# DEMOCRATS ARE JOYFUL REPUBLICANS ARE NERVOUS

Special to the Times.  
New York, Sept. 21.—The Herald has this from Chicago:  
Coming to Chicago from the East, where the paramount issue for weeks has been whether Governor Hughes would be renominated, one is struck with the changed conditions in this Western territory that has come about in a month. There are several things that stand out conspicuously. One is the republican chill. Another is the republican nervousness, another is the republican inactivity. Another is the republican incapacity to get together. And another is that it is still the republican plan of campaign, as it was in August, to rest on the coasts and assume that the Roosevelt pluralities were so large four years ago that no matter what strength Mr. Bryan may show he cannot top the crest of that wave in getting democrats back into his party.

**Democrats are Jubilant.**  
Looking over the democratic side of the fence, one is impressed with the jubilant air of campaign managers at the Western headquarters. Whether they are "together" or not, the democrats are giving the impression that they are fighting shoulder to shoulder. They seize on everything and magnify it. They are glorying in the fact that each week brings a new State that the republicans admit has suddenly become clouded with doubt, first, as to how the State ticket will fare, and second, as to how the electoral ticket will run.

They are laughing at the lead Mr. Bryan has over Mr. Taft as a campaigner. They are hoping that the republican candidate will meet Mr. Bryan in joint debate. They profess to have nothing but good news to offset the bad news which is concealed by their more frank and candid brethren in the republican headquarters, and they are generally creating the impression that Mr. Bryan has much more than a fighting chance. Some of them are electing Bryan on the face of the outlook on this, the 20th day of September, 1908.

Admittedly, the presidential battle line is flung much further afield today than it was several weeks ago, when the other campaign map issued

by the Herald last Sunday was sent to press.

**New Doubtful States.**  
New States have come into the doubtful column, and new States are being added to the list of surprise States, and it became necessary to revise the table of States that Bryan and Taft are reasonably sure to get, and to make a new classification of the number of votes each will have to gain from the doubtful States in order to get the necessary 242 votes in the electoral college.

It should be said, before making this classification, that the data on which it is based come from both republican and democratic sources. That is to say, there is no question in the minds of either democrats or republicans that the classification based on conditions today is correct.

The Herald last Sunday presented the situation as it appeared to unbiased observers at a given time about three weeks before as follows:

Total vote in electoral college, 483.  
Necessary to elect a president, 242.  
Republican reasonably sure, 206.  
Democratic reasonably sure, 161.  
Doubtful, 116.  
Taft to win must get (doubtful votes) 36.  
Bryan to win must get (doubtful votes) 81.

The situation today appears to be as follows:

Total vote in electoral college, 483.  
Necessary to elect a president, 242.  
Republican reasonably sure, 165.  
Democratic reasonably sure, 161.  
Doubtful, 157.  
Republicans to win must get (doubtful votes) 77.  
Democrats to win must get (doubtful votes) 81.

The States which have slipped into the doubtful column since the notification of Mr. Taft and Mr. Bryan, while Mr. Bryan has been at concert pitch in the Middle West and has invaded the East, and while Mr. Taft has been playing golf at Hot Springs and fishing at Middle Bass Island and making up his mind what to do are given as follows, with the number of votes each has in the electoral college:

Kansas 10, North Dakota 4, Ohio 23, Oregon 4. Total 41.

## A TRIP TO NEWCASTLE.

A representative of the Times was one among about one hundred citizens of this city who took the trip over the Wichita Falls and Southern yesterday to Newcastle for the purpose of witnessing the birth of the new mining town in Young county and to attend the sale of town lots.

The day was an ideal one for town booming and there were more than one thousand people in attendance.

The train from this city was composed of four or five coaches and before it reached Newcastle every coach was filled to its capacity and more. Several hundred came in wagons and buggies from across the country.

On reaching Newcastle the train from this city was first stopped at the coal mine (Shaft No. 2), which is located on a spur of the road a short distance north of the new town and here the prospectors and future citizens of the new town were given an opportunity to inspect the coal which was being taken from the shaft 110

feet deep, and a few ventured to go down to the bottom of the shaft and make an inspection of the mine. The coal vein in this mine is 53 inches thick and the quality compares favorably with any coal that is shipped to Texas. An analysis of the coal taken from this mine shows that 94 per cent of it is coal, leaving only 6 per cent waste matter. It is believed that this vein of coal underlies all that section of country and that being the case the supply is almost inexhaustible.

Shaft No. 1 is located on the south of the town and is only about 40 feet deep. The vein of coal struck in this shaft is not as thick as the one in Shaft No. 2, although it is claimed it is the same vein, and if so, this proves that the further north it runs, the thicker the vein is, and the further down in the earth.

Newcastle is located about 55 miles south of Wichita Falls in Young county, on rather an elevated prairie, which drains well on three sides. That it is going to become a town of more than passing importance is evidenced by the fact that more than \$25,000 worth of town lots were disposed of between the hours of 11:30 a. m. to 12 m. and from 2 to 5 p. m., and the people, apparently, were as eager to bid on the last lot auctioned off as they were to bid on the first.

Already there are four lumber yards on the ground, and a fifth has bought lots upon which to locate. Several frame structures have already gone up, and before another six months passes Newcastle promises to be a thriving little town, second to none in Young county.

The Times naturally feels an interest in Newcastle, because it is through the efforts put forth by Wichita Falls business men and promoters that the development of this splendid coal field was made possible, and therefore the building of a thriving town in the center of it, and for the same reason it trusts that all that the most optimistic have predicted for Newcastle may soon be realized.

In mixing with the crowd the Times man observed that there were some who came from nearby and older towns in the same county and it was difficult for them to conceal their jealousy, but the wiser ones did not let this interfere with their good judgment, from the fact that they got in on the ground floor by purchasing some of the choice business lots with a view of making a change in location if it became necessary.

## FROM ANOTHER POINT OF VIEW.

It is less than six weeks until the season for killing birds will be open in Texas and sportsmen are looking forward to the first of November eagerly. It has been a good year for feathered game, and the supply is plentiful.

One who has never experienced the joy of a day in the open fields, following a well trained dog, who has never known the pulse-bounding thrill that comes when the first covey is flushed, whose nostrils have never sniffed the sweet, sharp incense of burnt powder, who has never felt the hunter's pride when the dog came carrying back the little bunch of ruffled feathers, and the lifeless bird that proclaimed a well-aimed shot sent true cannot fully appreciate what the opening of the game season in Texas means.

But on the other hand it is possible the sportsman cannot fully appreciate the point of view which moved a neighborhood of Chicago children recently to hold a bird's funeral. There had been a terrific hail storm, and fully 2,000 birds were killed in one of the parks. The park workmen gathered up the little victims carefully, dug a wide grave for them, and then all the children of the vicinity held a funeral service.

Above the wide graves the children stood with bowed heads, sobbing as they strewed simple flowers. The funeral of the birds was indeed a serious affair to these boys and girls, who offered this prayer:

"We are very sorry, O God, that all the poor birds had to die, for we would like to have them stay around in the trees, but we need rain and we guess You know what is best and we hope that You will take them all to Heaven."

Whether the death of the sparrow that falls to the ground is a small affair or a great one would depend, it would seem, largely upon the point of view.

The government is bringing a strong argument to bear in the matter of good roads when it threatens to abolish established rural routes unless the roads are put in shape so that the carriers can get over them in bad weather as well as in fine. This is bringing the proposition right home to the people of the community through which the roads run. The Herald doubts if the people living along any of these routes would want to see their daily mail privileges taken away and the action of the department certainly ought to bring immediate results.—Denison Herald.
