PRESIDENT REAGAN is currently trying to sell congress and the American people on his efforts to trim the federal budget by an additional \$13 billion.

The president received widespread support during the first round of his budget cuts, but the further the budget-cutter's knife whacks, the more opponents are coming out of the woodwork.

However, as spelled out by President Reagan in his speech to the nation last week, we believe that the president can effectively continue his budget cuts, without particularly harming any particular group or segment of the economy.

The first item on Reagan's list is that of welfare reform, and this is one area in which we have felt for a number of years that some fat could be trimmed from the federal program.

Welfare fraud has probably cost the American taxpayer more money in the past quarter century than any other single area. The admission in recent years that millions of dollars simply "fall through the cracks" in some of the federal agencies is proof that a crackdown is needed in policing the manner in which welfare money is distributed, assuring that only those who definitely qualify for payments receive them.

Next, Reagan says he will eliminate two agencies--the departments of Education and Energy. This would probably be in order; in fact, many people could recommend from two to two dozen additional agencies which could be wiped out, effecting an immediate savings of tax dollars, and doing very little hurt to the nation.

Other points to be pursued by the president include a crackdown on taxes, and user fees for those receiving government assistance--such as public transportation, etc.

President Reagan assured the recipients of Social Security that he would not take any action to threaten their monthly checks. The truly needy, he said, has no reason to worry about the loss of assistance.

"I will not stand by and see our senior citizens suffer financial hardship," the president said during his speech.

Reagan decried the fact that the increasing numbers of Americans on Social Security and Welfare have seen the number of people working to support those receiving payments decrease from 16 workers to one recipient 30 years ago, to 3.2 workers for every one recipient today.

The president indicated that this trend needs to be reversed, in order to assure the solid base for the Social Security system.

"We have it within our power to change things. We need to finish what we have started," Reagan admonished the nation.

If you agree with the program he has outlined, the president urged citizens to contact their congressman, and urge them to support the program.

Court Re-Hashes Radio Problems

At the County Commissioners meeting, which was held on September 28 in the Parmer County Courthouse, the members held a lengthy discussion on a variety of topics.

Commissioners Jack Patterson, Raymond McGehee, Archie Tarter and Ernest Anthony were present as was County Judge Porter Roberts.

Clerk Bonnie Warren read the minutes of the previous meeting to the members present and it was moved and seconded to accept the minutes as they were.

Mrs. Warren also read the month's bills to the members and it was moved and seconded to pay the bills by the Commissioners.

I.W. "Dutch" Quickel of the Probation Department submitted a request for a new typewriter for the office and gave the Commissioners a list of bids which he had received from various equipment supply companies in the county from which to purchase the machine.

Commissioners decided to accept the bid from the Curtis Smith Office Supplies in Farwell for a Smith Corona typewriter in the amount of \$925.00, with a trade-in on the old machine of \$100. Another bid from Moonlight Office Supply from Friona was considered.

Also purchased from Smith Office Supply was a calculator for Bonnie Warren's office. This machine was purchased in the amount of \$260 with a trade-in on the old machine valued at \$25.00.

More discussion was given to the current radio problems within the county which affects all the law enforcers in the county--the local police officers in Bovina and Friona, and the County officers as well as the troopers of the DPS.

Sheriff Bill Morgan was called into the meeting to summarize the situation confronting the officers since the Motorola engineers had spent two days the past week in Farwell trying to locate the problem.

"We've still got problems. Motorola brought two engineers down, one from Missouri and were going to send down additional equipment on September 29 (Tuesday) to look at the problem," stated Morgan of the situation.

According to the sheriff, the company was waiting for this piece of equipment which was being flown in, to arrive yesterday.

There was some additional discussion on perhaps going back to the 37180 equipment, which was a unit and type of equipment which was used before the present facilities were installed.

Morgan interjected that it was not solely the sheriff's office which the problem affected the most.

"(We the sheriff's office) can solve our problems easily. All we have to do is to unplug the present system and go back to the 37180," remarked Morgan. However, the local police in Friona had done away with this

system earlier, and this type of equipment is what fire departments and ambulances usually transmit over presently.

"I don't think it is in the equipment," said Morgan. "I think it is still a problem in frequency...there is something that is interfering with the broadcast."

Some question was raised as to why the proper equipment was not on hand at the beginning of the process last week and why it was not here and ready to be used when the engineer from Missouri was flown in.

There was more discussion on possibly moving the tower, base station and other equipment to Friona, but Morgan brought up the point that it would be futile to do this if the problems in Farwell still persisted even after the move.

"Then what have we gained?" was Morgan's reply.

