CHALLENGE ISSUED

WACO DELEGATES THROW DOWN THE GAUNTLET TO THE BAILEY MEN.

JOINT DEBATE SOUGHT

Terrell and Gerald To Speak at Lufkin and Georgetown on Bailey Dates.

The following was made public here tonight:

Hon. Clarence Ousley, Chairman Bailey Campaign Committee, Fort Worth, Texas: Dear Sir—The decision to be made upon pending issues by the democratic voters of this State in the May primary is so vitally important to the welfare of the State and Nation that nothing should be left undone to throw light upon the matters in dispute.

In response to what seems to be a general demand I beg to advise you that the candidates for delegate at large nominated by the Waco convention will be glad to discuss the questions and principles involved with their opponents in the order designated by the two conventions respectively at such times and places as may be mutually agreed upon by the two campaign committees.

In order that all necessary arrangements may be made to this end, I beg that you will promptly advise me by wire if this proposal should be accepted. Yours very truly,

If the foregoing challenge is accepted by the Bailey people—and the anti-Bailey leaders here seem to entertain some doubt on that score—the debates will be paired as follows:

Hon. O. T. Holt of Houston and Judge M. M. Brooks of Dallas.

Hon. Cullen F. Thomas of Waco and Hon. James L. Storey of Lockhart.

Hon. Lee Young of Stephenville and Hon. Andrew J. Baker of Tom Green county.

Says Bailey Will Meet None.

Fort Worth, Tex., Mar. 30. Chairman Ousley of the Bailey campaign committee tonight replied to Chairman Riddle's communication, asking that Senator Bailey and associates on his ticket engage in joint discussions with the opposition candidates, as follows:

"Mr. George W. Riddle, Chairman Anti-Bailey Club, Dallas, Texas: Dear Sir—Replying to your telegram communicated through the press tonight, permit me to say that the issue in this campaign so far as it relates to Mr. Bailey is one impeaching his personal character. In the nature of things, neither Senator Bailey nor any other self-respecting man can agree to meet any man in public debate on that proposition. As to joint debates with other candidates on our ticket, I will advise you as soon as I can confer with them and our committee. Yours truly,

TO PAY CHURCH DEBT.

Loyal Methodist Women at Chillicothe, Mo., Sacrifice Easter Hats.

Chillicothe, Mo., Mar. 31.—Several dozen women members of the First Methodist Episcopal church in this city have shown their devotion by agreeing to forego that article of dress so dear to the feminine heart, the Easter hat, in order that a church debt of \$700 may be paid off.

A year ago the Ladies Working Society of this church took upon itself a debt of \$700. The debt is still unpaid and the leaders of the society have been at their wits' end as to the best means for raising it. Recently one of the members proposed that members put the money they expected to spend for Easter bonnets into a fund to pay off the obligation.

The proposition was a severe test, but many of the members agreed to give up the cash that would have been spent for a "Merry Widow," to pay off that long standing debt.

The result is somewhat hard on the millinery stores, but it is quite gratifying to church officers. Those who have pledged themselves are expected to come to church Easter bareheaded and show the other members of the congregation who has made sacrifices.

Whether the brethren will rise to the occasion by giving up spring derbies for the same purpose remains to be seen.

STATE PROHIBITION

EIGHT FIELD WORKERS PUSHING CAMPAIGN IN TEXAS.

TO HAVE MANY SPEAKERS

Task of Securing Signatures to Petition Reported to Be Progressing Satisfactorily.

Dallas, Tex., Mar. 31.—Eight field workers are now employed by the Texas Prohibition Federation to push the campaign for State prohibition. As the time for voting on the proposed constitutional amendments approaches the number of speakers placed in the field will be greatly increased. This will be done in sufficient time, it is said, to enable the issue to be fairly presented before all the people.

From Crosby and Midland counties the petitions recently sent out providing for the submission to the people of the prohibition question have been returned, with the names of about 20 per cent of the voters of those counties. Those circulating the petition stated that, with further effort, the names of three-fourths of the voters could have been added to it.

