# SHOOTS SNAKE FROM COMPANION'S ARM

Joplin, Mo., Aug. 7 .- Herbert Davis, aged 14, threatened with a death-dealing stroke by a big ratlesnake, was saved by the quick action of Francis Evans, aged 15, who sent a bullet through the head of the reptile just in time to prevent it burying its fangs in the flesh of his chum. The snake was wrapped around the arm of the Davis boy, who grasped it under the impression that it was a fish.

Francis Evans is the son of Or. M. H. Evans. Herbert Davis is the son of the owner of the swimming resort on North Main street. The boys are great chums and spend much time fishing and hunting about the ponds of the

Thinks Snake a Fish.

The swimming lake had overflown and the water filled a basin formed by mining operations half a mile away. The overflow had allowed many fish to escape from the lake and many of them had been imprisoned in the basin. The boys were draining the basin and taking the fish back to the lake. The work of removing the fish had nearly been completed, when the Davis lad saw something move under a large rock. He promptly grabbed at it, thinking it a fish, shouting as he did so, "I'll bet this is a big one."

He jerked it up and to his sorrow beheld a big rattlesnake squ)rming in his grasp. He attempted to release it, but the snake was too quick, coiling about his arm and raising its head to
