A PIECE OF ANCIENT HISTORY.

Ex-Ranger Sullivan Visits the City and Tells of a Lively Chase After Bank Robbers.

W. J. L. Sullivan, better known as John L., who was first lieutenant of the Texas Ranger force for years, and who took an important part in the capture of the bank robbers who robbed the City National Bank in this city in 1896, killing cashier Dorsey and wounding P. P. Langford, was in city today in the interest of the candidacy of Judge Iry Dunklin of Fort Worth, who is a candidate for Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals of the Second Supreme District.

In speaking of the bank robbery and the capture and execution of the robbers, Mr. Sullivan described minutely the details of the chase of 13 miles from the city to the place where the robbers, being so closely pursued were forced to leave their horses and take to the brush, and where they were held by the citizens posse, led by W. E. Skeen, then the editor of the Times, until the Rangers with other citizens arrived and surrounded the thicket, until 3 o'clock in the morning when the robbers called for Capt. McDonald of the Rangers to come into the brush and they would surrender to him.

Capt. McDonald who had gone to a farm house to get a cup of coffee was sent and told of the message of the desperate robbers and without hesitation entered the thicket, exclaiming to the robbers to "throw up your hands, and throw them high."

They were brought back to the city and placed in jail, and a heavy guard placed around the prison, but the people were determined the two men should be hung and could not be persuaded to let the law take its course. The Rangers left in the middle of the afternoon the day after the robbery took place, and that night at about twelve o'clock Foster Crawford and Kid Lewis, the two robbers were taken from the jail and hung from a telephone pole which stood at the corner of the bank they robbed.

A reward of \$2,000 was subscribed by the two banks of the city for the capture of the robbers, the First National then known as the Panhandle National, paying one half of it. The Rangers were given \$800 of the reward and \$1200 was divided up among the citizens who took part in the pursuit, many of them turning their proportion of the reward money over to the widow of the murdered cashier. The officials of the bank had been warned several days in advance that an attempt would be made to rob the bank and the Rangers were sent for. They remained here several days, or until it was thought the contemplated robbery had been given up, and the day of the robbery left the city, going south on the Denver. By the time the train on which the Rangers had left town had reached Bellevue, a message reached them that the robbery had taken place, and that the cashier had been killed. They came back on the first train reaching here about 5 o'clock in the afternoon, or three hours after the robbery had taken place.

The story of how the robbers shot their way through the crowd and made their escape is told in detail in a book which Mr. Sullivan has written and has entered into a contract with a Nashville publishing house to have published.

Van Horn, chairman of the Wichita County Republican committee has issued a call for county delegate convention to be composed of five or more delegates from each voting precinct, to meet in the court house in Wichita Falls at 1:30 p. m. on Saturday, August 1, for the purpose of electing a county chairman, selecting delegates to the various State and district conventions and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the convention. All parties desiring to participate must be qualified electors and must take the pledge to support the National and State tickets.

INDUCED AUNT TO COME TO AMERICA AND KILLED HER.

New York, July 20.—The discovery of the body of Mrs. Ottilie Eberhardt, a well-to-do Viennese widow lead the police to believe that she had been murdered by her nephew who induced her to come to this country and bring her fortune with her. The body was found on the railroad track in a section of Hackensack, N. J. August Eberhardt, the nephew had promised to marry the dead woman's daughter.

RELAY RUNNERS HAVE REACHED ADRIAN, MICHIGAN.

Toledo, Ohio, July 20.—The Y. M. C. A. runners carrying the message from New York to Chicago reached Toledo at 5:22 this morning from Fremont. Not a second was lost here, the local boys starting at once for Adrian, Michigan. A large crowd welcomed the runners and witnessed the start for Toledo.

TAFT ATTENDS COURT HOUSE DEDICATION.

Hot Springs, Va., July 20.—Judge Taft today was at the dedication of the new court house at Germantown, Va., and attended the opening of the session of the court. A large crowd was present.