Where the early return of petitions means sacrifice of signatures the federation is not advocating hasty return, preferring that the petitions be kept in circulation and every signature possible obtained. While it is recognized as certain that the necessary number of signatures will be obtained, only 20,000 being needed, it is desired to present to the Democratic State Executive Committee 100,000 names. The more numerous signed petitions are the greater will be the weight and dignity added to the prohibition issue, it is believed.

Dr. E. O. Taylor of Boston, Mass., who has been discussing in Texas the subject of alcohol as viewed from a scientific standpoint, has come to Arkansas. He will return to Texas when the campaign for State prohibition begins in earnest.

April Fools' Day Tomorrow.

Tomorrow is the first day of April, when it is an almost universal custom throughout Christendom to play more or less amusingly asinine tricks upon one's neighbor.

April Fools' Day has been observed from time immemorial and its observance will likely continue as long as fools are born.

The responsibility for April Fools' Day is laid upon Noah. A London newspaper more than a century ago said:

"The April Fool custom arose from the mistake of Noah in sending the dove out of the ark before the water had abated, on the first day of the month among the Hebrews which answers to our first of April, and to perpetuate the memory of this delinquency was thought proper, whoever forgot so remarkable a circumstance, to punish them by sending them upon some senseless errand similar to that infernal message upon which the bird was sent by the patriarch."

Whoever may be responsible for the custom, the readers of this are warned that the day is still observed by some sharp fools as well as dull ones. Last year many credulous folks were thrown into a hysteria of fear and excitement by a report that somebody's comet was enveloping the earth and that the towns of Europe were a mass of flames. A number of newspapers issued extra editions telling of the wholesale destruction and the certain ending of the earth, but before the ink was fairly dry the readers had noted the date line and the incipient panic was averted.

IN A GASOLINE EXPLOSION.

Chattanooga Man Fatally Burned and Little Daughter Also Injured.

Chattanooga, Tenn., Mar. 31.—By the explosion of a gasoline stove at the home of James F. Barnes, a reporter on the Daily News, he was perhaps fatally burned and his little daughter was also badly burned this morning. Barnes was so badly burned that when he was taken to the hospital the flesh on his feet dropped off.

The little girl, who was in the bed into which Barnes sprang to put out the flames, was badly burned. Barnes in his agony sprang from a window and screamed with pain. Neighbors came to his assistance and he was carried into the house. The physicians say there is no hope for his recovery.

Robber Fatally Wounded in Fight

Doings at Guthrie.

Guthrie, Ok., Mar. 31.—Attorney General West this afternoon appointed Judge Walter Ledbetter of Ardmore as special counsel to prosecute all appeal cases from the former Indian Territory.

TO CANCEL TOBACCO RISKS.

Policies Worth \$500,000 in Kentucky to Be Given Up.

Lexington, Ky., Mar. 31.—A special agent from Mount Sterling says an insurance agent there who has authority to do so will notify agents at once to cancel all insurance policies held by two of the leading companies in Kentucky on tobacco risks, except in the cities of Louisville, Owensboro and Paducah.

The amount to be cancelled is said to be about \$500,000.

MORE WAGE REDUCTIONS.

Twenty-Five Hundred Men Affected By Reduction in Thread Mills.

Pawtucket, R. I., Mar. 31.—Notice has been posted in the thread mills of the J. & P. Coats Company, announcing a 10 per cent reduction in wages effective on April 13th. Twenty-five hundred hands are employed in the mills.

MR. THAW'S MILLIONS

HOW THEY VANISHED INTO THIN AIR AND TEXAS FINANCIERS HELD THE SACK.

WAS MODEST GENTLEMAN

But Wasn't Ashamed of His Relationship With Harry K. and Withal Was Fond of Diamonds.

Whatever unpleasant notoriety the mad doings of the erring and reckless Harry have brought to the family cognomen, the name of Thaw has been one to conjure with in the financial world, and is generally associated with millions. While the foregoing is undoubtedly true as a general proposition certain financiers in at least two towns along the Fort Worth and Denver road will tell you that it is not always safe to place too much confidence in a name and the name of Thaw attached to a draft or a check hereafter will measure along with Smith, Jones and other common everyday names.

