POWER OF WATER.

Under Certain Conditions it is Practically Irresistible.

When a man goes in swimming at the seashore and slaps the water forcibly with his hand or takes a back dive from a pier and lands squarely on his back he realizes that the unstable liquid offers not a little resistance. Yet, says a writer in the New York Tribune, it would surprise almost anybody to see what water will do under certain conditions.

A stream from a fireman's hose will knock a man down. The jet from a nozzle used in placer mining in the west cuts away a large piece of land in a day, toys with great bowlders as if they were pebbles and would shoot a man over the country as though he were a projectile from a cannon.

There is a story of an eastern blacksmith who went west and made a bet that he could knock a hole through the jet of one of these nozzles with a sledge hammer. He lifted his arms, swung the sledge and came down on the ten inch stream with a force that would have dented an anvil. But the jet, never penetrated, whisked the massive hammer out of the blacksmith's hands and tossed it several hundred feet away into the debris of gold bearing gravel beneath a crumbling cliff. After this the blacksmith left out iron when he spoke of hard substances.

There is also a power plant near Durango, Colo., where a United States cavalryman one day thought he had an easy job in cutting a two inch stream with his sword. He made a valiant attack. The result was that his sword was shattered in two and his wrist broken.

A little thinner jet of water descending 1,000 feet to a manufactory at Grenoble, Spain, and traveling at the moderate speed of 100 yards a second fractures the best blades of Toledo. Of course some people will not believe such stories without having seen the thing, and one may think it a proof of the scientific imagination to say that an inch thick sheet of water, provided it had sufficient velocity, would ward off bombshells as well as steel plate.

Nevertheless many persons while traveling have seen a brakeman put a small hydraulic jack under one end of a Pullman car and lift twenty tons or so by a few leisurely strokes of the pump handle, and the experience of riding every day in a hydraulic elevator tends to remove doubts of the magic power possessed by water hitched to a machine.

PUBLIC RIDICULE.

The Time When it Served as Punishment For Lawbreakers.

It is the problem of all ages to make the punishment fit the crime, but they seem to have come nearer its solution in Plantagenet times than they ever were after the introduction of flogging.

When burglary meant the total ruin of the man who kept his whole fortune in his house, the burglar was hanged. But in the same period public ridicule served as a punishment for most crimes, and the man who sold bad meat was placed in the pillory and his bad meat burned to windward of him; the vintner who sold bad wine was forced to drink some of it and the rest was poured over his head; for more serious offenses the criminal had to walk along Cheapside bareheaded, dressed only in a shirt and carrying a wax taper, escorted by the mayor's sergeants.

The result was that law and order were maintained far better than when men became brutalized by the horrible floggings of Georgian times. Punishments became worse with religious persecutions, and after the reformation the pillory, with its terrible accompaniment of silt ears, whippings, etc., became popular, to say nothing of torturing, burning at the stake, and so on. At St. Thomas' hospital one of the sisters, "for a grave offense, contrary to ye laws of god and according to the proffe of three wytnesses," was ordered to "be punished and have xli stripes well laid on."

But all this, bad as it was, was less demoralizing than the terrible criminal code of George II's reign, when there were forty-eight crimes punishable by death and forty punishable by whipping, transportation or pillory. Flogging for mere vagrancy began with Henry VIII, and as late as 1804 six women were publicly whipped at Gloucester for this unavailing offense. And never did public morality sink so low.

In those good old days we flogged our sailorsmen "to encourage the others," and there were many trussed at the triangles who would now be simply admonished. A pleasant form of punishment was "flogging through the fleet." It was given to the ignorant sailorman who struck a superior officer. And when he had been carried from one ship to another and flogged in each he survived—if he was unfortunate—for six months. The lucky man died accidentally.—London Chronicle.

COTTON PROSPECTS.

The prediction is freely made that extremely high prices will prevail for cotton the next season. In the absence of unusual disturbance of business conditions, not as the result of combinations to artificially inflate values, but in response to the legitimate operation of the law of supply and demand, which has not yet been put out of business by either bulls or bears.

In one of his latest bulletins on the subject, Special Agent Knapp of the bureau of plant industry, in charge of the farmers' co-operative demonstration work, says that it is evident that the weevil will soon spread over the entire cotton region; it is, he explains, annually invading new territory with a column 600 miles long and in numbers sufficient to cover every stalk of cotton to a width of thirty miles.

While at this early date, says the New Orleans Picayune, in discussing the price outlook, it is foolish to speculate on the crop of the year, as it has not yet been planted, still it would be equally foolish to fail to take cognizance of the conditions existing, which, under ordinary circumstances, cannot fail to exert an influence on the ultimate outcome of the crop.

Let diversification be continued on a broader scale than ever, for in that policy lies assured prosperity.

Unfortunately, the city builder quitter is the victim of his own thoughtlessness. He joins a commercial club, steams up with enthusiasm, and because a factory stack doesn't sprout up on a vacant lot before his semi-annual dues are called for he renews his standing in the what's-the-use club.

Fortunately for Wichita Falls, she is not afflicted with but a very few members of the "What's-the-use" club. They never have joined our Chamber of Commerce, and it is best for the organization. Perhaps it would be better if they would move away, sell their property that has been enhanced in value in two short years to more than double what it cost them, through the efforts put forth by good money contributed by their neighbors.

