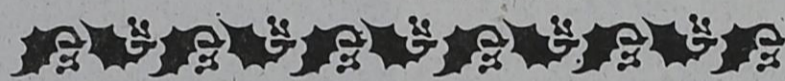

The District 4-1A football all-district selections were announced this week.

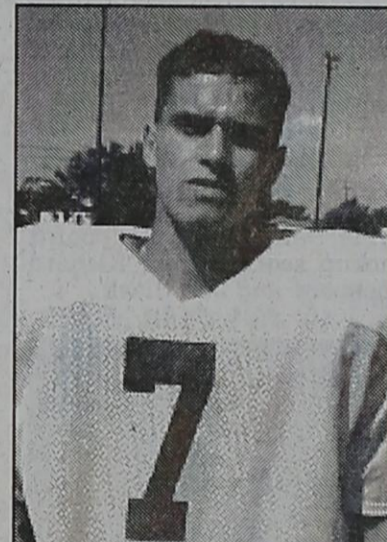

Others selected were: second team defense, Raymond Chisom. Honorable mention defense were linemen Josh Kerby, Richardo Rojas,

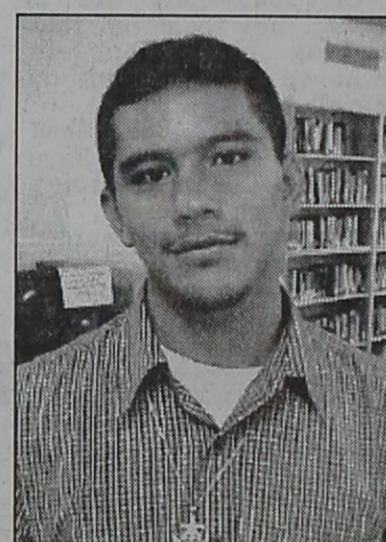
Mike Nieto and John Nelson, and Matthew Villarreal, defensive secondary.

THE LETTERS ARE WORN off the "MUTE" button on both of our TV remotes. Since we are an Equal Opportunity household, the Good Old Boy and I both have dueling remotes. We usually agree on programming, so there's not much conflict there. The trouble brews over how loud (or how soft) the sound should be. Bill likes the sound turned down; I like it turned up. . . a sure sign that I have some hearing loss.

But when those loud commercials come on, we both grab the remote to see who'll be the quickest to hit that mute button.

Here's a word of advice to those of you who are trying to get us to buy your pickups, SUVs, furniture, appliances, etc. We invited you into our homes to share some moments of our leisure time. . . so QUIT SHOUTING AT US! And while you're at it, turn down the grating background noise that pretends to be music.

The one we hate most is the carload of teenagers driving at high speed along a freeway in an expensive vehicle, probably belonging to someone's parents. Irritating "music" is blaring and the young folks are squirming and jiggling around in the car like a bunch of worms in hot ashes. That sort of thing causes death by car wreck!

Networks and advertisers continue to spend all their airtime and ad money on the 18 to 49 age bracket despite the fact that the "Baby Boomers," the largest demographic group ever in history, are now age 55. TV targets the younger folks, even though they lead busy lives that leave little time to veg-out in front of the TV. There are many other, less sedentary forms of entertainment that the younger set enjoys more.

Unfortunately, movies follow suit, aiming their mindless action-packed thrillers at the young. Only 20% of the 12 to 20 crowd ever go to the movies, while 34% of the 40 and older crowd do go to the movies. Year after year, the most popular movies (i.e. largest attendance) are the ones with less blood and gore, and more romance and quiet family values.

There are 112 million people over age 55 in this country, who have more money to spend and more time for watching television and movies. But, with television geared primarily for youthful viewers, it is no surprise that TV viewing has dropped 40% in recent years.

A few of the more popular comedies are beginning to take notice of their senior viewers by including elder family members in the story line of their shows. Otherwise, seniors are relegated to watching channels that feature old TV shows from back in the days when programs had some value, or watching video tapes of old movies.

On the subject of video tapes, they've done it to us again! They (whoever they are) who decreed that we should pitch out our old records, lps, 45s, etc., and turn to tapes, first 8-track, then smaller cassettes. . . these are the same folks who then said we should throw out all of those and buy CDs and CD players. Now they insist that all video tapes will be obscure in a few years' time because they have decided that we should all have DVDs. Some folks haven't yet figured out how to set that blinking clock on their VCR.

