





Spurious Masonry.

In February I was advised by the secretary of Corpus Christi Lodge No. 189 that a Lodge was organized at that place claiming to have a warrant from the Grand Lodge Vale de Mexico. It is called Melchor Ocampo Lodge, No. 4, and claims to have been organized by the Mexican Texan Grand Lodge of San Antonio. I understand the rights are in the Spanish language and for that not very full.

In June some sort of a spurious called "Respectable Logia Estrella del Norte," The parties connected with this so-called Lodge claim to be working the Scottish Rite under warrant manating from Covington, Kentucky. ADDRESS BY HARRIMAN.

Declares Roosevelt Will Recommend Changes of Anti-Trust Law.


New York, Dec. 1.-E. H. Harriman, though not on the list of speakers for the first dinner of the Economic Club of New York, in the Hotel Astor last night, became the most interesting of the eminent persons who figured there as orators when he defined the conduct of American transportation financiers. declared they sought wealth only as a subordinate end and they had a whole souled, high purpose in their efforts to see great work well done.

He said he had urged upon President Roosevelt an amendment to the Sher man anti-trust law which would operate in conjunction with the Hepburn act and the amendment to the interstate commerce act, but this amendment was denied the Administration's sanction.

"Mark my word, gentlemen," Mr. Harriman said, "when I prophesy that he will come out and himself advocate that amendment to the Sherman act and relieve the situation so that selfrespecting and honest men can meet and discuss what shall be done in this situation.

"Idle money is just as mischievous as idle labor. I believe we should all struggle to bring about a situation where both can be used properly and fairly.

"We want the right for the strong companies to help the weak," Mr. Harriman said. "We want the right to help them to use money and labor for the improvement of the weak companies and for the betterment of the transportation interests of the country."







It has been found that the victims of the Atlanta mob of two years ago, were innocent, and the bodies of innocent victims have marked the course of other mobs in Georgia, Mississippi, Tennessee, Illinois and other States. The guilty brute whom the mob lynches is the very sort of criminal the courts of the country are quite sure to convict and hang. After referring to the Reelfoot Lake lynching, the Commercial Appeal adds:

Yesterday three negroes were taken away from officers of the law by a mob and they were hanged. The crime of this mob is not solely against the three negroes; it is against the State. When they murdered these negroes they lynched the law in Lake County, Gov. Patterson made a supreme effort to save the State from this additional exhibition of lawlessness, but he failed. A Judge and an Attorney General started over from Union City to Tipton die. Soldiers were hurried over from Union City toward Tiptonville. An imprompta ession of court was hled; the negroes were tried before a Magistrate, and he, in order to preserve the form of the law in so far as possible, estimated them to be hanged. Even this did not suit the mob. The carrying out of the Magistrate's order would have saved justice from one humiliating insult, but when the sentence of tag-Magistrate had barely passed the mob began These negroes were had its work. men. They made a disturban to at a religious meeting held by their own peoale. Officers were sent to arrest them, and one of them killed an officer. Just as sure as the sun rises and sets, a trial would have resulted in a death penalty for these men, but the mob would not wait. You can excuse it by saying the men hanged were negroes and should have been hanged. It will not answer to the law to say the black murderers got their deserts. The negrees could have been-killed, and the law could have done it. The result is that the negroes are dead and the law itself has been lynched. As the fresh red pages of Tennessee history show, the lynchers do not stop with negro criminals. They murder innocent negroes, and they murder white men and women who are not even accused of crime. The man who

alty for crime-shooting and killing. whether it be essassination or mutual combat--whichever you please to call it-in the streets of Nashville, nightriding, murder in Obion, negro-lynching ia Lake, pistol-carrying everywhere, and the disposition of every man when his blood is up to be himself jury, trial Judge and executioner. We can not denounce crime today and condone crime tomorrow. We must not permit, for any cause, a suspension of the forms of the law. We can not excuse one crime though it is caused by another crime. "We can not accept the philosophy of Christ today and promptings of the devil tomorrow. If we cast aside the rule that comes from heaven, when it suits us, and substitute the law of hell, it will be only a short time until we shall have a hell on earth." That is the plain, blunt and truthful way to talk about it. Is it not a most remarkable fact, with all these shocking instances of organized violence, not to speak of assas sinations and robberies and burglaries of daily or nightly occurrence, that the legislative bodies of this country

