HOMESEEKERS' TICKET RULES.

Most of the Roads Have Already Conformed to New System.

Fort Worth, Tex., Dec. 30.-Following the meeting held here Saturday morning, relative to the rules governing homesekers' tickets by the general passenger agents of the various railroads of the State, announcement was made today to the effect that with but one or two exceptions the roads have and those who have not are simply using up their present supply of tickets.

In formulating and placing in operation the new plan the railroads have succeeded in landing a direct blow on the scalpers' business, inasmuch as the law now requires that the tickets shall be signed by the purchaser at the final destination and concessions to this rule will only be made in the event of illness or accident. The former home seekers' rates will be continued throughout the coming year and attention of certain railroad representatives will now be directed to those who may make the attempt to engage in the private scalping business.

> Few citizens of Wichita Falls realize the large amount of revenue derived by the city from fines assessed by the corporation court. Judge Rye has just compiled the records of his court for the year which closes tonight and finds that during the year he has turned into the city treasury the sum of \$4,102.50 in cash fines, in addition to which fines to an equal amount have been worked out on the streets.

During the past three years \$6,070.50 in fines have been paid into the treas-

From the foregoing sums the officers fees, with the exception of \$2.50 for the city attorney for each fine have been deducted. In cases where the offender works out his fine on the street, the officers receive no fees whatever, the city receiving the full amount of the fine in the work of the prisoner.

ELASTIC AND EMERGENCY CUR-RENCY DICUSSED BY BRYAN'S COMMONER.

BANK RESERVES

A Few Pertinent Suggestions Made About Reserve Money-Postal Savings Bank and Guarantee Plan.

There are two phases of the currency question which are demanding attention. The first relates to the kind of currency we shall have. For years the banking interests have been endeavoring to secure an asset currency. After they found that they could not bring the country to an approval of an asset currency as a permanent currency, they changed their tactics and asked for it as a temporary currency. They have magnified the importance of elasticity and sent out long discourses on the injury done to the agricultural sections by a scarcity of money during the period of crop moving. The very men who shouted themselves hoarse declaring that we had plenty of money in 1896 have been clamoring for the right to issue more money even when the per capita circulation has increased more than fifty per cent. These financiers have seized to force their plans through congress, but they have not deceived the democrats, and it is evident that many republicans understand the plan. Steadfast resistance ought to be offered to any plan that contemplates a change in the basis for the bank note circulation. The president indicates that he is willing to approve of a measure which will permit the issue of temporary bank note currency on bonds deposited. While this would be better than currency issued on the general assets of the bank, it is not necessary to make even this change. Whatever elasttic currency is needed ought to be supplied by the government by the Issue of United States notes like those now in circulation, and these notes can be loaned to not only national banks, but State banks. In fact, the security being regulated by law and the interest fixed by law, there is no reason why the loan should not be made to individuals as well as to banks, and surely there is no reason why such loans should be confined to national banks. We already have the United States F. W. SNYDER note in circulation, and it is a legal tender. The bank note is not a legal tender, and being redeemable not spe-

Wall street financiers have no plan for the protection of depositors, and they resent any plan which will lessen the advantage which the big bank has over the little bank. Just now, however, the big bank is responsible for the one, and by refusing to return the money deposited with it by the smaller banks. has made the stringency as wide as the nation. The scare which has come upon depositors is likely to stimulate hoarding for some time to come. Notthat depositors are justified in being frightened but because they are frightened, and a fright is a fright whether it is reasonable or unreasonable. Something ought to be done to restore confidence among the depositors. The president has recommended a postal savings bank. This is good as far as it goes, but it does not go far enough, and if it did, it would soon involve the government in a large amount of unnecessary work. The guarantee of the banks is more simple and involves less extension of governmental activity.

Two methods have been proposed for the protection of depositors, firsta guarantee fund; second-absolute security. Mr. Bryan advocated the guarantee fund some thirteen or fourteen years ago and endeavored to secure the passage of a bill providing for such a fund. It was defeated then, although it is probable that it would be more popular now. An absolute guarantee, however, is better than a guarantee fund, first-because it can be put into operation more quickly, and secondbecause it leaves no room whatever for the operation of fear or a scare. It would require some time to raise a guarantee fund sufficient to give confidence to the depositors, and no matter how large the fund might be, it would be so small in proportion to the total deposits that the more timid would still feel that they ran some risk in depositing. But an absolute guarantee upon the part of the government would restore confidence at once, and yet, the government would really incur no risk, for judging the future by the past, the loss which it would have to bear would be little, and this loss could be collected from the banks in proportion to their deposits. Today, December 31st, closes the year 1907-a most prosperous one for Wichita Falls and Wichita county. During the year the population of Wichita Falls has increased more than 1,000; two new railroads have been added, making six in all; a cotton compress and cotton oil mill have been constructed, with a combined capital of \$150,000; over 150 new residences have bene built; the largest broom factory in the State, which was destroyed by fire, has been reorganized and rebuilt with double its former capital stock; a new bank has been organized and is now enjoying a nice, patronage, which makes the third strong banking institution of the city; about a half dozen or more new busevery one in the city is now occupied 10 cents. and there is a demand for more.

