

ROADS AND SWITCHES BEING BUILT THROUGH BRICK AND TILE PLANT.

#### **DWELLINGS FOR EMPLOYES**

Are Also Contracted for and Work Will Begin at Once-Plant Will Be a Model One.

M. W. Stannifor'h, who is at the head of the brick factory, returned to his home at Gainesville last night, after spending several days here in making arrangements for the preliminary

work on the plant. While here he made arrangements for a roadway to be opened through the factory grounds and also purchaied lumber and other matrelals for an office building and for dwellings for the employes of the plant. He purchased a big bill of material from Moore & Richolt and contracted with Brown & Cranmer for the construction of the buildings.

The Fort Worth and Denver has a gang of men at work making the grade for the switch, which will run through the factory grounds, and soon a large force of men will be at work putting up the kilns and installing the machinery,

Mr. Stanniforth states positively, from his personal investigation of the brick plants throughout Oklahoma, Texas and Kansas, and visits to the factories of the leading manufacturers of brick making machinery throughout the country, that the plant to be put in here is the model and most upto-date plant of the three States above

SECRETARY OF STATE DEFENDS STATUTES AND FIRES BROAD-SIDE INTO FEWER LAWS.

And Better Ones, Too-Acts Most Complained of, He Declares, are Working Well.

Special to the Times. Abilene, Tex., June18.—In a speech delivered at a banquet following the second meeting of the Central West

Texas Commercial Clubs, Secretary of State L. T. Dashiell fired a broadside into the movement for "Fewer and Better Laws," and valiantly defended the acts of the Thirtieth legislature and the Campbell administration.

It has been generally understood that Mr. Dashiell expected to say a few things to and about his critics last night and as a result there was a good crowd in the skating rink, where a funch had been spread for visiting delcrates to the commercial clubs' conention. Most of these delegates were present, but there was also a large sprinkling of the Abilene people.

Asks Critics to be Specific. No time was wasted on preliminarics. Mr. Dashiell opened up by saying that there was a movement on foot for 'ewer and better laws and he believed it would be to the interest of the Texor commercial secretaries to come out and say plainly what laws they wanted repealed and what ones they wanted l ottered.

Not having any such statement to work from, he said he would take up. some of the Thirtieth legislature's acts which were most criticised and which, be understood, were some of the ones it is believed an effort will be made to

The first one was the anti-free pass law and its bearing on the right of contract.

Mr. Dashiell explained in all his remarks that he did not declare the Thirtieth legislature's laws were without defects. But he emphatically deolared that the measures most attackcd are decidedly right in principle.

# **ELECTRIC POWER IN**

Fort Worth Record.

Each machine in the new Foort Worth & Denver general shops soon to be erected in Childress will be equipped with an individual dynamo, which will enable the road to disense completely with the old-fashioned system of overhead shafting and pulleys, at once dangerous and inconvenient. These new shops will replace those burned in May.

The introduction of electricity as a motive power into the shops will be only one of many big improvements both in machinery and in the operation of machinery

The shops will also be much larger than those destroyed by fire.

The use of the individual dynamos by the Fort Worth & Denver appealed strongly to the officials because of the fact that it is possible to operate any one machine under the electric plan without turning on the power for the entire shop, as with the shafting and belting.

The Fort Worth & Denver is taking care of the machinists and mechanics who were thrown out of their regular employment by the fire. In the first place, quite a large number were put to work repairing whatever machinery was gotten out of the old shops and partly saved from the flames. And temporary structures have been provided for pieces of new machinery and some of the unemployed put to work on them. A few were sent to Fort Worth, Amarillo and Wichita Falls.

As a further boon to the unemployeed workmen, the Fort Worth & Denver ever day labor may exist on the line. has offered them first call for what-

The contract for the new shops has not been awarded. It is expected that the buildings will be finished ninety days from now.

Then wash the leather with warm water, and when dry polish it with a very little linseed oil and vinegar mixed in equal parts. The ink stain should be removed as quickly as possible, for if allowed to dry and harden it is doubtful whether you will ever be able to entirely remove it.


