## IN TROUBLE AGAIN

**WALKER HARGRAVES INDICTED  
IN FORT WORTH FOR AGGRA-  
VATED ASSAULT.**

### GUN PLAY ON STREET CAR

**Conductor, However, Proved Equal to  
the Emergency and Threw Him  
Off the Car.**

Fort Worth, Tex., Mar. 9.—Walter Hargrave, the reputed "bad man" of Bowie who is said to have killed seven men, was indicted by the district court grand jury today charged with aggravated assault. Hargrave is accused of leveling a revolver at street car conductor N. M. Brown and in a fight which followed Hargrave was thrown off the car.

Hargrave was tried before a jury in Fort Worth Saturday upon a charge of carrying a pistol contrary to the laws of the State of Texas and was acquitted.

Hargrave's defense was that his life was constantly menaced by enemies who sought to kill him. At the trial he was asked if he then had a pistol in his pocket and to this he replied that he did not as he thought the officers of the court would protect him from any outside danger. It will be remembered that Hargrave was convicted in the Wichita Falls court some months ago upon the same charge and was fined \$100 and costs.

### BIG LAND DEAL.

**W. Q. Little Buys Moon Ranch in Cottle County.**

## PRIEST'S ASSASSIN PLACED ON TRIAL

Denver, Colo., Mar. 9.—Anticipating the presence of a large crowd at the opening of the trial today of Giuseppe Albo, the Sicilian, who in cold blood murdered Father Leo Heinrich of St. Elizabeth's church while he was giving the sacrament on Sunday, Feb. 23rd, Sheriff Alexander Nesbit this morning stationed deputies along the walks and entrance ways leading from the jail to the court room, also in the court room itself. This precaution was taken to frustrate any attempt at mob violence, although the officers did not really look for any outbreak of that kind. It is expected that the defense will be insanity.

## DR. ROBERTSON DEAD

**PROMINENT PHYSICIAN ANSWERED  
DEATH'S SUMMONS SATUR-  
DAY EVENING.**

### USEFUL CAREER ENDED

**Dead Physician Stood High in His  
Profession and Was a Big Hearted  
Man.**

Saturday evening, March 7th, at 7:30 o'clock, Dr. Robert R. Robertson died at his home in this city, 1302 Eighth street.

The news of his death came as a shock. That he was in bad health and had been for the past four years, was well known, but no one, not even the members of his own family, thought the end was so near.

Only the day before his death he attended the funeral of Col. L. T. Miller and while at the cemetery grew so weak that friends had to support him to his buggy and on reaching home he had another and more severe attack, which resulted in his death as above stated. The immediate cause of Dr. Robertson's death was hemorrhage of the stomach.

He was one of the most skilled and widely known physicians in Northwest Texas. Coming to Wichita Falls in the fall of 1892 from his native State of Kentucky, it was not a great while until he had built up a practice in his profession that should have required the physical strength of two strong and vigorous men like himself rather than one, but he rarely ever refused a summons from the sick, whether the patient was a poor or rich man. The matter of collecting his fee for a professional visit was always secondary with him. A few years of such active work soon began to show its effect

of being 44 years of age, and leaves a devoted wife and four small children to mourn his untimely taking off, besides numerous other relatives and a host of close friends.

Besides his immediate family, deceased leaves two sisters, Mrs. J. H. Huggins of Kell, Oklahoma and Miss Bettye Robertson of Amarillo, and one brother, Mr. W. W. Robertson, of this city, and several nephews and nieces, all of whom attended the funeral.

The funeral was held at the family residence at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon under the auspices of the local order of Elks, of which deceased had been a member only a few days. The weather was decidedly disagreeable, but notwithstanding this, a large number of close personal friends came in from far and near to pay this last sad tribute of respect to his memory. The service was simple, but sad and impressive. The choir organized for this special occasion rendered very sweetly, "Rock of Ages," "Some Day We'll Understand," and a solo by Mr. Krueger, "Lead, Kindly Light." At the conclusion of the funeral service at the home, the remains were escorted to the Riverside Cemetery, and there deposited in their last resting place, Messrs. J. H. Russell, P. H. Pennington, R. B. Stayton, Henry Miller, S. Y. Ferguson and Ed. Lysaght acting as pall bearers.

