A tag will be given to every man who contributes any sum, large or small, to the fund. The wise man will contribute \$25, \$10, \$5, \$1 or 25 cents, as his finances will justify, early in the day, receive a tag, which he will exercise good judgment in giving a prominent display upon his coat and thus be honored and at the same time immune from further solicitation. This work is to be done in a most thorough manner, and as the Chamber of Commerce has given its hearty endorsement to the project, and the sterner sex generally have expressed a ready willingness to help the ladies in the good work, it is anticipated that Tag Day this year will be a gratifying suc-

Dr. Sam Carrigan, president of the State Medical Society of Arkansas, fell dead at his home at Hope, thirty OTTO W. STEFFENS miles north of here, this afternoon while answering a call at the telephone. He had just recovered from a severe attack of grip.

'His father, Judge A. H. Carrigan, s dying. He is one of the most prominent men in the State, having been a member of the convention which passed the ordinance of secssion at Little Rock in 1861.

"Deceased was also a brother of Hon. Alf. H. Carrigan of the District Court at Wichita Falls, Tex. The latter is at his father's bedside."

LARGEST SCHOOL BUILDING IN OHIO BURNED THIS MORN. ING-NO ONE INJURED.

In New York Conflagration and Sev eral Were Injured at Wilkinsburg, Pennsylvania.

Toledo, Ohio, Mar. 10.—The school building at Napoleon, Ohlo, the largest of its kind in the State, was destroyed-by fire this morning. The loss will reach \$110,000. No one was injured.

Twenty Firemen Injured.

New York, Mar. 10 .- A score of firemen were injured, several of them seriously, a hundred persons were driven from their homes and many buildings threatened by a fire early today which destroyed the six-story brick building at West 18th street. A back draft, which blew out every window in the burning building and scattered a shower of broken glass, was responsible for the injuries to so many firemen.

13,000 Loss at Abilene.

Abilene, Tex., Mar. 9 .- Fire this afstroyed the drug store of Dr. J. D. Maspread through the building. The fire spite of its efforts the contents of the building, both upper and lower floors, were almost entirely destroyed. The upper floor had barely time to escape, Among these was Dr. Silas Ballard, who was rescued with a ladder, which was quickly placed for his escape. Damage to the adjoining buildings was principally by water. Losses are given as follows: J. D. Magee, loss on building, \$4,000; insurance, \$4,000; less on stock, \$7,000; insurance, \$5,000. THE SULPHUR SPRINGS METHOD

Be Adopted By Local Water Company to Clarify Water.

Charles Majone, manager for the Wichita Falls Water and Light Com pany, has returned from Sulphur Springs, where he spent several days in company with Henry. Sayles of Ab!lene, one of the principal stockholders in the local water company, in investigating the system or method used by the water company of that place in purifying and clarifying the public water supply.

The water at Sulphur Springs from its original source is much like the water that comes through the mains here. It is run into large settling tanks and chemicals are introduced into the water as it pours into the tanks. It is allowed to remain in the tank a sufficient length of time for the silt. and other suspended particles in the water to precipitate, after which it is drawn into another tank, from which it is pumped into the mains. After this process the water is almost sa clear as crystal and is pronounced by the physicians of Sulphur Springs to be noninjurious in any way to the health of the consumer. The floor of the settling basin is sloped in such a manner that the slit can be flushed off each time the tank is used.

The local water company is propos ing to adopt the Sulphur Springs method to clarify the water here and some experiments are boing made here with the chemicals used at Sulphur Springs. Before the method is adpoted here it is probable that the physicians of the city will be asked to investigate and analyze the water and the chemicals to find whether there is anything injurious to health therein.

Noble, the were sent to Nacogdoches to investigate the foundry and machine shop proposition recently made by a Mr Christenson, reported to the Chamber of Commerce last night that they had found the value placed by Mr. Christenson upon his plant entirely too high and upon their recommendation Mr. Christenson's original proposition was rejected. The committee reported, however, that Mr. Christenson would consider a proposition for the removal of his plant to this city if the Chamber of Commerce would pay the freight charges for transporting the plant, and also furnish a site for the After some discussion the freight charges were estimated at \$400 and upon a motion the committee was authorized to offer Mr. Christenson \$400 to defray freight charges and to offer him a suitable site if he would re move his plant here.

Federal Building.

Frank Kell brought up the Federal building proposition again and stated that he had just received a communication which made the project look very favorable. Others also stated that they had had correspondence which was favorable to a favorable report by the committee on public buildings in the lower house of congress and the senate as well.

It was taken as the sense of the meeting that the matter of securing a Federal building should be pushed with all vigor and no effort remain unexerted to secure a favorable report and an appropriation at the present term of congress. The committee heretofore appointed was authorized to take up the work immediately.

A New Census.

The committee further recommended the appointment of not less than twenty persons to take the census.

After a discussion the committee was authorized to appoint the census takers and to proceed to take the census. It was agreed that the committee and the census takers whom they will appoint meet this week and organize for the work and take the census next Monday.
