## RIGHT BODIES FOUND

SOME DISCOVERIES MADE ON WOMAN'S FARM NEAR LAPORTE, IND.

## TRAGIC TALE OF MURDER

Told By Mutilated Corpses—Mrs. Belle Guinness Suspected of Terrible Crimes.

**BULLETIN**—LaPorte, Ind., May 6.—A skeleton of a sixth body was unearthed on the Guinness farm at 11 o'clock today. The body was that of a child and was found in a pine box, lying downward, and had been buried probably two years. It has not been identified.

The gang of workmen excavating on the Guinness farm today, after unearthing the sixth victim, came upon two more skeletons in the same place. There is nothing to tell whether they were male or female. The bodies are being further excavated.

**Associated Press.**—LaPorte, Ind., May 6.—It is reported, but not yet confirmed, that three more bodies have been found in the cellar of the Guinness house.

**Associated Press.**—LaPorte, Ind., May 6.—Today the theory advanced that Mrs. Guinness is still alive and in hiding in Chicago. The theory is strengthened by the fact that the body of the woman found in the ruins of the Guinness house is missing. Unless the head is found, a careful investigation will be made to learn whether the woman subjected one of her victims for herself when set fire to the house to cover her crime.

**Associated Press.**—LaPorte, Ind., May 6.—Further excavations which may reveal more bodies of the corpse strewn farm of Mrs. Guinness, north of here, were resumed today by Sheriff Stulzer.

Mr. Lamphere, who is held on the charge of having caused the death of Mrs. Guinness and the three children, is subjected to another examination before Justice Smith.

The victims unearthed so far are Olsen, aged 40, the adopted son of Mrs. Guinness; Andrew Guinness, aged 35, a son of Mrs. Guinness; and three other children, Mrs. Guinness, and her three children, Lucie, aged 11; Luey, aged 10; and Phillip, aged 5.

The discovery of the bodies was about by the appearance of the Helldren of Aberdeen, S. D., a brother of Andrew Helldren, in LaPorte in search of the missing man.

The information that his brother had come to LaPorte to wed Guinness, that he turned over his property to her, he became convinced his brother had been made the man of foul play.

**Bodies are Unearthed.**—The questioning of Joseph Maxson, a hand on the Guinness farm, he told of the mysterious digging of the bodies by Mrs. Guinness. Helldren and the officers to the place where the holes had been dug 150 feet from the house, and after digging a few minutes, uncovered the body of Helldren. Remains were only four feet under ground and were inclosed in a gunny bag.

Legs and arms had been dismembered and were with the trunk. About thirty-five feet further on the house the remains of four persons were found.

On top of a mattress were the bones of two men and a woman. One of the men was the body of the 11-year-old girl said to be Jennie Helldren.

All the bodies were taken in by the coroner and are now lying in a barn on the Guinness farm, being carefully guarded.

The discovery of the bodies led to the delivery of five to the Guinness farm during the last six months, and this fact has led the authorities to work on the theory that the place was a clearing for murderers. They suspect wealthy persons, after being lured to the place and killed, were packed in trunks and sent to LaPorte to be disposed of.

**Husbands Were Insured.**—Developments of today also led the authorities to remember the two husbands of Mrs. Guinness under suspicious circumstances, meeting violent death. The first, Max Sorrensen, was insured for \$10,000, and the second, Guinness, for \$10,000. This insurance was paid over to Mrs. Guinness by the companies.

A central figure in the case is Mr. Lamphere, the former hired man of Mrs. Guinness, who was arrested with murdering her and her children after the woman's house was destroyed by fire, and the bodies of Mrs. Guinness and her children had been found in the ruins.

dren had been found in the ruins. He will now be accused of being an accomplice of Mrs. Guinness in the murdering of the alleged victims of the LaPorte woman.

**Death of First Husband.**—The first husband of Mrs. Guinness, Max Sorrensen, died several years ago, while the family lived at Austin, Ill. His death was then said to have been due to heart failure, but relatives claimed that he had been poisoned. An inquest was ordered some time after the remains had been buried, but for some reason the body was never disinterred by the authorities.

