Board Resolution Calls For Adequate School Financing

Bovina ISD's Board of Trustees met in regular session Monday, September 9, at the school administration building.

All members were present except Isabel Carrasco. Staff present were Charles Carter, Darla Sealey, Mitzi Johnson, and Michael Downes. There were no visitors present.

A public hearing was held at 7:22 p.m. on the 2002-03 tax rate. Board action items included a motion approved to set the 2002-03 tax rate at \$1.14.

The Board issued a resolution in support of legislative action to guarantee adequacy and equity in school finance. Section I of the resolution reads as follows:

"We call upon the Texas Legislature to take up for consideration and passage such bills as will modify or replace existing laws regarding public school finances to provide all the public school

districts of Texas adequate and equalized state and local resources that will make it possible for each district to maintain current levels of programs and services, and to add to those levels in an appropriate manner."

Section II said this recommendation "shall be communicated to all officers and/or members of Bovina Independent School District, the media, the Texas Legislature and other appointed and elected officials."

In other business, a resolution was approved to adopt a governmental 457(b) program. The resolution says that effective September 9, 2002, BISD authorized Michael Downes, superintendent, to adopt a nonqualified deferred compensation plan that qualifies under Section 457(b) of the Internal Revenue Code and shall make the plan available to all employees.

This plan will enhance the employee's personal retirement savings through deferral of current compensation.

A motion was made to amend a policy to allow the use of local leave days prior to the use of state leave days. The motion passed 5/1 with Joe Steelman voting against.

The board also heard principal's reports and reports from the superintendent included Texas House of Representatives commendation for Bovina Elementary School; Texas Association of School Boards convention; the superintendent's itinerary; and new grant programs.

The board went into closed executive session at 8:13 p.m. and came out at 9:17 p.m. No personnel action was taken and the meeting was adjourned.

A YEAR CHURNS BY pretty fast and can seem like just a few short weeks once you become a member of the "over the hill" generation. It has been a very short year since a band of fanatics killed three thousand of our people and took away our freedom to feel safe in our own homes, in our own country.

Those people are gone forever, and we'll probably never get back some of our freedoms that also disappeared in the billowing smoke of the World Trade Center Towers. Television networks can run stories of those families who lost loved ones non-stop all day every day from now on, if it will insure that no one in the world ever forgets the events of that September day last year.

America was not prepared for what happened because civilized people cannot understand, much less predict, the actions of purely evil extremists. We simply can't comprehend the depth of hatred that they have against our nation or understand the reason why. We only know that this enemy must be destroyed and their capacity to strike must be eliminated. But who are they?

After the Oklahoma City bombing, there was Timothy McVeigh. At Pearl Harbor, the enemy was Japanese imperialism. In WWII Germany, the enemy was Hitler and his Nazi totalitarianism.

Now we are in a war against terrorism without a clear-cut enemy. Bin Laden is only one small fish in a teeming sea of dedicated Islamic fundamentalists, extolling faith, mindless obedience, primitivism, sacrifice to state and God, theocracy. They are against everything we stand for: reason, individualism, pursuit of happiness, secularism, capitalism. Their plan is basically to force their religious dogma on nonbelievers--us--by spreading their doctrine, not via appeals and rational arguments, but by violence, guns and suicide bombers.

I don't know what our leaders have in mind when it comes to destroying this unpredictable enemy, but I hope the Islamic fundamentalist nations of Iraq, Iran, Saudi Arabia and Pakistan are at the top of the hit list. Bipartisan bickering and blathering over the minuscule details of homeland security are certainly not going to win a war against anything.

America has the courageous military and the weapons to take on this enemy and defeat them. We've just gotta find them first and then have the will to practice self-interest and safeguard American lives. . . and not be squeamish about stepping on anyone's toes in the name of right and reason.

Okay media, news magazines, networks, talking heads... keep running those stories and memorials about nine-one-one. Some of the more cynical folks among us may get tired of hearing about it. But I don't want anyone to ever forget. It must never be "out of sight, out of mind." I want Americans to stay mad as Hell about this, until every last terrorist is wiped off the earth. . . in memory of those three thousand vibrant intelligent young folks who died last year in New York City. They'll never have the opportunity to become a part of the "over the hill" generation.

Mustangs Edge Hornets With Nieto Field Goal

Left-footed kicker Mike Nieto has been practicing hard on extra points and field goals under the tutelage of Coach Randy Ragland.

The practice paid off with a win Friday night against the Lorenzo Hornets. All Mike did was kick two extra points, then a 19-yard field goal with 6 seconds on the final clock, to give the Mustangs a 17-14 victory and a 1-1 record.