Some of the Commissioners suggested that leasing a tower and antenna from Friona Cablevision, might help in solving the communications problems. The land on which the equipment sets is owned by Glenn Reeve, Sr. and Friona Cablevision pays lease on the land. Commissioners did not take any action on this matter, but decided to wait until they could find out what Motorola was going to do about the present situation.

A change in frequencies was mentioned by one of the Commissioners but Morgan stated that the cost of doing such a thing would be almost prohibitive, as it would cost approximately \$200 per vehicle to change the frequencies and that it takes two crystals per unit to change the frequencies. It takes two crystals per unit to change the frequencies and in approximately 25 vehicles and base stations, that would run into a large amount of money.

"We have no problem on other channels, but we can't talk for any distance on Inner City from the cars," lamented Morgan.

It was stated that when the transmission hit the repeater the transmission should be boosted, but instead it is being cut off.

Another point mentioned was that what ever different action that might be taken would have to be cleared through the Federal Communications Commission.

Some discussion was also brought up on the fact that all the cities who use this system should be willing to accept the financial burden of getting the system fixed as it was not just a county problem, primarily.

Archie Tarter brought up the discussion of a letter which placed the responsibilities of hiring and firing any employee whose salary is paid out of road and bridge funds. In essence, the letter regarded the County Commissioners duty as a superintendent of the county roads also the duty of one who has the authority of employing or dismissing an employee serving the county for

that commissioners precinct. This has been the standing policy of the commissioners and Tarter wanted to make it a resolution but no action was taken on the matter at the time.

A wire was to be sent to our congressional delegation in Washington announcing the displeasure of President Reagan's proposed Revenue Sharing cuts and commissioners were to send the wire presently.

Frances Euler, Albert Smith and Wayne Spears, all Justices of the Peace in Parmer County, were lauded by commissioners for having successfully completing a 20 hour course of training for JP's, which was funded by the Governor's office and a grant from the Criminal Justice Division.

Some discussion was held on the county reapportionment and the commissioners decided to employ the services of Steve Bickerstaff, attorney-at-law from Austin to take care of the legalities in this matter.

Wilt Heads Awareness Seminar

Pete Wilt of Clovis will be the instructor of the Alcohol Awareness Seminar, set for October 4, 11, 18 and 25 in the High School cafeteria here beginning at 7:30 p.m. each session.

Wilt is a veteran in the profession of DWI prevention and instruction and is certified in the State of New Mexico as a DWI instructor.

In New Mexico, this course is offered as an option to serving time in jail for DWI offenses.

This program is open to the public, without charge and refreshments will be provided afterwards.

All of the churches in Bovina are actively sponsoring this seminar and it has met much support from many of Bovina's private citizens.

Sponsors of this event feel a real necessity in conducting a program of this type so everyone can see the effects of alcohol on everyday activities, especially driving.

In the most recent statistics sent from the DPS in Austin, in rural areas of Texas for the past seven months, there were 873 total violations resulting from DWI in the state, and of those, 59 incidences were fatal and 427 incidences were of the type which caused injury to the persons involved.

In the entire state, there were 2778 violations for DWI committed and of those 79 persons died and 1319 persons were injured.

And, according to most law enforcers who deal with DWI violators, these persons will go out and drive drunk again and again. And, they are often the hardest type of arrest which officers must make.

This seminar is vital to anyone who suspects that someone in their family might have a drinking problem and it is important to everyone who has ever done any drinking and driving...it might change your mind and your life.

I am sure that many feel that it was the county commissioners, or perhaps our remarks helped bring a resolution to this situation, but I think all of these suggestions as to where the credit should go are wrong.

I feel that the real heroes in this story are the law enforcement officers who had to put up with these problems for the past three years almost every day.

They were still able to do their jobs with a high degree of efficiency and service, despite the problems they so often encountered.

They were the ones whose safety could well have been jeopardized. But, each of these public servants did their duties like the professionals that they are and without regard for their own safety while safeguarding all the county residents.

To these real "heroes" we all owe a debt of gratitude. They are the people who deserve the hand shake or the pat on the back...to be sure.

To them all—the local police officers, the sheriff and his deputies and to the four troopers in our county who work for the Texas Department of Public Safety—we say thank you for your patience and thanks always

for a job well done.

There are truly few times in this business that I really dislike, but last week, I encountered one of those times.

Anytime I have to print three fatalities in one paper, I can expect to be a little "down" from that.

Robert Amador, Arthur Bentley and Pedro Guerrero died in Parmer County in the past ten days in auto accidents. There were seven wrecks in this county in the past seven days.