While a resident of Austin, the home of Mrs. Guinness was burned, and although some question as to the origin of the fire arose, the insurance was collected.

With the money secured from insurance, on the death of her husband, Mrs. Guinness bought a confectionery store in Chicago, which was located at the corner of Grand avenue and Elizabeth street. A short time later the store was gutted by fire, the origin of which was suspicious, but, after making an investigation, the insurance companies could not attach any blame to Mrs. Guinness and paid the claim.

**Sudden Death of Second Husband.**—After the fire at Chicago, Mrs. Guinness moved to LaPorte, and it was here that she was united in marriage to Peter Guinness. While in the kitchen one day, Guinness was struck on the head by a meat chopper, and his wife explained to the coroner that it had fallen from a shelf and had killed him. Although her story was questioned, the investigation was never carried any further, and her story was given sufficient credence by the authorities to drop the case. Andrew Helldren came to LaPorte Jan. 10, having left his home at Aberdeen, S. D., on Jan. 2, as the result of a courtship by mail. Mrs. Guinness had advertised for a husband. Her second husband, who met death in a mysterious form, had been buried several years, and she had worn widow's weeds up to the time of his death.

**Helldren Appears on Scene.**—Mrs. Guinness and Mr. Helldren had exchanged a number of letters. When Helldren arrived he became a guest at the Guinness home. Mrs. Guinness confided to him her need of \$1,500. Helldren expressed his willingness to loan her the money, in view of the fact that she was to become his wife. He remained, according to the best advice, at the Guinness home until Feb. 1, when, according to the statements made Ray Lamphere, he left the city on an early morning Lake Shore train for Chicago. No marriage ceremony was solemnized. Mrs. Guinness had been made the recipient of \$1,500, his loan to her.

**BOY CUT THROATS OF FOUR PERSONS**

**By Associated Press.**—New York, May 6.—A 16-year-old boy, known only as Carmello, and employed in a barber shop in Brooklyn, early today cut the throats of his employer, Antonio Peraso, and Mrs. Peraso and three barbers, while they were asleep in Peraso's apartment in Fulton street.

The wounds of Peraso and his wife are believed to be mortal, while those of the barbers are serious, but probably not fatal. The boy escaped. The police hold to the theory that the boy was an agent of the black hand society.

New York, May 5.—Mrs. Hetty Green is one of the latest arrivals at the Hotel Plaza. It became known yesterday that the woman frequently called "the richest woman in the world" had been at the hotel for four or five days. To live at the Plaza Mrs. Green had to abandon her modest apartment in Hoboken, where she has made her home for so long. She has taken an expensive suite. With her are her daughter, Sylvia, and maid, the trio having a suite of several rooms. They breakfast and dine in the hotel restaurant and Mrs. Green visits her office at the Chemical National Bank.

## JOHNSON VS. HARMON

FORCES OF TWO DEMOCRATIC LEADERS IN LIVELY CONTEST IN OHIO CONVENTION.

## WILL FIGHT TO FINISH

Harmon Driven By Johnson Declares He is in Fight to a Finish—Convention Instructs for Bryan.

**By Associated Press.**—Columbus, Ohio, May 6.—The democratic State convention will nominate a full state ticket and four delegates at large and alternates to the democratic national convention. The convention was called order at 10 o'clock today by temporary chairman Moore of Youngstown. So bitter has been the fight by Mayor Johnson on Judson Harmon, that the latter telephoned from Cincinnati today that he is in the fight to remain until the last ballot.

The friends of Harmon predict lively times on the floor of the convention before adjournment. The platform as informally agreed upon by the committee on resolutions, indorses Bryan and instructs the delegates to vote for him. A unit rule has been provided for.

**Harmon Gets Nomination.**—Late this afternoon Judson Harmon of Cincinnati was nominated for governor of Ohio over three other opponents for that office.

## FLEETS CASTS ANCHOR AT SAN FRANCISCO

**By Associated Press.**—San Francisco, Cal., May 6.—Four months and twenty days out from Hampton Roads, the Atlantic fleet of battleships and the second American torpedo flotilla steamed today within the Golden Gate and cast anchor in the harbor of San Francisco. The fleet, with the Connecticut at the head, with Admiral Evans in command, passed in at the headlands of Bonita at 12 o'clock noon.

