COUNCIL FAVORABLE TO METER PROPOSITION-WATER USER TO FURNISH MEASURE.

### TO SUBMIT PROPOSITION

Council Gives Expression of The'r Position-Matter is Now Up to Mr. Sayles.

The city council last night placed itself on record as in favor of a new contract with the water company to permit the company to install meters, which they could put in at the cost of the consumer, or for which they could charge a monthly rental of 25c a month, at the option of the consumer. This concession was agred to, provid ed that the minimum water rate of \$1 per month be changed to \$12 per year, and that the proposed contract should go in force after and so long as the water company furnished the consumers with pure, clear water, suitable for all domestic purposes.

A motion that such was the sense of the council was passed and the action was authorized to be announced to Mr Henry Sayle's of the water, company. This action was taken in executive session after the matter had been discussed in open session with Messrs, Kemp

and Kell.

At the opening of the meeting Mr. Kemp asked that the council announce its position in the matter, as Mr. Sayles was awaiting their action be fore proceeding with some extensive improvements at the water plant by which clear water could be secured. He said that he appeared before the council rather as a citizen than as a stockholder in the water company and that his financial interest in the water company was secondary to his desire as a citizen to have clear water. Mr Sayles, he said, owned a controlling interest in the stock and was ready to begin the improvements at the plant when the council would give the company the right to install meters for which they could either charge a rental or the consumer could own at the cost of installation.

After a discussion at some length, the matter was passed until the council went into executive session, when the action mentioned in the foregoing lines was taken.

Mr. Sayles is expected to agree to the proposition of the council and is expected to come to Wichita Falls soon, when the contract will be voted upon in proper form.

# Collier & Hendricks

Happily a woman who is the least bit skillful in dainty arts can make a great deal of fancy pottery for Her own home. It really calls for no separate room in which to do the work, and the results, even in unskilled hands, is creditable, considering the material and implements used for making vases. jardinieres and the like. It is best to begin the work on a simple basis and. with the development of work at hand, new ideas and inspirations come as he worker becomes more experienced The plasta or powder for the material can be purchased and all it needs is water to form it into a smooth dough When made into a smooth dough, it can be rolled on a small board with a small rolling pin. It can be purchased in the natural pottery color, cream, olive or terra cotta. Any of the fancy shapes can be used for patterns and the pounding and kneading is done with the hands and a small round-headed mallet. It will be found that the hands are more useful in making the designs than any tools. If the pieces are to be colored, the coloring powder can be purchased at any drug store. It is put in a mixture of gum arabic and water, made the consistency of a thick cream with which the piece is coated. When partially dry, the surface is smoothed with the back of a silver spoon, which also increases the gloss of the ware. The pieces must be fired in a home-made kiln or sent to a pottery for that purpose. It costs comparatively little to have the work done away from home. Have the pieces perfectly dry before sending them to the kiln. It is said that or dinary floor wax is used by the amateurs to give the desired gloss to some of the ware. Jade gren pottery is very handsome for dining room decoration, and the patterns are extremely simple Great care must be taken in adding pieces of clay to a piece of work, for a piece too heavy may break down some pieces. One has to experiment and let the process of work be the chief instructor, for there is nothing complicated in the process, for children can make miniature pottery in the kindergarten departments and the principle is exactly the same for the larger pieces.

To Brighten the Glassware. The next time you wash the glassware, rinse in hot water and plunge the articles in a bucket of water in which there is a cupful of clear starch. Keep the starch stirred through the water. Put the glassware on towels to drain and leave until perfectly dry.

Rub with a soft cloth and you will be

delighted to see how bright are the pieces. Have a soft brush to clean ou the cut glass articles.

An Ironing Scheme. Often one will put papers under the ironing board to catch the ends of articles liable to fall on the floor. The next time you iron curtains or long table cloths, slip a metallic tub under the board and it will hold both ends of the material and there is absolutely no danger of the goods being soiled.

The Refrigerator.
If you wish to keep the refrigerator lean and sweet smelling do not place onions, bananas or fish in it, or every article of food that will absorb the odors. If there are metallic parts never place steaming foods in the apartments without afterward airing the box. The dampness not only causes rust, but is instrumental in causing

The White Summer Clothes.