In life the deceased was a great lover of flowers and was rarely ever seen upon our streets without a small bouquet fastened in the lapel of his coat. His friends seemed to remember this and there were many floral offerings. ## TWO SAD DEATHS SATURDAY NIGHT

Two deaths attended by unusually sad circumstances occurred in this city Saturday night.

The first was that of Mrs. G. W. Farley, who recently came here from Stonewall, Oklahoma, and the second was that of Mrs. Farley's 10-year old sister, Lillie Duncan.

Mrs. Farley's death occurred at 7:30 o'clock and her sister died an hour later.

The Farley family, since coming here about three weeks ago, have been living in a tent adjoining the Nichols wagon yard on Indiana avenue.

Several cases of measles broke out in the family and a short time ago, before she had fully recovered from the measles, Mrs. Farley gave birth to a baby and following her confinement was seized with pneumonia, which resulted in her death Saturday night.

Her sister, Lillie Duncan, aged 10, was also stricken with pneumonia following an attack of the measles, dying in the same tent an hour after the death of her sister.

The baby still survives and two other children of the family, who have been sick with the measles, are on the road to recovery.

The bodies of Mrs. Farley and her sister were laid to rest in the Riverside cemetery Sunday afternoon.

### TOMORROW IS CLEAN UP DAY.

Tomorrow will be observed throughout the state of Texas as clean-up day. The day has been designated by State Health Officer Brumby with a view of concentrating public attention to the importance of better sanitary conditions. So far as the Times is able to learn there will be no public observance of the day in Wichita Falls but this need not deter the citizens generally from putting their premises in a more presentable shape and improving sanitary conditions.

A thorough cleaning up right now, and keeping of public and private property in a more cleanly condition throughout the season, would, no doubt do away with the causes of many cases of typhoid fever which will afflict and may cause the deaths of many patients in Wichita Falls next summer. As science has demonstrated, there can be little individualism in matters of health where contagious or epidemic diseases are concerned. The health of every man is bound up with that of every other man, so it behooves the public to act in concert in securing more healthful conditions. The Times regrets that it has not urged the observance of clean-up day more vigorously and that no organized effort will be made tomorrow for a cleaner and a more healthful Wichita Falls. We suggest that the Civic League, the City Council and any other organizations that are interested, join in an effort to set apart a special day to clean up Wichita Falls.

### NEWS FORECAST.

Senator Aldrich is still hopeful of bringing his emergency currency bill to a vote during the present week of the congressional session. As several speeches are to be made, however, it is probable that the vote will be postponed until next week. The legislative, executive and judicial appropriation bill will be reported to the senate on Tuesday or Wednesday and it will be taken up at the first opportunity.

The House will devote Monday to matters relating to the District of Columbia and then take up the postoffice appropriation bill, general debate on which will close at 3 o'clock Tuesday. It is hoped to pass the bill before adjournment on Thursday. Then will follow the pension bill, on which there will be a period of general debate.

The Lilley submarine boat investigation by the special house committee will begin today and continue daily. The senate committee on naval affairs will resume its investigation into the government's method of construction today, when it is expected that Admirals Goodrich and Ramey will be heard.

The Federal suit to dissolve the Standard Oil Company will be continued today in Cleveland, Ohio. The hearing in the government's suit to dissolve the American Tobacco Company will be resumed in New York on Wednesday.

The trial of Giuseppe Allo, charged with killing Father Leo, was begun in Denver today.

To arouse intelligent interest in the home and foreign missions among our younger laymen, members of the Young People's societies and the fourteen million members of the Sunday schools of North America is the aim of the first intermissionary convention to be held in Pittsburg on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday under the direction of the Young People's Missionary movement.

Two republican State conventions will be held on Wednesday to elect delegates to the national convention. The Nebraska convention will be held at Omaha, and the Oklahoma republicans will meet at Oklahoma City.

