WATER QUESTION

CITY COUNCIL AGAIN POSTPONES
ACTION ON NEW CONTRACT
WITH WATER COMPANY.

THE METER PROPOSITION

Is a Thorn in the Sides of the Consumers—Minimum Charge Also Meets Opposition.

The City Council and the Wichita Falls Water and Light Company are not much nearer to an agreement upon the terms of the proposed new water contract than they were before the meeting of the council last night.

The water proposition was discussed in council last night, but none of the councilmen were ready to vote upon the matter.

Councilman Bean, who had been delegated to secure information relative to meters and water charges in other towns reported that he had written letters of inquiry to the officials in twenty cities, but up to date had received only six replies.

These letters were read before the council. In nearly every instance where meters were used the consumer either furnished the meter or paid a monthly rent of from 25c to 50c.

Mayor Noble also read communications from a number of cities showing that it was customary for consumers to either furnish meters or pay rent for the same.

In all the cities heard from the charge for water was greater than the local charge of 25 cents per thousand gallons.

Various other phases of the water question were discussed and Superintendent Malone of the Water Company, who was present, was asked a number of questions about what the company would bind itself to do.

It developed from the discussion that the draft of the franchise recently published in the Times was presented to the council merely as a tentative proposition and it was not expected that the contract would be adopted in that form. The water company, it was stated, expected only to have the meter charge definitely settled, making it obligatory for the consumer to furnish the same or pay a rental for a meter furnished by the company.

The water company, Mr. Malone stated, would not object to the old schedule of charges being incorporated into the new contract. A majority of the members of the council objected to the minimum charge of \$1.00 per month in case meters were put on, but no definite agreement as to any part of the proposed contract was reached.

City Attorney Montgomery was instructed to draft several forms of a contract to be considered at a special session next Wednesday night.

There has been some dispute as to the exact terms of certain portions of the contract now in force and the sections about which there has been a dispute are herewith presented:

Be it ordained by the City Council of the city of Wichita Falls, Texas: Section 1. That the rights and privileges to construct, operate and maintain waterworks in and near the city of Wichita Falls, Texas, for the purpose of supplying the city aforesaid and the citizens thereof, for domestic, manufacturing and sanitary purposes, is hereby granted to M. Lasker of Galveston, Texas, and to his associates, successors and assigns for the term of fifty years from the 21st day of August, 1900.

Section 5. It is hereby ordained that the following tariff of rates shall be and is hereby established:

That said Lasker, his associates, and their assigns, shall not charge any consumer more than the following maximum rates:

The consumer using daily 10,000 gallons of water or less, 25 cents per thousand gallons.

The consumer using daily 10,000 gallons of water, or as much as 20,000 gallons, at the rate of 20 cents per thousand gallons for the excess over 10,000 and for the balance as above stated.

The consumer using daily more than 20,000 gallons of water, or as much as 40,000 gallons, at the rate of 16 cents per thousand gallons for the excess over 20,000 gallons, and for the balance at the rates above stated.

The consumer using daily more than

40,000 gallons of water, or as much as 80,000 gallons at the rate of 14 cents per thousand gallons for the excess over 40,000 gallons, and for the balance at the rates above stated.

The consumer using daily more than 80,000 gallons of water at the rate of 10 cents per thousand gallons for the excess over 80,000 gallons, and for the balance at the rates above stated.

These charges shall be made and based on daily consumption and the consumer shall not be permitted to group his daily water bills together in an effort to lessen his water rates.

For all water furnished public school buildings and the public buildings of the city, public water fountains for man and beast and for the sprinkling of its streets, parks and public places, and for flushing the gutters and sewers of the city, not exceeding 10 cents per thousand gallons of water.

Provided, said Lasker, his associates and their assigns shall not be required to furnish water to any consumer at a less minimum rate than \$1 per month.

Sec. 6. The water delivered to consumers shall be measured through reliable meters of some standard make, provided, however, the said Lasker, his associates and their assigns shall have the right to agree with their customers on any other basis of measurement or method of determining the value of the water delivered.

One of the chief features of the State Convention of Sunday School Workers of all denominations in Texas, which will begin at Austin on Thursday, Mar. 19th, will be the great Adult Bible Class Day, on which there will be carloads of delegates from various sections of the State from the organized Baraca, Philathea and other Bible classes. TO U. S. SUPREME COURT.

Negro Sentenced to Hang Will Appeal His Case.

CARGO OF POWDER EXPLODED ON TRAIN

By Associated Press. Litchfield, Ill., Mar. 3.—A cargo of powder carried by a Big Four freight train was exploded today while the train was running at full speed two miles from here. Two men are reported fatally injured. The concussion shook houses and shattered windows for miles around.

OVER EMBANKMENT

FIVE FREIGHT CARS TURNED OVER NEAR ALVORD LAST NIGHT.

HOBOS WERE KILLED

Men Beating Their Way Were Crushed Beneath Piles of Lumber and Ties.

One hobo was killed outright, another was fatally injured and a third seriously hurt when seven cars of the second section of manifest freight No. 19 were overturned on an embankment three miles south of Alvord at about 11 o'clock last night.