The winning field goal came after a 60-yard drive by the Mustangs was stopped at the two-yard line with time running out.

"We had clock management trouble at the end and didn't have time to run another running play with only 6 seconds left," said Coach Bruce Scroggins.

He said the holder missed the kicking tee when he sat the ball down and Nieto actually kicked the ball off the grass, "which he hadn't practiced." The ball barely cleared the left inside upright for the winning points.

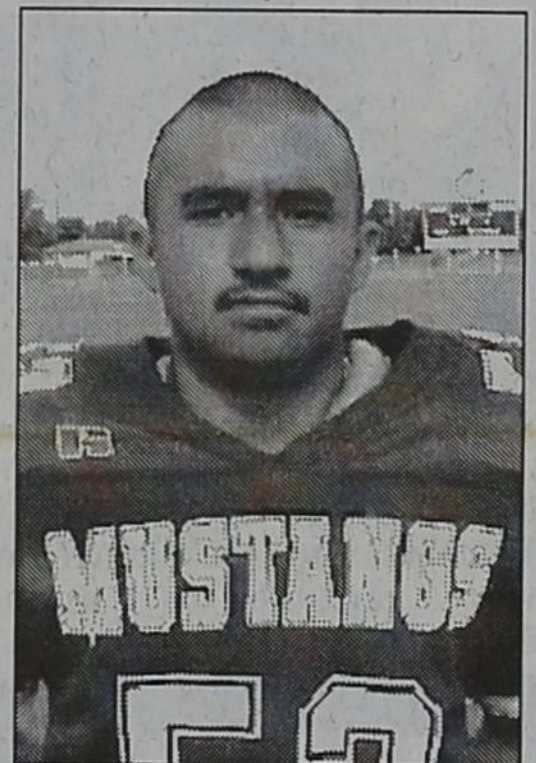
Senior running back Nemecio Rodriguez, crowned Homecoming King before the game, had 18 carries for 130

yards. John Nelson carried 9 times for 36 yards and a touchdown. Jake Steelman was one carry for four yards.

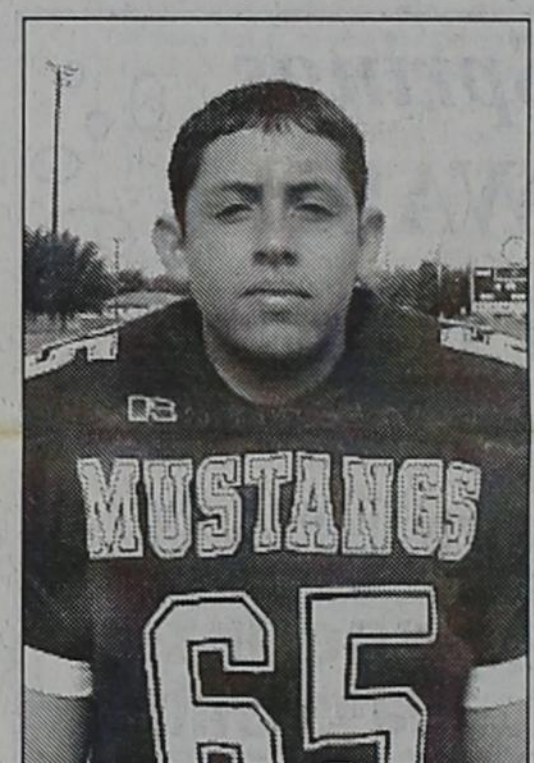
Sophomore quarterback Jeff Casas, in his second varsity start, gained 53 yards on 10 carries and was 0-4 passing with one interception. Casas also scored a touchdown on a 6-yard run in the second quarter.

In two games, Rodriguez has gained 219 yards on 31 carries; Nelson 19 for 89; and Casas 14 for 67. The Mustangs have punted 6 times for 150 yards, a 25-yard average.