The deaths of these people left me with a sick feeling inside. They left friends, families and jobs behind them. And, for what did they die?

Who can the blame be placed on? Some cases alcohol may have been the culprit, in some cases, neglect. But, in all cases, these deaths could have been avoided.

How, you might ask? Rule one is don't drink and drive. Alcohol and automobiles do not mix well, and the result is often fatal.

Rule number two, always be sure that before you drive, you are at your best. Don't take off on a trip half asleep. Be sure you are wide awake and in good control of your senses.

Rule three, learn to drive defensively. Anticipate the other guy's motives and take the precautionary measures to save your life. It might also save the other guy's life as well.

Rule four, make sure your vehicle is in proper operating condition. Don't leave knowing that your brakes are not what they should be. Don't start out knowing that your headlights are partially out. Although you may not get stopped by the Highway Patrol over these, they may still stop you...permanently.

Rule five, take enough time to get where you're going without having to drive over the speed limit. Speeding is the number one killer in auto accidents...if you don't believe this, look on the front page of last week's paper at the picture of a car which

was speeding and cost that person his life.

Rule number six, if you are not in the shape, physically or emotionally, to operate a vehicle, don't do it. Ask a friend or get a fellow employee to drive you home. Don't take chances with your life.

These rules are so simple that almost any driver should think of these the minute he steps into his car. But, how many of us realize that by not reviewing these simple rules we may be the next fatalities.

Please remember that law enforcement officers don't get a holiday off, and neither does the negligent driver.

Make it a point to not become one.

Now, on a more cheerful note, I had a friend give me this excerpt from a magazine the Optimist's Clubs of America puts out and I felt that it says a lot.

to be so strong that nothing can disturb your peace of mind;
to talk, health, happiness, and prosperity to every person you meet;

Mustangs Lose To Plains In 53-26 Decision Friday

The Bovina Mustangs met their match last Friday as they faced a tough Plains team, and fell for the first time this year, 53-26.

"I thought we played well offensively...in fact, I thought we played well enough offensively to win," was the comment from head coach Paul Toppliff after the game.

"We did not play well defensively, and I suspect that we will be looking to bring up some kids from the JV to reinforce our defense," said Toppliff.

In the statistical column, Bovina's Dale Gilbreath attempted 45 passes and completed 17, with five or more passes dropped.

On the scoring drives, Bovina scored from 13 yards out on a pitch from Dale Gilbreath to Richard Shepherd, and Victor Robledo made the PAT.

Edward Chisom caught an eight yard pass to score the second TD with Robledo adding the extra point.

Joe Pat Wright scored on a one-yard run for the third TD, but the two point conversion attempt failed.

And, Joe Black made good on an 18-yard pass from Gilbreath to the Mustangs' final score of the night. The two point conversion on that try also failed.

Although this was the first loss for the Mustangs, Toppliff cited them for many things which they did well.

"Richard Shepherd took some really hard licks in the game, but just kept on coming back. Joe Black, as well, did a fine job for us, and most of all the kids never gave up...this is something they would have done last year in a similar situation."

Saying that the team "learned a lot," Toppliff stated that Plains is the best ball team Bovina has faced to this point all year.

"We gave them three easy TDs, but this is to take nothing away from Plains. They have the best quarterback we've faced this year and they also have some very good, big running backs."

Richard Shepherd was cited for his 15 carries in which he racked up 93 yards and Ricky Shepherd was responsible for seven carries for 139 yards, but Toppliff also said, "We were disappointed in Ricky's offensive blocking. We felt he could have done a better job."

Victor Robledo was cited for his job as the kicking specialist in the game.

In the game which will be played Friday night against the Lazbuddie Longhorns, Toppliff said that he was anxious to see what effect the previous Friday night's game would have on his players.

"We are going to have to improve every week, or we won't win ball games. Improvement is the key."

Toppliff stressed that the team would really need the support of the Bovina fans more Friday night than ever before.

"It is easy to back a winner, but it is more important to back a team which has lost, because they need and appreciate the support so much more."

The Mustangs will go into that ball game with a 3-1 record and the Longhorns will enter the contest with a 1-3 record, after winning their first game of the year last Friday against the Amherst Bulldogs.

The game will start at 8 p.m. in Longhorn Stadium in Lazbuddie.

On Monday afternoon, several Bovina Mustang fans gathered at the local football field to lend a supportive hand to the gridsters. Several persons came out to show their faith in and support of the Mustangs.

Also, during the week of September 28-October 2, the fans in Bovina have proclaimed it "Shake the Hand of a Mustang" week.

