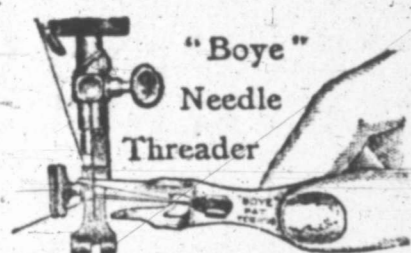

**FADS AND FASHIONS**

New York, May 4.—The latest arrivals among the spring and summer models from Paris show a remarkable lack of unanimity among the great dictators of fashion. There is no longer one autocrat who dictates to the whole world of fashion. Instead of one dictator of fashion there are now ten or more and every one of them seems to have ideas and tastes different from those of his rivals. The result of this diversity of ideas is extremely bewildering for the followers of fashion.

While one great house has gone over to medievalism and sends out moyen age models, another famous maker plus his faith to the Louis XV lines, and still others remain true to Directoire and Empire lines. Every woman may choose what best suits her taste and figure, without fear of being out of style. She may wear her waist line just under her bust, slightly above the normal waist line, at the round normal waist line, at the natural line on the sides and back, but running sharply down in front or dropped below the natural line all the way round, in true moyen age fashion.

But, after all, the Princess model may be considered the reigning one this season. The Princess frock of today, however, is not the tight-fitting, straight-line, one-piece frock of former days. It is only semi-fitted, and while it may suggest waist curves, it does not define them. Many of these models have girde or belt effects at the sides with straight front and back, and there are others in which only the front panel carries out the long lines of the Princess idea, while a waistband of some sort appears in side and back. The idea has, however, been so much in vogue for several seasons past that even an added straightness of silhouette will not give it an air of novelty, and the fashionable makers turn out their smartest princess models with unbroken lines from bust to skirt hem, or if a tunic enters into the scheme, from bust to tunic edge.

Guilpe and sleeves in the smartest imported models are of net, matching the linen material of the dress in color. There is this season a decided fancy for trimming colored linen with soutache embroidery of white rather than self color, and in such a case a little of the fine white braiding may finish the top of the colored net collar and the cuffs, even a touch of white next the face being more becoming than a color. Self-colored braiding is still used on many of the linen models, but there is something very cool and summery in the effect of the white upon the light or medium light shades of rose, yellow, green, blue and gray.

Never before were there yellow linens so lovely as those offered now, and the shops show any number of handsome linen frocks in these dull, beautiful tones, often with white embroidery for ornamentation. Linen coats

are furnished with some of the Princess models and the one-piece models whose bodice and skirt are cut separately and then joined. These latter models are simpler of achievement than the true Princess, and a safer venture for the average dressmaker. In linen and, indeed, in all the season's materials one finds this version of the one-piece frock with or without an accompanying coat.

Soutaching and other hand embroidery are the favored trimmings, though occasionally one finds a very chic little frock which, aside from guilpe and sleeves, has no trimming other than bias bands and buttons. The long straight line is usually emphasized by an embroidered front panel of some sort, but the embroidery may run down the sides rather than the front.

Large, loose separate coats are made of white serge and are comfortable things to throw on over the summer frock where additional warmth is needed and elegance is out of place. One of the most attractive models shown in the shops was an ample coat with raglan shoulders and a seam up the middle of the bias back. It buttoned down the front with large, white pearl buttons, had a shawl collar which ran down in a point in the middle back, and the sleeves were wide and open, the bottom of each turned up six or eight inches and buttoned to the sleeve with big pearl buttons. The coat was unlined and even the collar was self-faced.

Big white serge capes too are offered in the cloak departments and are made with clinging shoulder lines and very ample flare and with or without satin lined hoods. One of these capes is a most useful possession for summer wear and the price is not necessarily high, for many of the capes are unlined, and even when there is lining of soft satine the price, as a rule, is not exorbitant. It is always a great deal less than the cost of a big coat of the same quality.

