HEAVY RAINS CAUSE FLOODS IN NORTHWEST TEXAS AND CENTRAL OKLAHOMA.

#### TRAINS ALL HELD HERE

Wichita Falls was the center of an unusually heavy rain, wind and hail storm last night, which flooded the streets and caused washouts on all railroads entering the city, seriously delaying traffic.

The rains, which started shortly afer nightfall, continued to pour downin torrents throughout the night and up to noon today bad scarcely abated. Last night several vehicles were stalled and wrecked in the streets, where the dirt had settled in the sewer

Paper From Corn Stalks.

Millions of dollars annually will be added to the income of farmers of the corn belt if the government chemists are correct in their belief that they have solved the problem of making print paper from corn stalks.

The cost of wood pulp from which the newspapers of America are supplied with paper and the possibility of exhausting the supply have long been incentives to experimenting with other materials. The necessity of finding some substitute is evident when it is recalled that for The Star alone more than an acre of timber must be cleared every day in the year.

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


