Area customers of telephone accustomed to the procedure. service providers such as West Texas Rural Telephone, GTE and Southwestern Bell are reminded that effective July 3, it will be permitted to include the 806 area code when making a long distance call within the 806 area code.

Effective January 3, 1995, including the area code on all long distance telephone calls will no longer be optional. Customers will have to dial 1-806 and the number for all long distance calls within the 806 area code, according to Keith Hacker, central office foreman for

Hacker says that even calls placed from one local exchange to another, such as the Frio exchange to the Oklahoma Lane exchange, or local long distance calls, such as Hereford to Canyon, or Friona to Hereford, will require eleven-digit dialing. Seven-digit local calls such as from Hereford to local exchanges of West Texas Rural Telephone will remain unaffected.

Customers will continue to dial 11 digits for long-distance calls into other area codes, just as is done at

Prompted by the addition of new area codes, the changeover to eleven digit dialing will affect individual and business telecommunications. Presently, all area codes in North America have been assigned.

Growing use of cellular telephones, FAX machines, pagers and additional lines, all of which require more phone numbers, have accounted for using up the area code numbers. Bellcore, administrator of the North American Numbering Plan that determines how area codes and telephone numbers are assigned to businesses and individuals, has created new area codes to address the

New codes will be phased in beginning in January of 1995, and will have a middle digit of 2 through 9, where previously, all area codes had a 0 or 1 as the middle

Southwestern Bell reports that when the new area code plan is introduced, many office phone systems, including PBX's and Key Systems, will be unable to process some types of calls unless appropriate changes are made. Any necessary changes to PBX or Key System equipment to accommodate the new 11-digit dialing pattern and new area codes must be complete by January 3, 1995. Failure to make these necessary changes could cause businesses to be unable to make and receive certain longdistance calls. Administrators of

The 1974 class reunion was held at the home of Pam Wilson Bell with 27 members present.



Court Rules In Favor Of **Private Property Rights** 

the Oregon case called Dolan versus Tigard is being celebrated as a victory by landowners in rural Texas, according to the president of the state's largest farm organization.

"This case shows there really is a fifth amendment and it is not some kind of constitutional quirk to be ignored while private property rights are trampled," said Bob Stallman, president of the Texas Farm Bureau.

The takings clause of the fifth amendment states that government may not take private property for public use without compensation. In this and other recent decisions, the court seems to have expanded the definition of "taking" to include the diminished value of property due to government mandates and regulations.

In the case, Florence and John Dolan, a mother and son with a plumbing supply store in Tigard, Oregon, decided to expand their

The Supreme Court decision in store. The necessary building permits were conditional, requiring the Dolans to give up a strip of their land as a "greenway" and bicycle path. The strip in question amounted to ten per cent of the Dolan's property.

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The court ruled that such action constituted a "taking" under the fifth amendment, and that the Dolans were entitled to compensation.

Stallman, a rice farmer from Columbus, said it will now be more difficult for governments to impose regulations that lower the value of property, or to demand that private property be dedicated to public use without compensation.

"This is an important decision for farmers, ranchers and landowners across the nation," Stallman said. "It will force governments at all levels to look more closely before taking a person's property without compensation."

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boisterous thunderstorm moved across the area, following a day of much cooler temperatures, on the heels of a light "norther." The high temperature registered at Friona's National Weather Service recording station was 81 degrees, which felt considerably better than the 100+ that we had endured earlier this month and in late June.

Friona's official guage caught 1.26 inches of rain that night, while Bovina got .57 inches. On Saturday night, Bovina added another .06 inches. The rainfall was somewhat heavier to the north of Bovina in the Rhea community.

Then on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings of this week, a couple of wicked-looking clouds traversed the area, leaving not too much moisture, but threatening with lightening, along with high winds.

Both evenings, tremendous down-draft winds kicked up dust at the perimeter of the clouds, giving a tornado-look. The clouds produced very little beneficial moisture, with Bovina measuring .11 inch and Friona .31 inch on Wednesday, and none from Tuesday's "blow."

It was reported, however, that the Lazbuddie area received better luck from the Tuesday cloud, with one farmer reporting .7 inch that

High temperatures during the week ranged from the 81 of last Friday to 94 on Monday and Tuesday. Thursday morning's low was 57 degrees--the first time for a reading in the 50s since early in

Jim Jordan of Amarillo has resident of the region as well as to documenting the communities which lie along the Panhandle's major highways. The exhibit consists of 50 pairs of black and white photographs, each pair depicting the skyline and an intown view of a city or town.

> The 100 pictures are organized by the highway that passes through the community, resulting in four groups of pictures: I-40, U.S. 287, I-27 and U.S. 60.

These are the routes that cross the region from corner to corner or border to border, each one passing through and intersecting the others in Amarillo. Each group of photographs includes a large map for orientation, and the exhibit as a whole is introduced by Mike Harter, Amarillo teacher and regional geographer.
"The Panhandle, being

majestically open and flat, is a place where you can count the trees twenty miles away and see from town to town thanks to the grain elevators," says Jordan. "Many of these stately structures were appropriately spaced by the railroad companies at the turn of the century as collection points for their freight

There are a lot of elevators in this exhibit, of course, but not everywhere. Only in an exhibit of this scope can the viewer see and appreciate the differences as well as the similarities across the 26,000 square miles of the Texas Panhandle.

