

"MY TURN"

THE FOLLOWING is a repeat of the "My Turn" column which was published in this paper September 19, 1987, almost exactly three years ago. I feel more strongly about these comments today than I did then.

THE UNITED STATES has placed itself squarely in between Iran and Iraq in the Persian Gulf, which is a terribly precarious position in which to be. Those Aryan-Arabic peoples have been fighting among themselves since about 700 B.C.

Bloodshed, violence and martyrdom are a way of life which has been bred into their genes for centuries. What makes U.S. diplomats and politicians assume they can bargain peace between people who simply do not reason on the same level as peace-loving people?

So now we are endangering American lives while escorting oil tankers through the Persian Gulf with the distinct possibility of bringing the U.S. into a full-scale war. All of this is so that we can have enough oil and gas to run here and there in our cars, trucks and planes while the rich get richer. And, of course, we need lots of rocket fuel so that our missiles will be ready to blow other folks away when the occasion warrants.

When you get right down to it, all wars have been fought so that one side or the other can get richer, which translates into power. The rich start wars; the poor fight (and die) in those wars.

The U.S. seems to get into the mood to go and fight somebody's war about every 18 or 20 years, which is quite relevant since it takes just about that long to grow a new crop of young Americans to ship off to be maimed, killed and blown to bits on foreign soil.

If we thought Vietnam was a no-win war, just wait until we start sending our young people over to those countries which start with "I." Thinking Americans need to try to get the message across to the government that the youth of our nation are not an expendable commodity to be used for fighting foreign wars whenever the economy seems to need a boost.

When discussing preservation of our natural resources, the Chief of our Armed Forces should be aware of the fact that the young men and women of the USA are perhaps the most important natural resource that we have. They are the future of our country.

Instead of spending billions of dollars escorting Kuwaiti oil tankers through the Persian Gulf, wouldn't it make more sense to invest in furthering alternative energy sources in our own homeland? Technology and sources for other fuels are available to us here on U.S. soil, but are not being used to the fullest extent.

Experiments with grain products and also with feedlot manure have proven very effective in the production of ethanol fuel. Goodness knows, we have plenty of those two commodities in the Texas Panhandle. An expanded use of ethanol would be a boost to the sagging agricultural economy of our area. So why do we continue to use petroleum products which clog our motors and pollute our air? I simply don't understand.

Vice President Bush has expressed some interest in pushing grain ethanol production as a boost to the down-trodden farming industry. We need to get busy with some letters to our congressmen, both state and federal, to see what can be done to speed production of alternative energy sources for our country.

Wouldn't it be great if someday soon we could just tell the Persian Gulf countries to take their oil and shove it?

Mustangs Seeking First '90 Victory

"We should have won that ball game," was the reaction of Bovina coach Rock Stanley to the Mustangs' 19-12 loss to Lorenzo in a game here last Friday.

Bovina held a 12-7 lead in the third quarter, but Lorenzo rallied for the last two scores to make off with the win.

"I felt the kids did as good a job as they possibly could have. Lorenzo was a tough team, and had held Paducah to two touchdowns. We just made too many mistakes, and we're working hard this week to correct these," Stanley added.

The two teams traded touchdowns in the second quarter, with Kory Mitchell scoring on a 12-yard pass from Corey Kirkpatrick.

A kick attempt after the touchdown failed, and Bovina trailed by one at the half, 7-6.

In the third quarter, Hector Guevara picked off a Lorenzo pass at the Hornet 26 and ran it in for a touchdown. The kick attempt again failed, but Bovina led, 12-7.

The visitors got two touchdowns from Albert Turner, one on a 22-yard run and one on a one-yard plunge, to round out the scoring.

Lorenzo led in first downs, 19-12, and in total yardage, 207-163.

Kory Mitchell led the Mustangs with 41 yards in 12 attempts, Hugo Renteria added 38 on 14 tries, and Andy Stormes had 28 yards in 13 carries.

Kirkpatrick completed three of seven passes for 34 yards.

Stanley singled out Genaro Ruvalcaba as a defensive standout. He had an interception to go along with the one by Guevara.

This Friday, Bovina visits Highland Park in Amarillo. A fairly new school, Highland Park has won their first two games this fall, for the first time.

Area Gets Rainfall Sunday

Bovina continues to receive a little rainfall every week and this week we received about one and one-tenth inch in town. It has also been cooler with high temperatures in the 80s and 70s. Sunday's high was only 66 degrees.

Other rain reports in the area were received. Wes Cockerham, who farms three miles west received one and one-half inches of rain. Wayne McClaran, who farms eight miles southeast said they had one and two-tenths of an inch.

Houston Bartlett received seven-tenths and his farm is located five miles north. Bovina Feeders, located eight miles south, reported having two and one-half inches of rain.

Stanley said Highland Park has some good players, including a 6-3, 275-pound tackle, but he felt the Mustangs could beat this week's Hornet opponent. H.P. is a class 2A school. The game begins at 8 p.m.

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

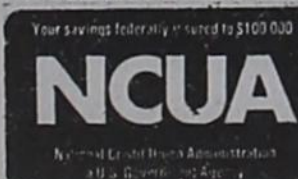
"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."
