

## AIDS INVESTIGATION

### CONGRESSMAN LILLEY OFFERS INFORMATION TO HELP INVESTIGATION OF FRAUDS.

### BRIBERY NOT CHARGED

No Accusation of Bribery Made Against Any Member of Congress.

Washington, D. C., Mar. 12.—Representative Lilley today made a statement before the house committee regarding alleged improper influence in securing submarine boat legislation. He called the attention of the committee to the fact that his charges did not embrace any accusation or inference that members of congress had been actually bribed or knowingly participated in or had been influenced by wrongful efforts on the part of the Electric Boat Company to secure legislation.

His purpose, he said, was to set on foot and assist in carrying out an investigation which, he believed, if properly conducted would show that wrongful methods had been used by the Electric Boat Company to secure legislation in congress.

Mr. Lilley said that he was now prepared to furnish the committee with the addresses of all witnesses whom he desired to have called. He said that whether or not money had been improperly used to secure legislation in the interest of the Electric Boat Company could be shown by an examination of the officers, attorneys and the agents of the company, and a careful scrutiny of the company's books, vouchers, check stubs and other accounts.

Chairman Boutelle informed Representative Lilley that the business of the committee was necessarily confined to conducting an investigation and the committee would not permit Lilley to assume the role of a prosecutor. Lilley suspended his statement long enough to be sworn and then proceeded under oath.

## ATTEMPT TO SHOOT MR. E. P. WALSH

Arthur Graves, a driver for the Wichita Ice Company, came near getting into serious trouble this afternoon by making a gun play on E. P. Walsh, of the firm of Walsh & Clasbey, but was prevented from carrying out his intentions by his employer, Mr. W. W. Robertson, who seized the shotgun which Graves had leveled in Walsh's face and stopped what might have resulted in a murder.

The trouble between the two men, it seems, arose over the purchase by Graves of a pair of shoes from the firm of Walsh & Clasbey, and the purchaser claimed the shoes were not as represented. Some hot words were exchanged, Graves leaving the store, but told Walsh he would see him later. He then, it appears, went and secured a shotgun and waited for Mr. Walsh to come out of his building. After lying in wait for several minutes, Mr. Walsh started to the sample room with a drummer, when Graves made the attempt to shoot him with the gun, and but for the timely interference of Mr. Robertson would probably have succeeded.

As the Times goes to press Graves is in the custody of the officers and in all probability will be required to give a peace bond before he is again turned loose upon the public with his shotgun. If the Times is correctly informed, the provocation was very slight for the employment of such extreme methods.

Two Writs of Error Have Been Filed. Special to the Times.

Austin, Tex., Mar. 12.—Two motions for the rehearing of the applications for a writ of error were filed in the supreme court today by the Waters-Pierce Oil Company, one being in the ouster or main suit, and the other in the receivership phase.

## WROKSTARTS FRIDAY

### LAWTON, WICHITA FALLS AND NORTHWESTERN CONTRACTORS ON GROUND.

### SEVERAL OUTFITS READY

It is Expected to Have New Line in Operation Before Winter.

Lawton, Ok., Mar. 11.—Dirt will begin to fly on the Lawton, Wichita Falls and Northwestern railroad on Friday, the 13th. President Bellamy's road came in this afternoon from South McAlester, where he was closing up the final arrangements with the contractors. The contract has been let for the first seven miles of the road connecting Randlett with the junction of the Wichita Falls and Northwestern. J. E. Kirkes, the contractor who will do the grading, was in Oklahoma City last night with eight cars of stock and grading outfit. He has forty teams in the shipment and unloaded there to feed. The outfit will unload in Lawton tonight.

George Wall, one of the subcontractors who has two miles of the work, came into Lawton this morning with eight teams and outfit and after feeding left overland for the Big Pasture. Bill Burton, another subcontractor, shipped his outfit from McAlester. The contract provides for a completion of the grade between Randlett and the junction seven miles west of there, in ninety days.

After the work is completed on the first section the contractors will move on the section between Emerson and Randlett and then between Lawton and Emerson. If no complications arise the Lawton, Wichita Falls and Northwestern will be running trains into Lawton before next winter.

### Banker Jenkins Dead.

New York, Mar. 12.—John G. Jenkins, the Brooklyn banker, who, with his three sons, was indicted as the result of the banking investigation which followed the recent financial panic, died at Sea Cliff on Long Island today. His death was due to paralysis.