The plain, stylish shirt waist, with the coat and skirt gown which goes with it, represents the acme of comfort and practical wear, and in the wardrobe of the summer girl will be seen a number of models, the materials in these ranging from board-like fibers to the finest textures.

The body portion of the practical shirt waist differs very little from those of former seasons. Many models show the old Gibson shoulder pleats, the breast pocket and plain French back, while the front tucking and fitted backs of other familiar styles are still favored. It is in the sleeves that the greatest changes have been made, and though not nearly so close as those of dressier waists, the sleeves of the favored shirt waist are decidedly close fitting. The enormously high stocks are also giving way, to a large extent, to stiff linen collars and turn-down ones of linen, muslin and embroidery, which are most becoming to a youthful throat.

Everywhere these stylish waists give delightful hints to the expert needlewoman, for hand-embroideries, hand-run tucks and drawn threads distinguish the majority. Indeed the girl handy at her 'seam' will dwell, as you might say, in the shirt waist, paradise this summer, while those unacquainted with the gentle art of the needle will have to stand outside the gates.

White linen parasols are particularly lovely this season, and the button holed edge is newer than the hem-stitched finish. The latter is more serviceable, but all idea of practicability vanishes when one sees anything so dainty as the latest arrivals in linen parasols. A particularly fetching white linen parasol shown in one of the fashionable shops had the modish button-holed edge. About a quarter of a yard above these scallops were eyelets set wide apart, through which was run a pale blue ribbon that ended at one side with a large chou of loops. Another stunning linen sunshade was of green, ornamented in the same fashion with white ribbon and a buttonholed edge done in white cotton.

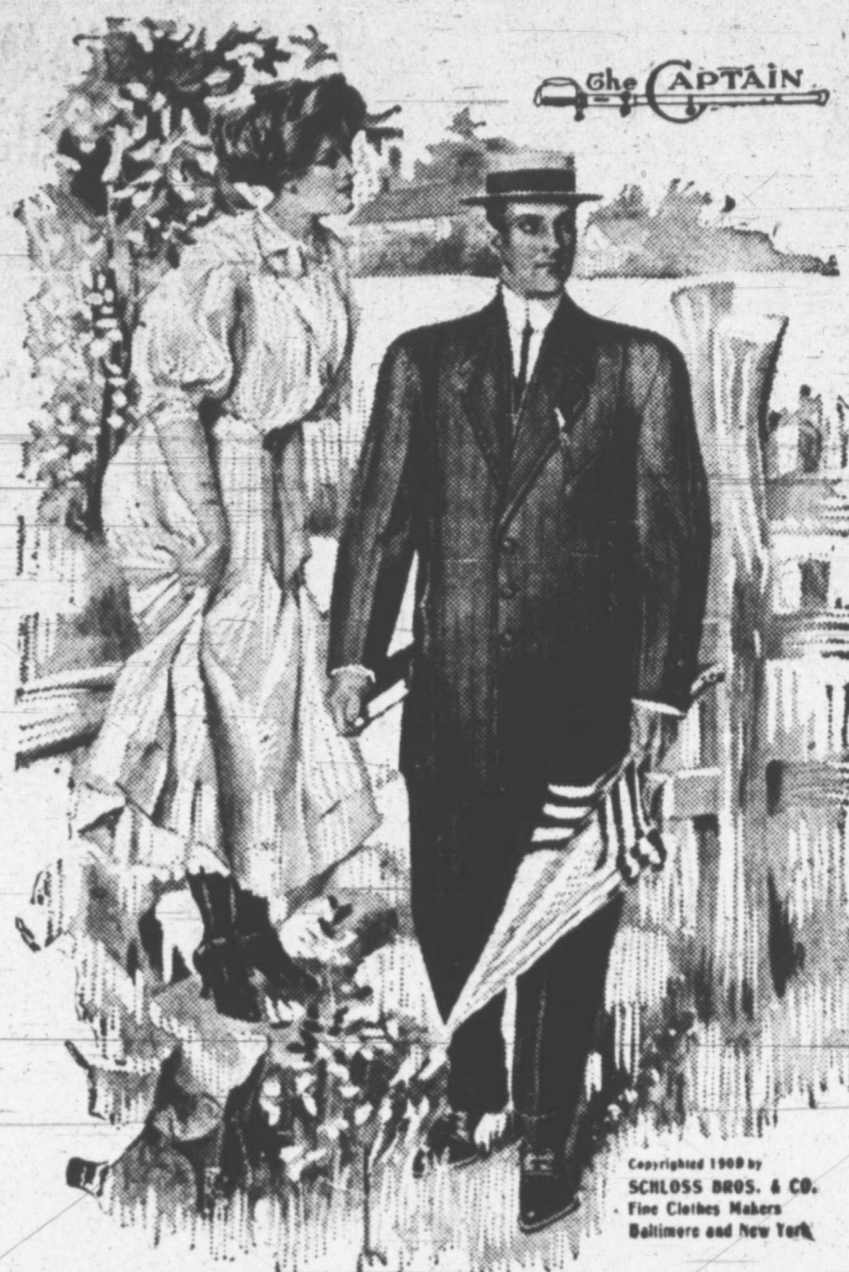
A cozy-looking garment for present wear is a negligee made from challie in a Persian pattern. There are pleats on the shoulders which afford ample fullness down the front of the skirt, and the neck is cut square Dutch. This is finished with a fold of albatross in a plain color outlined with a fancy braid. The same trimming is seen on the front edge of the gown and as a border to full, loose sleeves. The waist is defined by a loose sash of the goods. Combination colors of pink, light blue and lavender may be used.

