sale house are allowed to enter our clty and take orders for any article of dry goods, grocerles, hardware, etc.., they should at least be required to take out an occupation tax. If there is no elty ordinance governng this matitme in framing one up that will cover the case of these "drummers" with pencil and pad ând an armful of sama house to house canvas, taking or ders for everything from a pair of socks to a plano. It they are required to pay a tax, like that fmposed on nome merchants, perhaps there will be
fewer of them. The home merchant is tewer of thenn. The home merchant is entuted to protection along this line
and it there is any law by which these peddlers can be requitred to pay an occupation tax it should be enforced.