About ten days ago a well dressed, but rather ordinary looking man dropped into Vernon and at the hotel registered as John G. Thaw of New York city. He was a modest and unassuming man and until some of the more curious made inquiry did not venture the information that he was the noted financier and cousin of Harry K. Thaw, whose killing of Stanford White furnished the country with one of the most sensational trials in history.

Later when Thaw presented a draft for \$2,000 on a New York bank at one of the Vernon banks he furnished credentials which satisfactorily identified him as the man he claimed to be, and the amount of the draft was placed to his credit in the bank, while the draft was forwarded to New York for collection through the regular and somewhat slow channels.

In the days that followed, Vernon financiers made the days very pleasant for the supposed Mr. Thaw, who had estimated that he considered the Vernon country an inviting field for investments.

At the expiration of about ten days Mr. Thaw took a little side trip to Wichita Falls, coming here on Friday of last week. Incidentally, he dropped into Fonville's jewelry store and casually purchased \$350 worth of diamonds, offering a check against his deposit in the Vernon bank as payment. Mr. Fonville stepped to the telephone and was soon in connection with the Vernon bank and learned that while the draft given by Thaw had not been heard from, that they believed him all right. Upon this assurance Mr. Fonville took the check and turned over the diamonds. A few minutes later Thaw appeared at the City National bank, presenting a check for \$100. Again the telephone was brought into play and the Vernon bank agreed to stand behind the check and Thaw was given \$100.

That was the last seen of the supposed millionaire in Wichita Falls. Thaw went to Vernon that night and without stopping to say goodbye to his kind friends there, bought a ticket to Childress.

The same afternoon that he visited Wichita Falls several other checks came in against the \$2,000 at the Vernon bank, and their suspicions being aroused, they telegraphed to New York and found out that the man was a rank fraud.

The officers were at once put on the man's trail, with the result that he was arrested on a Fort Worth and Denver train at Dalhart Saturday night and is now in jail at Vernon.

He still had the diamonds purchased from Mr. Fonville in his possession and they are now in the care of the sheriff until Mr. Fonville can reclaim them. The Vernon bank will have to make good the money secured by the alleged Mr. Thaw here.

The building of cement walks and curbing is not quite so lively now as it was a very few weeks ago, though the weather is most favorable for that kind of work, being neither too hot nor too cold, and when that is the case it gives a much better chance for the concrete to set, and the man who says for the work gets a better job. More than \$50,000 has been spent in Wichita Falls during the past three years for concrete sidewalks and curbing, and the city has expended in putting down concrete street and alley crossings to connect up these sidewalks in the neighborhood of \$10,000. It will thus be seen that for every dollar the city has paid out for crossings, the citizen and tax payer has spent five. This speaks well for our citizenship and shows to what extent it is co-operating with the municipal government in giving to Wichita Falls a greater number of miles of substantial sidewalks than any town of twice its size in the State. Only in a few instances have property holders balked or refused to comply with the order to have walks constructed. These gaps look bad, but in time will be filled in. Fully one-half of the sidewalks were ordered constructed by property owners before any order was passed by the City Council compelling them to do so. Contractors say that they have orders to keep them at work for the next two weeks, and unless something turns up, some of them will probably go to neighboring towns with their forces to work until a sufficient amount of work accumulates here to keep them busy for a several weeks stretch. The Times trusts that the enthusiasm of our citizens in constructing cement walks will continue in the future as in the past. Cement sidewalks least twenty miles of each in the corporate limits of this city, but there is room for that many more miles.

BAILEY'S LETTER TO JOHNSON.

