MATT MOTEN WRITES

Troops Might Have Ideas About "Worthy Causes"

(Editor's note: Matt Moten was superpower, economically as was a sport of kings, wherein raised in Bovina, when his much as militarily. I am a ground troop. I'm the guy you've heard pundits, politicians, pollsters, and very occasionally, real people talk about. You will usually hear them talking about "sending in" guys like me. But what we "ground troops" are to be "sent in" to do is the subject of much muffled mumbling. muffled mumbling.

The banality of such discourse stems form the poverty of the average American's military lexicon. This country has now reared a second generation that cannot tell a colonel from a corporal, a soldier from a Marine, a howitzer from a tank. And the reason for this limited vocabulary is a dearth of military experience. The fact is that most Americans have not served, have never thought of serving, and have no close tie to anyone who has served in the military.

Now, one might argue that a societal ignorance of military experience is a good and precious thing. Indeed, America remains the only

sophistication of our armed was frequently an end in forces is such that we see no itself. As on a chessboard, "peer competitor" on the horizon as far as we project. of Marlborough or Frederick It is a luxury and It is a luxury, and an accident of history, that we enjoy such prosperity and security when our citizens are so free from the burdens of military service that they give little thought to war, or conflict, or much else that

happens beyond our shores.
There's the rub. Americans give almost no attention to matters of national security. When a crisis rears, they give practitioners of the military art, us "ground troops," an unwitting compliment. They believe that we are equal to any task. Over a coffee break with a strategic wave of the hand, they "send in the ground troops," those undifferentiated interchangeable parts of military power, and assume that all will be well.

The American military profession is partly to blame for this cavalier attitude. In the quarter century since the Vietnam War, we have rebuilt the military into an all-volunteer, professional force. We won the Cold War and then Desert Storm with such efficiency and such bloodstinginess that most Americans now view war as antiseptic. America now expects, and regularly receives, military action that results in no U.S. casualties and little loss of innocent life among our adversaries. The recent bombings in Iraq, Afghanistan, and now Serbia are all examples of the art.

It seems that we have achieved a Clausewitzian absurdity. Carl von Clausewitz, the vaunted Prussian military historian and theorist, argued that Napoleon's great and horrible contribution was bringing the people into warfare. Prior to the French Revolution, war

often capitulated bloodlessly and acquiesced to the limited political demands of the

Napoleon, on the other hand, wielding the emotion and violence of the levee en masse, ruthlessly and bloodily conquered enemies who still played by these old rules for all time, thereby transforming war. And as the Industrial Revolution reinforced stateharnessed popular violence, bloodbaths in the American Civil War and two World Wars ensued with greater

and greater fury. Now it seems that we have returned to the pre-Napoleonic era. American military forces are again small, expensive, and professional. Thanks to Information-Age technology they are also growing ever more effective and lethal. But the people are no longer

there. That change is not technological. It is political. As Joseph Califano has recently reminded us, young Americans began turning against warfare in 1968. That is when the Johnson Administration took steps to see that the sons of the middle class would begin to bear the burdens of military service alongside their poorer and darker fellow citizens. War protests began in earnest once the oxen of the articulate were gored. The war became unpopular. Johnson, then Nixon in his turn, lost support of the people. America lost that war in 1973 and turned away from conscripting its citizens to fill its military ranks.



"Where is God Today Anyway?"

At mid-afternoon on a Thursday, about 15 people gathered in the front yard of a small house in Ralls, Texas. Some knelt in prayer at an

The reason for the gathering, as reported in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, was an image of the Virgin Mary on the front porch of the small, tan house with a green gable in the 1400 block of Avenue G.

The image appeared when Isabel Riojas went out on the little wooden porch to clean up some spilled chocolate milk.

family and speaks only Spanish, said "As soon as I put water on it, the image just appeared. I called my daughter out of the house to see it."

Word spread. People came to kneel and pray to the chocolate milk stain that contained the image of the Virgin Mary.

A shrine evolved as candles were lit and prayer beads and crosses and flowers were left on the humble wooden porch by visitors who wanted to see the image themselves.

In one way or the other, we all look for a religious sign. Especially when things "ain't goin' so good." We shrines, and monuments, and statues signifying our search for something we will never really understand anyway.

A friend once said that the reason people worship God is because us humans aren't about to worship something if we understand it. If we can figure out the mystery, then it is not a mystery anymore.

People look for miracles. Oral Roberts would open his once-popular TV show with the words, "Expect a miracle."

But before you can grasp burning bush of your choice, you have to get a big dose of

The intimate sanctuary, which seats 7,000 believers, has convenient big screen TVs throughout. That is in case you don't get one of the 3,000 parking spaces and get there late you wouldn't be able to see the preacher way down there at the front.

The article in the Dallas paper did not say whether the deacons sold private skyboxes to the more affluent worshipers.

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



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

the next plant, injecting the virus as it feeds on a healthy plant.

After the leafhopper acquires the virus it carries it indefinitely. The level of plant infection depends upon the number of virus-carrying insects, the strain of the virus and the stage of the tomato plant.

There is no single practice that eliminates this virus. However, combining several cultural practices will lessen the spread of the disease. Here are some practices that will affect curly top development.

At the first sign of the virus, remove the infected plants as soon as possible. Diseased plants will not provide salvable fruit and keeping the plant amongst your other plants will only help the virus spread.

Remove all weeds from in and around garden. As mentioned earlier, the insects are attracted to weed hosts. I know that some people plant gardens on field edges and this may be difficult if there are a lot of weeds

present in the adjacent field. Fertilize and irrigate to encourage young plants to grow a heavy foliage that might discourage leafhopper

migration.

Plant tomato plants in partial shade, or plant the tomatoes closely together. A thick canopy will produce shade to ward off leafhoppers. Shade discourages leafhoppers, however, excessive shading could prevent the proper development of the plant.

It is not recommended to target the insect itself because the leafhoppper is not a permanent resident of tomatoes. The virus is transmitted after leafhopper feeding, and the insect is probably long gone, feeding on other hosts, before symptoms appear on the tomato plant.
