BOTH CITY AND COUNTY SHOW GREAT GAINS IN SCHOLASTIC. POPULATION.

Wichita Falls Independent School District Shows a Net Gain of Two Hundred and Twelve.

The scholastic population of the Wichita Falls independent school district is much larger than was reported several weeks ago, before Mr. Frieze the enumerator, had compiled his sup-

plemental list This list has now been completed and shows a scholastic population of 1,110 against a total last year of 898, net gain of 212. Of this number 1,045 are whites and 65 are blacks. showing a white population almost ass large as many cities which clafm a population of from ten to fifteen thous-

Of the whites 515 are males and 530. females, and of the blacks 35 are males. and 30 females.

The complete scholastic enumeration of the county has been completed and County Judge Yeager, ex-officio county superintendent of schools, is preparing to send the completed reports to Aus-

tin. The total number of persons in Wichita county of scholastic age is 2.588. Last year the scholastic census showed only 1840, showing a net

gain in one year of 748 pupils. This, it is believed, will be one of the largest percentages in gains of any county in the State, and shows a gratffying increase in population, both in

the city and throughout the county. The reports of the enumerators this year show the following number of pupils in the different in lependent school districts in the county, and in those sections not included in any independ-

ent school district: Wichita Falls, 1;110; Iowa Park, 228; Burkburnett, 172; Electra, 88; outside of independent school districts, 990; total, 2,588; last year's total, 1,840; gain over last year, 748.

If the per capita apportionment is maintained at \$6 this year, Wichita county will receive \$15,428 from the State tuition fund, but if the states school tax is maintained at its present rate-20 cents-it is likely that on theincreased valuations under the full rendition law, the county will pay to the State fund more than \$5,000 more than will receive.

A LITTLE LEARNING.

Amusing Blunders Made English School Children.

BURNING A DIAMOND.

The Experiment as Made by Davy and Faraday.

That diamonds will not only burn but will blaze, was proved as long ago as 1814 by Sir Humphry Davy and Michael Faraday. The experiment was carried out at Florence, where the two scientists were visiting the great Duke of Tuscany, whose burning glass was the medium through which the sun was induced to operate. This burning glass consisted of a couple of convex lenses, distant from each other about three and a half feet, the large lens being some fourteen inches in diameter, the smaller about three inches. The diamond rested on a rod of platinum which had a cup shaped receptacle at the top, plerced with holes to admit of free-circulation of gas: This rod was fixed in the center of a glass globe of twenty-two cubical inches capacity, exhausted of air and

illed with pure hydrogen Intense heat was brought to bear upon the diamond when it was exposed to the sun, the second lens greatly reducing the focus. In the course of three-quarters of an bour it was necessary twice or thrice to cool the globe. Then it was noticed that the diamond was slowly diminishing and becoming gradually opaque. Suddenly it burst into flame. They removed the stone from the focus, and it blazed away merrily. It glowed brilliantly. with a scarlet light inclining to purple, and continued to burn for about

four minutes. The glass was then cooled and the diamond again submitted to the action of the sun. Again it blazed, but not for so long a period as at first. Twice more this was repeated, and then the diamond was totally consumed. This was the first occasion on which, so far as is known, a diamond had been seen to burn.-Chicago News.

It remains the batch of platitudes, fulsome boasts and skillful straddles that it was when it left the hands of its framers, and it is hoped by those who seek to hold irreconcilable republican factions together that the voters will greedily swallow the variety of bait which has been tossed to them.

The tariff plank, which will probably command most attention, is a promise of revision that will never be fulfilled so long as the republican party remains in power, and yet it is possible in a way, in the remote event of republican success, to make some changes in the schedules that might be accepted by some as revision.

The declaration favoring the protective principle announces that duties must represent the difference between the cost of production at home and the cost of production abroad and include a reasonable profit for the home manufacturers. That will amply satisfy the standpatters, for they can outjuggle the revisers and perhaps they may be able to raise duties in some cases. In any event, the republicans promise no substantial relief to the people and they never intended to.

The anti-injunction plank is so vague that it amounts to a denial of the petition of the labor unions. Labor has the shadow and the captains of industry the substance.

Stripped of its adulatory verbosity, there is little of promise to the masses. There are abundant assurances that the privileged interests will continue to receive the faithful consideration of the republican party if the campaign contributions are liberal enough to enable the party to purchase the election.

The Roosevelt policies are declared for, but the Eastern wing of the party is given to understand that there will be no further running amuck and that the party has no intention of proceed ing further on the pathway of Roosevelt radicalism than may be necessary to hold the discontented Westerners in

There is a certain craft displayed in phrasing some of the planks which are supposed to represent the party's constructive program and, but for the public's shaken confidence in the republican party and the doubt of its capacity to further promote the welfare of the country, perhaps many people would be misled by the specious promises they contain. But the undoubted tendency of voters to seriously think and investigate will subject the entire platform to closer scrutiny than usual and scrutiny will reveal to intelligent citizens the inherent folly of reposing further faith in republican