### A LEPROSY TRAGEDY.

The Sacrifice of Kaomouna, the Hawaiian Beauty.

HER LIFE FOR HER MOTHER.

A Story Which Sheds a Bright Light Upon the Filial Devotion of Kanaka Women—The Reason a Baby's Advances Were Not Returned.

The usual Honolulu crowd was down at the dock when the steamship from San Francisco pulled alongside the pier on a brilliant, balmy afternoon in January some years ago. American women in summer afternoon costumes, a few English and a few German women of society, arrayed also for steamer day, leaned back languorously in their carriages and phaetons, under the shade of parasols, listening to the lazy complimentary talk of the duck clad, lew enwreathed young business men who combined duty with pleasure in thus waiting for the great steamer to slip laboriously into her measured berth beside the pier.

All of the Kanaka women had bare feet. They stood about in little groups as silent as the men of their race. A few of the Kanaka women carried tiny brown babies—silent also. The young women were of varying degrees of beauty, their figures showing a uniform excellence of proportion.

One of these Kanaka women at the dock on this brilliant January afternoon was particularly beautiful. She was clad like the rest of the women of her race. She was fully five feet ten inches in height, and the white silk cord with which, unlike the other Kanaka women, she drew her white dress about her waist emphasized the splendid heroic proportions of her figure. Kaomouna seemed quite unconscious of her beauty. The young shipping clerks, hurrying to and fro on the dock with their pencils behind their ears, stopped suddenly when they caught sight of her. The women in the carriages, who had not been long down from the States or from Europe, saw Kaomouna and asked the women of longer Honolulu residence, “Who is that glorious creature?” Kaomouna, with a very sad face, spoke only an occasional word to one of the Kanaka women.

The steamship was made fast to the pier, and the passengers began to troop over the gangplank. There was one man with his pretty young wife and three-year-old little girl. The little girl was the first to catch sight of Kaomouna as she reached the bottom of the gangway. She quickly freed her hand from her father's grasp and ran toward Kaomouna with baby words. Kaomouna smiled at the little girl, but did not offer to take her up. Instead she folded her arms, looking down at the little pink faced child—pleasantly. When the mother had taken the little girl she raised her eyes to look at Kaomouna.