If any of your white garments stored during the winter, show iron rust marks saturate the marks with lemon and salt and place in the sun. Con-tinue this until the spots fade, then wash the articles with strong borax

#### INDORSEMENTS OBSERVED ON REGISTERED MAIL

Washington, D. C., May 5.—The post master general has just issued the following notice to all postmasters:

The increasing frequency of complaints from the public, charging fail ure on the part of postmasters and their employes to observe and comply with indersements on registered mail restricting delivery of same to the addressees in person makes it necessary matter so indorsed and to remind post masters of the necessity of strictly The Wichifa county delegation to complying with the regulations relative

"Registered mail indorsed for de livery to the addressee in person must be delivered to no one but him, not even upon his written order; and if it cannot be so delivered, it must be re turned, after the expiration of the proper period, to the sender. It should be noted that the word 'personal' is not to be construed to restrict delivery to the addressee in person, but only such indorsements as indicate a demand to 'deliver to the addressee in

'No control which another person may have over the addressee as parent or guardian, or in any other capacity, alters or lessens the requirement for a strict observance of this regulation. In such cases, if delivery is forbidden by the person having an authorized control over the addressee's mail, the registered articles indorsed for delivery to the addressee in person must be refurned to the sender so marked, and a demand for the article or for its delivery to other than the addressee, made by the person having such control, must be disregarded.

"Senders who desire to make such indorsement should be advised when ever occasion arises to place it upon the address side of the article, in order that it may be readily observed at the office of delivery."

#### FORETOLD HIS FUTURE.

The Message Carl Schurz Received From Spirit Lan

An extraordinary experience with a medium is given in the Carl Schurz memoirs in McClure's.

After receiving what purported to be message from Schiller, General Schurz asked that the spirit of Lincoln be summoned to tell why President Johnson had called Schurz to Wash

"The answer came, 'He wants you to make an important journey for him.' I asked where that journey would take me. Answer, 'He will tell you tomor-. I asked further whether I should undertake that journey swer, 'Yes; do not fall.' (1 may add, by the way, that at that time I had not the slightest anticipation as to what President Johnson's intention with regard to me was.)

"Having disposed of this matter, I asked whether the spirit of Lincoln had anything more to say to me. The answer came, 'Yes; you will be a sena tor of the United States.' This struck me as so fanciful that I could hardly suppress a laugh, but I asked further. 'From what state?' Answer, 'From Missouri.' This was more provokingly mysterious still, but there the conversation ceased.

"Hardly anything could have been more improbable at that time that that should be a senator of the United States from the state of Missouri. My domicile was in Wisconsin, and I was then thinking of returning there. I had never thought of removing from Wisconsin to Missouri, and there was not the slightest prospect of my ever doing so.

"But, to forestall my parrative, two years later I was surprised by an entirely unsought and unexpected business proposition which took me to St. Louis, and in January, 1869, the legislature of Missouri elected me a senator of the United States. I then remembered the prophecy made to me at the spirit seance in the house of my friend Tiedemann in Thiladelphia."

#### CLEVER FISHERMEN.

Odd Methods of the Indians Sault Ste. Marie.

On the Sault Ste. Marie the Indians have a novel method of catching whitefish. Two Indians go with a canoe into the rapids. One occupies the bow and one the stern. The latter uses a paddle to keep the boat's head upstream The former has a pole with which to steady the boat, standing upright in his place.

They take with them a dipnet four feet in diameter attached to a pole of handle fifteen feet long. This is placed ready to the hand of the Indian in the The fishing is done at the foot of the rapids, where the water boils and tumbles furiously.

With his pole the Indian in the bow holds the canoe or lets it float stendily sidewise, now up a little perhaps and then down, but always under perfect control, The Indian gazes constantly into the water, which is often ten feet deep where they are fishing and the depths of which no white man was ever yet able to school his eye to pene-

Suddenly he seizes the net by the handle with one hand, still manipulating the boat with the other, and plunges the net into the water, perhaps ten feet away, thrusting it to the bottom. Then he gives it a peculiar twist, draws it up and turns out into the boat often as many as half a dozen whitetish weighing from three to five pounds.

These Indian fishermen are unerring in casting their nets, and it is not an uncommon thing for them to capture 300 whitefish in a day. How they are able to see the fish in the bottom of the rapids is a mystery no one has yet been able to fathom .- Pearson's Week-

As Good as a Porter.

It is curious how many people are in ignorance of simple little facts in connection with everyday life which would save them a large amount of unnecessary labor and fatigue. Take the case of carrying a heavy bag or portmanteau, for instance. We all know the annoying way in which it knocks against our legs and the almost intolerable ache in the arm that is supporting the burden. Few people are aware, bowever, that by folding a couple of newspapers and putting them under one's armplt a large amount of the strain and inconvenience is immediately removed. Breaking Wire. Anybody who has tried to break a plece of wire without the aid of a pair of pinchers will probably agree that the operation is both a difficult and painful one. By bending the wire into a loop and pulling both ends as tight as possible an injury will be caused to the wire, which on being straightened will immediately break. By this means wire up to No. 12 gauge may be successfully dealt with.

