HORROR IS AVERTED

FIRE DRILL PREVENTED REPETITION OF YESTERDAY'S DISASTER IN GRAND RAPIDS.

THE DEATH LIST GROWING

Total Number of Victims in Cleveland Holocaust May Reach One Hundred and Eighty.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Mar. 5.—Grand Rapids today was threatened with a repetition of the Cleveland tragedy of yesterday on a larger scale. Fire was discovered to have broken out in the laboratory of the Central High School while one thousand two hundred pupils were in the midst of their morning work. The signal for the fire drill was given and the children marched out in "perfect order."

Fire Resulted From Explosion.

Cleveland, Ohio, Mar. 5.—So far as known today, one hundred and twelve bodies have been identified from among the pupils of the Lakeview school in Collinwood, who lost their lives in the fire that gutted the school building yesterday. The exact number of fatalities is unknown. The number may reach one hundred and seventy. How many bodies are still in the ruins, if any, has not positively been determined.

The village firemen and voluntary assistants are still probing the smoldering ruins.

One hundred and sixty-eight bodies have been recovered, and of these there remain fifty-six to be identified.

Arrangements for a great public funeral are being rapidly perfected. This will take place tomorrow or Saturday.

County Coroner Lusk has begun an investigation of the causes leading to the terrible loss of life. It is now believed that the fire resulted from the explosion of a heating boiler.

As the day wore on the belief became general that the number of the dead might total upwards to one hundred and eighty. Village Engineer Gould says he is of the opinion that possibly twenty more bodies are still in the ruins and are probably burned to ashes.

Numbers Used at Morgue.

At the temporary morgue in the Lake Shore shops, the scenes became fourfold in the intensity of human suffering as fathers, mothers, brothers and sisters passed up and down the lines formed of 160 corpses. To facilitate identification the bodies were numbered as they were received at the morgue.

The first identification was made by the mother of Nels and Tommy Thompson, aged 6 and 9 years, respectively. The heads and arms had been burned from both bodies, but the mother recognized the shoes on their feet.

And so the heartrending work went on, accentuated now and then by a piercing shriek or plaintive moan as a loved one was recognized by clothing or token, such as a ring or necklace.

About the burned school house are but few residences. In one of these Mrs. Clark Sprung lived. Her little boy, Alvin, aged 7, was a pupil in the second grade. When the fire started the mother ran over to the school and arrived when the first floor was a mass of flames.

Statement By Janitor.

Janitor Herter could tell little of what happened after the fire started. "I was sweeping in the basement," he said, "when I looked up and saw a wisp of smoke curling out from beneath the front stairway. I ran to the fire alarm and pulled the gong that sounded throughout the building. Then I ran first to the front and then to the rear doors.

"I cannot remember what happened next, except that I saw the flames shooting all about and the children running down through them screaming. Some fell as the rear entrance and others stumbled over them. I saw my little Helen among them. I

tried to pull her out, but the flames drove me back. I had to leave my little child to die."

Many May Never Be Identified.

Cleveland, Ohio, Mar. 5.—One hundred and sixty-five lives, all but two of them children between the ages of 6 and 15 years, are known to have been lost in the fire which yesterday destroyed the public school in North Collinwood, ten miles east of this city.

Several others are missing and their bodies may possibly be in the ruins. Of the one hundred and sixty-five bodies recovered, one hundred and eight have been identified and fifty-seven are still unknown. The bodies are so blackened by the fire and smoke and so battered and bruised by the trampling of feet that there is no human chance of their identity being discovered. It is only by means of some small articles of wearing apparel that their identity can be ascertained.

ANARCHIST DEN RAISED.

Chicago Police are Active in Their Efforts to Rid the City of Them.

Chicago, Ill., Mar. 5.—Continuing in their efforts to connect the attempted assassination of Chief George M. Shippy last Monday with an anarchist plot the police today raided a rooming house at Seventy-six Johnson street and seized a trunk full of property belonging to Harry Goldstein, one of the alleged anarchists now under arrest. The trunk which is believed by the police to contain anarchist literature, was taken to the Maxwell police station.

TO MEET ON SAME DATE.

Republicans Would Hold Convention at Same Time and Place as Democrats.

Dallas, Tex., Mar. 5.—It was announced today that the republicans are making a determined effort to hold their State convention in Fort Worth on May 26th, the same as the democrats will hold their convention there. Should both meetings be held there at the same time it will be an unique event in Texas politics.

Adamson was the only eye witness and declared that Brazel shot in self defense.

OVER FOUR HUNDRED

BIG CROWD CAME UP ON THE EXCURSION FROM OLNEY THIS MORNING.