It is estimated that 300,000 strangers have been brought into San Francisco during the past forty-eight hours.

It gives an increase in pay, both to officers and enlisted men. The bill carries a total of ninety-five million dollars.

DERR & EARLY OF OKLAHOMA WERE THE SUCCESSFUL BIDDERS.

## START WORK IN 15 DAYS

Contract Calls for Completion of Work in September—Cost Approximately \$28,800.

The contract for the construction of approximately eight and one-half miles of sewer in Wichita Falls was awarded by the city council today to Derr & Early of Oklahoma City, whose bid was approximately \$28,800.

The cost will probably exceed this sum by several hundred dollars, as the contract provides that for excavations made in rock the contractors will receive 25 cents per lineal foot for each foot in depth, this being at a higher rate than the schedule bid for other excavating.

In the contract which is now being drawn up for the signature of the proper officials and the contractors, the latter will bind themselves to begin work within fifteen days, and to complete the work on or before September 15th.

The successful bidders are required to furnish a bond of \$5,000 for the proper performance of their part of the agreement.

### OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

Betty Bradeen in Boston Traveler.

The surest sign of old age is inability to sleep in the morning and habits of early rising all out of keeping with the family life. My friends, cultivate morning naps before it is too late--you will avoid being a nuisance to those who do not get up with the sun and when you have to live with them that means something.

Children have the early rising habit because they retire early. The exceptions keep hours out of all proportion to their years, and sometimes are difficult to persuade to the breakfast table while the meal is at its best. In a family where the children are supposed to retire at 7 o'clock, the elder, a boy, rarely gets to sleep before 9, and his mother once left him to make his morning toilet undisturbed, and it was afternoon before he was presentable. He missed breakfast and just caught luncheon by neglecting the finishing touches.

Nobody believes, nowadays, that any special good comes from early rising. Long life falls to many a man or woman who were sluggards in both youth and middle life. The worker's whom business calls from bed in the wee small hours of the morning are not such specimens of health and strong nerves as to make us wish to follow in their footsteps. Personally, I find it easier to sit up all night than to get up early in the morning and my resting hour has nothing to do with it.

Sometimes I think that sleep is very largely a matter of habit. I have worked nights and slept days, and after the habits were fixed have changed them by working through the day like other Christians. A little experience was all I needed in the transition. In cases of need I can get up at any hour, but if it is early I do not feel real well at any part of the day.

The afternoon nap is impossible to extremely active women, but I have seen scores of others converted to it by persistent effort. If the sleep supply is curtailed by amusement or work, a nap in the day is the most rational method of repairing the loss. There is such a thing as too much sleep, and if early retiring hours are in order the time for leaving bed should be arranged to allow no more than eight hours of healthy slumber.

I do not like to hear anybody confess to sleeplessness. It means disease somewhere. Fancy lying in bed wide awake and finding the noise of a milkman's wagon almost unbearable. I know a case of that kind, and the dispenser of the white fluid was mortally offended at a request to use rubber tire and wrap the bottles to avoid the danger and noise of hitting together. No amount of money can compensate such a wretched sleeper for his loss.

#### Kitchen Notes.

Flour and sugar can be mixed together and sifted for some kinds of pastry. It makes the flour smoother and frees the sugar from lumps.

In making pie dough, lift the flour in the hands above the bowl and let it sift lightly into the bowl. This carries air cells into the dough, which gives the lightness that many fail to find. If baking powder is used, it begins its work as soon as moistened, for which reason it is necessary to get the dough into the oven as quickly as possible. Pie dough not made with baking powder can be put away in a clean cloth and kept for several days. Lay it in the flour bin and it will remain clean and ready for use when needed.

Rhubarb retains all of its delicate flavor and shape if sweetened and cooked in a double-boiler or steam cooker. It is not necessary to add water to it.