#### A DEATH GRIP ON THE WORLD

They Indicate the Beginning of the End of Our Beautiful Planet, Which Is Doomed to Roll Through Space a Parched and Lifeless Orb.

Deserts already exist on the earth.

and the nameless borror that attaches

to the word in the thoughts of all who have had experience of them or are gifted with imagination to conceive is in truth greater than we commonly suppose, for the cosmic circumstance about them which is most terrible is not that deserts are, but that deserts have begun to be. Not as local evitable evils are they only to be pictured. but as the general inescapable death grip on our world, for it is the begin-

ning of the end. What depauperates the forests to grass lands and thence to wastes must in turn attack the sen bottoms when they shall have parted with their seas. Last of the fertile spots upon the

planet because of the salts the streams have for ages washed down and of the remnant of moisture that would still drain into them, eventually they must share the fortune of their predecessors and the planet roll a parched orb through space. The picture is forbidding, but the fact seems one to which we are constructively pledged and into which we are in some sort atready adventured.

Girdling-the earth with what it takes but little personification to liken to the life extinguishing serpent's coils run two desert belts of country. The one follows, roughly speaking, the tropic of Cancer, extending northward from It; the other, the tropic of Capricorn, Arlzona is in the northern band, as are the Sahara, Arabia and the deserts of central Asia

Now, these desert belts are growing. > Trunks of trees in all stages of fracture strew the ground over a space some miles in extent. So perfect are their forms he is almost minded to think the usual wasteful woodchopper has been by and left the scattered products of his art in littered confusion upon the scene of his exploit. Only their beautiful color conveys a sense of strangeness to the eye, and, leaning down and touching them, he finds that they are-stone; chalcedony not carbon! Form has outlived substance and kept the resemblance, while the particles of the original matter have all been spirited away. Yet so perfect is the presentment one can hardly believe the fact, and where one fallen giant spans a little canyon one almost thinks to hear the sound of water rushing down the creek.

> But it is some millions of more since this catastrophe befell, and the torrent, uprooting it, left it prone. with limbs outstretched in futile grasp upon the other side. A conifer it was cousin only to such as grow today, and flourished probably in the cretaceous era, for the land has not been under water here since the advent of tertiary

> Nowhere near it. except for the rare cotton woods along the bank of the Little Colorado, grows anything today. The land which once supported these forests is incompetent to do so now Yet nothing has changed there since except the decreasing water supply. During tertiary and quaternary time the rainfall has been growing less and less. I'roof of this is offered by the great plue oasis that caps the plateau of which these petrified forests form a part and is kerneled by the San Francisco peaks. The height above sea level of the spot where the chalcedony trunks are strewn is about 4.500 feet. The lower present limit of the pine in its full development is 6.500 feet. Two thousand feet upward, the verdure line has retreated since the former forests were. And this is no local alteration; for upon the other side of the plateau petrified remains of trees are similarly found.

> The line of perpetual green has risen because in desert regions the moisture is found most plentiful pearest to the clouds from which it falls upon a parching earth. Streams, instead of gathering volume as they go, are largest near their source and grow less and less with each fresh mile of flow. The brooks descending from the Anti-Lebanon, in Syria, water the gardens of Damaseus and, thence issuing upon the plain, lose themselves just beyond the threshold of its gates. So in the Arizona desert, though in a less degree, and those who live there know it but too well.-From Percival Lowell's "Mars and the Future of the Earth" in Century.

### POSTAGE STAMP CHEATS.

Faolish Persons Who Run the Risk of Going to Prison.

"You would be surprised," said a postoffice clerk, "at the efforts people make to avoid the payment of postage. And quite often it is not the work of children either. The most common trick is to take the stamp that has been canceled by band and the impression just touches the edge of the stamp After pricking the marked edge with a pin or cutting it with a pair of shears to resemble the punctured edge of the stamp or tearing away that part the stamp is put on an envelope for another voyage. All these are placed in the bands of postal inspectors for in vestigation. =

"Others try to give the impression that a stamp had been put on an envelope and become loose and lost in transit by sticking a stamp on the envelope and then pulling it with part of the envelope sticking to it off again. These as well as underpaid letters, unless they have a foreign destination. where postage is then collected, are marked 'Returned for postage' and sent back to the sender. Second class matter, as a roll of newspapers, is often sealed against inspection by having the stamps overlap the cover. Whether foreign or not it is returned for postage. When it again shows up. the mistake rectified, upon inspection it is usually found to contain written letters, photographs (unmounted), jewelry, merchandise of all kinds, making the package underpaid; hence it is again returned.