Now that Hon. Cone Johnson of Tyler is opposing Senator Bailey as a candidate for delegate at large to the Denver convention, both are saying bitter things about each other. In defending himself against some things said about him credited to Senator Bailey, Mr. Johnson gave out the statement that Senator Bailey had urged him at one time to become a candidate for Attorney General of Texas. Senator Bailey heard of this statement by Mr. Johnson, and gave out to the press a copy of the letter written to Mr. Johnson, which is as follows:

"Gainesville, Tex., July 10, 1906.—Hon. Cone Johnson, Tyler, Tex.—My Dear Friend: Yours of the 8th inst. is just to hand, and the fact that you are interested in Mr. Kouns would be sufficient to command my services in his behalf. I do not, however, believe that anything I could say for him to the management of the Santa Fe railroad would promote his chances of appointment. I do not know Mr. Ripley personally, nor have I ever heard of any hostile expressions from him; but the president and managing officers of nearly all the railroads, resent the part which I took in the rate bill legislation, and many of them would take pleasure in refusing to do anything which I might recommend. If Mr. Ripley should happen to be in that frame of mind, my indorsement would do him more harm than good. Besides the probability that my indorsement would be of no value, I do not feel that I can afford to ask any favor of people who feel that I have been instrumental in legislating against their interests. Of course, I felt that I was simply doing my public duty in helping to pass a railway rate law, and I felt that the amendments which I proposed were proper and well calculated to make the law a better one; but at the same time I recognize that those whose special interests were immediately involved take a different view of the question and think that I was influenced simply by a desire to please the public. I am sure you know that I do not legislate upon any such considerations, and in my place you would not be willing to ask favors of or to make recommendations to those who ascribe such motives to your conduct.

"I assure you that it would be a great pleasure to help Mr. Kouns, and I regret that I am unable to do so. Please show this letter to Mr. Wright, who telegraphed his concurrence in your request.

"Turning aside from the matter which relates to Mr. Kouns to one which relates directly to you, but indirectly to the public service, you will permit me to say that I would love to see you the next Attorney General of the State. Without intending to question the ability of the present attorney general, I feel that the law officer of Texas ought to be a man of commanding ability, and I know no man in the State who could better meet the requirements of that position than you. If you can see your way clear to make the race, it would give me great pleasure to do what I could toward procuring your nomination.

\$2,500,000 LAND DEAL AT STAMFORD

Stamford, Tex., Mar. 30.—The big land deal that has been pending for more than a year between Swenson Bros. of New York and the Espuela Land and Cattle Company of London, England, has been closed. This deal transfers 433,000 acres in Dickens, Kent, Crosby and Graza counties to Swenson Bros., the consideration being \$2,500,000 cash. The section embraces as fine land as there is in Texas, taking in the famous Duck creek and Dockum country. The transaction is given out by Judge W. T. Andrews, of this city, who returned this morning from London. He accompanied E. P. Swenson, senior member of the firm of Swenson Bros., and C. P. Northrop of New York, and with them represented the Swenson interests, and they were also accompanied by Judge Henry C. Coke of Dallas, the Texas attorney for the Espuela Land and Cattle Company.

Deal Year Under Way.

The purchase of this immense tract of land in West Texas, known as the Spur ranch, was under consideration a year ago, but on account of complications in connection with the division of property among the heirs, the deal was not put through until the recent conference of the Swenson interests and the representatives of the Espuela Land and Cattle Company in London.

The Swenson Bros. make the important announcement that the Spur ranch will be thrown open for settlement without delay, and it will be cut up into small tracts of quarter-sections each. The entire body has been surveyed and cut into tracts already, and as soon as it is placed upon the market, it is certain there will be a rush for this land. Sale of this land is of interest to Stamford and this section, as it means the early construction of the Stamford and Northwestern railway. Without the vast area of land being settled, there would have hardly been sufficient tonnage to justify the expenditure of a million and a half dollars that is necessary in the construction of this road from Stamford to Dickens county, but with the land divided up and sold to actual settlers, there will not only be ample tonnage, but will in time bring other roads.

Each season the passing of the shirt waist is predicted, but again and again the season passes and the prediction with it, while that useful garment remains.

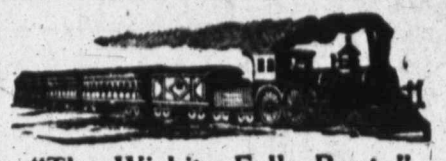
Its name alone vanishes, like the "wash-dress" that has now become a "tub-gown;" the shirt waist of this season is a "plain shirt," so the importer tells us.