Wring a cloth out of pure elder vinegar, wrap cheese in it and place in an earthen jar, tightly cover and it will remain good the warmest summer weather.

If lettuce is to be kept fresh over night, wrap each head in wet cloths and place in the refrigerator or cellar and it will be in as good condition the next day as when purchased.

Save egg shells by breaking a small point from each one and keep them to put jelly or jam in for the school children to carry to school next winter. The end can be sealed with a small piece of paper dipped in paraffine or a small cloth used in the same manner. Jelly must be moderately stiff to put into the shells.

#### Posed as a Man.

Spokane, Wash., May 6.—Nelme Allen, 23 years of age, who declared afterward that she has posed as a man for eight years, was arrested here recently, but as there is no law in Washington under which she could be prosecuted for masquerading, Chief of Police Rice released her. Miss Allen said the reason she dressed as a man is because she was often suspected of masquerading as a woman. She has large feet and hands and a voice like a man.

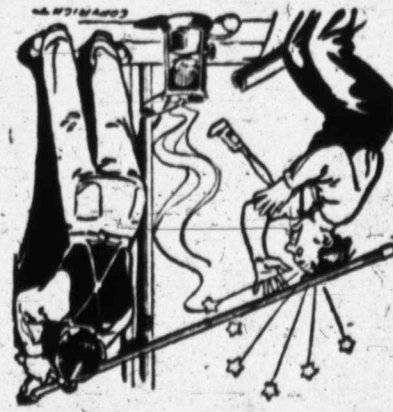

### In the Interest of Accuracy.

The Telegram feels a pardonable pride in its publication of primary election returns Sunday morning and Monday afternoon. Not only were the returns more complete than those published by any other paper of the State, but they also presented as accurately as could be computed Senator Bailey's actual majority up to press time of each issue.

Possibly the Telegram has no reason for being satisfied at giving its readers accurate information, yet there seems to be evidence that all Fort Worth papers are not so anxious to give their readers the facts.

Through the courtesy of the Burroughs Adding Machine Company computing machines were loaned both the Telegram and the Record Saturday night. To prevent mistakes the company also furnished expert operators.

Yet the Record Sunday morning claimed for Senator Bailey "a majority of from 35,000 to 50,000," while its own published table of figures (footed by the Telegram on a Burroughs machine) show only a total majority of 20,843. This total majority from the Record's figures has not been augmented by any additional figures published by the Record. Its readers are still left to assume that Senator Bailey's majority is from 35,000 to 50,000, though no figures have been published by the Record to substantiate this claim.

The Telegram's estimate of Senator Bailey's majority Sunday morning was 18,000. The Sunday Dallas News made an estimate of 25,000, but on Monday morning cut down its estimate to 18,000, which were the Telegram's Sunday figures. Totals in Monday night's Telegram showed a little more than 18,000 majority up to that time.

The Houston Post, second only to the Record in support of Senator Bailey during the campaign, printed Sunday morning the actual majority shown by its returns, which was only a trifle over 16,000. The Record printed no footed tables Sunday morning, nor has it done so yet. On Monday it still claimed 35,000 to 50,000 majority, but printed no election figures to substantiate the claims. On Tuesday morning it made no claims and printed no tabulated statements. Readers were evidently left to make their own estimates on Monday. The Telegram does not claim to know what the final figures will be. But the Telegram is first of all a newspaper and as a newspaper it will print and did print election returns as they came in, and make its running story of the election correspond to its figures.

Why, in the interest of accuracy, does the Record not print the facts, at least so far as they are shown by its own figures?

The election is over now, and at least the general results are known. If the Record is interested in printing a newspaper it ought to take its own figures, total them on the adding machine, and print the result. After that it can claim 35,000, 50,000 or 100,000 majority if it wants to.

As for the Telegram, it will print all the true information on the election results it can obtain. It will print the figures and their totals and make its running account of conditions conform to the figures at hand. If the figures of Mr. Bailey's majority are 18,000, its readers will have it. If the figures go to 20,000, 22,000, 25,000 or even 35,000 the Telegram will print them with as much display as it would if they were 5,000.—Fort Worth Telegram.
