JAPAN'S ULTIMATUM

PRESENTED TO CHINESE FOREIGN BOARD AND JAPAN EXPERTS REPLY TOMORROW.

INSISTS UPON APOLOGY

Japanese Will Not Tolerate Investigation of Steamship Seizure—Declares Facts Incontrovertible.

Pekin, China, Mar. 7.—Japan's ultimatum in the case of the steamship Tatsu was presented to the head of the Chinese foreign board yesterday and today the board has the matter under consideration. Japan expects a reply tomorrow. She will not tolerate China's offer to investigate the case and insists upon apology for the hauling down of the Japanese flag on Matsu Maru and will not accept mediation, affirming that China is in error and that the facts are incontrovertible.

Japan Will Not Resort to Force.

Tokio, Japan, Mar. 7.—Japan will not resort to force in connection with the seizure of the steamer Tatsu, unless compelled to do so by the action of China. This statement was given to the Associated Press today by a high authority in the foreign office. The foreign office does not expect further developments for a few days. The only points remaining undecided are the restoration of the arms which the Japanese continue to demand, also the raising of the Japanese flag on the Tatsu with appropriate ceremonies.

PITCHED BATTLE WITH ROBBERS.

Two Farmers Wounded, But Three Robbers Were Captured.

Camden, N. J., Mar. 7.—A pitched battle between robbers and farmers, in which two of the latter were wounded followed the daring robbery early today of the postoffices at Fredericktown and Bridgeport, about thirty miles south of this city. Three robbers were captured. A score of farmers, well armed, penned the robbers in the woods. Both sides opened fire and one robber fell and a second threw up his hands and surrendered. The third man held his ground some time, but fled further into the woods, being captured later. The robbers had secured about \$1,500 in stamps and money.

Russian Robbers Captured.

Luga, Russia, Mar. 7.—A band of men recently attacked the postoffice here and having killed the clerk and a policeman, made their escape empty handed. The police and gendarmes and the villagers started in pursuit and in a two days chase lost four men killed and three wounded. Two of the robbers were killed and three captured.

BOOTLEGGER CAUGHT AT FREDERICK

Frederick Leader.

On Monday night Sheriff Carter added another bootlegger's scalp to his record by the arrest of Joe Milton at the wagon yard on South Ninth street in Frederick.

When arraigned before Judge Campbell in the county court on Tuesday, Milton plead guilty and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$50 and serve thirty days in jail.

Five and a half gallons of whiskey that was captured with Milton was ordered destroyed by the judge, and while many thirsty ones looked on sorrowfully, Marshal Waggoner poured the contents out on the ground.

LOCAL CAPITAL GOES TO CHILDRESS

Childress, Tex., Mar. 7.—The Childress Ice and Electrical Company was organized Thursday night and a temporary board of directors was elected as follows: Thomas Kilpatrick, R. H. Morris, F. M. Hilliard, E. E. Woods, P. C. Maricle, C. A. Faulbon and J. H. Aynesworth. The directors were authorized to proceed to investigate the sites offered, also to contract for an ice plant at once, so that the plant could be in working order by the middle of June.

It is proposed to incorporate the company at a capitalization of \$50,000. This amount has been fully subscribed. Mr. Maricle and other parties at Wichita Falls have subscribed for a good portion of the capital stock.

THE NASSAU IS LAUNCHED.

Germany's Largest Warship is Christened by Grand Duchess of Baden.

Wilhelms, Haven, March 7.—Germany's first mammoth warship was successfully launched today and christened the "Nassau" by the Grand Duchess of Baden. Emperor William, the Grand Duke of Baden, Prince Henry of Prussia, Prince Henry of Netherlands as well as other brilliant statesmen, were assembled among the prominent officials present.

Hohenhau Degraded.

Berlin, Germany, Mar. 7.—Count Hohenhau, formerly commander of the guard corps and at one time adjutant to Emperor William, has been sentenced by a military court to be deprived of his rank in the army and to surrender all orders and decorations that have been conferred upon him. The finding of the court has been confirmed by Emperor William. Count Hohenhau was accused of being one of the so-called court of camarilla, recently exposed by Maximilian Harden.

HUGHES ENDORSED

NEW YORK REPUBLICANS APPROVE CANDIDACY OF THEIR GOVERNOR.

EULOGY FOR ROOSEVELT

President is Commended and Classed With the Most Heroic Figures in American History.

