FLAMES INFLICT HEAVY DAMAGE AT PORTLAND, ME., AND BALTIMORE, MD.

Others Were Seriously Injured in Baltimore Fire-Century Old Records Destroyed at Portland.

Baltimore, Md., Jan. 24.-Three firemen were killed and sixteen others more or less seriously injured in a fire early this morning. The list of the injured includes George Horton, chief of the fire department, who has a badly lacerated scalp and internal injuries; Lieutenant Frederick Harmon, William B. Pugh, and an unidentified man thought to be Emil Mor-

The financial damage is estimated by Mayor J. Barry Mahool, who was on the scene early, at \$400,000.

The blaze started on the third floor of the building occupied by J. Register, Sons & Company, dealers in plumbers' supplies. The other occupants of the building were the Baltimore Bell and Brass Company and the William D. Holdingsworth Company, lic protested against the presence of machinists. Upon these three firms the heaviest losses will fall.

The firemen lost their lives by the falling of a large section of a wall of the burning building.

President, Secretary and Directors Chosen at a Meeting of the Subscribers Last Night.

Last night at the Chamber of Commerce hall the stockholders in the company to build a new opera house held their first meeting. More than a majority of the stockholders was represented and the organization was perfected by the election of C. W. Bean as chairman of the meeting and G. D. Anderson secretary.

By a resolution the company is to be known as the "Wichita Falls Opera House Company" and is to be capitalized at \$20,000.

The next busines to be transacted by the meeting was the election of a board of seven directors of the company and the following were unanimously chosen: J. A. Kemp, Frank Kell, C. W. Bean, T. R. T. Orth, J. L. Jackson, W. M. McGregor and N. Hen-

SOCIETY FOLK LAND IN JAIL.

New York, Jan. 23.-Nineteen mer and ten women, many of them handsomely gowned in silks and furs, crowded before Magistrate Wahle in Harlem police court today to explain how they came to be in the roadhouse at Fifth avenue and Ninety-Sixth street last night when Captain Corcoran of the East One Hundred and Fourth street station, and his raiding squadron pounced upon the place.

There was a general display of lace handkerchiefs, enough tears to mel the sternest magistrate, and explana tions to the effect that the ungallant captain had interrupted several "sluriming" parties. The captain explained that he had no desire to have the "slums" in his district and added that the roadhouse has been watched by his sleuths for two weeks. The proprietor of the place, Charles Green, for whom the police had a warrant, was held.

All the policemen in the precinct are splitting their sides laughing to day at the strange combination corralled last night, the efforts made by a person named Cohen to "tip off" the proposed raid and the leaps for liberty from second story windows. The prisoners ranged from a prize fighter to a banker's chief clerk. And the ladies lived at home and had been caught seeing the sights of Fifth avenue." LAWSON ABANDONS THE FIGHT.

At the beginning of my battle the people stood on the curb, looking on at the most terrific onslaught made on man, and-grinned. Thousands of press tirades, describing me as all that was dangerous and detestable, the people read without resentment, and scinned. The Belknap Coal Fields.

F. B. Slagler was in from the Belknap coal fields last Tuesday and remembered the Leader with a pleasant call. Mr. Slagler informs us that the Wichita Falls and Southern Railway Company will run a new line from the Henry Williams place, west of True, to the river, and will likely cross at or near the mouth of California creek. This will leave the old survey several miles to the east, and in case the new line is adopted the coal fields at Belknap will be abandoned for a time. Work on this new line was started yesterday.

Mr. Slagler believes the coal at the mouth of California creek is superior to that near Belknap and believes that the new line will be the accepted one. He also stated that steel was laid to within four miles of Olney last Monday and that beyond a doubt the road would be completed to that place by the first of February. The road will be built to the coal fields and ready for business by April 1st.

When asked as to his idea where the road would be built after reach ing the coal fields next April, Mr. Slagler said he believed it would go on south and connect with the T. and P .- Graham Leader.



Conference of Commissioners of Agriculture Will Be Held in Washinton Feb. 4th.

Washington, D. C. Jan. 24 .-- A conerence of Commissioners of Agriculture of all the States south of the cat? tle quarantine line is to be held in Washington February 4th, and the next day they are to appear before the gricultural Committee of the House tion for the eradication of the cattle

The conference is to be held in acordance with the suggestion of Representative Ransdell of Louisiana, Mr. Ransdell has pending a bill to appropriate \$500,000 for this work. The gave \$100,000 and such a showing has been made to warrant a larger appropriation bill this year.

Secretary Wilson favors an appropriation of \$150,000, while Dr. Melvin, hief of the Bureau of Animal Industry, thinks the amount ought to be \$300,000. It is not believed that this amount can be secured, but it is believed that if the committee is properly acquainted with the tremendous loss that the South suffers because of the cattle tick, and of the efficacy of the means adopted to terminate it, a larger appropriation than that of last year can be obtained.

The call for the proposed meeting of the Agricultural Commissioners in Washington will be issued in a few days by the Commissioner of North Carolina, who has been in communica tion with Mr. Ransdell.

Total Ginnings to January 16 Are Announced as 10,337,607 Bales.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 23.—The Census Bureau today issued a report showing that the total amount of coiton in the United States ginned from the growth of 1907 to Jan. 16th was 10,337,607 bales, as compared with 12,-175,199 bales for the same period last year and 9,989,634 for the same period in 1906. The total number of active ginneries was 27,370. In this bulletin round bales are counted as half bales. The number of round bales included is 187,562 for 1906, 258,717 for 1907, and 270,669 for 1906.

There were ginned 9,951,507 bales to Jan. 1, 1908. The percentage of the crop ginned to Jan. 16 was 93.8 for 1907 and 95.2 for 1906.
