WRIGHT AEROPLANE IS A COMPLETE WRECK.

Manteo, N. C., May 15 .- After scoring a triumph in a splendid flight of more than eight miles this afternoon, the Wright Bros. aeroplane was suddenly dashed to the earth and completely wrecked.

Wilbur Wright, the operator, was not injured, but the wreck of the machine was so complete that the parts will be shipped back to Dayton, Ohio, where the craft will be rebuilt and the practice work continued, probably at this point.

The cause of the accident is not definitely known, but it is supposed that while going at a rapid speed the operator pulled the wrong lever and sent he machine downward instead of up-

ward, as he had tended. Had the 1. ac .ne continued in the air for anoth three miles it would have beaten ten miles continuous flight as more that eight miles had been covered in the most thrilling flight thus far made. At this point the machine had traveled at about forty-five miles hour, but was probably making mace greater speed at the moment of ne ollapse. It came down behind one the big sandhills and in a spot here no one could see what happen-

Orville Wright, an assistant, and a w life savers, saw the machine sud-

denly dart to the earth, and went to the assistance of Wilbur, whom they found unharmed, physically, but wellnigh crazed with grief and disappoint ment over so serious a setback at this

Today's flights were undoubtedly, all things considered, the most important achievement in the history of aerial navigation, and the accident occurred when the Wrights seemed at the very threshold of one of the world's greatest triumphs.

It appears that in August, 1889, an order was passed by the county commissioners expressly forbidding the county judge or any other agent of the county from making any compromise or accepting any money from the purchasers. At a subsequent meeting it appears from the records that Judge Foster, who was the county judge, did accept a tender of the principal of the purchase price, without the payment of the interest.

The records show no intervening or der and it is claimed that the action was illegal and that the purchasers thereby have no ownership in the land. The question has many complica tions and the commissioners are now stiempting to unravel the records to show the exact status of the matter.

It is never necessary to use a soapy cloth on the face, though it is needed for washing the rest of the body. Better than soap is almond meal, but this, too, must be used carefully. Never use but enough to make a lather on the face, and this will be less than a thimbleful of meal. The bitter almond must be sparingly used and if the face is first dampened with tepid water, the meal carefully worked into a paste in the palms of the hands, then gently rubbed into the pores of the skin, it most assuredly will remove blackheads, soften and whiten the complexion. If the least irritation follows a bath of this kind, apply cocoa butter, leave for a short time and remove with a clean towel and apply talcum powder. If an eruption frequently occurs on the face; the cause is inward and medical attention is ded, though obstinate skin blemishes can be cured by mixing sulphur with vaseline. Being unable to pay the money, he was forcibly taken down and whipped with a leather belt in the hands of a negro. The crowd on the outside witnessed this spectacle.

In the name of the Southland, where the white man boasts that his reign is supreme and where the laws of his making are executed with fairness to all men without regard to color or nationality, is this condition of affairs to be tolerated?

It is a fact that our police officials are aware of these conditions and, I presume, approve of the same, else last night's performance would not have taken place.

A Curious Ear.

The catfish uses his tungs as an organ of hearing. The needless lung becomes a closed sac filled with air and commonly known as the swim bladder. In the catfish, as in the suckers, chubs and most brook fish, the air bladder is large and is connected by a slender tube, the remains of the trachea, to the esophagus. At its front it fits closely to the vertebral column. The anterior vertebrae are much enlarged, twisted together, and through them passes a chain of bones, which connects with the hidden cavity of the The bladder therefore assists the ear of the catfish as the tympanum. and its, bones assist the ear of the higher animals. An ear of this sort can carry little range of variety in sound. It probably gives only the impression of jars or disturbances in the