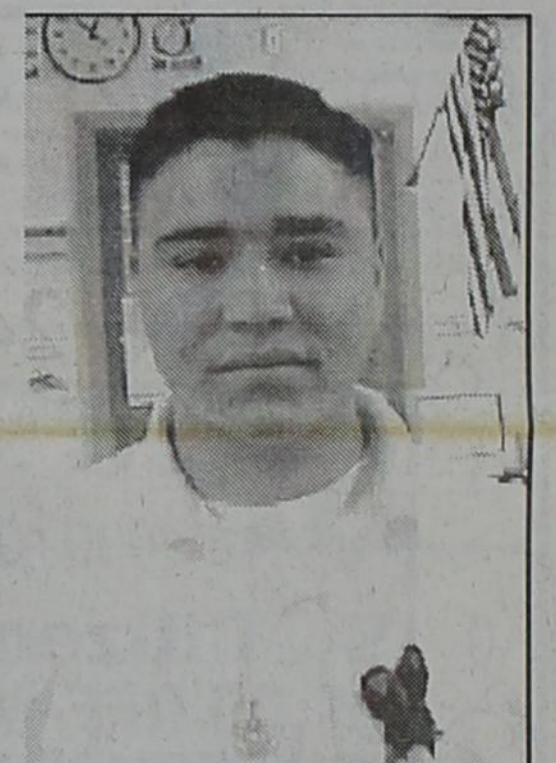
Tonight (Friday, September 13), the Mustangs host Trinity Fellowship at Mustang Field at 7:30 p.m.



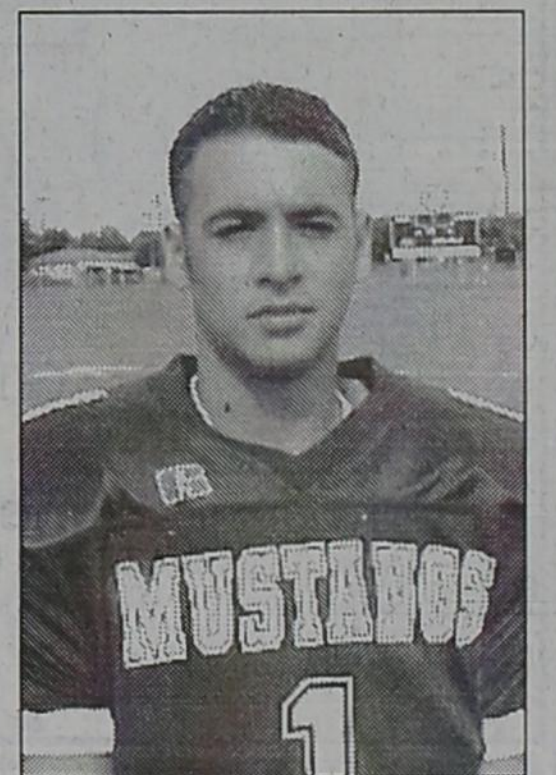

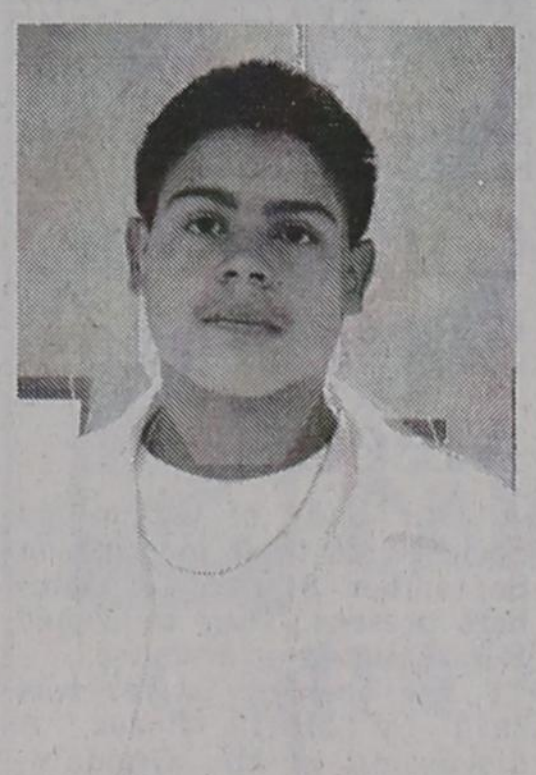
Student Wins At Clovis Art Festival

Drawings by brothers Ronaldo and Mauricio Garcia were entered in the Clovis Downtown Revitalization Art Contest. Both boys did well.