New York, Mar. 7.—Governor Chas. F. Hughes today received the endorsement of the New York republican State committee as a candidate for the presidential nomination. A resolution was adopted by a unanimous vote commending President Roosevelt "for his rugged determination to oppose wrong doing and demanding justice for all" and classed him with "the greatest and most heroic figures of American history, Washington, Lincoln, Grant and McKinley."

GOOD SHOWING MADE.

Three Wichita Falls Banks Are in Splendid Shape.

The statements of the three banks of Wichita Falls for February 14th show all of them in stronger positions than at the call of December 3rd, though the aggregate amount of deposits has decreased considerably, showing \$859,000.00 as against \$941,000.00 in December.

In even numbers the statement of the First National Bank shows deposits of \$335,000.00 as against \$330,000.00 in December. It also shows cash and exchange on hand \$119,000.00, an increase of \$14,000.00 over December. It has loans of \$310,000.00, a decrease of \$37,000.00 since December. Its rediscounts have been reduced \$27,000.00 since December.

The City National Bank shows deposits of 467,000.00 as against \$552,000.00 in December. It shows cash and exchange \$93,000.00, an increase of \$6,000.00 over December. It shows loans of \$605,000.00, a decrease of \$98,000.00. It has reduced its rediscounts to \$19,000.00 since December.

The Farmers Bank and Trust Company shows deposits of \$57,000.00 as against \$62,000.00 in December. It shows cash and exchange \$38,000.00, an increase of \$6,000 since December. It shows loans of \$92,000.00, a decrease of \$12,000 since December. This bank has no rediscounts and occupies an exceptionally strong position having over 65 per cent of its deposits on hand.

The First National Bank leads in cash and exchange, having \$119,000.00 out of a total of \$250,000.00 held by the three banks. The City National Bank leads in the amount of deposits, having \$467,000.00 out of a total of \$849,000.00. The Farmers Bank and Trust Company leads in amount of proportionate reserve on hand showing over double the amount required by law.

Wichita Falls has cause to be proud of her three banks and of the showing made by them as to amount of business and financial strength.

VERNON MELON GROWERS MEET

Vernon Record.

At the call meeting of the Melon Growers' Association which was held at the Court House on last Saturday afternoon, plans for the 1908 crop were completely reviewed and a thorough understanding was arrived at as to the number of acres each member of the association would plant, together with the number of shipping crates that would be needed by the association to take care of this year's crop.

From reports which came in, it seems that the acreage will be larger this year than usual, and while the association already has a good many crates on hand, it was decided that 12,375 more would be required, so an order was placed for that number to be distributed among the members in proportion to their respective acreage.

Last year 18 cars of cantaloupes were shipped from this point, giving the owners in round numbers about \$375 per car, which leads any other West Texas community.

At Saturday's meeting, J. H. Pettit was chosen president and J. T. Weathering, vice president, E. L. Witty, having been made secretary at a previous meeting.

OVERCOME BY GAS.

Twenty-Six Laborers Overcome in Railroad Tunnel.

BIG CROWD AT WACO

THREE THOUSAND ANTI-BAILEY MEN GATHER AT BIG MEETING.

EDITOR WAS WHIPPED

Hon. A. M. Kennedy and P. H. Carnes Fight Over an Anti-Bailey Badge.

Waco, Tex., Mar. 7.—Cheers, waving flags and banners announced the arrival of the trains today bearing delegates to the anti-Bailey convention. Three thousand delegates are attending. The event is the most unique and important in Texas history. The delegates declare that they seek to free Texas from "machine" rule and Baileyism and to prevent the senator from attending the Denver convention as a delegate at large.

P. H. Carnes, a Waco traveling man, beat up A. M. Kennedy, a representative of the last legislature, a Bailey supporter and owner of the Waco Star. The fight was occasioned by Carnes' wearing an anti-Bailey badge as a member of the reception committee.

The Dallas train carried a huge oil can with the label, "Shall this or the people rule?" The crush at the auditorium was great. Judge West of Waco called the convention to order.

TWENTY WERE INJURED.

Four Seriously Hurt When Burlington Passenger Went in Ditch.

Kansas City, Mo., Mar. 7.—The Burlington passenger train No. 4, which left Kansas City at 7:30 o'clock this morning for Chicago, was derailed at Kearney, Mo., twenty-five miles north of here and went over a fifteen-foot embankment. Twenty persons were injured, four of them seriously. Those seriously hurt are: J. D. Guyton, Kansas City; R. E. Wilcox, Kansas City; a Mr. Chappell, a young Divinity student studying at Liberty, Mo., and a traveling man whose name is unknown.

