

"MY TURN"

IT WAS UTOPIA and we didn't even know it. I've often wondered why people are so drawn to the "fifties" era. Growing up in the 1950s was fun, but we didn't think it was anything extra-special until now, forty years later.

Practically every city of any size today has at least one restaurant or club which operates on a fifties theme and decor.

Anyone who is fortunate enough to own one of those lovely old vehicles from the fifties, generally considers it to be their most cherished possession. . . the big engines, the fins, all that chrome. They really were unique autos.

Some radio stations now play nothing but music from the fifties and sixties. We've seen a lot of today's TV shows and movies set in that time period. Friona's recent dinner theater/talent show brought us entertainment from that decade.

We had it all! A chicken in every pot, a car in every garage, gasoline was 19¢ a gallon, Cokes were a nickel, and you could get a perfectly good hamburger for 25¢. Most kids got a quarter a week as an allowance. With that, you could go to the Saturday movie, get popcorn and a Coke and still have five cents left over to buy a comic book at the drug store after the show.

Television had been around for awhile but it was just becoming affordable for the average family in the early fifties. . . black and white, of course, and we watched everything that moved. Variety shows with comedy skits and music were the major fare at first. The quiz shows, situation comedies and dramas came a little later. There was a lot of "local" programming which was pretty bad, and this filled up the daytime hours, since the main network shows aired only in the evenings. The "Hit Parade" was a countdown of the top ten most popular songs each week and you tuned in to see the little skits they'd worked around each song. I guess this was the forerunner of today's music videos.

Backyard cookouts were just beginning to be popular. But you couldn't go out and buy a barbecue grill and there were no bags of charcoal briquettes at the grocery store. The dads would construct a barbecue of mortar and bricks out in the yard and you used wood chips and kindling for the fire.

Only wealthy folks had cars with automatic transmissions and air conditioners. These became more affordable in the late fifties and early sixties. Those who wanted to stay cool in the car could buy a little tacky tank-like affair that hooked onto the window of the car. You put water and/or ice in this thing and the wind blew through it as you were driving down the road and it was supposed to cool you. . . sort of like a traveling swamp-cooler. You could stay just about as cool by riding around with the windows rolled down.

When thinking about fashions in the fifties, pony tails, poodle skirts and penny-loafers usually come to mind. Some of the other styles of that time were: fuzzy angora sweaters and wool plaid skirts, Bermuda shorts and knee socks, a hundred yards of ruffled net petticoats under those full-circle skirts. Sometimes you had a hard time fitting a girl with all those petticoats into a car. Putting white polish on your saddle oxfords every night was no fun, but you didn't go to school the next day unless they were dazzling white.

There was a school dance in the gym after every football game with some local group like "Johnny Flash and the Weasels" providing the music. At a sock-hop, you took off your shoes and danced in your socks. The Debate Club pondered such weighty questions as "Does rock and roll music contribute to juvenile delinquency?"

Those guys with the greasy hair, who rolled a cigarette package up in their t-shirt sleeves, were known as "toughs" and daddies didn't let their little daughters go out on dates with that sort of fellow.

City Earns Grant For Water Tower

The City of Bovina last week received a \$250,000 grant from the Texas Department of Community Affairs for the purpose of constructing a new water tower.

The City will match 20 per cent of the funds, making the total for the project in the neighborhood of \$300,000.

The new water tower will be located on Eighth Street close to the showbarn and will replace the existing water tower which needed to be replaced due to age and wear. The new tower will hold 100,000 gallons of water.

"We applied for the grant at the first of the year," said City Alderman Kenneth Waters. "We have been seeking a grant for several years and we are real proud to be able to get it as they are not easy to obtain." The grants are not given to cities unless they really need it.

The Dwight Brandt Engineering Firm has been selected to construct

the water tower. The project will take about two years to complete and Waters said it should be completed by early to mid-1997.

Other area cities whose grant applications were granted included Friona, Wellington, Stinnett, Happy and Sanford.

Bovina ISD Recognized For Safety

Ms. Sue Nuttall, Superintendent of the Bovina Independent School District was recently honored for outstanding employee safety by the North Texas Educational Insurance Association at its annual meeting conducted in Austin, Texas.

The association consists of 121 participating school districts located throughout northern and central Texas. The district is a member of a uniquely designed partially self-funded workers' compensation program developed by Hibbs-Hallmark and Company and administrated by Claims Administrative Services, Inc., both located in Tyler.

Hibbs-Hallmark and company currently provides workers' compensation programs to over 25 percent of all schools in Texas. "We have a team of safety professionals who help the districts to implement a strict set of safety policies and procedures."