An article in the *Amarillo Globe-News* early in July noted that VHS is on the way out and Circuit City has booted all VHS titles from its shelves in favor of DVDs. I don't shop there anymore.

I'm buying up a lot of blank video tapes so as to continue recording my soap opera every day and watching it on the weekends when I have more free time. We will continue to treasure all our old family videos of kids' birthday parties, music recitals, school plays and sporting events, interviews with older family members at anniversaries and family reunions, and we'll hope that our video tape players will hold out for a few more years, since there won't be any new ones.

As for those old records and cassettes that we were supposed to throw out. . . every catalog which has come to my mail box this season, offers a replica of an old-time radio with record turntable, cassette and CD combo for between \$150-\$200. If there weren't still a market for this item, it wouldn't be in all the catalogs.

Everything old is new again!

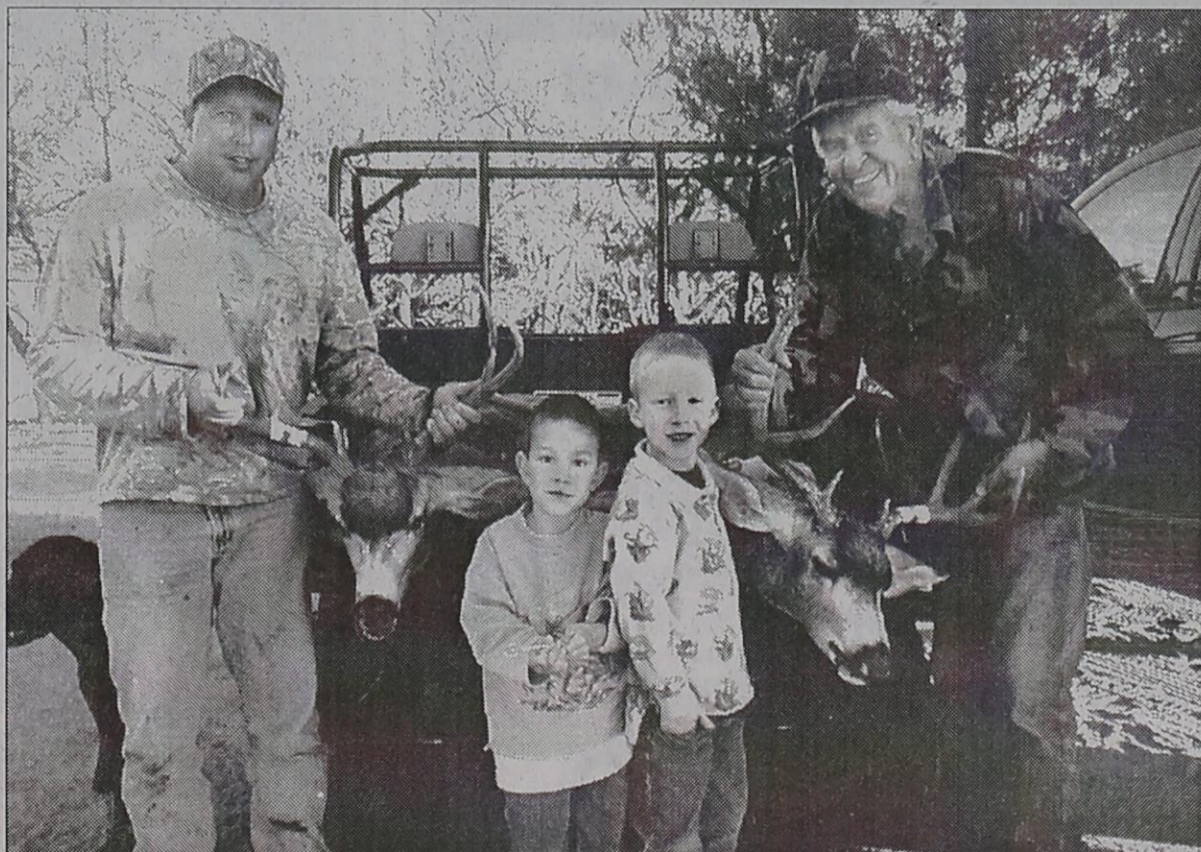

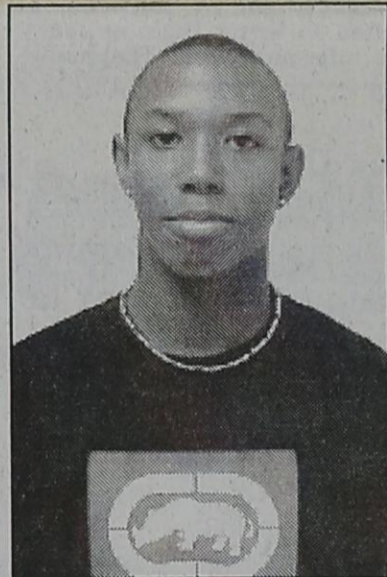

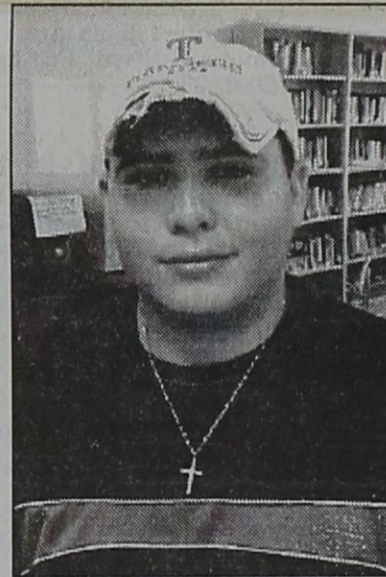

## Immunization Clinics Set During December

Immunization clinics offering vaccines protecting against several childhood diseases are scheduled for

December throughout several Panhandle communities.

Protection will be against polio, diphtheria, lock-jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps, H1N1 (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B) and varicella (chicken pox).

All flu clinics are for high-risk individuals only, including people who are 65 years old or older, people with chronic illnesses, or people living with someone with a chronic illness. Costs are \$10 for flu vaccine and \$15 for pneumonia vaccine, for those without Medicare.

The Texas Department of Health is charging fees to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability of the individual or family to pay, however, no one will be turned away if not able to pay.

The vaccinations will be administered at 616 Euclid in Friona, Friday, December 20, from 9:30-11:30 a.m. and 1-3:45 p.m.

Vaccinations will also be available at the Bovina EMS Building, Monday, December 9, from 10-11:45 a.m. and 1-3 p.m.