The train was in charge of Conductor Wiley and Engineer Sanford and was northbound.

The exact cause of the wreck was unknown. The cars which were overturned were in about the middle of the train and were loaded with ties and timber.

The cars at the front of the train and those following the seven wrecked cars did not leave the track and none of the crew were injured. The hobos were riding on the lumber in the middle cars and several others besides those injured more seriously received slight injuries. The injured tramps were carried to Alvord where local physicians gave some attention to their injuries.

The wreck interfered seriously with traffic and all morning trains were detained at Bowie over the Rock Island into Fort Worth.

The Wichita Falls and the Fort Worth wrecking crews were called out and at 10 o'clock this morning had the tracks clear for traffic.

Later—a dispatch from Alvord says that Bailey Stevens, a mechanic of Alvord, was killed. John Cunningham of Ballinger was perhaps fatally injured, Otto Leqman of Cincinnati, O., was seriously hurt and John Wootson of New York sustained slight injuries. The men were riding in a freight car, Dick Calhoun of Crockett, Texas, who was in the same car, narrowly escaped.

Snake Bites Horse.

Sunday was an ideal Spring day, warm and balmy, and as a result snakes came out of their winter quarters. A horse belonging to H. Jentsch, residing on R. F. D. No. 3, six miles south of town, came in contact with one of the reptiles and as a consequence the animal has a head on him with which he "can't eat oats" or any other kind of food.

The horse was bitten on the nose, while grazing in the pasture, and as a rattler was seen in that vicinity that morning it is supposed that that was the species of reptile which bit the horse. Mr. Jentsch fears the animal will die.

TOMORROW ASH WEDNESDAY

Tomorrow is Ash Wednesday, marking the first day of Lent.

The name Ash Wednesday has a general reference to the penitential sack cloth and ashes so frequently spoken of in the Old Testament, but a more special one to a peculiar rite in the Roman church.

Before the commencement of mass the congregation approaches and kneels at the altar rail, and the priest puts ashes on the forehead of each, saying, "Memento, homo, quia pulvis es, et in pulverem revertis." (Remember, man, that thou art dust, and unto dust thou shalt return.) The ashes are obtained by burning the palm branches consecrated in the church on Palm Sunday of the year previous. Originally the administration of the ashes was made only to public penitents.

The day is observed by special services in the Roman Catholic and the Episcopal churches and some other Protestant denominations.

ARRESTS BEING MADE

CHICAGO POLICE MAKE VIGOROUS WARFARE AGAINST ANARCHISTS.

OFFICIALS GO ARMED

Raids Made Upon Alleged Anarchist Headquarters—Man Who Wrote Letter to Priest Arrested.

Chicago, Ill., Mar. 3.—The possibility of deporting avowed anarchists from the city was brought to the attention of United States Attorney Sims today after the matter had been discussed by the city officials gathered at the home of Chief Shippy.

Bulletin—Chicago, Ill., Mar. 3.—Late this afternoon the police raided a supposed anarchist headquarters at West Eighteenth and Sangamon streets and a man and a woman were arrested.

By Associated Press. Chicago, Ill., Mar. 3.—Isadore Maron, 20 years old, a Russian Jew known as the "Curly Haired Boy," a companion of Lazarus Averbuch, the anarchist who was shot and killed yesterday in an attempt to assassinate Chief of Police George M. Shippy, was arrested today near Averbuch's home by Detectives O'Connell and O'Brien of the chief's office.

In addition to Maron, three persons are being held by the police in connection with the attempted assassination of Chief Shippy. Their names are Olga Averbuch, 22 years old, a sister of Chief Shippy's would-be assassin; Tonitza Korinforce, a bartender and Edward Bergman, aged 40 years, a cobbler.

According to attendants at the Augustana hospital, where Harry Shippy was taken yesterday, his condition has improved slightly during the night and he was resting quite comfortably this afternoon.

Thought Murder Would Right Wrongs.

Chicago, Ill., Mar. 3.—Lazarus Averbuch, the young Russian Jew who yesterday attempted to assassinate Chief of Police Shippy and whom the chief killed, had, it is believed, a partner in the work, who thus far is known only as the "Curly Haired Boy." Two other men were arrested at midnight, but it is thought that their connection with the case is most remote.

In a search of Averbuch's library, which was made up largely of books on revolutionary subjects and lectures of prominent socialists and anarchists, the police found that the terrible deed of the morning was planned and carried out to the death by the dreaming Russian boy, whose mind was filled with hatred of the government of his own country, the burden of peasants of the world and inflammatory ideas for remedying social conditions promulgated by leaders of liberal thought in America.

Sent Threatening Letters.

Chicago, Ill., Mar. 3.—Frank Zajflok was arrested early today, charged with sending threatening letters to a Roman Catholic clergyman, Procopius Nuzil, a friar of the Benedictine Fathers. The prisoner, who is 38 years old, lives at 584 Blue Island avenue, on the borders of the Ghetto district. He admitted sending a demand for one thousand dollars to the priest, according to the police.

ROSSITER THE MAN.