The convention of the United Mine Workers of America has been called at Indianapolis to consider the situation resulting from the failure of operators and miners in the central competitive field to agree upon the proposition to call a joint convention to re-establish the interstate wage agreement and adopt a scale of wages.

The battleship fleet now on its way to Magdalena Bay is expected to arrive there Saturday. A month will be spent there in target practice and fleet evolutions. The American torpedo boat flotilla now in Callao harbor will leave Monday for Panama.

Some apprehension is felt in foreign circles over the proposed visit of King Alfonso to Barcelona on Thursday. Placards throughout Barcelona gave a warning that an attempt on the Spanish sovereign's life would be made and

**Hundred Bushels Per Acre.**  
 Wm. H. Evans, a farmer who raised 1035 bushels of corn on ten acres, tells in the Farm Journal how he did it, as follows:

Some one has very truly said, "To be well bred is to be well born." This is true, not only of human beings, but of animal and vegetable life as well. A good crop of corn cannot be grown without previous arrangements.

The ground should be thoroughly drained to carry off surplus water in a wet season, as well as to help the soil to retain moisture in a dry season. The field should also be rich and strong, as a bumper crop of corn cannot be grown on poor, run-down soil.

Allow me to tell you how I raised 1035 bushels of corn on ten and one-quarter acres of ground; the corn was measured by wagon loads, giving good measure. I was neither buying nor selling, but was putting it in my crib, and the wagon loads that I called forty bushels always weighed from forty to forty-three bushels per load when sold on the market.

The ground was black loam, formerly a swale or swamp, having been previously drained by putting four-inch tile drains in the ground about thirty inches deep and about 100 feet apart; and it was in clover pasture the previous season, the pasture being good and heavy and not overpastured, so that by fall the ground was literally matted with clover. I believe that this was the secret of success in my bumper crop of corn, or at least the strongest reason for it.

I plowed the most of this field in the fall, and the balance in the winter and early spring. The ground was thoroughly frozen after having been plowed, which made it as mellow as a heap of ashes and fit for an onion bed. When the proper time for planting came, I harrowed that field both ways lightly with a spike-tooth harrow to level off the ground nicely and to uproot all weeds that might have started to grow. Then I planted the field with a two-horse planter, checking it three and one-half feet apart with plates in the planter to drop three grains in a hill as accurately as possible, two to two and a half inches deep.

Some hints: Be careful not to plant too deep while the ground is cold, for if you do the seed will lie in the ground long enough to weaken the germ before it comes up, so that even if it comes up at all it will not amount to much. Do not be in a hurry because some one else is planting. Never plant corn before you get the ground in good condition; ground put into good condition before planting is half cultivated.

How I cultivate my corn: Should it rain hard after planting, before the corn comes up, I harrow the field with a two-horse spike-tooth harrow, with the teeth slanting backwards, which breaks the crust and gives the corn a chance to come up all at once, giving an even stand. As soon as the corn is well up, and while it is very small (the sooner the better), I work it with a two-horse cultivator with a narrow shovel on it, as close to the corn as possible. Then I like to go myself, or have come other careful person go, after the cultivator with a hoe (not expecting to hoe much), to remove any clods or dirt that may be on the little corn. I fix and nurse every stalk that may need it, as every little stalk is expected to produce a nice large ear when matured.

Then in about a week, or sooner if it should rain hard, I go through the corn crosswise with the same shovels on the cultivator as before. I do not follow with the hoe this time. In about another week, or as soon as a good farmer knows best when, I put larger shovels on the cultivator, working the same way as the first time, and taking the hoe after the cultivator to cut any weeds growing. Then I work it once or twice more as needed, trying to lay it by with plenty of mellow ground on top to act as a mulch, to retain moisture in case of drouth and to keep ground from cracking.

Selecting seed corn: Selecting seed corn is a very important part of the work. Select a kind of corn adapted to your ground and locality, a kind not too large to mature early, and be damaged by the early frosts, a person does not know at planting time what the season will be.

I select my seed corn in the fall when I take my corn from the field.