BROUGHT TWO BANDS

Were Welcomed in Brief Speech by Attorney Montgomery—Visitors Have a Good Time.

Headed by two brass bands, one of fifteen pieces from Olney and the other of thirteen pieces from True, nearly five hundred excursionists from Olney and the surrounding country arrived in Wichita Falls at about 11 o'clock this morning on a special train of six coaches over the new Wichita Falls and Southern railroad.

The excursionists were met at the Katy depot by several hundred citizens of Wichita Falls and a brief, but appropriate address of welcome was delivered by Attorney J. T. Montgomery, following which a procession was formed and headed by the two bands the excursionists marched through the business part of the city.

No special entertainment was made for the visitors, who soon scattered about town, enjoying themselves as they saw fit.

The trip coming up is described as a very pleasant one, no disagreeable incident to mar the pleasure of the excursionists.

The track was in good shape and no delays were experienced.

The excursion left on its return trip shortly after 3 o'clock this afternoon. The visitors were an exceptionally well behaved crowd and seemed to have enjoyed the trip immensely.

A FIRM ATTITUDE.

Japan Will Not Resort to Force Toward China.

Tokio, Japan, Mar. 5.—The Japanese government, while maintaining the firmest attitude concerning the seizure of the ship Tatsu by the Chinese at Macoon on February 7th, entertain no idea of resorting to force for the recovery of the vessel. Possibly in the event that China delays action, Japan will appeal to England or America to act as an intermediary in the matter.

REDFIELD PROCTOR DEAD.

Vermont Senator Succumbs to Attack of Grip in Washington.

Washington, Mar. 4.—United States Senator Redfield Proctor died late this afternoon of grip. Senator Proctor was 77 years of age.

The senator had been ill and confined to his room at the Champlain apartments in this city for about a week. His ailment was diagnosed as the grip, which later developed into pleurisy, with pneumonia complications, which affected the heart, and which, in his enfeebled condition, proved too much for his powers of resistance. Besides his son, Governor Proctor, the Governor's wife and several intimate friends were at his bedside when death occurred. The senator's body will be taken to his old home in Proctorsville, Vermont.

The senator had been in feeble health ever since the assembling of congress, and it was remarked by his friends that for the first time in his recollection he had failed to return from his usual summer fishing trip in the high state of health which he always enjoyed.

Biographical Sketch.

Redfield Proctor has been a United States Senator from Vermont since November, 1901. He was born at Proctorsville, Vt., June 1st, 1831, son of Jabez and Betsy (Parker) Proctor; graduated at Dartmouth College in 1851 and studied at the Albany law school. He practiced law and for a time was at the head of extensive quarry interests; served as lieutenant colonel in the union army from 1861 to 1865; was a member of the Vermont legislature in 1867, 1868 and 1888; member and president pro tem of the State senate in 1874 and 1875; lieutenant governor of Vermont 1876 to 1878; governor of the State from 1878 to 1880, and was secretary of war of the United States from 1889 to 1891. During March, 1898, he visited Cuba, and his speech in the senate on Cuban reconstruction, after his return, attracted wide attention.

SIXTEEN FOR BRYAN

NEBRASKA DEMOCRATS TO SEND SOLID DELEGATION TO DENVER.

POPULISTS MEET ALSO

Leaders of That Party in Nebraska Propose to Endorse Bryan.

Omaha, Neb., Mar. 5.—Twelve of the sixteen delegates from Nebraska to the democratic national convention in Denver next July were selected by the congressional district convention of the party here this morning.

Four delegates at large will be chosen by the State convention which is scheduled to be called to order in the city auditorium at 2 o'clock this afternoon. All sixteen will go to Denver instructed to vote for W. J. Bryan as the presidential candidate of the party. The State convention of the populist party will also take place here today and an endorsement of Mr. Bryan as a presidential candidate is planned by the leaders.

The democratic State convention was opened at 2 o'clock this afternoon. The opening address was made by Mr. Hanks. His address in part was as follows:

"The campaign of 1908 began in 1896," said Mr. Hanks. "Against the Chicago platform and the nominee have been hurled denunciation, vituperation and accusations of anarchy. Vain are the battles against the right. Where are the defenders of national honor? Where are the organizers of the 'safe and sane' democracy? The mask has been torn asunder and they stand condemned before the bar of public opinion. This band of men told us to 'reserve the national honor' when they were devoid of personal honor.