ELEVEN FREIGHT CARS OFF TRACK

The northbound afternoon passenger trains are several hours late this afternoon. The delay is caused by a freight wreck at mile post 76. At this point a southbound freight left the track from some cause that has not been learned here, and eleven cars are off the rails. None of the cars were overturned and no one was injured.

AMERICAN SPRINTERS AND JUMPERS EXPECTED TO WIN.

London, Eng., July 20.—An almost entirely new set of athletes takes possession of the Stadium for the Olympic games today.

The American jumpers and sprinters who came up from Brighton yesterday are expected to cause the stars and stripes to flutter frequently at the peak of the official flag pole. The final hundred meter swim was won by Charles Daniels of the New York Athletic club, and L. G. Rich of the Brooklyn Swimming club, was fourth. The time was 1:05.35.

The final Archery contest continental style at fifty meters was won by Grizet of France, with two hundred and sixty three points.

RANGERS AT GROESBECK TO PREVENT MOB VIOLENCE.

Groesbeck, July 20.—The State Rangers arrived here today to prevent a mob from seizing Ed Beard, now on trial here charged with the murder of Tilden Goode.

A large crowd packed Judge Cobb's court this morning when the trial was resumed.

All citizens are resenting the appearance of the Rangers, declaring that there was no occasion for their coming.

It is declared that while Beard will not be molested unless the jury acquits him, that a lynching would follow a verdict of acquittal is freely admitted.

DOCTOR SAYS HYDROPHOBIA DID NOT CAUSE DEATH.

Clarence Evans, the six year old son of W. P. Evans, living on Lamar street near the court house, died at about six o'clock Sunday morning after an illness of several weeks.

Several weeks ago the child was bitten on the arm by a bull dog belonging to a neighbor and a severe wound was inflicted. This fact was foundation for the rumor that hydrophobia was the cause of the little boy's death, but Dr. Coons who attended the case says that death was not caused by hydrophobia.

The remains were shipped to East Texas yesterday afternoon for burial.

TWO MURDERERS EXECUTED AT SING SING TODAY.

The crimes for which Rogers paid the death penalty were the killing of Willie and Frederick Olney near Middleton, in 1905 and the killing of Alice Ingerick, the daughter of the housekeeper for Olney whom he assaulted. Laudero killed Michell Ambraro in December 1906.

MEMBER OF CLEVELAND'S CABINET IS STRICKEN.

Madison, Wis., July 20.—Former Senator William Vilas, a member of Cleveland's cabinet suffered a hemorrhage of the brain and his condition is said to be serious.

WACO ELKS PROTEST AGAINST PRIZE AWARDED AT DALLAS.

Waco, July 20.—W. W. Selley this afternoon said that a protest against the decision of Elks' committee in falling to give Waco first prize in the Dallas parade had been filed with the Grand Secretary.

VOTERS KEPT BUSY

HARDLY A WEEK PASSES WITHOUT SOME KIND OF AN ELECTION BEING HELD.

LATEST ON JULY 31ST

Election Will be Held Then to Vote Upon Question of New School District.

Elections appear to be very much in vogue just now, and between the opportunities the citizen has for exercising his suffrage in city, county state and school district and bond elections of various kinds, it is difficult to find a week in which an election of some kind is not held.

The latest election that has been ordered is one to vote on the question of organizing a school corporation to be bounded by the corporate lines of the city of Wichita Falls. This election has been ordered to take place on the 31st day of July. Notice of such elections must be given ten days before they take place and as the petition for the election was filed only today, it was impossible to set the election on July 25th.

This election if the question of incorporation is carried as now seems certain must be followed by two more. One to vote upon the question of a tax levy and the other to elect officers for the new school district.

BRYAN WELCOMES TAFT TO ADVANCED GROUND.