VICTIMS IN SCHOOL FIRE NUMBER 174

Cleveland, Ohio, Mar. 7.—The last of the little victims of the Collinwood school fire to perish was Glen Barber, aged 8 years. He died today of injuries sustained in his leap from the second story window of the school building.

A canvass of the school district shows that one hundred and seventy-four are dead or missing, including two teachers. Only one hundred and sixty-seven bodies have been taken out of the ruins. Twenty-one of these are still unidentified.

 Burkburnett, Tex., Mar. 7.—Burkburnett, Wichita county's youngest town, which in less than twelve months has reached a population of four hundred or above, has made wonderful advancement. During the past few months the writer has been giving considerable time to the work of securing for this beautiful and thriving little town a house of worship, which is its present greatest need. He has had the co-operation of not only the members of his own church, but of members of other churches and some not identified with any church. Rev. Isaac Frealey, a local preacher who owns property here and who preached the first sermon in Burkburnett, has rendered valuable assistance. The ladies have organized an Aid Society and are rendering appreciated help, having pledged \$100. Mr. Burk Burnett recently sent us his check for a like amount, the town and community also responding nicely to the needs of the enterprise in a material way. It is to be remembered that a large percentage of the country population and almost the entire population of the town are new settlers. They deserve much credit for their heroic effort to secure for themselves and friends a house of worship. If anyone should feel disposed to help them, though not a resident of the town or community, it would be highly appreciated and money invested in a worthy cause. It needs no argument to prove that religious and educational institutions enhance the value of every lot, house and acre of land near them, since no one wants to live where these advantages are not to be had. Here is the present status of the enterprise: The following have been appointed as a building committee—Messrs. J. L. Roberts, J. B. Evans, J. F. Gullett, Isaac Frealey and H. J. Ingram; organized with J. L. Roberts, chairman, and J. F. Gullett, secretary and treasurer; bids submitted to lumbermen for material; contract for same awarded; mechanics employed; lots in most central and desirable part of town purchased, on which a solid concrete foundation is now being placed for the building, 32x50 feet and the erection of the church to be begun early next week. While the property is to be owned by the Methodist church, other denominations will be accorded the use of it.

The Bonham News says that any young man who wants to make \$25,000 clear of all expenses within the next five years can do so by planting one hundred acres in strawberries. Whether \$25,000 could be cleared is not a certainty, but such a profit is entirely probable to any young man of brains and energy who will plant strawberries along the irrigation ditch here. Wichita Falls can beat the world in the production of strawberries and another thing in favor of the strawberry producer is the fact that he can always dispose of the crop at fancy prices. Strawberries are being raised here in increasing quantities every year and the market for the crop is growing faster than the production.

The following pretty little story was contained in a Washington special to the St. Louis Republic, giving an account of how Senator Bailey saved the job of a rural mail carrier in Southwest Texas:

"Senator Joseph W. Bailey of Texas dropped all other business himself and made Postmaster General Von L. Meyer drop all other business yesterday until it had been promised that a rural delivery carrier in Southwest Texas would not lose his job because of his love affair.

"It came about through a letter to Bailey by the carrier. It was a very lively, direct and sincere letter. On his route was the home of a farmer, and the farmer had a daughter.

"She is the best girl in the world," reads the letter, "and if I get her I'll be

elect to congress along with you." It was explained that 'Pearl' liked him, too. Well, the carrier rode by the farm every day, and could not see why he shouldn't leave notes in the mail box at the front gate.

"One day he left a ring in an envelope. The next day he dropped into the box another note, inquiring if she had received the ring, saying 'sweet things' and asking would she. It seems that the papa and mamma in the case opposed the match, and got the ring and the note. The carrier had not used stamps. The father-in-law prospective saw his chance in this. He complained that the intruding carrier had defrauded Uncle Sam of postage. Technically this was true. The carrier's job certainly was endangered. But he wrote his plaintive letter here, saying to Bailey:

"It was just a very little mistake. Couldn't you fix it with the postmaster general?"

"And Bailey took it to the postmaster general in person. The rural carrier Romeo's job is safe."

The charge is now almost openly made that Attorney General Davidson owes his first election to the office which he now holds to a large campaign fund subscribed by both the railroad interests and the wholesale liquor dealers. They can find consolation, however, in the fact that he failed to get the nomination—a case where the defeat of their favorite candidate was a victory in disguise.