"The people for the years preceding 1896 groped in darkness. No leaders dared defend them. Their representatives were bribed. Men of wealth banded together with but one purpose and that to plunder the people. They knew no political lines save for business interests. They were republican for States that were republican, democrats in States that were democratic. They nominated the candidates for both political parties and financed both campaigns that they might control the administration, no matter who was elected.

"Against this dictation and usurpation of power the American people have rebelled. Getting their inspiration from the early patriots of our country, getting their encouragement from men who are battling for purer politics, with a determination founded on eternal right, they will yet nominate, they will elect, they will yet rule.

"There is a feeling of unrest everywhere that bodes ill for the republican party. The time is ripe for a change. It is vain for the republicans to claim credit for widespread prosperity and try to avoid the blame for a widespread panic.

"The republican party defends aristocracy and grants it special privileges—the privilege of taxing the many for the benefit of the few, the privilege of controlling our finances, the privilege of monopolizing the necessities and the privilege of disobeying the law.

"The democratic party challenges this right of privilege by aristocracy. They demand that they obey the law; they demand that they shall not rob the public; they demand that private monopoly must be destroyed; they demand equal rights to all and special privileges to none.

"The united democratic party welcomes the conflict. It will be a contest between the few that dominate the commercial world and control the republican party and the many that carry the living masses toward equality and justice.

"Thousands of republicans are telling us that if a reform candidate is not nominated they will vote for Bryan. LaFollette is their only reform candidate—the only man old enough to take his stand with the people. Roosevelt, thundering democratic doctrine in his message to congress, has opened the minds of millions of republicans to the philosophy of democracy. He calls to arms to the masses against the masses and has opened the hearts of thousands to the evangel of democracy.

"We do not know which of the special representatives of the special interests their candidate will be—Fairbanks, Cannon or Foraker? Or will it be Taft, who has not committed himself on any public question? There is no reform with a candidate like Taft.

"You search in vain for his convictions on vital questions. That has (Continued on Page 5.)

FINED \$50 AND COSTS FOR INTOXICATION

Clint Turner, formerly a bartender in a local saloon, was fined \$50 and costs in the corporation court this morning on a plea of guilty to a charge of public intoxication.

Turner had no funds with which to liquidate his fine and was set to work upon the streets.

The fine in Turner's case was made unusually heavy, after it was found upon investigation that he had not only failed to provide for his wife and baby, but had mistreated them. According to the story told the officers by Turner's wife, when she was interviewed in the room occupied by the family over a store on Ohio avenue, her husband compelled her and their little baby girl to sleep on the floor with a single quilt to cover them while he usurped a single cot, the only furniture the place afforded. The woman further stated that Turner had failed to make any provision whatever for the support of herself and baby.

These statements were taken into consideration by the court in assessing the heavy fine, as it was thought that Mrs. Turner and the child would get along better without her husband, who would likely have to work out his fine on the streets.

It is probable, the officers say, that other complaints will be filed against others who have failed to provide for their families.

MILLERS' SUIT IS CONTINUED.

Anti-Trust Litigation Goes Over Until the May Term.

Austin, Tex., Mar. 3.—The anti-trust suit of the State against the Texas Millers' Association for cancellation and penalties, was called in Judge Wilcox's court this morning and continued until next term because of lack of service. There are 129 defendants, and some being partners and out of the State when the process was first sent, it has been impossible to serve them. Then others have filed affidavits denying that they are the agents for certain principals sued, besides others who were not located. All of that class of process will be reissued at once.

The next term of court will convene on the first Monday in May. Several attorneys were present, representing defendants, but made no objection to the continuance. A number of the defendants who have been served have filed answers to the State's petition, being in the usual formal language and closed as general demurrers and general denials. They contain nothing out of the ordinary, maintaining that no trust exists and no laws have been violated. All of these will be considered when the case is called for trial. Practically every flour miller in Texas is named as a defendant.

Word comes from the State headquarters of the Texas Sunday school association, which is the organization of all Sunday schools banded together for mutual helpfulness, that the State Sunday school convention to be held in Austin, beginning Thursday, March 19, will be the greatest and most enthusiastic ever held in the State. Mr. Marion Lawrence, the leading Sunday school man of the world, Prof. O. E. Excell, the leading song leader of the world, and other world leaders who will be present are: Marshall A. Hudson of New York, E. A. Fox of Kentucky, E. Richmond of Pennsylvania, Secretaries Ellzey of Louisiana and Long of Arkansas, and probably W. N. Hartshorn of Massachusetts, E. K. Warren of Michigan, and John R. Pepper of Tennessee. The leaders of the various denominational organizations of Texas will also have a part on the program.

KENTUCKY'S "REANIMATED DEMOCRACY."

