J. A. Kemp, president of the Wichta Falls and Southern railway, last night came in from Olney, to which point the track was completed this week, with \$10,000 in treasury certificates and bank notes in a neat roll carried in a hand grip, Mr. Kemp got in from Olney after the banks had closed and the time locks, set, so that the vaults could not be opened until of the money over night himself, sleeping with the money under his pillow

The ten thousand dollars represented one-half of the bonus subscribed by the citizens of Olney and surrounding country to ald the building of the

Today 5,000 bushel's of wheat, representing \$5,000 in money is being loaded onto the cars by the Olney farmers for shipment to Wichiat Falls, where it will be received as its equivalent in money by the railroad company.

The remainder of the \$20,000 bonus pledged by Olney for the railroad is being contributed in cash and will be paid over today.

A regular train schedule has been established over the new road between Wichita Falls and Olney and the shipment of goods and products between the two places has started.

The train leaves Wichita Falls at 3:10 p. m., arriving at Olney at 6:40 p. m. Leaving Olney at 7:30 a. m., the train reaches Wichita Falls at 11:00

John Heartsill Charged With Attempt ed Assault Upon Mrs. Noite.

John Heartsill, charged with an atempted assault upon the person of Mrs. Charles Nolte, was carried before County Attorney J. C. Wilson yesterday and made a sworn statement, in which he denies that he a the party who made the attempted assault.

He was arrested about two and a half miles west of the city by Con-stable Barker and was hiding in the brush when discovered, attempting to run when he discovered the officers

were after him.

After his arrest he stated to Constable Barker that he had spent the night away from home, and upon his return Tuesday morning, was informed the officers were after him and proceeded to make himself scarce. He claims he was drinking Monday night, and did not know, what charges the officers had against him.

Heartsill was carried before Mrs. Nolte, who identified him as the party who made the attempted assault.

Yesterady afternoon his bond was fixed at \$2,500, to await the action of the next grand jury, in default of which he was remanded to jail .-Weatherford Herald.

Mrs. Nolte is the wife of Charles Nolte, a printer who was working in this city at the time the attempt was made to assault his wife, which occurred on Sunday night of this week. The fellow went to the Nolte home and told her she was wanted at the long distance telephone. There being two local telephone systems at Weatherford, she asked the man which one of the phones she should call, and he told her the one to which she was not a subscriber, therefore it was necessary for her to cross the street to a neighbor's to use their phone, and as she stepped out of her door the fellow grabbed her and attempted an assault. Mrs. Nolte screamed for assistance, which came almost immediately, and the fellow fled before her rescuers could lay hands on him. Mrs. Nolte was considerably bruised by the fellow who, when she screamed for assistance, choked her.

#### LEO NOT INTENDED VICTIM.

#### Itolian Killed German Priest Instead of Sicilian.

Denver, Colo., Feb. 27 .- 1 ae Post today published what purports to be a statement said to have been made by the assassin of Father Leo Heinrich. Guisseppe Alio, alias Guarnaccio, alias Angelo Gabriele, from which it appears that Father Leo was not the prest whom he inteded to murder, but was mistaken by him for a young Italian priest who had been condemned to death by a band of anarchists, who had been exiled from Sicily.

This priest, it is stated, had been foremost in the warfare against the ralcontents in Sieily which culminateg several years ago in an attack upon an Easter procession in the streets of Avalo.

At a meeting of the exiled anarchists in Buenos Ayres, he was chosen by lot to kill the hased priest, and was sent to this country for the purpose. He did not know where to look for the condemned man, but is reported to have said that he identified Father Izeo as the man. .

When told by the interpreter that the priest he killed was a German and had never been in Sicily, Alio burst into a paroxysm of grief, and after it had passed calmly said:

"If I have killed the wrong man I am very sorry, but I will take the consequences like a man."

TEXAS AND COLORADO.

Railroad from Mineral Wells to Trinidad Will Open New Territory.

nouncement has been made that while he financial depression has caused de lay in the carrying out of the Gould plans for buliding an extension of the Weatherford Mineral Wells & Northwestern division of the system from Mineral Wells, Texas, northwest to a connection with the Denver and Rio Grande at Trinidad, Colo., the project by no means has been abandoned. Preliminary work in connection with the survey is in progress. More than 400 miles of the route has been decided on. The extension is to be almost an air line, of lower grade than the Fort Worth and Denver or the Colorado and Southern, both of which it will parellel for a considerable portion of the distance.

