> Simple Rules for Ginger Bread. A delicious ginger bread which is most appetizing for a picnic may be made on the morning of the day it is

needed by this simple rule: A cup of molasses, a tablespoonful of butter, a tablespoonsful of boiling water, two and a half cups of flour, a teaspoonful each of ginger, cloves, cinnamon and soda, and a half a saltspoonful of salt. Put the melted butter into a bowl and add molasses and spices; dissolve the soda in a little boiling water, and put it in next and then beat in the flour. Bake in a shallow tin lined with buttered paper for half an hour, or, if the oven is not very bot, a little longer.

#### Delicious Grape Jam.

For this use the smaller Concord grapes or the late Isabellas. Stem, weigh and wash. Measure out a pound of sugar for each pound of uncooked grapes. Put the grapes in a large preserving kettle with just enough water to keep them from sticking to the bot tom. Cook gently for half or three quarters of an hour, then press through a colander fine enough to keep the seeds from coming through.
