## CHIEF CRAZY SNAKE WOULD SURRENDER

### HEAD OF INDIAN AND NEGRO BAND OF DESPERADOES OFFERS TO GIVE UP.

## NEVER DESIRED TO FIGHT

### Indians are Now Surrounded by Militia in Thicket in Upper Canadian Bottoms.

Texas News Service Special. Henryetta, Ok., Mar. 30.—The troops this afternoon arrested eleven Snake Indians, among them Rising Star, chief counselor to Crazy Snake. A clash between the government and State authorities is brewing. The government officials are indignant at the wholesale arrest of full bloods, and will intervene in behalf of the Indians.

By Associated Press. Oklahoma City, Ok., Mar. 30.—With Crazy Snake and a large portion of his band of Indians, half breeds and negroes apparently trapped in the North Canadian bottoms, more than a hundred Oklahoma militiamen, cowboys, deputies and farmers hurried forward to-day to join those already on guard and crush or capture the belligerents. It is believed that the wily chieftain has been outgeneraled by his pursuers and that there is no possibility of his breaking through the cordon which encompasses him.

Other Indians Flocking to Join Band. Pierce, Ok., Mar. 30.—The troops under Colonel Hoffman's command reached here this morning after an all night march and breakfasted near Crazy Snake's home. They are now marching for the mountains near Lena, where it is believed Crazy Snake is in hiding.

The Indians are divided into several bodies and it is not known which body Crazy Snake is leading. The Indians today are gathering from all parts of Eufaula county and hurrying in pairs to the mountains to aid the Snakes. It is feared that the situation may turn out more serious than has been anticipated.

Texas News Service Special. Camp Hickory, near Henryetta, Ok., Mar. 30.—With Crazy Snake and his band of desperado Indians and negroes fortified in a heavy growth of timber, Colonel Hoffman this morning is using caution in surrounding the outlaws for the final battle. Crazy Snake and his followers are hiding in a clump of trees and bushes, well prepared to fight. The troops have them hemmed in and they must either fight or surrender. The Indians may compel a siege and not seek to fight or escape until lack of food and water forces them to and it is believed Crazy Snake has the latter course planned. The soldiers themselves are not well prepared to starve them out, but can obtain further supplies.

Crazy Snake Offers to Surrender. Texas News Service Special. Guthrie, Ok., Mar. 30.—Crazy Snake offered today to surrender. The offer was made to officers of the militia this morning. He sent word that he desired to come in, but feared to surrender to the local authorities. The chief states that he never desired to fight.

### Creeks Primitive Band.

Crazy Snake, whose name is Chitto Harjo, and whose English name is Wilson Jones, is the leader of the Snake band of Creek Indians. This band of Creeks, unable to speak English, have never turned their faces from the old ways and the old customs. They are as primitive as the Cheyennes or the Sioux. They were opposed to the division of their lands by the federal government and refused to take their allotments. Unable to escape the change they persistently resisted the taxation of their property. They relied impli-

## IMPROVEMENT OF UPPER RED RIVER

### CAPTAIN WALTON SUBMITS HIS REPORT TO THE BOARD OF ENGINEERS.

## TO MOUTH OF WICHITA

### Survey of Stream is Made by Army Officer—First Favorable Development in Project.

The citizens of Wichita county will read with interest the following dispatch from Washington, which recently appeared in the Dallas News, relative to the proposed improvement of the Red river to the mouth of the Wichita. It is believed that if navigation is ever established on the Red river as far up as the mouth of the Wichita, that the latter river could be made navigable to Wichita Falls.

The Washington dispatch is as follows: The first favorable development in the proposed improvement of the upper Red river section, as far as the mouth of the Wichita, developed when Capt. Waldron, the local engineer, gave to the special army engineer this week his report of a survey of the river. War Department officials, while declining to discuss the features of Capt. Waldron's report admitted today that the findings of the local engineer were favorable to the proposed improvement.

## 3 VIOLENT DEATHS AT SHERMAN TODAY

Texas News Service Special. Sherman, Tex., Mar. 30.—Arthur Caldwell, aged 23 years, was shot and killed by Will Timms five miles southwest of Sherman this morning at 8 o'clock. Timms then turned the weapon on himself, ending his own life. The bodies of both men were found within a few feet of each other. It is believed that a quarrel of a year ago led to the tragedy.