From the amount of talk and advertising, one would be led to believe that Wichita county had double the population of Wilbarger county.

No one has ever claimed that Wichita county was a populous county or that its population was one-tenth as large as it should be and would easily support. However, we are making a noise like ten times as many people are here, and behold! the people are coming.

AUSTIN NEWS LETTER.

Summary of Proceedings of Legislature for the Past Week.

Special to the Times Austin, Tex., Feb. 11.—The sensation of the week and of the session for that matter was sprung in the senate Monday when Senator Thomas of Hopkins county declared that, under the strict construction of the anti-lobby law he had been improperly approached.

The announcement was startling and was followed by a series of rapid fire questions and a considerable expenditure of oratorical pyrotechnics. Senator Thomas intimated that it was his conviction that other senators had undergone his experiences.

The house has gone on record as unfavorable to the submission amendment. On the first vote taken on the final passage of the resolution two votes less than the required two-thirds majority were lacking, which puts the house on record as against the measure.

Aside from the submission question and Senator Thomas' declaration, the proceedings of both houses have been considerable routine. Much work has been done and many local bills have been advanced rapidly on the calendar.

The legislature will not be called on for assistance in this matter, so it may be said that the members will be gratified to see the grounds improved without expense to the State.

About the Sleep Cure.

Have you been overdoing it? Are you run down and seedy, and generally out of sorts? Try a day in bed once a week, and you will feel and look a different person. Don't wait until you are a wreck from sleeplessness before following this advice.

White Slave Traffic.

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 11.—The "white slave" traffic is an international problem because conducted by a gigantic international business enterprise operating in all parts of the world.

This is the assertion of James Bronson Reynolds of New York, who is here taking part in a public conference called to devise plans to combat the evil. Mr. Reynolds is a member of the National vigilance association, who has investigated the traffic in women in Japan, China and Panama, as well as on the Atlantic and Pacific coasts of the United States.

"The 'white slave' traffic became international," said Mr. Reynolds, "when, through the initiative of France, treaties were entered into by the leading civilized nations providing

for a bureau in each government for information and correspondence regarding the 'white slave' traffic between nations. Federal machinery in each government for the investigation of railroad stations and ports of entry for the purpose of detecting criminal traffic in foreign women and punishing the offenders was also provided for, and provision made for the proper care of foreign victims of the 'white slave' traffic and their return to their native land by the government holding them.

The victims of this traffic are numbered by the thousands yearly. Alert agents move from place to place, luring farmers' daughters from their homes and entrapping innocent girls at out of the way railroad stations and resorts. Girls who go to the city to seek their fortunes and fall are caught by these harpies, the agents of an organized 'white slave' system.

Men are queer. Wouldn't there be a roar when they went home to their meals if they had to climb upon a high stool in front of a table where there is no cloth, and eat their meals in that fashion. Yet a majority of men, when they go to a restaurant, will pick out the high stool and feed board with no cloth on it in preference to a good table. 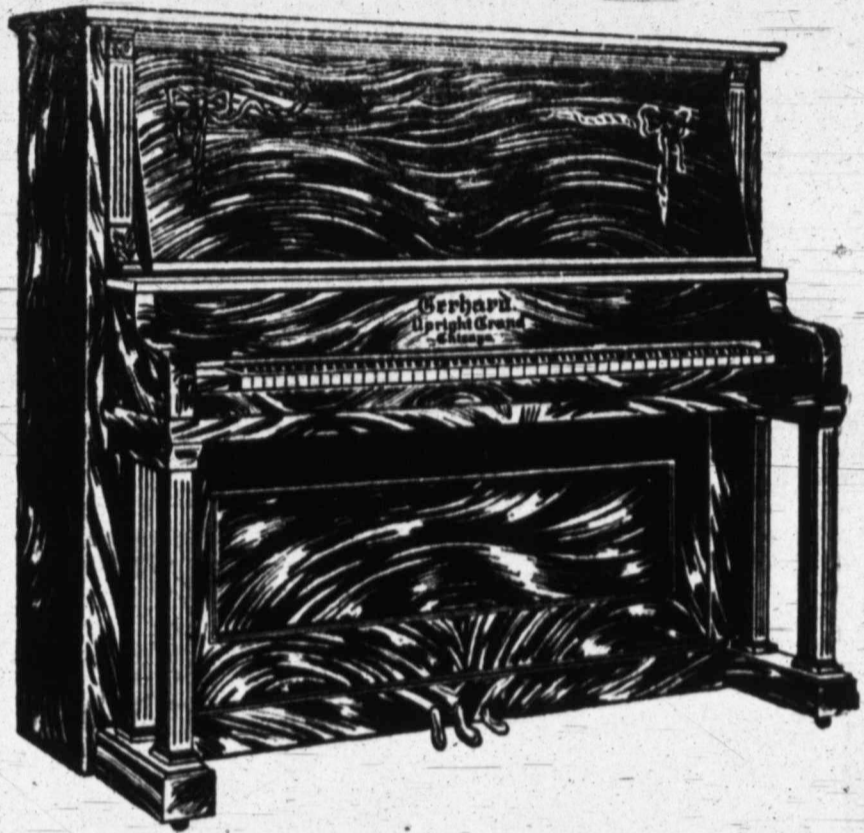
