible in the South Pacific, will take place Friday and will be observed by several American and European scientists. The astronomers hope to observe the heating effect of the sun's corona and to decide if possible more definitely the cause of coronal light. Another important scientific event of the week will be the fifty-eighth meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and its affiliated societies, which will convene in Chicago today and remain in session through the entire week. Distinguished savants from all the leading universities of the United States and Canada will be in attendance.

Georgia Will Become Dry.

Many new important State laws will become enective the first of the year. Georgia's drastic bill prohibiting the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages will go into effect and under its provisions all saloons will be closed and no whiskey, wine, beer or any other beverage capable of producing intoxication may be sold. The bill cause a loss in revenue, State and municipal, of more than \$1,000,000 a year, In New York, among other measures, a law will be enforced requiring that licenses be secured before marriages may be performed by any persons qualified to the the matrimonial knot. It is thought that this law will serve to prevent the secret margiages heretofore so common in the Empre State. A reform divorce law, based on the recommendations made by the national uniform divorce congress, will go into effect in New Jersey. Drastic laws affecting the conduct of insurance companies will become operative in Wisconsin and will cause many concerns to leave the State. An act designed to create better conditions in the tenement houses in Philadelphia and Pittsburg will become effective in Pennsylvania. In New Mexico gambling will be prohibited after next Wednesday by

Among the dividend disbursements of next week, the largest will be the 4 per cent semi-annual distribution among the stockholders of the Pennsylvania railroad company controlling the lines west of Pittsburg. The sahre holders of the Canadian Pacific have been called to meet today in Montreal to pass upon the issue of \$28,320,000 of additional stock. The Western Passenger Association, representing all Western railroads, will on Wednesday abolish all haif fare permits to clergymen, who will hereafter be compelled to pay full fare.

Today Secretary Taft will deliver an address at a Boston banquet in which he is expected to make some announcement regarding his presidental candidacy. 