### Riley Bell Murdered.

Texas News Service Special. Sherman, Tex., Mar. 30.—Riley Bell, aged 20 years, was assassinated by an unknown party early this morning in North Sherman. His body was discovered by his parents. There is no clue to his murderer.

### Death of Mr. Cooper.

Mr. Cooper, the venerable father of Mr. J. D. Cooper, died at the home of his son on Red river last night and will be buried tomorrow at 11 a. m. at Burkburnett.

## MORE CANDIDATES FOR STOREY'S PLACE

Texas News Service Special. Austin, Tex., Mar. 30.—More candidates to succeed the late L. J. Storey on the Railroad Commission are cropping out, but no authentic information is to be had as to who will receive the appointment. One report says that John L. Wortham can have the place if he asks for it, and it is known that he is seeking the place. Wortham was offered the position of financial agent of the penitentiaries, but refused to accept it. Wortham has been loyal to Campbell, but disagreed with some of his lieutenants.

Neill of the Farmers' Union and Marshall Hicks of San Antonio, it is believed, do not stand a good chance, although they are candidates for that office.

Thomas B. Love is prominently mentioned, but his gubernatorial aspirations may prevent him from accepting, so it is generally believed that Trav Dashiell will receive the appointment.

The governor, State officials and a majority of the members of the legislature went to Lockhart this morning, accompanying the body of L. J. Storey. The house and senate will meet tomorrow.

### Bloodhounds on Trail of Burglars.

Texas News Service Special. McKinney, Tex., Mar. 30.—Officers hurried from here this morning to Allen with bloodhounds to search for the burglars who robbed the Allen Grocery Company there of a large amount of money and goods early today. No arrests have been made so far.

## WOULD-BE ASSASSIN HELD IN IRONS

### ITALIAN ANARCHIST REPORTED TO HAVE ATTEMPTED TO KILL ROOSEVELT.

## PLOT WAS DISCOVERED

### In Time to Prevent Success of the Attempt—Many Conflicting Rumors are Heard.

By Associated Press. Ponta Del Gado, Azores, Mar. 30.—While the steamer Hamburg was at Horta a sensational rumor to the effect that a steerage passenger had attempted an assault on former President Roosevelt was circulated. The Associated Press correspondent is able to state positively that no such incident occurred.

### Plot Was Discovered in Time.

By Associated Press. Lisbon, Portugal, Mar. 30.—The Seculo today publishes a special dispatch from Horta, which says an attempt was made by an Italian anarchist on the person of Roosevelt, but that the plot was discovered before it could be carried out. The man was arrested and placed in irons.

### Was Steerage Passenger.

New York, Mar. 29.—Giuseppe Tosti, a steerage passenger on the Hamburg, is the man who threatened former President Roosevelt, according to a special dispatch from Horta to the World.

This incident happened soon after the Hamburg was losing sight of America. Then Tosti broke from his companions in the steerage and started for the upper deck, where Mr. Roosevelt was standing with his son, Kermit.

He has let them take away my child,' Tosti is said to have shouted in English. 'Now he shall pay for it.'

Sailors seized Tosti, quickly mastered him, carried him below, and, by the captain's orders, put him in irons. The incident, it is stated, was known only to Mr. Roosevelt and a few of his fellow passengers.

Tosti, after his imprisonment, refused for four days to eat, crying, 'Roosevelt is trying to poison me.' The ship's doctor must now taste all food offered to Tosti before he will eat it.

## STRUCK BY BICYCLIST AND SERIOUSLY INJURED.

Texas News Service Special. Waco, Tex., Mar. 30.—George F. Payne, a prominent merchant of China Springs, was perhaps fatally injured this morning when he was struck by Will Dawson, who was riding a bicycle. Payne's head was cut open and he suffered concussion of the brain.

Texas News Service Special. Fort Worth, Tex., Mar. 30.—Judge Meek in the Federal court here today sentenced James Lewis, convicted of passing counterfeit money at Mineral Wells, to four years imprisonment.

