HOUR IS AT HAND

NO REPORT HAS YET COME FROM FREE CONFERENCE COMMIT-TEE ON BANK GUARANTY.

Fake Message Purported to Be From the Governor Has the House at White Heat.

Austin, Tex., May 11.—Already on edge, the house was thrown into consternation and arose to a white heat this morning by practical jokers who delivered a message as coming from Governor Campbell, which warmly denounced the legislature for passing an unsatisfactory bank deposit guaranty amount in excess of any previous appropriation measure. The message said he would like to send the lawmakers home, but his duty to the people required him to keep the legislature in session all summer, as he proposed to veto the bank guaranty and appropriation bills and that a special session would be called immediately.

COMES UP TODAY

Chicago, Ill., May 11.—Before Judges Grosscup, Baker and Seaman, in the United States Circuit Court of Appeals, arguments were begun today in the apneal of John R. Walsh, who was convicted some time ago of misapplying the funds of the Chicago National Bank, of which he was president.

That Walsh intends to keep up a vigcrous fight for his freedom is evidenced by the fact that he has retained David Rroms-City National Bank Building S. Rose, mayor of Milwaukee and one of the acknowledged leaders of the Milwaukee bar, as associate counsel with John S. Miller, the eminent Chicago lawyer who has had charge of Walsh's case from the start, If all efforts of counsel fail, then the former banker and railroad president must serve his sentence of five years in the Federal prison at Fort Leavenworth.

Public litterest in the Walsh case was revived a week or so ago when the name of the former president of the Chicago National bank was brought out in the re-investigation in the affairs of Peter Van Vlissingen, the Chicago real estate man, who was sent to prison for forgeries aggregating nearly \$2,000,000. But whether Mr. Walsh had a knowledge of the Van Vlissingen forgeries prior to the public exposure of the real estate man's misdeeds, as other men of more or less prominence in Chicago financial circles are alleged to have had, did not develop at the hearing.

Walsh is believed to have but a meager remnant left of his once large forhis own downfall and since then he has see me. seen the two Indiana railroads for which he made such great control of others. Until the crash came he was reckoned among the shrewdest financiers in the West. Starting his career as a homeless news boy he had grown to be a millimaire several times over. But his ambition to become a railroad magnate finally Plans and Specifications Furnished got the better of his judgment, and eventually brought about his ruina-

The grand jury investigation which led to his indictment showed amazing conditions of rottenness in Walsh's bank. It was charged that he put the bank's money into his pocket in amounts exceeding \$100,000 at a time. In four years he realized nearly \$3,-000,000 on ''memorandum notes'' alleged to have been fraudulently issued.