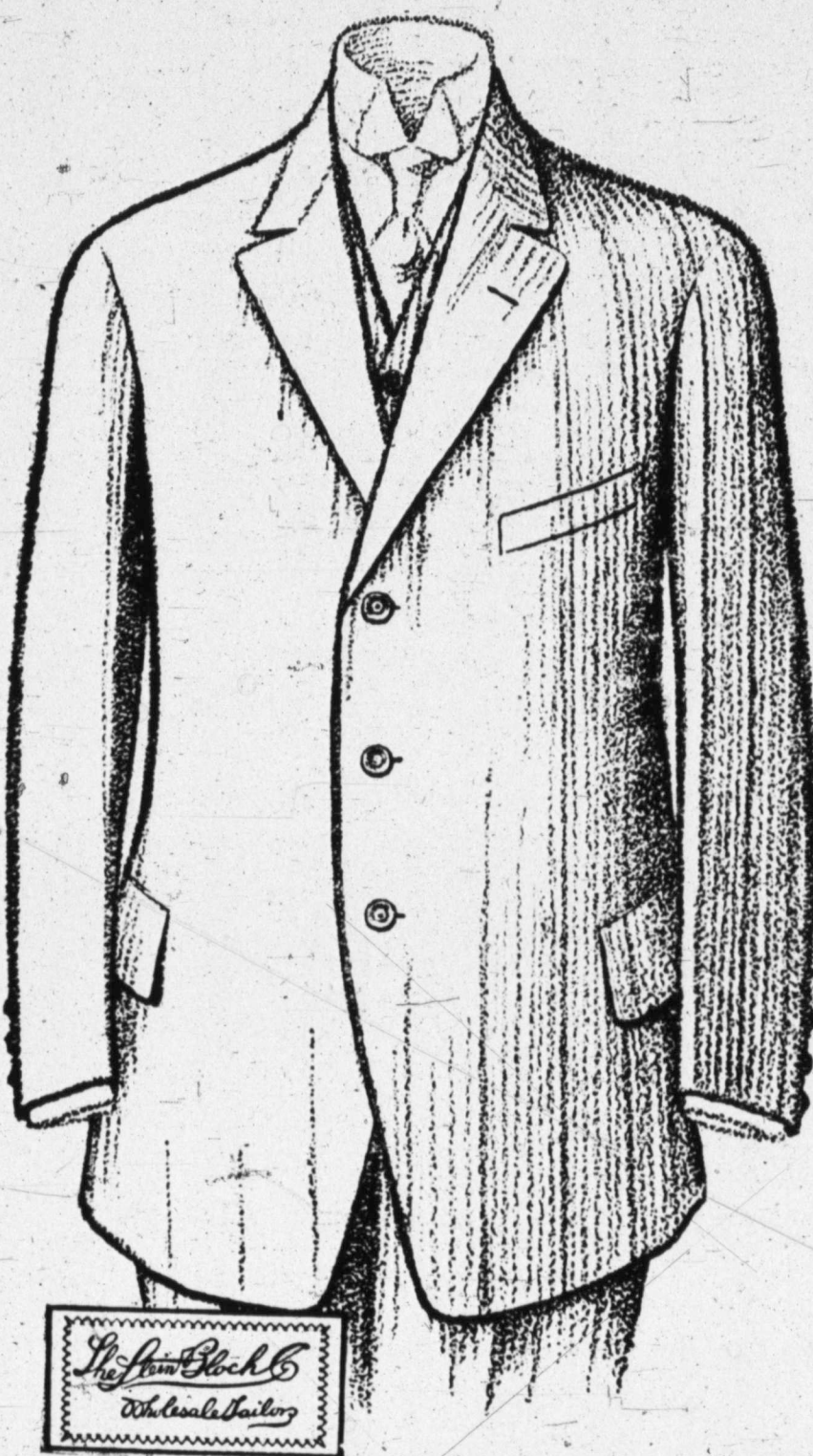