Claims Administrative Services, Inc. President, Barry Jones, stated "Safety in the Workplace is such an important issue and the administrators who have achieved such a high level of success in the area of employee safety deserve this special recognition. 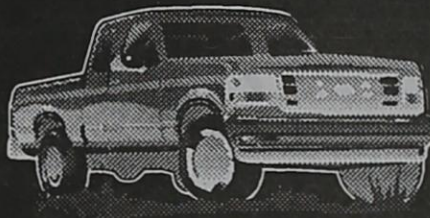

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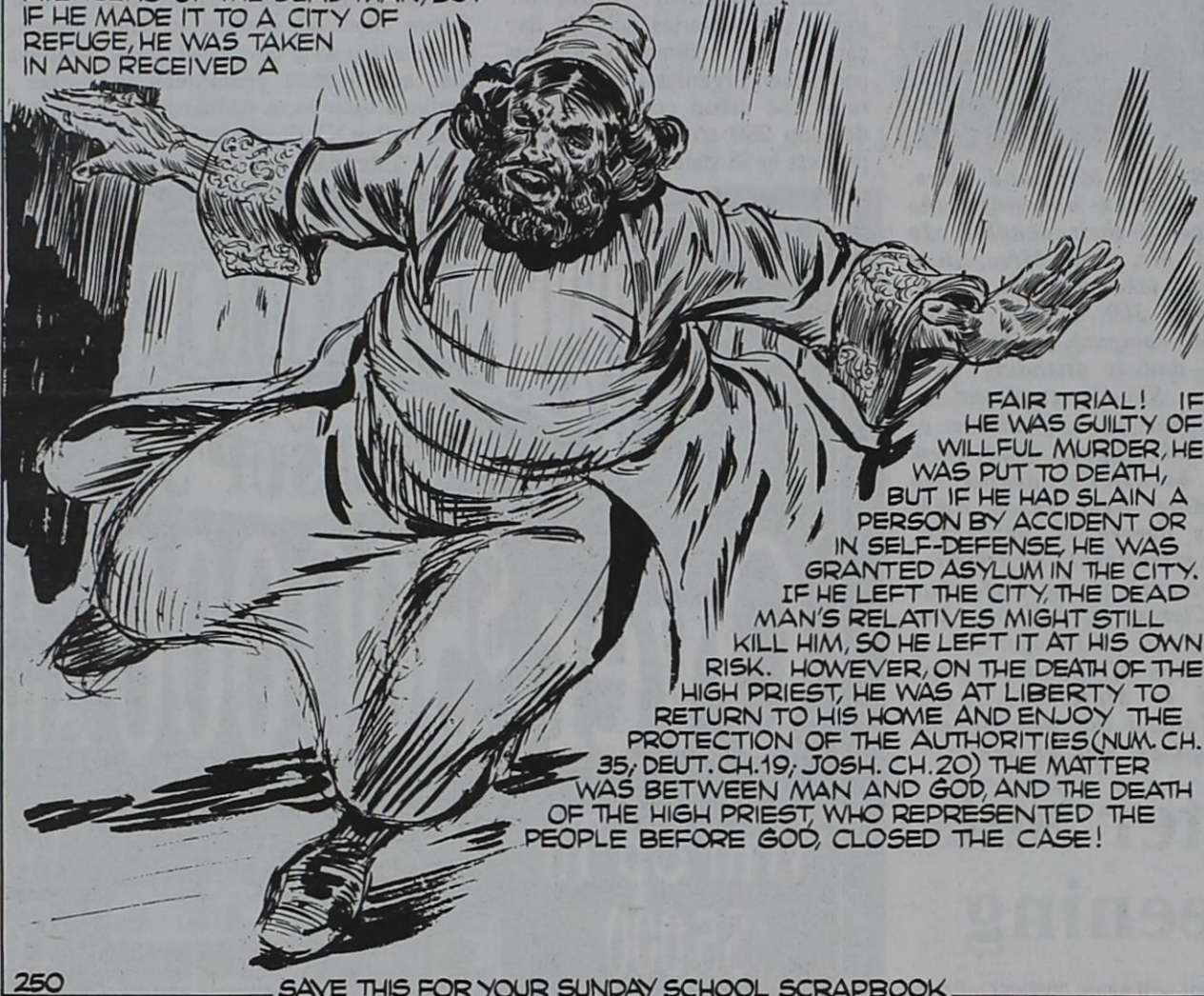

Grief saturates our society. It is all around us. We grieve over the death of a loved one, the loss of a friend, or even the loss of a pet. Grief may be initiated when one's health has rapidly deteriorated, or when an aging parent must be placed in a nursing home, or when severe injury robs us of physical abilities.

Alzheimer's disease, the necessity of one being home bound, even the necessity of being a caretaker for such a loved one, may result in bereavement of spirit.

Just now, even as I write this, one has come into my office to express deep grief and trauma. Loved ones have been inflicted with severe injuries due to an automobile accident. The doctors have given the family little hope for the survival of a grandson. We have prayed together, but only God can grant comfort and strength at a time like this.

As a pastor, I at times realize so greatly my inability to do what only God can do.

Grief follows any significant loss in life. A rape victim is terrorized by the loss of her most precious possession-- her very being and most intimate self has been violated. A sexually abused child will experience deep sorrow and traumatic guilt over the loss of innocence.

A man layed-off from his job may grieve and go into deep depression over his seeming inability to provide for his family. He may rue his loss of his manliness.

