She is now lying at anchor in the fog off St. George, L. I., with a large gash in her stern, high above the water line.

Portugal, whose affairs are now occution, contains 34,254 square miles. That is 1,210 square miles more than Maine and 1,090 less than Indiana. Its popuing 5,016,267 to the 4,821,550 of Illinois. The population of Illinois is now estimated to be 5,590,000.

The civil list of the king of Portugal is \$567,000 a year. Maine pays its governor \$3,000, Indiana pays \$8,000 and Minois \$11,000. Indiana and Illinois there are so few schools that the bulk of population is illiterate.

Jury in Case of Assailant of His Own Family Returns Insanity Verdict.

Cleburne, Tex., Mar. 17 .- Curtis Mason, the young man who shot and dangerously wounded his brother, Rev. W. E. Mason, his brother's wife and his own mother, Mrs. M. E. Mason, was tried today in the county court before a jury on an insanity charge. Several experts on mental diseases were present at the trial and testified, in addition to the deposition of Dr. Charles Gregory, superintendent of the State Insane asylum at Terrell, who stated it to be his opinion that young Mason, who has been confined in the county jail since the shooting, was insane. President and Republican Bosses Split on Modification of Sherman Anti-Trust Act.

Washington, D. C., Mar. 17 .- The president is in conference with the leaders of his party in both houses of congress tonight, and on the result of this conference may depend whether there is to be peace or warfare between the president and the republican bosses of congress

The president's legislative program calls for the passage of a currency bill, the re-enactment of the employers' liability act, some preliminary step toward tariff revision and a modification of the Sherman anti-trust law, both as it affects corporations and labor unions. An agreement has been reached as to the first three items; that is, there is the promise on the part of the leaders in congress that the Aldrich bill will be enacted, that the employers' liability act will be reformed and passed and that a resolution directing the Ways and Means Committee to investigate the tariff will be put through.

SEEK PARDON FOR VAN SHAICK.

Texas Pilots Interested in Behalf of General Slocum Commander.

Galveston, Tex., Mar. 17.-Through the Pilots' association petitions directed to President Roosevelt asking for the pardon of Captain William Van Shaick, the former commander of the steamer General Slocum, which was burned three years ago near Hell Gate in New York harbor, are being circulated here. Signatures of many citizens, as well as those of numerous visitors to the city from all parts of the country are being appended.

Captain Van Shaick was convicted on charges of misconduct in connection with the burning of the excursion boat, in which several hundred lives were

The petition acknowledges the importance of such life-saving equipment as is required by the government, but pleads that boat masters are powerless to maintain such when no action to that end had been taken by the owners and United States inspectors.

TO EXAMINE WATER.

Dr. Reed Goes to Suphur Springs to Investigate Method in Cleaning Water. Dr. J. F. Reed left last night for a trip to Sulphur Springs. At Fort Worth he will be joined by Henry Sayles, one of the directors in the Wichita Falls Water and Light Company, who will go to Sulphur Springs with him. Dr. Reed goes to Sulphur Springs to investigate the quality of the water after it is clarified by the process used there, especially from a physician's standpoint.

If it is foud that the water at Sulphur Springs contains nothing injurlous to the health of the consumer it is probable that the same method used in clarifying the water there will be installed here, provided that the city council and the water company can come to a satisfactory agreement concerning a new contract.

Fire at Thornberry.



Farmers are Waking Pp.

At last the farmres of this country are beginning to wake up. They are organizing themselves into small business-like associations for the protection of their business. They propose now to have something to say about fixing the prices of their own products. The seedsmen decided what they would charge the larmer for hisseed. The banks decided what they would charge him for the use of money with which to develop his land. The grain buyers and stockmen decided what they would pay him for the stuff they raised. The railroads decided what they would charge him to han! it to market. Merchants decided what they would charge him for the things he needed for himself, his wife and

The farmer simply took what was offered him and has never been in a position to control or even in a remote way increase the selling price of his product. Spasmodic efforts have been made to form organizations, but they have always failed because they were not founded upon correct business principles. During the past five or six years, however, farmers have been more successful in their efforts in this direction. They are learning wisdom from the trusts and the railroads and everybody else who has been fixing prices for them.

The idea of national organization to control prices has been practically abandoned and small comapnies to regulate prices in certain sections and communities or States are being formed. These are easy to manage. They effect better results and in time will, for all practical purposes, become a unit.

In these organizations the politician and the windjammer have been forced to take a back seat. In many instances high class business men who are familiar with all the conditions of trade in the cities are employed by the farmers to manage their companies. The buying and selling is placed in their hands and wherever this has been done the results have been of the greatest ben-

The farmer has been the country's ox, and its ass long mough. He has sustained every industry by his own labor and has been poorly paid. He has been a long time in waking up, but at last he is beginning to realize, faintly as yet, the possibilities of the benefits that may come to him through wise moderate and just combinations.—Secretary of Agriculture Wilson.