President Will Appoint New Yorker as Public Printer.

By Associated Press. Washington, D. C., Mar. 3.—It is understood that President Roosevelt has decided to appoint W. S. Rossiter of New York to be public printer to succeed Charles S. Stillings of Massachusetts.

"BILLY, THE KID'S" SLAYER KILLED

An El Paso dispatch last Sunday tells of the killing of Pat Garrett, the slayer of "Billy, the Kid," a noted Western outlaw.

Garrett was killed by John Brazel Saturday morning while on his way from his New Mexico ranch to Las Cruces. The killing is said to have resulted from a dispute over a cattle range.

Garrett was a rich stockman and was a personal friend of President Roosevelt, Emerson Hough, the novelist, and many other prominent men. Brazel is in jail. Garrett killed many outlaws in his time as a man hunter.

Pat Garrett's death marks the passing of a figure unique even in the days of daring deeds and quick gun plays.

His most noted encounter was with "Billy the Kid," whom he killed in New Mexico, after having hunted him over West Texas and New Mexico.

Famed as Texas Sheriff.

Fifteen years ago he attained fame as sheriff of Uvalde county by his daring captures and law enforcement. At this time New Mexico was hopelessly struggling to secure alleged slayers of Judge Albert Fountain, attorney for the cattle raisers, who disappeared mysteriously on the plains.

As a last resort Pat Garrett was made a sheriff by New Mexico and commissioned to run down the men. A six-year chase, marked by several running battles, ended when Oliver Lee and two cowboys surrendered, declaring that they did not feel safe in giving up elsewhere owing to feeling in the country. The men were acquitted and the death of Fountain has never been established, his body never being found.

Pursuit of Billy the Kid.

The pursuit of "Billy the Kid" was conducted by Garrett single handed. This occurred while General Lew Wallace, author of "Ben Hur," was governor of New Mexico. "Billy the Kid," said to have come out victor in thirty-seven pistol battles, had twice escaped from the authorities and vowed he would never be captured alive.

Garrett went to the home of a girl

friend of the man and secreting himself, waited the arrival. Billy the Kid arrived shortly after dusk. He seemed to feel danger in the air, though unable to see Garrett. His gun was at once drawn, but not in time for the lightning draw of Pat Garrett and the indomitable Billy the Kid was killed.

Collector of Customs.

Garrett was later appointed collector of customs at the port of El Paso, holding the office one term.

His well known staunchness for his friends is popularly held to have caused the loss of this lucrative federal berth. Accompanied by Tom Powers, a well known saloon man of El Paso, Garrett attended the reunion of Rough Riders at San Antonio. With Powers he sat down to dinner with the president.

Jealous opponents are said to have spread the story in the East where the square deal gambling and saloon methods which made Tom Powers a man of standing in the West were not understood.

Losses Federal Office.

At all events Garrett failed to secure a reappointment to the collectorship and moved to New Mexico, where he became a ranchman.

Though of middle age he was still reputed one of the quickest and surest shots along the Mexican border. Six feet in height and of lanky build, his figure was a noted one all through the plains country.

NEW ORDINANCES

ROLLER SKATES AND OTHER WHEEL CONTRIVANCES TO BE PLACED UNDER BAN.

BLOW AIMED AT VAGRANTS

Males Who Appear in Public Places With Prostitutes Will Get Theirs.

At its regular monthly meeting last night the city council passed two new ordinances on their first reading.

The first ordinance was directed at males who associate with women known to be common prostitutes. This ordinance will make it unlawful for any male person or persons to escort or remain with any female known to be a common prostitute within the city limits of Wichita Falls.

The ordinance provides a penalty of not less than \$10 nor more than \$100 to be assessed against any male person violating this ordinance in being found with a prostitute on any public road, street or alley of said city or in any hotel, inn, tavern, store, grocery, restaurant, theatre, show place of amusement or any other public place.

The second ordinance makes it unlawful for any person to skate upon roller skates, or to ride or propel or push any wagon, vehicle or other contrivance on wheels on or along or across any sidewalk within the fire limits of the city of Wichita Falls. The ordinance provides a penalty of not less than \$5 nor more than \$25 upon conviction.

A provision of this ordinance excepts baby buggies or perambulators used for conveying infants and also wheel chairs for invalids or cripples and trucks for transporting merchandise.

Another ordinance making it unlawful to paint, print or mark with chalk any sign, figure or advertisement on the sidewalks was presented, but was not acted upon.

Monthly bills were allowed and the reports of the city officials were audited and approved.

The city tax collector was authorized to release and to convey to S. C. Rucks lot No. 1 in block 161, it appearing that all taxes had been paid and that the records showed that the said lot had been sold for taxes to the city.

Fire Chief McHam was authorized to purchase a set of Hale's fire harness for the fire team.

Councilman Bean suggested that the city provide a cart and horse and hire a man to keep the streets and alleys in the down town district free from paper and other trash, but action upon his suggestion was deferred.

The discussion of the proposed new contract with the water company was then taken up, but no definite action was taken and a special meeting was set for next Wednesday night to further consider the proposition.
