Witness in Night Rider Trial at Union City Overcome With Emotion on the Witness Stand.

Union City, Tenn., Dec. 19.-Colonel R Z. Taylor, who was a companion of Captain Rankin when the latter was murdered by the night riders at Reelfoot Lake, was the first witness on the

He testified that after the rope had been placed around Rankin's neck and he had been drawn up, the swaying figure said; You are choking me, gentlemen; let me down.