Fairview, Lincoln, Neb., July 19.—The statement of Mr. Taft at Hot Springs, Va., that the Republican National Committee would not accept any contributions from corporations in his campaign was viewed here with more than ordinary interest. Mr. Bryan gave it his special attention: in fact so impressed was he with the announcement that he broke his usual silence and dictated the following statement:

"We welcome him to this advanced ground and bid him to go further and announce that all individual contributions above a reasonable minimum will be made known before the election.

The fact that today was Sunday did not deter a number of persons from going out to Fairview. The stream of visitors began while Mr. Bryan was at church. The most important caller was Mayor Dahlman of Omaha, who was closeted with Mr. Bryan for some time, but neither of them would discuss the subject matter of the conversation. Mayor Dahlman returned to Omaha this afternoon.

Late tonight Frank S. Monett, former Republican Attorney General of Ohio, who conducted the prosecutions in that State against the Standard Oil Company, and later was employed by the Interstate Commerce Commission to gather material upon which to base the Government suits, arrived here and had a lengthy conference with Mr. Bryan. Mr. Monett announced that it is his purpose to actively support Mr. Bryan in Ohio in the campaign, and he will make numerous speeches in behalf of the Democratic ticket.

Mr. Monett said that he was authorized by Mr. Bryan to state that because of the Government's dereliction in prosecuting the alleged wool combine, whose headquarters he claims are in Ohio, Mr. Bryan had announced that if elected to the Presidency he would at once put all the machinery of the Government at work to destroy any combination that may exist.

"It will be his policy," said Mr. Monett, "to destroy the wool monopoly that prevents competition as promptly as the courts, and himself, can do it. The American Woolen company has destroyed, so far as the producer is concerned, the entire benefit supposed to inure from the pay of wool."

BATTLESHIPS MAINE AND ALABAMA REACH MANILLA.

Manila, July 20.—The battleships, Maine and Alabama, in advance of the fleet arrived here today. The battleships will coal and start for Singapore, on the 27th.

Marshal Gwinn this morning was called upon to shoot a dog said to be mad. Mr. Gwinn found the dog on Lamar street with several men with shot guns in pursuit and put it out of misery. The owner of the canine is not known.

MICE AND MATCHES CAUSE A BLAZE

At about eleven o'clock Saturday night the fire department was called out by a large blaze at the home of William Jochrendt on Lamar avenue.

The blaze which started in the kitchen had gained good headway when discovered by the neighbors, but was extinguished before much damage had been done to the building. Mr. Jochrendt's loss will be about \$250 most of which results from smoke and water. His loss is fully insured. The house was owned by his father, whose loss is also insured.

The fire started back of the kitchen stove. Mr. Jochrendt was away from home at the time and there had not been a fire in the stove for over two weeks. It is believed that some matches which might have fallen into a wood box behind the stove were ignited by mice, starting the blaze.

FOOT CAUGHT UNDER TIE MAN STRUCK BY ENGINE.

Fort Worth, July 20.—The man killed in North Fort Worth last night by a Rock Island train was today identified as Chas. Thompson of Weatherford. He leaves a wife and child, and was 28 years of age. His foot caught under a tie and the engine rushed down upon him crushing him to death and hurling his body twenty feet.

Trial Set for July 30th.

The special venire summoned for the trial of John Patterson charged with the killing of the negro Gus McElroy at the Mansion hotel several months ago was dismissed this morning upon a motion of the defendants attorney to quash the venire. Patterson's case has been set for trial on July 30th.

Hudson Budd of Chatham, N. J., says a year ago he laid a concrete floor in his henery and that one of his best hens stepped into the concrete before it was set and was held fast. The hen, he declares, continued to lay eggs anchored in the spot, and did not die until the other day.

A pretty ten pound baby girl arrived at the home of Mr. and Mrs. V. S. Frazier on Tenth street at eight o'clock Sunday afternoon. All the folks are doing well.