The Louisville Courier-Journal seems to regard the result of the senatorial election in Kentucky with more or less satisfaction. That is to say, it prefers Bradley to Beckham and it asserts that Beckham is down and out and that the way is now open to a "re-animated democracy." Let us hope at least that the latter prospect really exists. But we have doubts.

Quarrels like that which arched the Kentucky democracy do not as a result so satisfactorily when a climax like that of last Friday is reached. We have had bitter party quarrels in Texas, but they were settled easily because of the overwhelming democratic majority. Where parties are of approximately equal strength, feuds culminating in treachery do not yield so easily to treatment. It will be fortunate indeed, for the democracy if the election of Bradley, by the votes of democrats who embezzled the power they used, does not result this year in the loss of the electoral vote of the State.

Of course, the Courier-Journal may be right. It is on the ground and the Post is not, but from this distance the action of the democrats who voted for Bradley seems utterly unpardonable. It looks like they deliberately sold out, not for pecuniary profit, possibly, but that they sacrificed Kentucky's interest in national affairs for votes involving a purely local measure.

Whatever may have been their mo-

tive, the fact remains that public opinion can never justify a deliberate act of treachery like that. It would have been bad enough had the four members held out to the last and prevented an election, thus submitting the senatorial issue to the people of Kentucky next year at the election for members of the legislature. That would at least have given the democratic party a chance to adjust the quarrel or if necessary to agree on some candidate other than Beckham. But to turn republican was the limit of political debauchery.

Now the question comes up: What good will a primary election do in Kentucky hereafter? Those who have justified the attitude of the six recalcitrants have a precedent that knocks the props from under the doctrine of direct election of senators, so far as Kentucky is concerned. Party minorities may hereafter disregard a primary mandate with impunity or ignore party caucuses, and no doubt such will prove the case in view of recent happenings.

Out of such conditions the republicans will profit. Thus the majority of the people are denied the right to dominate State affairs because the minority adheres to the policy of harmonious co-operation while the majority are flouting the party doctrine of acquiescence by the minority in the will of the majority. We fear that the Courier-Journal will ascertain that the "re-animated democracy" of Kentucky will be a long time on the way.—Houston Post.

been the policy of candidates in the past whose administrations were owned completely by the financiers.

"The democratic party is not extreme. They believe that legislative equality is the panacea for all government ills. The extreme conservative is the republican party. They are so extremely conservative that tariffs protect a few at the expense of the many; so conservative that a few own the necessities of life while millions of people must pay the price; so extremely conservative that they would ape European governments and establish a colonial policy.

"The democratic party is not radical, but conservative; not the conservatism of special interests, but of Jefferson, Jackson and Bryan. I do not agree that Bryan is radical. He is simply advocating earnestly and fearlessly democratic doctrine. To the special interests he is the sorrow of their thought and the nightmare of their dream. They fear him not because they think he is radical, but because they know if elected he will be faithful to democratic principles.

"The democratic party will name a man for president who would rather live on a farm at Fairview than to be a president owned and controlled by special interests; a man who would rather go down to defeat in the third battle than to mortgage his party before election; a man who for twelve years has been oak and rock to the democratic party. He is not only democracy's choice, but democracy's hope. They tell us that he has been defeated twice. Twice defeated, he has convinced the world that he is right; defeated twice, he has convinced the world that he is worthy to be president; twice defeated, he has forced a republican president to turn his back upon the republican party and to take his stand upon a democratic platform."

SOUTHWESTERN NOW CONTROLS TEXAS TELEPHONE COMPANY PLANTS.

NEW DIVISION FORMED

Wichita Falls is Headquarters and Judge C. B. Felder is Superintendent.

As was stated in the Times several days ago, the Southwestern Telephone Company has purchased the lines, exchanges and other property of the Texas Telephone Company, including the plants at Henrietta, Wichita Falls, Iowa Park, Vernon, Chillicothe and Childress.

Yesterday T. L. Powell, assistant general superintendent for the Southwestern, was in the city and a formal transfer of the property was made by the Texas company to the Southwestern.

Judge C. B. Felder, formerly manager for the Texas company, was appointed division superintendent of the new division formed by the exchange here and those included in the purchase. The headquarters of the division will be located in this city.

Improvements will be inaugurated at once and the whole division will be worked over, so that a more satisfactory service can be given. A crew of linemen are now engaged in transferring the telephone lines from the Katy to the Denver tracks between this city and Henrietta and new poles and additional wires are being used.

EYE ALMOST PUT OUT.

Two young men claiming to have recently been employed on the Rock Island as firemen and giving their names as L. T. Tipton and L. E.