“Did you ever in your whole life see such a perfectly beautiful woman?” asked the young wife of her husband in a whisper when he came up. “And Tita seemed to take to her immediately. If we could only have her for a nurse for Tita!”

Kaomouna heard her. “Kaomouna would love to be that,” she replied in a soft Kanaka accented speech, smiling. Then a look of pain came into her face. “But it may not be—it may not be!” And, with her hands at her eyes, Kaomouna turned suddenly and disappeared among the departing men and women of her race.

Three months later the parents of the little girl were at the dock together to witness for the first time the saddest of sights—the departure of the lepers for the island of Molokai. The Kilauea Hou, the leper steamer, was out in the stream, and the lepers were being carried out to her in barges. A litter was borne through the roped enclosure for the lepers. On it lay a very old Kanaka woman in the final stages of the disease. At the side of the litter walked Kaomouna. Her face was very sad. The parents of the little girl wondered. They spoke to an official of the Hawaiian board of health, who was busy in the task of embarking the lepers.

“Surely,” they said, “she does not accompany the lepers?”

“Who—Kaomouna?” replied the health official. “Oh, yes, she does. But it is her own choice. Kaomouna, you know, has been secreting her old mother for a number of years. We always knew there was something mysterious about Kaomouna—that is, we have known it for the last five years. She had made queer visits to a palm hut far over in the Nuuanu valley. Last week we followed her. We felt there was leprosy in it. We found her mother in the hut. Kaomouna had had her in hiding, trying to save her from Molokai, ever since the disease became evident. Kaomouna is not infected in the least. She has been careful. But she elects to follow her mother to Molokai. Extraordinary? Why, not at all! You do not understand the filial devotion of Kanaka women—men, too, for that matter. Such cases are common enough.”

The parents of the little girl looked at each other. There were tears in the mother's eyes.

“That is why she folded her arms and would not touch Tita!” she said. “In this world of God, civilized or uncivilized, could there be anything more noble?”

All was ready, and the Kilauea Hou, with Kaomouna and her mother on board, slowly started down the harbor, the Kanakas on the dock setting up the weird, plaintive death wail—Washington Star.

## EXTENSION OF NORTHWESTERN.

There has been considerable activity in Wichita Falls and Northwestern Railway circles during the past week. Many rumors are afloat that the company will not rest satisfied with making connection at Altus with the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient, but that the extension will be made at least eighty-five miles beyond Frederick to a connection with the Choctaw, Oklahoma and Gulf (Rock Island system) railway in Beckham county, Oklahoma.

The point of junction with that road at present is purely a matter of conjecture and the probable towns mentioned range from Texico on the State line as far east as Elk City.

The officers of the company are extremely reticent and say that their arrangements and plans are not far enough advanced to allow them to make any statement for publication. However, we feel justified in predicting that within a year the Northwestern will run far enough to make connection with the Choctaw division of the Rock Island, and that this line will develop more business for our city than the most optimistic citizen now believes possible.

#### FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE.

Her Summary Method of Snapping Official Red Taps.

When Florence Nightingale came, instantly a new intelligence, instinct with pity, aflame with energy, fertile with womanly invention, swept through the Scutari hospital. Clumsy male devices were dismissed, almost with a gesture, into space. Dirt became a crime, fresh air and clean linen, sweet food and soft hands a piety. A great kitchen was organized which provided well cooked food for a thousand men. Washing was a lost art in the hospital, but this band of women created, as with a breath, a great laundry, and a strange cleanliness crept along the walls and the beds of the hospital. In their warfare with disease and pain these women showed a resolution as high as the men of their race showed against the gray coated battalions of Inkerman or in the frozen trenches before Sebastopol. Muddle headed male routine was swept ruthlessly aside.