### DENVER EARNINGS.

Local Road Said to Be in a Class by Itself for Business This Year.

Showing an increase in earnings for February, the Fort Worth & Denver is said to be in a class by itself among the railroads of the Southwest.

In fact, the Fort Worth line is reported to be the only railroad in the State and probably in the entire southwest that reveals an increase in earnings for the first two months of the present year over the corresponding months last year.

The business, both freight and passenger, of the Denver, has been gaining right along in the face of the so-called panic and no let-up in earnings has ever occurred. There have been no reductions on the Denver either in office force, track gangs or trainmen.

## STRIKERS SHOT DOWN BY CHILEAN TROOPS

San Francisco, Cal., Mar. 12.—Machine guns operated by the government forces of Chile are in a great conflict with the strikers at the nitrate beds and in the city of Iquique have laid two thousand five hundred men low, most of these being killed, according to advices received yesterday, by the Australian steamer, Christiana-Boris, which arrived here direct from Chile.

The strike among the nitrate workers started several months ago and involves about a hundred thousand men. The mining of nitrate is one of the principal industries of the republic and the practical suspension of work in the mines caused by the strike is beginning to have a serious effect on business conditions in Chile.

**Alfalfa Planting Time.**  
Alfalfa planting time is fast passing. If the ground has been plowed and allowed to catch the rains in time to settle before the seed are broadcasted on it, the chances are yet favorable for a good "catch" of alfalfa this spring in the region within 150 miles of Red river. If rich land is selected for alfalfa, the crop can be expected to pay almost anywhere in the Southwest except where cotton dies very freely from so-called alkali, root rot. When wheel barrow seeder is used, 16 pounds of seed will do as well as 20 sown without this even distributor. The land should be in very fine condition in all cases. There is no reason for planting small alfalfa seed amidst clods. They cannot grow and thrive there any more than turnip or cabbage seed will. These seeds are all of nearly the same tiny size. Alfalfa hay is worth as much for feeding as an equal weight of wheat bran. Pound for pound it is worth

more than corn for work stock. While it should have some grain fed in connection with it for best digestive results, there is no hay that goes on the market that is as good as alfalfa—farm and Ranch.

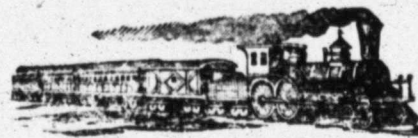

## GAS IN A WATER WELL

STRONG FLOW STRUCK IN TWO SHALLOW WELLS ON DR. TYSON'S FARM.

### WELLS HALF MILE APART

It is Believed That an Abundant Supply of Fuel Can Be Secured at a Very Low Cost.

While digging a well on the farm of Dr. L. C. Tyson, located about three miles northeast of the city, a flow of gas was struck at a depth of 17 feet a few days ago.

In speaking of this incident, Dr. Tyson says it is the second well of gas that has been struck on his premises. The first well was dug about six years ago, and although a strong flow of water was struck at a depth of 38 feet, the quality was such that it could not be used for stock purposes, and while at work on this well the flow of gas was so strong that workmen refused to dig it deeper in order to get a better quality of water and it was abandoned. For two or three years this well was left open and all during that time a constant flow of gas came up through the eighteen feet of water which stood in it. It finally caved in or was filled up for a part of the way, and the flow of gas stopped. The new well is located about one-half a mile from the old one, and Dr. Tyson is convinced that, by boring deep enough, a flow of gas sufficient to furnish fuel for domestic and manufacturing purposes to supply this city for years, can be had. He is also convinced that oil in paying quantities will be found. An effort is now being made to organize a stock company for the purpose of prospecting for both oil and gas in and around Wichita Falls, and if either can be developed in paying quantities it will mean a great deal for the parties who do the developing and much more for this city. The project is one well worth risking an investment of a few thousand dollars.

According to our latest information the gas gusher struck at Petrolia while drilling for oil last summer is still giving an undiminished flow, only a very small portion of which is now being utilized. It is estimated that the flow from this well alone would be sufficient to supply the entire city of Wichita Falls.

As has been previously mentioned, gas has been discovered in considerable quantities in many parts of the Wichita country.