Everyone is urged to shake the hands of these young men who so dedicatedly and faithfully represent the Bovina School system. This is to show them that they are winners...all of them.

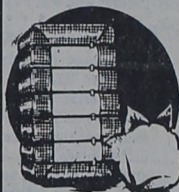

And, approximately 4:30 a.m. Saturday, September 24, police officials were called in reference to a disturbance at Allsup's 7-11 store, Parmer County Sheriff's deputy Jerry Atchley also received a call in reference about a car theft at about the same time as the reported disturbance.

Investigations turned up the fact that a male subject, Alfredo Alonzo, 24, had assaulted the clerk at Allsup's, who was on duty. The subject also stole a car belonging to a friend who was later identified by the Sheriff's Office as being Julian Lopez. Alonzo also reportedly assaulted the Lopez man in the process of taking the vehicle, according to Detten.

The subject abandoned the car at the 7-11 store, and proceeded on foot west of the store, through an alley, with police searching the vicinity of the store. After about an hour, the suspect was finally located at his residence, where he was taken into custody by Deputy Jerry Atchley and was transported to Parmer County jail.

Also assisting on this call were officers Joe Watts and Friona Police officer Mark Ancira and Lyndal Davis.

Alonzo was arraigned on Monday, September 28 on the assault charge only to which he plead guilty and ordered to serve 15 days in jail. Arraignment on the car theft charge is still pending at this time until District Court convenes.

On Sunday morning, at 1:30 a.m., David Dean Wines was arrested at Avenue A and Fourth Street by officers Joe Watts and Robert Olvera. The officers arrested Wines for public intoxication and disorderly conduct. The subject was arrested and transported to Parmer County jail, where he was arraigned on Monday following the incident and was fined \$35.00 including court costs.

On Sunday at 11 p.m., Andres Garza, Jr. of Bovina was arrested by officer John Detten and officer Charlotte Detten and charged with

DWI. The subject was transported to Parmer County jail where he remained and was offered a breath test but refused to submit to the test.

Garza was arraigned on the DWI charge before County Judge Porter Roberts on Monday and plead guilty to which he was fined \$200, and \$71.00 in court costs. He was also ordered to serve five days in the county jail.

On Monday at 2:30 a.m., Chief John Detten was called out on a burglary in process call at Second and Avenue B in Bovina. Upon arriving at the scene, Detten found none of the four suspects which reportedly were attempting to break into a house at that location. Deputy Jerry Atchley was also called on this report. Neither of the officers found anything unusual at the location. The home was watched and there was no evidence of a return of the subjects.

DPS REPORT

In the report from Parmer County's Troopers, the following items were received:

The vehicle driven by Bessire was pulling from a field road onto a county dirt road, turning east, when the Jarman vehicle, which was traveling west on the county dirt road collided, hitting left fenders.

Bessire was cited for failure to yield right of way from a private drive or road. The accident happened at the intersection of a county dirt road and a private field drive or road.

One accident was reported by Trooper Art Lopez, who by the way, was married in Friona on Monday evening, to Miss Cindy Auburg.

According to Lopez, the accident occurred at the intersection of Highway 214 and Highway 145.

Vehicle one was a 1982 GMC pickup driven by James D. Lee, and vehicle two was a truck tractor-trailer rig and we were unable to secure the driver's name at press time.

The vehicle operated by Lee failed to stop at a stop sign and was east bound, when his vehicle collided with the truck which carried the pickup approximately one-tenth of a mile down the road before stopping.

The pickup was totaled and Lee was taken to a Lubbock hospital with injuries. The truck driver was treated

The clerk at Allsup's 7-11 store in Bovina, whose name was not revealed, reported an assault at the store on September 26, in which Alonzo was charged for the incident.

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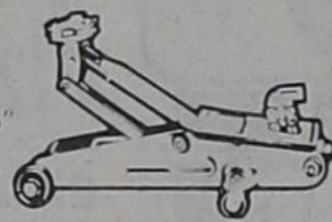

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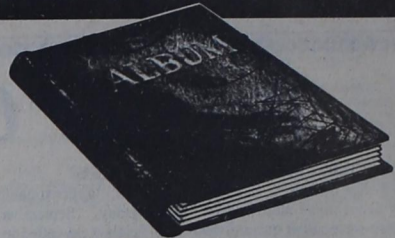

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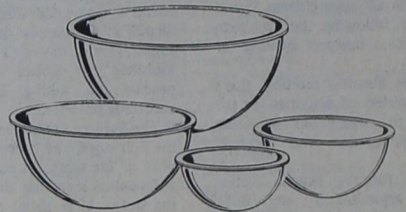