But the limit of foolishness comes when a person tries to efface the indelible ink from the stamp and with balf the features of the stamp missing or rubbed away and some of the ink still remaining affixes it to an envelope, with the address of the sender upon the back to facilitate investigation.

"This, though, is stretching it a little too much: A postcard that had been put through a canceling machine and delivered to the addressee had the canceling impression and the address scratched off with the aid of a sharp knife and a new address substituted and a written message pasted on the reverse, side "-New York Sun

# A NOTORICUS RASCAL

Bold Exploits of Colonel Thomas Blood In England.

TRIED TO STEAL THE CROWN

The Daring Scamp Almost Succeeded. Too, and Managed to Escape Punishment After Being Captured-His Attack on the Duke of Ormonde.

A daring, fearless scamp and one of the most reckless and brazen soldiers of fortune that ever cut a swath in England was the notorious Colonel Thomas Blood.

This choicest of seventeenth century coundrels was born probably in Ireland in or about 1618. During the civil war he was active on the parliamentary side, was made a justice of the peace by Henry Cromwell and received large grants of land. These were confiscated at the restoration, and Blood forthwith began his career as a des-

His first plot was to seize Dublin castle and the person of the Duke of Ormonde, the lord lieutenant, in 1663. A crowd was to be collected at the castle gates, a pretended baker with a load of bread upon his shoulder was to stumble and upset the loaves, and in the scramble which would probably ensue among the castle guards the gates were to be seized, but the plot was betrayed to Ormonde, and, although Blood himself escaped, his brother-in-

law was arrested and executed. After a period of seclusion among the Irish hills and in Holland, Blood crossed to England and joined the fifty monarchy men. After one or two minor deeds of daring be planned and nearly carried out a desperate stroke in 1670. In that year the Prince of Orange visited England and was entertained by the city of London. In his train on the occasion was the Duke of Ormonde. against whom Blood nursed undying hate. The duke was dragged from his coach in St. James street by Blood and his son-in-law, strapped on horseback to one of the conspirators and hurried

toward Tyburn. So determined was the prime mover in the affair that his enemy should die that he hurried on toward the gallows to arrange the rope. The duke's coachman gave the alarm and followed his master with assistance, and a timely rescue was effected

On May 9 in the following year Blood made his great attempt to carry off the Tower jewels. He set about the task in quite a modern style. Some three weeks before the attempt he and a woman whom he represented as his wife -his real wife being then in the north of England-visited the Tower, where the lady feigned a sudden illness. - She and her companion were invited into the private apartments of Edwards. the aged keeper, that she might rest

Three or four days later they return ed with a present of gloves as an acknowledgment of the civility. Blood was courtesy itself, admired everything, but especially Edwards' pretty daughter, and presently proposed a match between the young lady and his "nephew." This was agreed to, and the visitors at once dined with the family, Blood pronouncing an edifying grace. After dinner they were shown over the house. Blood managed to rid Edwards of a case of pistols by purchasing them for a friend, and it was arranged that the "nephew" should be brought for inspection by his future bride at 7 o'clock on the morning of

Punctual to the day and hour, Blood appeared with three companions-Parrot, Hunt and Holloway. Each had a sword stick in his hand, a dagger in his belt and pistols in his pockets. Hollo way remained outside to guard the

Blood, with a nice regard for the etiquette of the occasion, proposed that they should await the arrival of his wife before joining the ladies and that Edwards should show them the crown jewels to while away the time. The jewel room was entered and the door. as usual, closed. Edwards was at once attacked, gagged and bound, an iron hook being even attached to his nose-"that no sound might pass from him that way." In spite of threats he struggled gallantly, was knocked down, stabled and left for dead. Parrot put the globe in his toose breeches. Blood crushed up the crown and thrust it be neath his cloak, while Hunt began to file the scepter in two before putting it

At this moment, like a bolt from the blue, appeared Edwards' son, newly arrived from Flanders and eager to greet his family. He went first to his mother and sister, and the thieves slipped out, but Edwards, regaining consciousress, managed to give the alarm, and they were taken. Said Blood philosophically, "It was a bold attempt, but It was for a crown."

After this one imagines there would be short shrift for Colonel Blood, and we expect the march to Tyburn and an edifying "fast speech." But he refused to plead unless in private to the king and was admitted to an interview, got on the right side of the merry monarch, hinted at accomplices by the hundred who would avenge his death, was thenceforward frequent in the presence chamber. Then he quarreled with his patron, Buckingham, and was cast in damages for slander on the duke. He died in 1680 and was buried in Tothill fields; but, a "sham funeral" rumor being started, he was exhumed two days later and identified at an inquest.--London Globe