Joe Wigham, convicted of embezzling postoffice funds at Wichita Falls, received a sentence of two and one-half years.

Dan Dawson received a six months' sentence and a fine for violation of the Chinese exclusion act.

## SEVEN KILLED IN EXPLOSION

By Associated Press. Chillicothe, Ohio, Mar. 30.—Seven men were killed and nine others injured as the result of a premature dynamite explosion on the Norfolk and Western railway, five miles south of here.

A crew of men were unloading a car of dynamite when it exploded. With the exception of Charles Buchanan of Columbus, Jonathan Floyd and John Hayes of South Carolina, all were negroes. Some of the bodies were blown a distance of three hundred yards.

## TO BE ARRESTED FOR OLD MURDER

By Associated Press. Terre Haute, Ind., Mar. 30.—Charged with the murder of Rose Tritt at Sanford, thirty-two years ago, Sylvester Burnham is to be arrested in Texas. Requisition papers were obtained today from Governor Marshall, but the police will not say in what part of Texas Burnham lives. He is said to be a wealthy ranch owner.

### BARNETT CASE AT ABILENE.

Jury Selected From Special Venire of Hundred and Eighty Men. Abilene, Tex., Mar. 29.—When Judge Blanton called district court to order this morning the first case on the docket was that of the State of Texas vs. Tom Barnett, charged with the murder of Alex Sears, whose charred body was found in the ruins of the Mud Young school house, twelve miles east of here, on the morning of Feb. 1st.

The district court room was filled to overflowing and a special venire of 180 men who had been summoned were present at the opening of court. After the clerk had called the roll of veniremen, the examination and selection of the jury was begun. At 4 o'clock the twelve jurors had been selected as follows: A. P. Parr, W. J. Landers, R. H. Denton, W. G. Perry, Ben F. Graham, R. Mitchell, J. E. Chandler, C. M. Hunt, A. M. Robertson, John Davenport, J. E. Costephens and B. F. Jones Jr.

After the jury had been empaneled the taking of testimony began and before night two witnesses had been examined, the doctors who held the autopsy on Sears' body. A. A. Alsobrook, who found the dead body in the Mud Young school house, took the stand tonight. There are about thirty witnesses for the State and some twenty-four for the defense.

It begins at the breakfast table when a youngster tells his father that there is something on his face, and after repeated efforts to wipe it away it is informed that it is his nose, then blushes like a school girl at the howls of April fool from his young hopefuls. Being a good father and remembering—though saying nothing of it—just such pranks played on his venerable parents he lets it go with a confused laugh, registering a vow that he will get it on his partner as soon as he reaches his office. Frequently the dignified loving mother has her turn and smiles to herself as she covertly watches her family vainly trying to eat muffins filled with cotton, etc.

An old hat covering a brick placed temptingly in the way of pedestrians is an old trick the urchins of the streets use on every April fool's day. Some older people enter so freely into the sport as to heat a silver-dollar and place it on the walk just around the corner for some approaching and unsuspecting victim, and run the risk of losing it if the victim be wise enough to use his soft hat in picking it up.