TWO VALUABLE PACKAGES STOLEN

Chicago, July 20.—A suit case containing stocks, bonds and other securities valued at \$10,000 belonging to John Burford of Chattanooga, Tenn., as stolen by a thirteen-year-old boy. The theft occurred in the Federal court building while Burford was listening to the trial in the United States court.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE

FREDERICK JUDGE WILL GIVE DECISION THIS EVENING.

CRIMINAL NEGLIGENCE

Is Charged Against Woman for Allowing Grandson to Die from Snake Bite Without Medical Attendance.

County Judge Griffin at Frederick, Okla., tonight will announce his decision in regard to the case of the State of Oklahoma against Margaret Stephens, charged with criminal negligence in allowing her grandson, Leland Stephens Dobson to die without medical aid or attendance.

The case was called for a preliminary hearing on Thursday and after hearing the evidence Judge Griffin took the matter under advisement until this evening, when he will announce whether the woman will be bound over or not under the charge preferred.

The Frederick Enterprise gives the following account of the trial.

The State was represented by County Attorney Johnson and Hon. W. H. Dial, of Frederick, and the defendant by the Hon. B. M. Parmenter, Stephens and Meyers of Lawton.

The State called its first witness Dr. James Osborne, Jr. who testified as to the snake bite which killed the boy and gave expert testimony showing that death was the result of the bite. Dr. H. L. Roberts and Dr. F. C. Prestly testified along similar lines. E. F. Zumwalt testified as to having embalmed the body.

County Attorney Johnson then tried the deposition of Mrs. Vada Nelms and the defense made admission in open court that death was the result of the poison with which the boy's body became infected because of the bite. The State then rested. The defense opened by calling O. P. Woodman, President of the Oklahoma City Real Estate Exchange, Councilman, and a man influential in the business offices of the metropolis. He, with Mrs. Mary A. Young, a milliner of Lawton, W. E. Haden of Hobart, and Mrs. R. L. Jones gave evidence as to their faith in Christian Science and the marvelous cures it had brought to them and others.

At the evening session the defendant Mrs. Margaret Stephens was called. She denied to some extent the testimony of Mr. Nelms and asserted that after 13 years of trial, yet she still had and absolute faith in the efficacy of Christian Science.

Statistics show that Independence Day is more generally observed in Northern and Eastern States than in the South. They also show that more people are killed and maimed by the explosion of fireworks on Christmas occasions in the Northern and Eastern States than in Southern States. So, judging by this, the people of the North and East, while they may celebrate with more enthusiasm the Fourth of July than the people of the South, they also burn up more money in the purchase of fireworks on Christmas occasions. The only way this paper can account for the lack of enthusiasm displayed in the South on Fourth of July occasions is that the North and East seem to regard this section of the country as a part of the Union for tax-paying purposes only. Every since the war the government at Washington, with the exception of the two administrations of Grover Cleveland, has humiliated the people of the South in every way possible. This bitter feeling on the part of the North and the East towards the people of the South is gradually dying out, as is evidenced by the appointment of a Southern or "rebel," if you please, to a cabinet position. A few more appointments like that would have the effect of bringing about a more congenial feeling between the North and South, and would tend to make the people of the South feel that Independence Day meant something more to them than it does at present, and instead of saving up a greater portion of their spare change to buy fireworks on Christmas occasions, would spend a good part of it in the purchase of fireworks on Fourth of July occasions.

SPONGE DIVERS.

Hardly a Single Capbender of Tripoli Escapes Paralysis.

There are a great many varieties of sponges, most of which are found in the warmer parts of the ocean. The bath sponges are chiefly obtained from the eastern half of the Mediterranean, where they occur at all depths down to 200 fathoms and are obtained by diving, dredging or harpooning.

Writing in Harper's Magazine, C. W. Furlong gives an account of the work of the Greek sponge divers off the coast of Tripoli, in north Africa. Attacks by sharks and dogfish have gradually frightened away the common divers, who dive naked with a piece of flat marble for a line, and the field is left clear for the "capbenders," as the men are called who use air, pump, suit and helmet.