If the commissariat failed to supply requisites, Florence Nightingale, who had great funds at her disposal, instantly provided them herself, and the heavy footed officials found the swift feet of these women outrunning them in every path of help and pity. Only one flash of anger is reported to have broken the serene calm which served as a mask for the steel-like and resolute will of Florence Nightingale. Some stores had arrived from England; sick men were languishing for them. But routine required that they should be inspected by a board before being issued, and the board, moving with heavy footed slowness, had not completed its work when night fell. The stores were, therefore, with official phlegm, locked up and their use denied to the sick. Between the needs of hundreds of sick men and the convention they required was the locked labor, the symbol of red tape. Florence Nightingale called a couple of orderlies, walked to the door and quietly ordered them to burst it open and the stores to be distributed!—Cornhill Magazine.

## OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

All canned fruit should be kept in a cool, dark place.

Vinegar pickles will not keep in a jar in which any greasy substance had been kept.

Drop a lump of sugar among the turnips while cooking; it improves them wonderfully.

Lemon juice, applied with a camel's hair brush, night and morning will remove freckles of not too long standing.

When a lemon is halved or quartered and left unused, a tumbler over it, protecting it from air, will keep it from drying or molding for several days.

When cooking mush for fried mush do not cook as long as for eating, but pour into a deep pan after stirring ten minutes. When cold dip the slices in beaten egg and they will fry crisp.

A loaf of stale bread may be made to taste like newly baked if it is dipped in cold water for a few moments, and then put into a pan and rebaked for three quarters of an hour in a moderate oven.

An excellent lotion to whiten the skin is made of one-fourth ounce of white rose leaves steeped in one-fourth pint each of fresh lemon juice and brandy for three hours. Press, strain and decant. Do not apply oftener than once a day.

For ordinary use the best polish for furniture is a mixture of equal quantities of turpentine and paraffine oil. This should be rubbed on a woolen cloth, the surface being polished with a soft woolen cloth and finally with a piece of linen.

An excellent cream for massage and for softening the skin on face and hands is made according to the following recipe: Take pure white wax one-eighth of an ounce, spermacetone ounce and one-quarter; sweet almond oil one ounce and a one-quarter, and rosewater three-fourths of an ounce.

To make furniture look like new, dissolve one-fourth of a cake of soap in boiling water, add it to a pail of warm water, in which put two tablespoonfuls of kerosene. Stir thoroughly and then wash the furniture with a soft cloth moistened in the compound. Wipe dry with a clean, soft cloth, rubbing gently.

Nickel and steel articles are best polished by using emery powder mixed with a tablespoonful of sweet oil and a tablespoonful of turpentine. Use enough of the powder to make a thin paste and apply with a flannel. Finish with a piece of flannel cloth dipped in a little of the dry powder, which should be very fine.

Even a severe bilious attack may be overcome by taking the juice of one or two lemons in a goblet of water before retiring, and in the morning before rising. When taken on an empty stomach the lemon has an opportunity to work on the system. The use of the remedy should be continued at least for several weeks.

The best thing to do if you happen to overboil potatoes is to drain off the water as much as possible. Put them, still in the saucepan, but without the lid, over the fire and stir with a wooden spoon till the water has evaporated and the potatoes become floury. Mash them until no lumps are left. Add salt, pepper, a lump of butter or dripping and a little milk. Mix and beat well and serve as mashed potatoes.

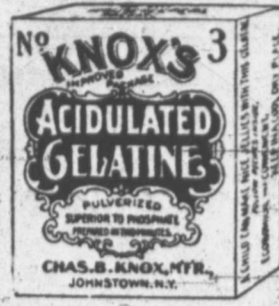

## A FAMOUS PLAYHOUSE

Old Drury Lane Has Outlived Many Vicissitudes.

### A PHENIX AMONG THEATERS.

London's Home of Pantomime Has Been the Scene of Many Conflagrations—Attacks Upon Royalty Within Its Walls—The "Rejected Addresses."