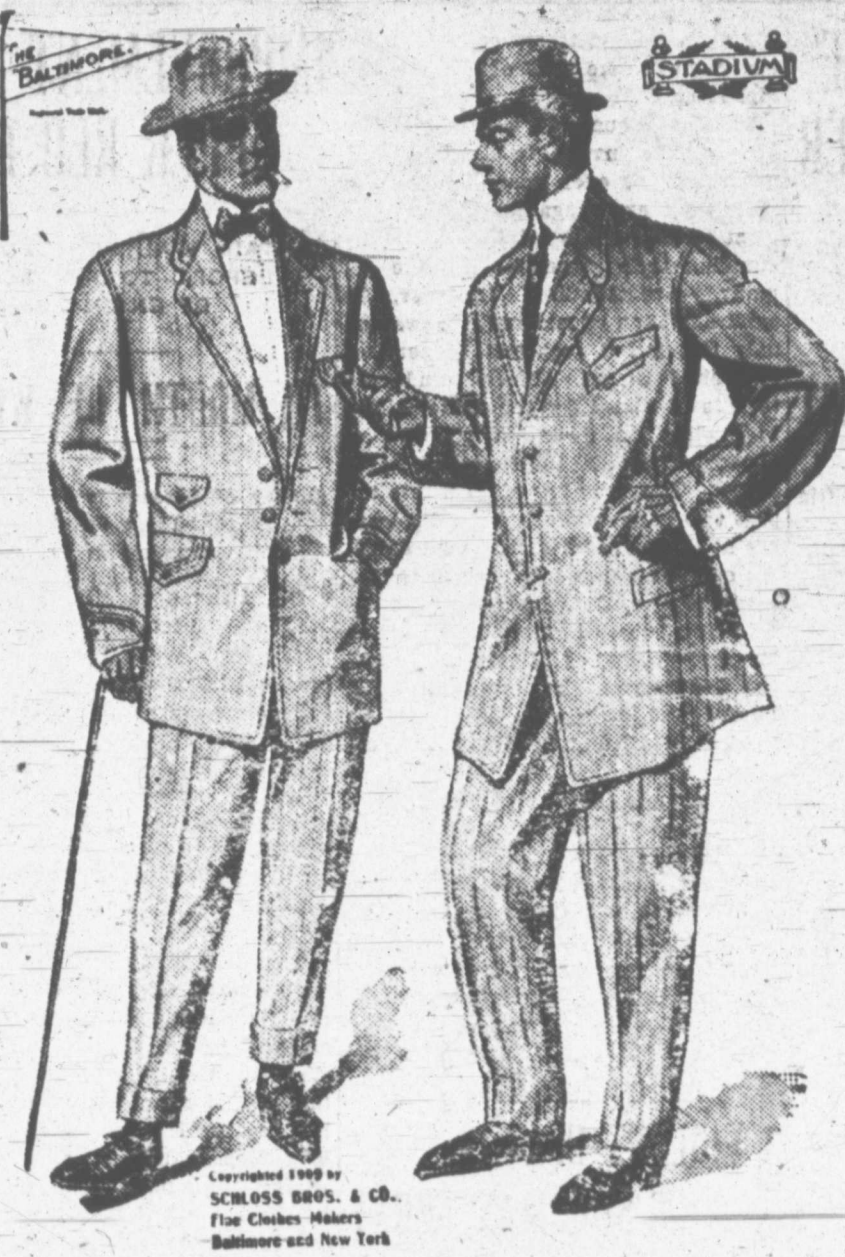

#### MORSE VICTIM OF "BIG STICK."

Convicted Banker From Cell Declares Roosevelt Persecuted Him.

New York, Mar. 30.—Charles W. Morse, who is confined in the Tombs pending an appeal of his case, charges that he is a victim of the "big stick" and that he has been persecuted by secret service men working under United District Attorney Stimson. Morse has complained to Martin W. Littleton, his counsel, that secret service men have even been placed in a cell close to his that they might spy upon him.

While Mr. Littleton would not discuss the matter, it was learned that about six weeks ago a "prisoner" was admitted to a cell on the federal tier in the Tombs and that he was given no hearing before the United States commissioner, although he was supposed to be charged with postal frauds. Several times, it is alleged, he was taken to the office of Mr. Stimson.

Mysterious "Prisoner" Gone.  
Warden Flynn placed a stool pigeon in the man's cell. The man played cards with the "prisoner" and got his name and address. These were fictitious and the man disappeared.

Morse makes the charges in a signed interview.

"I am the victim of the 'big stick,'" Morse declared. "But for the activity of ex-President Roosevelt I would not now be behind the bars of a prison. It has been by his personal activity in this case that I have been persecuted, or, more appropriately, persecuted. United States District Attorney Stimson, by his own statement, has remained in office for the past six months at the request of the former President to prosecute my case."

Secret Service Men Assigned.  
The former banker went on to say that after Mr. Stimson had been put on his trial a dozen secret service men were assigned to examine every one who had dealt with him in the previous five years in the hope of obtaining evidence upon which to base an indictment. Falling in this, the prosecutor "misconstrued the books of the National Bank of America."