The distance from Mineral Wells to Trinidad is about 700 miles. This at present is the largest railroad enterprise on hand in the Southwest. The particular object in view is to join up by the most direct route possible the Gould systems of roads in Colorado with that in the southewest, in order to gain an outlet for Colroado traffic through to Galveston. In addition to this through traffic, which it is desired to handle economically and expeditiously, the local traffic to be obtained from the full development of a vast region of Texas territory to which the building of the extension will contribute immensely, is deemed of enough importance to justify of itself the prosecution of the enterprise.

#### THE ODOR OF SANCITY.

French Writer's Theory of How ! May Be Exuded by Man.

Dr. Georges Dumas is the author of an article in the Revue de l'aris ou "The Odor of Sanctity." The writer accepts as true the numerous reported instances of saints and mystics of the Catholic church whose bodies after death or during moments of ecstasy emitted peculiarly pleasing odors of various kinds. Then men and women with whom such legends deal, argues Dr. Dumas, were neurasthenes, and it is not impossible that the aroma of sanctity which surrounded them was the product of strictly physiological and chemical changes common to all men, but present in highly intensified form in subjects who, so to speak burned up the candle of their existence at an unusually rapid rate. He says in

"So far, then, we have come across a great variety of perfumes-cinnamon. clove, orange, pineapple, rose, violet tily of the valley, yellow amber and benzoln. Now, the natural constitution of all of these is well known, and chemistry produces them daily for commercial purposes. We may therefore substitute the equivalent chemical expressions for the ordinary terms we have employed and say that orange, cinnamon, violet and musk owe their perfume to aldehydes and acetones. aromatic liquids derived from the alcohols, just as the artificial essence of pineapple comes from butyric ether. We have, then, to ask whether the hu man body can produce odorous compounds of the kind we have mentioned and under what conditions. As a matter of fact. It does produce a certain number of such compounds ir the destruction of organic matter, which is the constant condition of life, in par ticular acctones and the volatile fatty acids, butyric, formic, acetic, etc. If the process of combustion is normal all these constituents are burned up, completely oxidized, and give as a residue water, carbonic acid and urea. But let some slackening occur in the inmost nutrition of the tissues and the same constituents will escape through the breath, perspiration and the skin."

#### MAGIC MIRRORS.

Peculiar Effects In Some of the Polished Bronze Reflectors.

Now and then mirrors of a curious kind are seen in Europe. They are called "magic mirrors" and are of Japanese origin, made not of glass silvered, but of cast bronze, polished on the face and bearing on the back raised patterns, inscriptions, symbolical designs, crests of pictures. When exposed to a bright beam of light from the sun or from an electric lamp they reflect in the light from their pofished face the image of the pattern on their

This is a purely optical property and has of course nothing in common with the fortune telling magic crystals of the astrologer or the alleged magic mirrors of necromancy, yet it long puzzled the scientific optician and even now is little known or believed. The researches of various scientific men have established the fact that the phenomenon is due to very minute differences of curvature in the polished face, differences so minute that they do not affect the ordinary use of the mirror as a looking glass and that can be detected only by delicate optical tests.

The only remaining mystery has been as to how these delicate differences of curvature were produced in exact correspondence to the pattern on the back. The makers themselves are often in ignorance of the magic prop erty and do not know which of their mirrors possess it and which do not. The mirrors are cast in molds and afterward polished by hand, and it is held by scientific men that the difference of curvature is caused by the metal's yielding unequally under that pressure of the tools used in scraping and polishing, the thin parts naturally bending more than the thick. This accounts for the mirrory' becoming magic.-Chicago News.

#### Book Auction Back In 1732.

John Montgomerie, governor of the province of New York, died on July 1. 1731. In the New York Gazette of May 8, 1732, is the following advertisement, the first of the kind:

"On Thursday, June 1, at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, will begin to be sold at public auction a collection of valuable books belonging to the library of his excellency John Montgomerie, Esq., late governor of New York, etc., deceased. A catalogue of the books may be seen at the Coffee House in New York, with the conditions of sale " This is also the first instance where

the word "auction" appears," "vendue" being the term in general use.