On the night of Feb. 24, 1809, as the house of commons was engaged upon a rather important debate, sundry of the members observed through the windows a faint red glow which eventually became so alarming in its intensity as to interfere with the orderly course of the discussion. It was not long before the news ran round the benches that Drury Lane theater was alight, and so great was the general concern at what was considered almost a national disaster that a motion was made to adjourn the sitting. Sheridan, however, as Moore tells us in his life of the great orator, immediately expressed the hope—with an air of detachment that did him the greatest credit, considering his position as principal shareholder in the theater—that "whatever might be the extent of the present calamity it would not interfere with the public business of the country." That his courage was not daunted by so serious a personal disaster was proved by the fact that he reopened a week later at the Lyceum.

The destruction of "The Lane"—the third building since its foundation in 1603—was one of seven familiar disasters to London theaters in twenty years; but, whatever else happened, Drury Lane must be rebuilt. Nor was the decision on the part of the proprietors unbusinesslike in the least degree, for Horace Walpole, under the date of 1751, tells us how on the day appointed for the nationalization bill "the house of commons adjourned to attend at Drury Lane, where 'Othello' was acted by a Mr. Debanal and his family.

Drury Lane has passed through many vicissitudes in the course of its existence. The first building was very unfavorably described by Pepys, who writes of the discomfort caused by rain that found its way through the roof and drenched the occupants of the pit and also the bad acoustic qualities of the place. Fire put an end to these inconveniences in 1672. The second theater, which was designed by Wren and opened in 1674, had a much longer life, but was on two occasions the scene of attempts upon the royal family. In 1716 Freeman tried to shoot the Prince of Wales, who afterward became King George II., and in 1809 George III. was the victim of a similar unsuccessful attack at the hands of a lunatic. It was this same building which, as Walpole relates in one of his letters, was the scene of a lively disturbance in 1744, when an attempt was made to introduce pantomime for the first time. So great has been the change of popular sentiment on this point since that far off date that today winter in London without pantomime at Drury Lane is almost incredible.

The third building, which was opened in 1794, came to an untimely end, as we have seen, in 1809, and the inauguration of its successor, three years later was marked by an event of considerable literary importance. The managers of the theater, being desirous of giving their new venture a good send-off, invited the public to submit to competition suitable prologues, the prize poem to have the honor of being publicly recited from the stage upon the day of opening. A host of writers, including many of the best known names in contemporary literature, responded to the invitation, and this fact fortunately suggested to two brothers, James and Horace Smith, who were beginning to acquire a reputation in the world of letters, the notion of publishing anonymously a collection of prologues parodying the styles of various living writers of repute. As it was necessary that the little volume should be issued in time for the opening of the theater, the authors were compelled to complete their task in six weeks, but it is doubtful whether the quality of the work suffered much on this account. Indeed, in the preface to the eighteenth edition, published in 1833, it is suggested that the parodies gained rather than lost in effectiveness by being struck off, as it were, at a white heat.

The success of "The Rejected Addresses" was immediate and lasting. The two brothers found that they had leaped into fame at a bound, and the famous authors whom they had so successfully held up to kindly ridicule expressed their astonishment at the accuracy with which their peculiarities of style and expression had been reproduced. It was a notable achievement. Byron, whose prologue won the prize and was delivered in due course on the Drury Lane stage, writing to Murray, expressed his appreciation of the little volume that had made such a stir in the world and in a second letter told him that he liked it "better and better." Jeffrey in 1843 wrote that he took "The Rejected Addresses" to be the very best imitations (and often of difficult originals) that ever were made. But perhaps the comment which pleased the authors the most was that of a Lincolnshire clergyman (quoted in the preface of 1833) to the effect that he did not see why they should have been rejected. Indeed, he thought some of them very good. The reverend gentleman displayed "a plentiful lack of humor in this pronouncement, but there will be few even today to quarrel with his judgment.—London Globe.