All times are subject to change or cancellation due to weather or scheduling conflicts.

**45 Yrs Ago-Dec. 4, 1957**  
Burglars paid two Bovina businesses a visit Monday night and were successful in both break-ins. Bovina Implement Company and Read's Gulf Service were the victims.

Bovina Volunteer Fire Department answered two calls in two days, Sunday and Monday.

For the third place finish in the Littlefield District FFA leadership quiz contest, the Bovina chapter was awarded a banner at the district banquet in Littlefield Tuesday night.

**40 Yrs Ago-Dec. 5, 1962**

This community was shocked and saddened last week by the accidental death of Ronnie Isham, 21, one of Bovina's most popular young men. Isham, who was a student at West Texas College at Canyon, was found dead late Wednesday in the garage of his home there where he had been working on a car. He was a 1959 graduate of Bovina High School. He leaves his widow, the former Arlene Clayton, and a son, Robbie.

**35 Yrs Ago-Dec. 6, 1967**

City Marshall Ronald Mitchell has requested that business institutions in downtown Bovina clean up their alleys.

Mr. and Mrs. Bob Fillpot of Bovina Insurance have purchased Inman Insurance from Mrs. Bob Estes.

A contract was awarded Tuesday morning to Sherrill Lumber Company of Bovina for construction of a medical

clinic here, culminating the work and dreams of Bovina citizens during the past few years.

**30 Yrs Ago-Dec. 6, 1972**

Parmer County farmers who hadn't sold their 1972 grain sorghum crops this week were in an enviable position as the market for milo continued upward. The price quoted here Tuesday morning was \$2.60 per hundredweight, up 25 cents from last week's \$2.35.

At a meeting of St. Ann's Parish Council, Wednesday, November 29, the council voted to sell the bell from the old St. Ann's Church. Sealed bids for the bell may be made to the church.

**25 Yrs Ago-Dec. 7, 1977**

A veteran participant and winner of the championship in 1965, Allen D. Cumpton, rode the crest of a sustained seven-week drive to triumph in the 18th Annual Bovina Businesses Football Contest. He finished the season with 134 points of a possible 182. He received \$100 for Grand Prize.