should be devoting none of their time to tightening up and making more effective the penal codes of the different States, but that they, on the contrary, should have spent recent years in repealing sound rules of criminal juris- exquisite line of prudence, tested by centuries, which stood in the way of criminals, and should have actually wasted their time and opportunity in efforts to soften the law which needs, above all things, to be made even stronger and harder than it is? Of course the legislative bodies referred to were not moved by any purpose to encourage mob violence or crime of any kind, and neither are the courts which strain at gnats and swallow camels, nor the jurors who acquit the guilty; but citizens in any one of these lines of influence and power, as well as other citizens in other lines, are morally responsible for the evils and wrongs and crimes which they are able to prevent. Instead of exercising their powers to prevent crime, many of the thoughtless and misguided have actually done much to encourage it. The main thing to be considered by

public men of the different States today is the enforcement of the criminal laws for the prevention of crime. The laws should be made more rigid rather than more flexible. The order and




proven by its collapse that a free government by a free people can not exist? These are the pointed questions which the contemporary propounds. To answer them fairly, in the right way, is a duty which is incumbent upon every wise and patriotic American.

It has been found that the victims of the Atlanta mob of two years ago were innocent, and the bodies of innocent victims have marked the course of other mobs in Georgia, Mississippi, Tennessee, Illinois and other States. The guilty brute whom the mob lynches is the very sort of criminal the courts of the country are quite sure to convict and hang. After referring to the Reelfoot Lake lynching, the Commercial Appeal adds:

Yesterday three negroes were taken away from officers of the law by a mob and they were hanged. The crime of this mob is not solely against the three negroes; it is against the State. When they murdered these negroes they lynched the law in Lake County. Gov. Patterson made a supreme effort to save the State from this additional exhibition of lawlessness, but he failed. A Judge and an Attorney General started over from Union City to Tipton die. Soldiers were hurried over from Union City toward Tiptonville. An imprompta session of court was hled; the negroes were tried before a Magistrate, and he, in order to preserve the form of the law in so far as possible, estimated them to be hanged. Even this dul not suit the mob. The carrying out of the Magistrate's order would have saved justice from one humillating insult, but when the sentence of tae-Magistrate had barely passed the mob began its work. These negroes were had men. They made a disturban to at a religious meeting held by their own peo ple. Officers were sent to arrest them, and one of them killed an officer. Just as sure as the sun rises and sets, a trial would have resulted in a death penalty for these men, but the mob would not wait. You can excuse it by saying the men hanged were negroes and should have been hanged. It will not answer to the law to say the black murderers got their deserts. The ne-grees could have been killed, and the law could have done it. The result is that the negroes are dead and the law itself has been lynched.

As the fresh red pages of Tennessce history show, the lynchers do not stop with negro criminals. They murder innocent negroes, and they murder white men and women who are not even accused of crime. The man who dares to sell his own crop as he deems best is summarily executed by a mob. As the Memphis contemporary says, we have got finally to answer for this whole miserable business. We ourselves will finally have to pay the penalty for crime-shooting and killing. whether it be assassination or mutual combat--whichever you please to call it-in the streets of Nashville, nightriding, murder in Obion, negro-lynching ia Lake, pistol-carrying everywhere, and the disposition of every man when his blood is up to be himself jury, trial Judge and executioner. We can not denounce crime today and condone crime tomorrow. We must not permit, for any cause, a suspension of the forms of the law. We can not excuse one crime though it is caused by another crime. "We can not accept the philosophy of Christ today and promptings of the devil tomorrow. If we It cast aside the rule that comes from heaven, when it suits us, and substitute the law of hell, it will be only a short time until we shall have a hell on earth." That is the plain, blunt and truthful way to talk about it.-Is it not a most remarkable fact. with all these shocking instances of organized violence, not to speak of assas sinations and robberies and burglaries, of daily or nightly occurrence, that the legislative bodies of this country should be devoting none of their time to tightening up and making more effective the penal codes of the different States, but that they, on the contrary, should have spent recent years in re- is new in Jewelry. Also an pealing sound rules of criminal jurisprudence, tested by centuries, which stood in the way of criminals, and should have actually wasted their time and opportunity in efforts to soften the law which needs, above all things, to be made even stronger and harder than it is? Of course the legislative bodies referred to were not moved by any purpose to encourage mob violence or crime of any kind, and neither are the courts which strain at gnats and swallow camels, nor the jurors who acquit the guilty; but citizens in any one of these lines of influence and power, as well as other citizens in other lines, are morally responsible for the evils and wrongs and crimes which they are able to prevent. Instead of exercising their powers to prevent crime, many of the thoughtless and misguided have actually done much to encourage it. The main thing to be considered by public men of the different States today is the enforcement of the criminal laws for the prevention of crime. The iaws should be made more rigid rather than more flexible. The order and






