

#### MISSOURI FOR BRYAN DECLARES CHAMP CLARK

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 18 .- Announc ing that Missourl would give William Jennings Bryan a plurality of from 40,000, to 50,000, Champ Clark reached Chicago today to confer with the Democratic chiefs at the Auditorium Annex.

"Missouri will elect fifteen out o sixteen Congressmen and will elect a Democratic Senator to Washington." said Mr. Clark.

"It is Bryan everywhere that I have been and that means about eight States," said Mr. Clark, "and these include Ohio and Illinois.'

"Just after the Democratic convention at Denver I took up the chautaugua addresses and since that time I have lecttured in Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, Missouri, Kentucky, Ohio, and Illinois."

"It seems to me that Bryan is strong in all those States, and, as far as my own State is concerned. I feel positive "The States adjoining Missouri are also tending toward Democracy."

Words of high praise are being spoken of the presence of mind and courage displayed by Prof. Fairchild this morning in catching Mr. Hill, the victim of the gasoline explosion and throwing him down and stripping the burning garments from his body.

Prof. Fairchild happened to be passing along the street at the moment Hill dashed from his shop, a burning torch, and ran terror stricken across the street toward the drug store. The professor' reached the entrance of the store at about the same instant Hill did and made an unsuccessful attempt to throw him down. Falling in this, he seized the flaming man inside of the store and threw him down and tore off his clothing.


These acts called forth not only presence of mind and promptness, but also courage and strength, for in his pain and terror crazed state Hill, ordinarily a strong man, was doubly, powerful.

Prof. Fairchild's act not only saved Hill from fatal burns, but also probably averted what might have been another serious explosion and fire, for when thrown down Hill was making directly for the rear of the store, where the carbons and other explosives and combustible materials were stored, Had the flaming man reached this part of the store, an explosion would most certainly have resulted.

By good fortune, Mr. Fairchild did not suffer any burns in his contact with Hill.

Commercial Secretaries Demonstrate Need of Manufacturers.

Fort Worth, Tex., Aug. 19 .-- The following is a list of the principal manufacturing industries in Texas, together with an estimate of their annual productions:

Flour' and grist mill products .....\$ 30,000,000 Oil (cotton seed and cake) 4,000,000 Lumber and timber..... 22,000,000 Slaughtering and meat packing ..... 21,000,000

Railroad shops ..... 10,000,000 Printing and publishing... 9,000,000 Factory and machine shop products ..... 25,600,000

Other factory products ... 29,000,000

Total .....\$161,000,000 The manufacturer does not produce; he adds value and mutliplies the use fulness of the article. The manufacturer trebles the value of the raw material.

If we manufactured all we now produce, our annual factory output would reach \$1,500,000,000, and the possibilities of our mineral and agricultural development cannot be inteligently expressed in figures. We ship our raw material to Northern and Eastern markets to be manufactured into wagons, plows, clothing, food products, etc., and send with it cereals, fruits, vegetables, cotton and wool to feed and clothe the laborers employed in the work and buy back the finished product with labor, tax and all othe rexpenses included, as well as transportation both ways. We have only 3 per cent of our wealth engaged in manufacturing.

The manufacturer must with reasonable certainty be able to figure on cost prices of raw material, labor, tax and other expenses, as well as the selling price of the goods. With either of these conditions artificially disturbed, his business is jeopardized. Capital in making investments seeks first of all. safety. Why is it we are not manufacturing our raw material in Texas? This subject will be fully discussed at the convention of Commercial Secretaries. September 9, 10 and 11.