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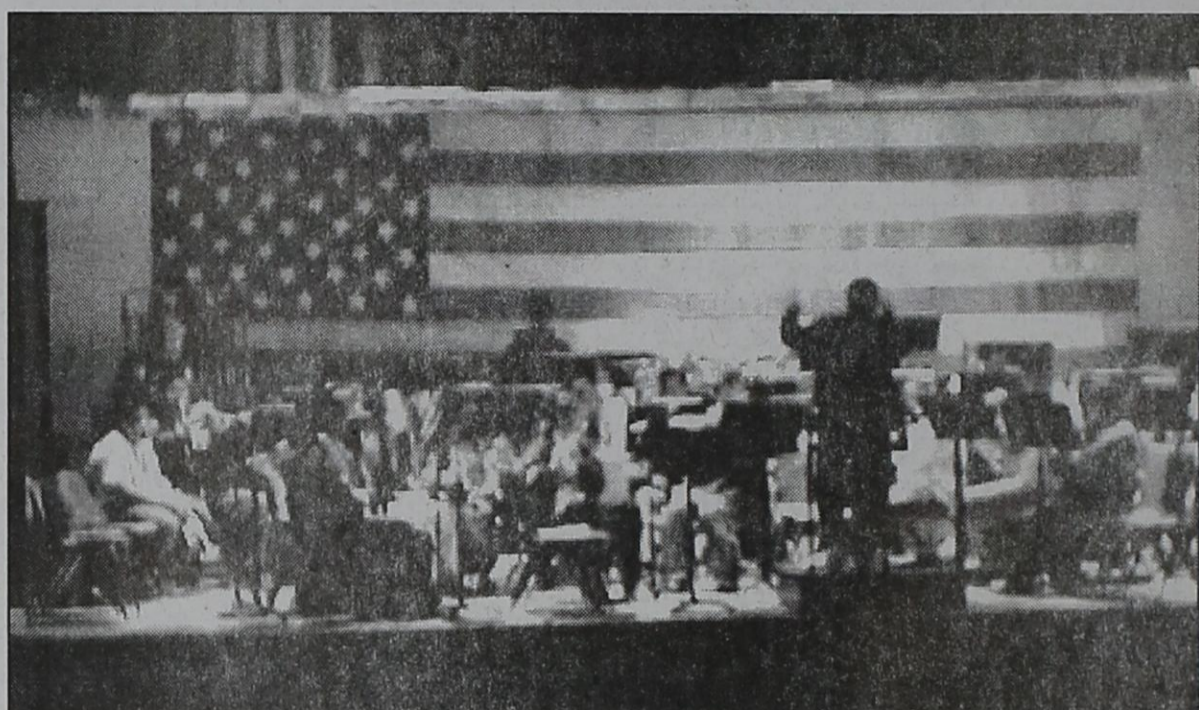

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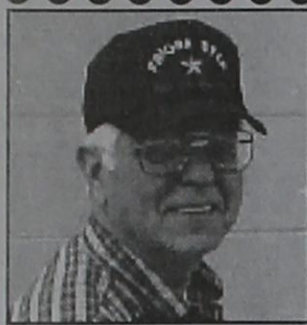

My favorite bit of holiday advice arrived in the mail this week. It is from the Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, quoting an assistant professor of psychiatry named Dr. Kristin Kassaw.

Dr. Kassaw says alcohol impairs judgment and decreases inhibitions (duh!). "You may find shopping bags full of impulse buys that you might ordinarily think twice about," she said.

Impulse buying is bad enough during the holidays much less exacerbated by bottles of fine whiskey. Whiskey makes you rich and handsome, if only for day.

She says using alcohol to "loosen up" before an event like the holiday office party can lead to embarrassing situations (amen, sister) when you say or do things you later regret (amen and amen).

Those who don't drink much to start with get drunk quicker, she says. You may not be able to carry out normal activities. So if you are going to get drunk and go shopping, you need to start now drinking a little each day to build up your stamina and tolerance.

Remember, the best advice is Don't Drink and Shop. But if you do, be sure to buy me something too, okay?

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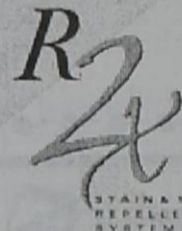
