It is predicted that R. R. Williams, the blacksmith candidate for the democratic nomination for governor of Texas, will poll at least 250,000 votes in the primary election on July 28th, and if he does this the chances are he will be our next governor. This estimate of Williams' strength, however, may be greatly exaggerated, and the Times is rather inclined to believe that it is, although it must be admitted that the Williams boom is gaining ground daily and if not checked by the Campbell forces is likely to turn into a ground swell and land a comparatively obscure man in the governor's chair. Those who do not agree with Campbell and his administration, however, should study the two candidates carefully before voting. Both have records—Campbell as governor for one term, and Williams as a representative in the legislature for one term from Hopkins county.

Reports from the country concerning the grain crops are rather discouraging. The continued heavy rains, following the overflow of low lands, have kept farmers out of their fields so long that it is now estimated that at least fifty per cent of the small grain crop has been ruined. Much of the grain has not yet, nor can it be, harvested, from the fact that it has fallen in tangled masses to the ground. But behind every cloud there is a silver lining, and while the heavy and continued rains have been detrimental to the small grain crops, they have been of great benefit to the other crops, such as corn and cotton, and the prospects are now that the best and largest corn and cotton crop in the history of Wichita county will be made this year.

Simple and Effective Remedy for Moist Hands in Summer.

So many girls complain of perspiration soaked hands in the summer. Such a condition is exceedingly annoying. It mortifies them whenever they are out among people.

They dislike to shake hands with anyone and they are always conscious that their gloves are spotted with moisture and are very untidy looking. The only way to remove them is after the manner of peeling the skin off a tomato.

But what is there to do? That is the question.

The following mixture is said to work wonders without being harmful, for bear in mind that it is not always healthful to stop perspiration.

There are remedies that are effective in that they stop the one thing for which they are used, but no one knows what other train of ills they start in action.

The mixture only calls for two ounces of alcohol and a quarter of an ounce of belladonna. Only the palms of the hands should be wet with it, and it should be put on three or four times a day.

Another precaution a woman should take who suffers in this way is to shake a little talcum powder into each glove before putting it on. If she has no regular powder shaker, she can use a salt cellar.

In truth, no woman should put on gloves in warm weather without first powdering the hands or the inside of the gloves. It is a clean habit and a refreshing one.

THE FOURTH OF JULY

Saturday is the Fourth of July and while the day will be celebrated in nearly all the surrounding towns, there will be no public celebration in Wichita Falls, although many stores and business houses will close and hundreds will go out to Lake Wichita, or other places to spend the day. The banks will close and there will be no rural mail delivery on that day.

The holiday celebrates the adoption of the Declaration of Independence in the Colonial Congress, July 4, 1776, and is more generally observed throughout all parts of the United States than any other holiday.

The following is a brief history of this celebrated declaration:

On the 15th of May, 1776, a convention in Virginia had instructed its delegates in the General Congress to propose to that body to declare the United Colonies free and independent, absolved from all allegiance to or dependence on the Crown or Parliament of Great Britain, and that they give the assent of this colony to such a declaration, and to whatever measures might be thought proper and necessary by the Congress for forming foreign alliances and a Confederation of the colonies.

The motion thus ordered was on the 7th of June made in Congress by Richard Henry Lee as the oldest member of the Virginia delegation. It was to the effect that "these United Colonies are and of right ought to be free and independent States. That they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown; and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain is and ought to be dissolved." The resolution was slightly debated for two or three days, but from considerations of expediency the discussion was intermittent.

Finally a committee consisting of Jefferson, Adams, Franklin, Sherman and Livingston was appointed to draft a declaration.

On the 1st of July there was again called up in congress the resolution proposed by Mr. Lee, which was adopted after various amendments from Mr. Jefferson's pen as the "Declaration of Independence" on July 4th. The document was authenticated, like the other papers of the congress, by the signatures of the president, secretary and the members present.

Rev. George C. Ulmer, who has his temporary home here, held two meetings at Burk Burnett Sunday. At 4 p. m. he addressed a house full of men in a meeting for "Men Only." Every seat in the M. E. Church was occupied. Many good things were said of this lecture. At night the seating capacity of the church would not accommodate the people who assembled to hear Mr. Ulmer on "Texas Dry in 1909."