The payroll of the Fort Worth and Denver has been more than doubled at this place, as has that of all the other roads entering the city; two new lumber vards have located here, making five in all; two new and first class gins were built to take the place of the two smaller gins; a cotton warehouse with a capacity of more than one thousand bales has been constructed; and the taxpayers of Wichita Falls voted to bond themselves to the extent of \$24,000 to improve the sewerage system and also \$15,000 for a new City Hall. These improvements, no doubt, will be made during the early part of 1908. There are various smaller enterprises that have been started in Wichita Falls during the year 1907, not the least of which is the Times Publishing Company, which has not yet passed the first mile post, and all of them are succeeding and doing their

full share toward making Wichita town. If the new year will be just as good to us as the one which will go out tonight at midnight, all should be satisfied.

Declares It is Elephant's Tooth. Fort Worth Telegram.

Dr. William R. Howard of this city, in expert in natural history, has deermined the identity of the mammoth prehistoric animal, a tooth of which was recently found near Wichita Falls. This immense molar has a grinding surface of 38 inches and evidently belonged to an animal of immense proportions. Dr. Howard declares that the animal was a member of the elephant family, and is described as "Elephas Columbi." It was different from the mastedon whose homes are fre. quently found in various portions of

the country. Dr. Howard thus describes the long extinct animal to which the great tooth formerly belonged: :

"In the Southern States are found the teeth of the species (Elephas Columbi) closely resembling the Indian elephant. It is curious that while the teeth of these animals have been frequently found in our country, their bones are very rare. They have been so long extinct in the New World and their huge bones are so easily disintegrated that all except the hardest portions have disappeared.

"This animal differed from the Mastodon Americanus, chiefly in the form of the molars. The mastodon had a series of pairs of large comical projections, instead of a flat grinding surface, being less worn and adapted for softer food.

"The Proboscidians, to which these animals belonged, are best understood by reference to their past history. They were at one time distributed over all the great continents, though they seem never to have reached Australia, or any of the islands, unless, these islands were at one time joined to the continent. Their remains occur only in the fresh water deposits of the Sivalix Hills of India, and the later beds in Nebraska and Texas.

"They first appeared in the Old World toward the close of the miocene or in the early pliocene age, the age of forests all over the continents, when Europe had dense jungles, and semi-tropical vegetation like that of our Southern States. From the Old World they possibly migrated (in common with many other large animals) to North America, and thence to South America.

The mustodons began somewhat earlier and probably remained longer in the New World than the elephants, having, perhaps, found a refuge in marshy regions after the elephants had been exterminated from the forests by big carnivores."

CONNER AT GAINESVILLE.

Will Look About to See What the Base ball Prospects Are.

Capt. Joe Conner of last year's Gainesville baseball team arrived here vesterday afternoon from his home in Brownwood and will remain here for a few days to see what can be done next year in the interest of the national sport here. There has been thus far practically no talk of a team for the coming season and the opinion seems to prevail that Gainesville will have

The appearance of Conner may cause the sports to get busy and decide to put out a good team, as they have for the past two seasons. An effort will also be made by outsiders to form a league in which Cainesville, Ardmore, Sherman and Denison will play, or they may try to consolidate Sherman and Denison and make Denton come in with the fourth team.

The fact that the past two seasons have not been successful from a financial standpoint may cause this city to be without a team for a season or two, or, at least, that seems to be the general opinion.-Gainesville Messenger.

WEATHER IN JANUARY.

Synopsis of Records at Local Office for Past Thirteen Years.

The story of the weather for the month of January for the past thirteen years for Fort Worth is an interesting one. Longer than thirteen years cannot be told, as it is only that long the government has kept records. During the thirteen years the warmest January was recorded was that of the year 1907, last January, when the temperature for the month was 54 degrees. The coldest January in the history of the thirteen years was the year 1905, when the thermometer averaged 38 degrees.

The highest temperature recorded on a January day was January 28, 1903, when the mercury went up to 85 and the coldest day was January 15, 1905, when it dropped to 11 Fahrenheit.

The dates of killing frosts for the autumns of the various years show that the earliest on the records came October 22, 1898. The average time of killing frosts has been November 15. The average date of late killing frosts in the springtime has been March 18. The latest killing frost known was on May 1, 1903.


The average precipitation, rain and melted snow, for the terms of years for January is shown as 1.66 inches. The greatest precipitation occurring in the month of January was in 1896, when 4.75 inches fell. During the January of 1901 only 08 inches fell. The greatest amount of precipitation falling in any consecutive twenty-four hours in a January was on January 10 and 11, 1905, when 1.16 inches fell.

The highest wind recorded in any month of January since the taking of records began was January 20, 1902, when it reached a gait of 48 miles per hour. The average velocity for the month has been 11 miles for the past nine years.—Fort Worth Telegram.