The greatest enemy of the capbender is paralysis, hardly a single diver escaping from it in some form or other. The great cause of this disease is the sudden relief of pressure due to the rapid ascent, the dangerous symptoms appearing when the diver emerges into the fresh air.

Strange as it may seem, a partially paralyzed diver on descending into the waters recovers the use of his limbs again, and his circulation becomes normal. To battle with this scourge the Greek government has issued regulations as to the depths to which a diver shall go and has also provided a hospital ship and a sponge divers' hospital on shore.

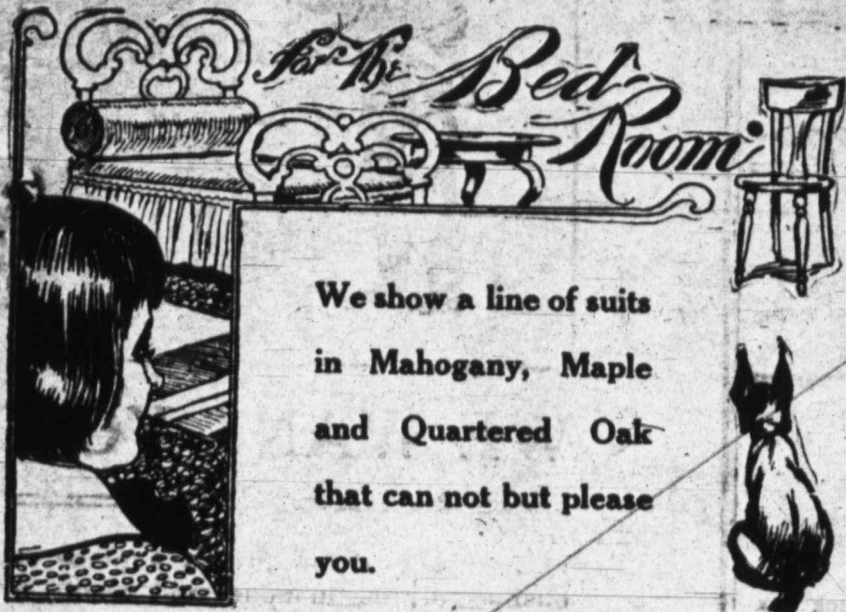

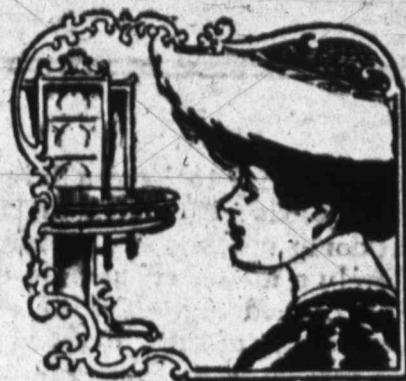

A Billion Dollars in Gold.

When the average man reads that congress at its recent session spent more than a billion dollars, he gets a vague impression that this is a lot of money, but he does not appreciate what an enormous sum it really is. It helps some to realize that the actual expenditure was eight millions more than a billion, and that these millions, regardless of the fact that a million is a lot of money, are thrown off to make a round number, as a grocer might throw off a few cents to please a good customer.

Congressman Hamline of Missouri has been doing a little figuring to bring the immensity of this expenditure within realization. He learns that it would take 13 \$20 gold pieces to make a pound, and 27,000 such pieces to weigh a ton. On this basis he shows that the expenditures of the late congress would weigh 1,851 tons.

Allowing a ton to the wagon, it would require 1,851 wagons to haul it. Allowing seven yards to the wagon and team, the procession of gold laden wagons would stretch out over seven and a half miles. It would take 82½ freight cars to haul this money, or about five ordinary freight trains. If each man could handle 150 pounds, it would take 21,063 men to carry all this gold.—Duluth Herald.
