From reports which came in, it

seems that the acreage will be larger this year than usual, and while the association already has a good many crates on hand, it was decided that 12,375 more would be required; so an order was placed for that number to be be distributed among the members in proportion to their respective acreage. Last, year 18 cars of cantaloupes werer shipped from this point, gringing the owners in round numbers about \$375 per car, which leads any other West Texas community.
