Birmingham, Ala., Nov. 17.-Fifty State convicts employed in the mines at Pratt City formed a conspiracy last night to set No. 3 mine aftre and escape during the confusion, and as a result eight of them were burned to death, one is missing and the oth r forty-one are safely locked in the stockades. The last body was taken out this afternoon at 4 o'clock. The coup was cunningly planned and daringly executed. A lot of timber lying it the manway was ignited and the convicts hoped when attention had been attracted to the flames they could make their way through the mine and scape by the main entry, which could be reached after a journey of about a quarter of a mile underground. They had hoped to be able to make their way along the mine ahead of the smoke and fumes from the fire. In this they miscalculated, for eight or nine appear have been suffocated. The others appeared to be meeting with success until the mine officials suspected something.

BATHING AT DIEPPE.

When the Comtains de Beigne Tried It

The Comtesse de Boigne in her mem oirs gives an account of a visit she paid in 1806, which is interesting in view of the position Dieppe now holds among French watering places.

"The poverty of the inhabitants." she says; "was frightful. The Englishman, as they called him (and for them he was worse than the devil). was cruising incessantly before their empty harbor. With much difficulty a boat was able to escape from time to time and go fishing, always at the risk of being captured by the foreigner or confiscated upon the return journey if the telescopes of the watchers had seen it approach a vessel.



TRUMBULL ON TEXAS.

Thinks There is a Disposition to Be Fairer Toward All Corporations. Railway World.

Frank Trumbull, president of the Colorado and Southern lines, the interests of whose roads in Texas is extensive, and who has worked energetically in shaping public opinion in the Southwest in favor of fair treatment of corporations, including the railroads, said recently upon his return from a five weeks trip through the Southwestern States that the attitude of Texas toward the railroads is very friendly, and that he has entire confidence in the prediction that the railroads of that State can count upon fair treatment from the people.

That Texas is greatly in need of pursuing such an attitude toward railread corporations as will encourage railroad building in the State was clearly brought out by Mr. Trumbull in an address recently delivered by him before the board of trade of Fort Worth. Dealing with some phases of the railroad problem, of the relation between the raffroads and the State and Federal governments, and Texas' need in respect to new rallroads, Mr. frumbull said:

"The right of the government to regulate corporations engaged in public service has been too long upheld and admitted, to now be turned over. But the question, 'How far should the regulation go?' and 'What is a reasonable cturn upon your capital if invested in railroads?' must be answered by investors as well as by law-makers, for It takes two to make a bargain.

"But it is said the railroads are overcapitalized and the people are taxed to pay dividends on watered stock. This is a feature of trapsportation which seems to have about the same fascination for many minds that a galvanic battery has for children, and when they tackle the subject and try to formulate a precise remedy that will retain the energy of private capital, they go through about the same amount of wriggling that the children do in trying to, let go of the battery. The same with the question of physical valuation of railroads; it is one of those theories which please the imagination, but no one can say what the government could do with it after it had it, any more than what the government could do with a physical valuation of farms and farm improvements."