Jordan was born in Plainview and "missed being a native son of the Panhandle by about nine miles." He is a retired City of Amarillo wastewater treatment supervisor and considers himself an avocational photographer specializing in Texas Panhandle rural photography and landscapes.

A graduate of Amarillo studied photography at Amarillo

"Xing the Panhandle" will be on exhbiit in the Hazlewood Building through August 28. The Square House Museum opens to the public at 8:30 a.m., Monday-Friday, 9 a.m. on Saturday and 1 p.m. on Sunday, and closes at 5:30 p.m. every day. As a general rule, grapes produce bountifully each year and grape jelly is a favorite of many Panhandle residents. I've canned an immeasurable amount of grape juice, but had never known it could be canned as recommended by Donna Miller Mears in the Miller-Roysden Cookbook and Genealogy. Could anything be simpler?

GRAPE JUICE In half gallon jars, put 4 cups grapes and 3 cups sugar. Pour boiling water until it runs over the top. Seal immediately. Let cool, then invert. (If you prefer to use a syrup pack, use 2 cups sugar to 1 cup water.) Store in cool place.

For quart jars, use 2 cups grapes and 1-1/2 cups sugar.

Most of the ingredients in the following recipes grow in the garden of Roy and Eva Miller, as well in gardens all over the country CHA-CHA or CHOW-CHOW 2 gallons large green tomatoes

1/2 head green cabbage 5 large or 8 small white onions 10 bell peppers

1 quart white vinegar 3 cups sugar 2 tablespoons salt

2 tablespoons ground mustard tablespoons celery seeds 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon allspice

1/2 teaspoon cloves Run tomatoes through collander. Let drain. Grind cabbage and onions and mix together with all other ingredients. Cook until mixture changes color--about 30 minutes. Fill sterilized jars to 1/4 inch from rim and seal immediately.

#### TIPS FOR MOMS

## When--And How--To Call The Pediatrician

Participants of the Child Health Care Seminar held June 29 at Friona State Bank discussed symptoms that necessitate a call to your doctor or pediatrician. This seminar was sponsored by the Parmer County Extension Home **Economics Committee.** 

Parenting styles vary. Pediatricians say that some parents call them practically every day, over the smallest concern. Other parents bend over backward to avoid disturbing the doctor, sometimes waiting almost too long to get advice. Fortunately, many parents do learn which problems can be taken care of safely at home, and which problems spell real trouble, and then get in touch with the doctor promptly. How can you tell the difference, and make the most of your calls to the doctor?

First, ask your pediatrician to state his or her preferences regarding telephone calls. Some schedule specific calling hours for routine matters or questions, and wish you to call at other times only for serious problems or emergencies. In addition, ask your doctor to review with you the types of symptoms or situations he or she would like to be alerted to.

Most pediatricians, for example, expect to be called (1) if a child has a fever of 101 degrees F or higher that persists for more than twenty-four hours; (2) if any fever

persists longer than three days; (3) if there is significant abdominal pain; (4) if a child has a severe headache; (5) if a child is not eating or drinking normally; (6) if persistent vomiting or diarrhea occurs, especially in an infant; (7) if the child looks very ill or displays any abnormal behavior, or if for some other reason you feel especially uneasy about your child's condition. After all, you know your child better than enyone else and you know when something is not right.

Age can also be an important factor. The younger the child, the more often your pediatrician will expect you to call, especially if the baby is under three months of age. Problems like diarrhea or fever, which might be considered minor in an older child, can be extremely serious in an infant.

As the child grows older and can communicate more, and as you become more experienced, you'll probably find that you can handle certain minor discomforts safely on your own and will call your pediatrician when you know you're beyond your depth. You'll learn to recognize the stomachache that means "I don't want to go to school" and the one that means your child is suffering from a gastrointestinal upset.

You may feel uncomfortable about calling your pediatrician in the middle of the night, but remember, a physician would rather treat a serious problem immediately--regardless of the time--than have to deal with a worsened situation in the morning.

Before calling the doctor, think through what you are going to say. He or she will want an accurate report of the patient's condition, including age and weight. Be prepared to answer such questions

\*Temperature--Exactly what is the reading? Does it respond to medication? How long has it gone

\*Vomiting or Diarrhea--How often? When does it occur? What does the stool or vomitus look

\*Coughing--Is the cough loose, barky, frequent? Does it cause the child to lose his or her breath? Prevent sleep?

\*Rash--Color? Appearance? Location? When did it start? Does it itch?

\*Behavior--How is the child acting? How is the behavior different from usual?

Have paper and pencil at hand to jot down any instructions you are given; also have the telephone number of your pharmacy handy in case the pediatrician wants to call in a prescription.

What if your child becomes ill while at a sitter's or a child care center? If you can, make the call from that location. When the doctor asks questions, you'll be able to get answers from the person who has been with your child all day.

Remember: You and the child's health will depend on your teamwork and communication. By combining the doctor's medical training and experience with your special knowledge of your own child and your keen observation of any changes or discomforts he or she experiences, you and the pediatrician can work together to keep your child healthy and feeling good.