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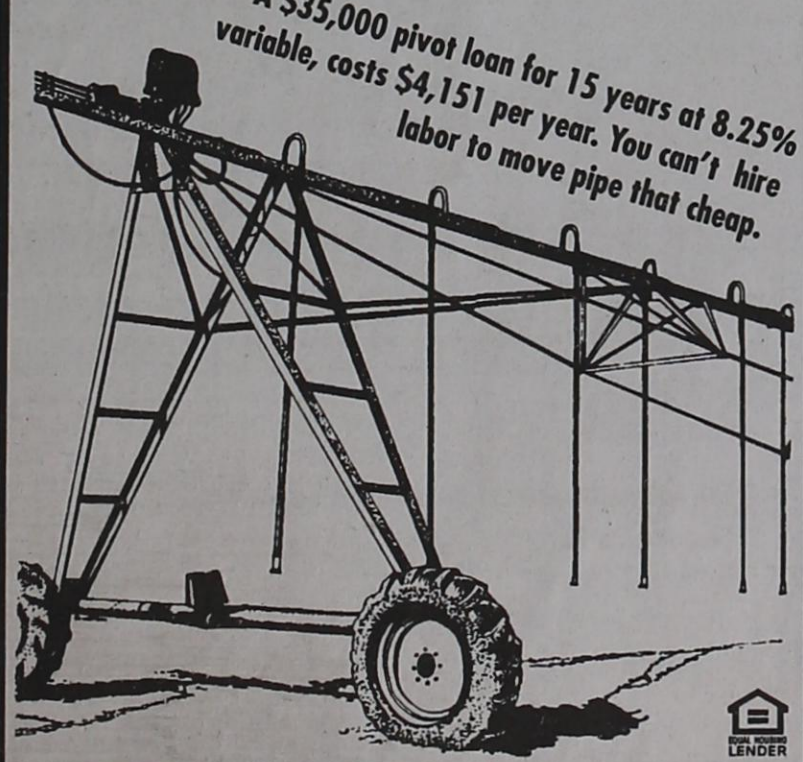

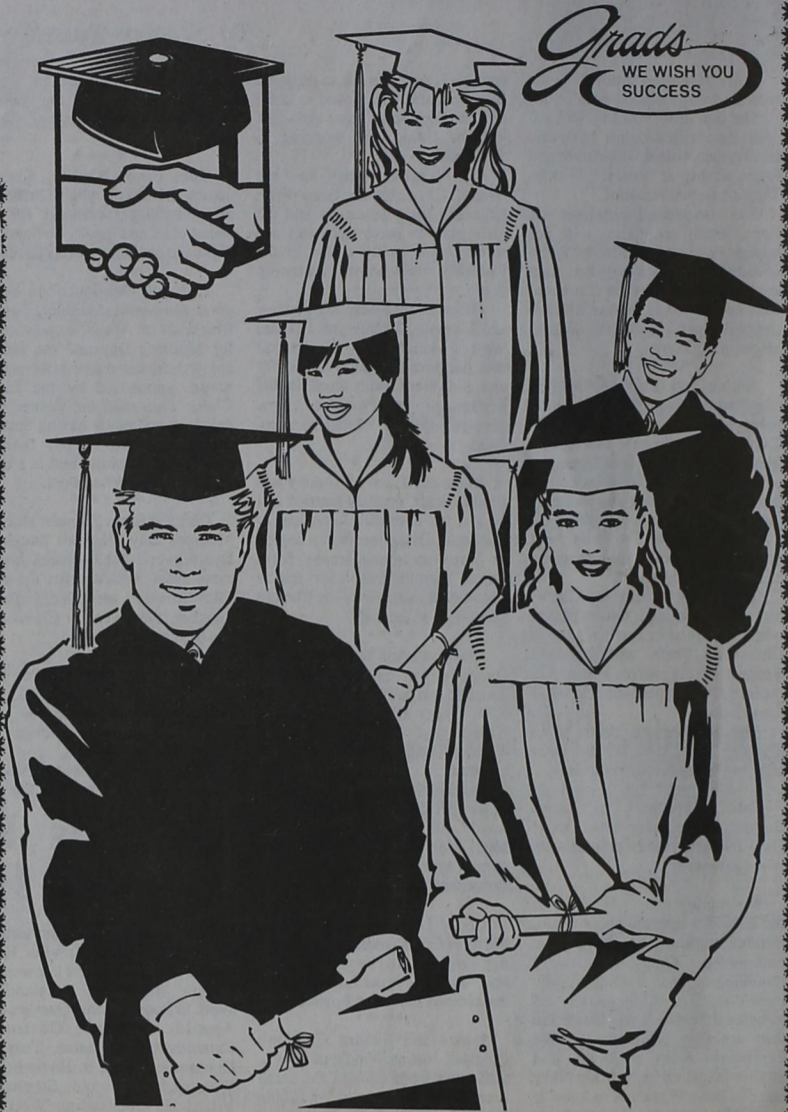

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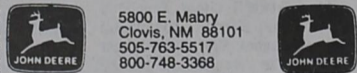
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