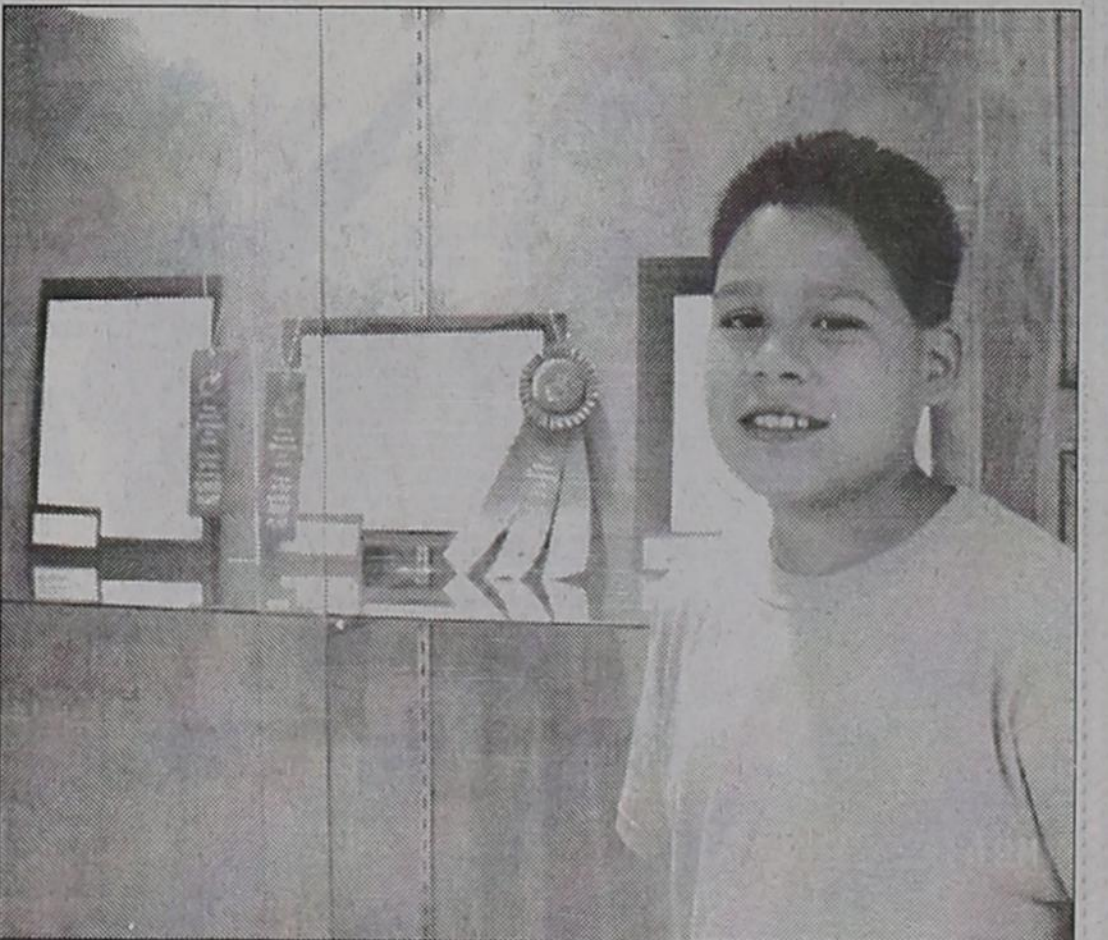

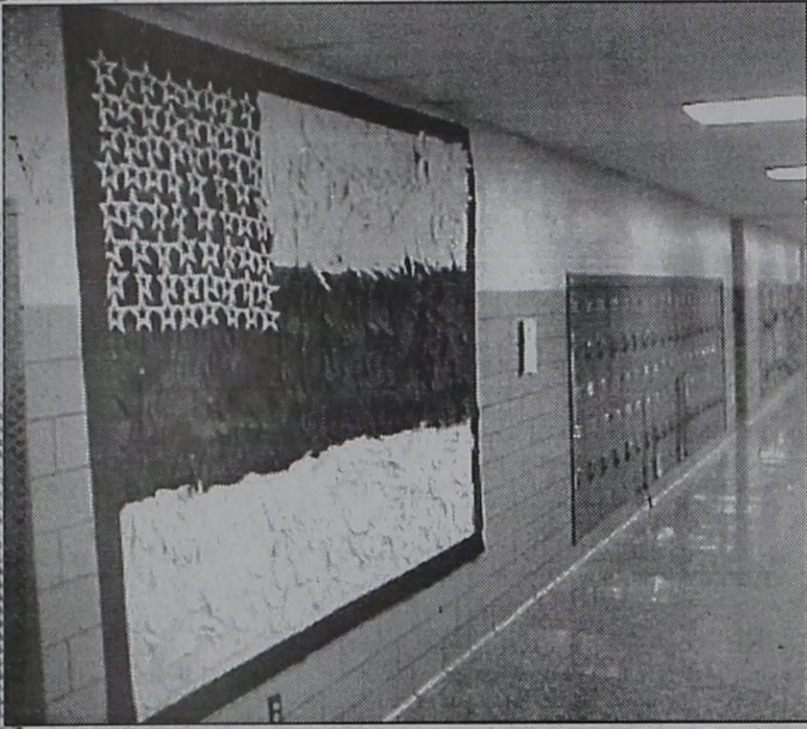