"I believe that I have been the victim of an extraordinary persecution, the butt of powerful interests, and my present condition to be the result of the frantic efforts of both the system and a demagogue to further their own ends—the one to distract attention from themselves in time of panic, and the other to make capital for popularity among the people of the country by putting behind the bars an innocent man, but one who has been prominent in Wall street."

## WEATHER FORECAST.

For Wichita Falls and vicinity  
—Tonight fair and warmer. Wed-  
nesday, increasing cloudiness and  
warmer.

April 6th will be a very busy day for Wichita Falls and Wichita county. On that day the people of the county will vote on the jail bond question and determine whether or not the county needs a new jail in order to care for in a decent manner those arrested, charged with crime, and who may or may not be guilty, but pending a trial of their cases are forced to be incarcerated in a jail which has not the facilities to keep white and negro prisoners in separate departments, male or female. In the opinion of our largest taxpayers, it is cheaper and far more economical to build a new jail at a cost of \$15,000 than to repair or make additions to the old one for nearly half that amount. There is also to be an election held on April 6th for the election of a board of seven directors for the Wichita Falls school district. This is a matter that should appeal to every good citizen, more especially those who have children within the scholastic age. Our city schools are overcrowded and in order to make more room it will be necessary to purchase a site and put one, or perhaps two more school buildings. These buildings should be located with a view of accommodating the largest number of children. There will also be an election held for three aldermen. Under the new election law the candidates for these offices have to be named twenty days before the election, and as but three candidates to fill the three offices were selected within that time, there will be no contest in this election, and one vote is sufficient to elect. In addition to the three elections, by proclamation of the mayor, the 6th day of April has also been designated as "Clean-Up" Day. Nearly all business houses will close on that day and every patriotic citizen will join with his neighbor in giving the city a thorough cleaning up. If present plans do not miscarry, it will be a day long to be remembered by Wichita Falls, and the good work to be accomplished will be of lasting benefit.

Did you see those movers from Wichita Falls Saturday? They were here and they said they had all of the West they wanted. They talked freely and said there was nothing doing out that way, while this country was looking good to them. When asked if they wanted to rent land they said they were fixed, but if anybody wanted to rent land they could find all the renters they wanted in Dallas and Fort Worth, as those two cities were full of folks who were wanting land and they were from the west. Take the cue, Boosters, and boost your lands. A small ad in the big papers of the State will bring the people, they said.—Bonham News.

If the movers were from Wichita Falls their reason for going away must have been for the very good reason that they could not obtain a house to live in. The only trouble with Wichita Falls and Wichita county is that we can't build houses fast enough to accommodate the people who are coming in and occasionally a family is forced to go to other towns and counties, where there are lots of vacant land and farms without tenants.

Hon. Cone Johnson practically admits that he would accept a nomination for governor of Texas, if tendered him, and there are those who believe that Mr. Johnson will make a canvass for the honor. In the event he becomes a candidate, the campaign will not by any means be a tame affair, as the probability is that both the Bailey matter and State-wide prohibition will be injected into the fight.

## CHIEF CRAZY SNAKE WOULD SURRENDER

(Continued from Page 1.)

plied as usual. "They are cowards, there is no danger." It was Odom's son, Herman, a deputy, who was one of the two men killed when an attempt was made later in the day to serve the warrant at the chief's home.

Crazy Snake, or Harjo, has pleaded many times to the county officials for the restitution of what he believed to be the rights of himself and his tribe. A notable instance of his efforts in behalf of his band was made at Tulsa, Ok., Nov. 23, 1906, when he addressed a committee of United States senators that were investigating matters connected with affairs in the territory.

"I am here and stand before you today, my fathers," eloquently pleaded Crazy Snake, "as a man of misery. I am here appealing to you to have the laws carried out."

He recounted the loyalty and allegiance of himself and his followers to the federal government in the civil war. He said that the Indians were not concerned in the question of negro slavery and that none of their individuals were involved, yet because of the compact with the federal government he joined with the latter against their enemies.

**Loyal to Government.**  
"I left my home and my country and everything I had in the world and went toward the federal army," said the chief with emotion. "I left my laws and my government. I left my people, my country and my home. I left everything and went with the federal army for my father in Washington. I left them all in order to stand by my treaties."

"I never agreed to the exchange of lands, and I never agreed to the allotting of my lands. I and my people, great masses of them, are unenlightened and uneducated. I am notifying you of those things because your government officials have told me and my people they would take care of my relations with the government, and I think they ought to be taken care of as they promised. The great father said that if anyone trespassed on my rights or lands for me to let him know, and he would take care of them and protect them. I always thought it would be done. I believe yet it will be done."

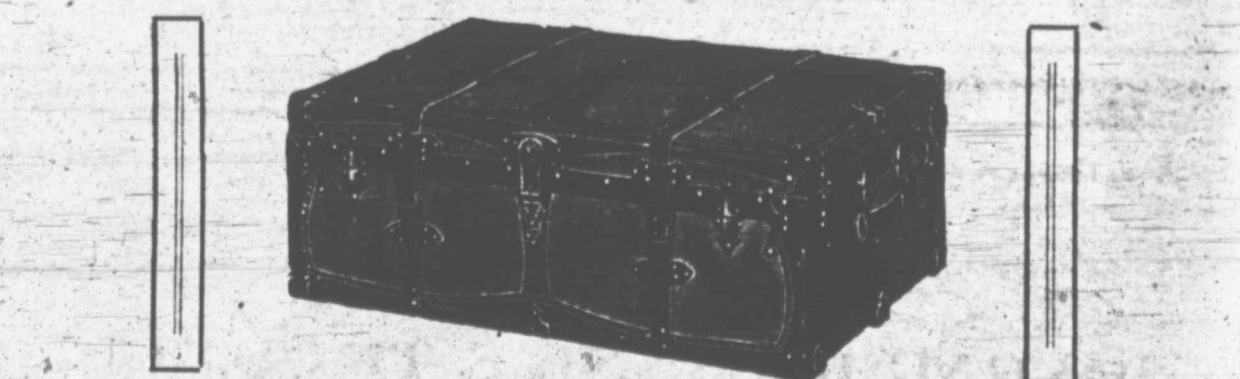

SHORT WHEAT CROP IN TEXAS.

Secretary Dorsey Thinks It Will Be  
Only a Third of an Acre.

Fort Worth, Tex., Mar. 28.—"It be-  
gins to look as if people will have to  
resort to eating corn bread instead of  
light bread," said E. G. Rall, a promi-  
nent grain dealer, Saturday afternoon.  
"Cash wheat is the highest it has been  
in years, and with the present crop  
prospects it looks as if it will continue  
high, and corn is liable to go higher  
also. For the past thirty or sixty days  
North Texas millers have been paying  
from \$1.25 to \$1.45 per bushel for  
wheat. This is the highest price paid  
in years for cash wheat in this sec-  
tion of the country."

With this condition and a shortage  
in the acreage of wheat planted, com-  
pled with the prospects of a short crop,  
due to the drought, it begins to look  
serious for the poor man. Secretary H.  
B. Dorsey of the Grain Dealers' Asso-  
ciation, who keeps in close touch with  
the grain situation, is authority for the  
statement that not more than one-  
third of the usual acreage of wheat has  
been planted, and that reports point to  
a poor yield, unless weather conditions  
change and some rainfall occurs.

So far there have been only local  
showers in localities where a general  
fall is needed. The heavy freeze of the  
past winter killed a good portion of  
the oats crop and the dry spring pre-  
vented the planting of a spring crop of  
oats. Mr. Dorsey expressed it as his  
opinion that Texas cannot expect, un-  
der the most favorable conditions, to  
make more than one-third of an aver-  
age crop of wheat this year, and not  
more than a quarter of a crop of oats.  
Corn planting is also having a serious  
setback and the usual early corn is not  
being planted as in former years. Flour  
is selling at about \$7 per barrel at  
present, with prospects of higher prices  
prevailing.

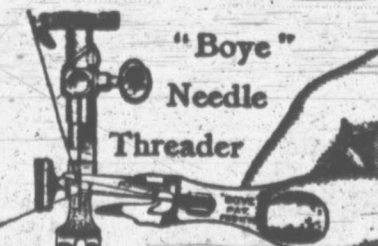
