Let the People Rule.

The city of Lincoln, Neb., has gone "dry" by a majority of 349. Two years ago it voted for license upon the pledge of the excise board that the saloons would be closed at 7 p. m. This year the excise board promised to close the saloons at 6:30 in case the license system was endorsed, but the voters have by a decisive majority declared against the saloon.

LET THE PEOPLE RULE!

The change in sentiment that has taken place since the question was last submitted is due to several causes, among which may be mentioned two. In the first place, there is a growth in the temperance sentiment all over the country. The use of liquor as a beverage is being more and more condemned. The moral awakening upon which the nation is entering is making both the individual and the public conscience more sensitive. Christians are giving increased recognition to the fact that they cannot afford to set an example which may lead weaker persons astray, even if they themselves are strong enough to drink with moderation.

But the temperance sentiment has grown for a second reason, namely, because of the officious and offensive interference of the liquor interests in politics. The brewers' lobby disgusted the people of Lincoln during the last session of the Nebraska legislature. It defeated the submission of the initiative and referendum on the ground that it might be used to submit a prohibition amendment. Instead of being content to satisfy a demand and sell when the people of a community want to buy, the liquor interests attempt to control legislation and to run the politics of local communities, not to speak of their encouragement of lawlessness. This will not be tolerated long. The saloon is bad enough at its best; it becomes unbearable when it sets itself up as a political dictator and attempts to defeat popular government.

In Lincoln hostility to the saloon is increased by the fact that the city is an educational center, being the temporary home of several thousand students. Many who might otherwise vote for saloons feel that Lincoln, in return for the advantages brought to the city by the university, should as far as possible shield the student from the temptations that lead the young astray. Few cities of the size of Lincoln have voted saloons out, but others are apt to do so, especially if those who are peculiarly interested in the liquor traffic continue to disregard both law and morals.—Bryan's Commoner.

ELECTION ORDER.

WHEREAS, The Trustees of the Wichita Falls Independent School District as incorporated by a special act of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Texas, approved March 7th, 1909, acting under and by virtue of the authority conferred by said act deem it advisable to submit to the qualified voters in said district the question of whether or not an annual ad valorem tax of fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of all taxable property in said District shall be levied and collected for the purpose of maintaining the public free schools in said district, and further deem it advisable to submit to said qualified voters of said district, the proposition as to whether or not the bonds of said district hereinafter described shall be issued for the purposes hereinafter mentioned.

THEREFORE, It is hereby ordered by the said Board of Trustees of the said Wichita Falls Independent School District that an election be held on the 18th day of May, 1909, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted:

First. Shall a tax of fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of all taxable property in said district be levied and collected annually by the Board of Trustees of said District for the purpose of maintaining the public free schools in said district, and for the erection and equipment of public free school buildings in said district?

Second. Shall the Board of Trustees of the Wichita Falls Independent School District be authorized to issue the bonds of said Wichita Falls Independent School District in the sum of Sixty Thousand Dollars, payable in forty years after date, with option of redeeming same at any time after ten years from date, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable annually, and to levy a tax of sixteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of all taxable property in said district to provide for the payment of the interest on said bonds annually and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of the erection and equipment of public free school buildings in said district?

Said election shall be held at the New City Hall at the corner of Ohio avenue and Ninth street in the City of Wichita Falls, in Wichita county, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers to hold said election: J. P. Jones, Presiding Judge; F. H. Denison, Assistant Judge; and H. M. Cauble and J. R. Carrico, Clerks of said election.

Said election shall be held as provided in said special act of the Thirty-First Legislature above referred to and only qualified voters, who are property tax payers of said Wichita Falls Independent School District shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who desire to support the proposition to levy and collect an annual ad valorem tax of fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of all taxable property in said District for the purpose of maintaining the public free schools in said District and the erection and equipment of school buildings in said district, shall have printed or written on their ballots the words "For the Tax," and those opposed to said proposition shall have printed or written on their ballots the words "Against the Tax."

All voters desiring to support the proposition to issue the bonds as hereinafter fully set out and described shall have printed or written on their ballots the words "For the Issuance of Bonds," and those opposed to said proposition to issue bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "Against the Issuance of bonds."

The manner of holding said election and making returns thereof shall be governed by the provisions of said special act of the legislature above referred to, and by the laws of the State of Texas when not otherwise provided for in said special act.

A copy of this order signed by the President of said Wichita Falls Independent School District shall serve as a proper notice of said election, and the President of said Board of Trustees of said District is hereby directed to cause said notice to be posted at three public places in said Wichita Falls Independent School District for at least 20 days prior to the date of holding said election, and also by publishing a copy thereof in some newspaper published in the City of Wichita Falls, Texas, once in each week for three successive weeks prior to said election.

OUR SECOND BIRTHDAY.

With yesterday's issue the Times, as a daily paper, completed its second year, the first issue having appeared on Tuesday, May 14, 1907. (The reason for issuing the first paper on the second workday of the week instead of the first was that, after having made everything ready except fixing the date line, it was discovered by consulting the calendar, that Monday was the 13th.) Notwithstanding this general superstition about the 13th being an unlucky day, and the Times' adherence to that superstition, it has had its full measure of bad luck and accidents, but of that it shall not speak.

At the beginning the gentlemen who subscribed for stock in the company did so wholly through a spirit of public enterprise—to give Wichita Falls an Associated Press daily paper, and did not expect to receive even the interest on their money. In this respect they have been agreeably surprised. The paper has paid two annual ten percent dividends and the book value of the stock is considerably above par today. While but a few merchants subscribed for stock in the company, all of them have been generous patrons and well wishers of the enterprise, and to them in a very large degree is due the splendid success of the paper. The Times, at the outset, adopted as its mission the upbuilding of Wichita Falls and since the city has nearly doubled in population and wealth since it was started, the Times flatters itself that its work along that line has not been in vain: It has given to every enterprise which demanded a bonus liberally, and has no regrets to offer for a single dollar expended along that line. For the very generous patronage it has enjoyed almost constantly from the very first day it was issued, the Times feels thankful. It has done its utmost to give value received, and judging by the fact that in nearly every instance its great number of patrons have prospered, the Times feels that it has succeeded in doing that.

Again thanking its patrons for the generous patronage bestowed upon it during the past two years, the Times greets its readers with the first number of the third year of its existence—Volume 3, No. 1.

The thirty-first legislature has adjourned, the governor seems satisfied, and there is little likelihood of a second extra session. The following general bills, besides the general deficiency bills were passed at this session: To guarantee bank deposits both by the assessment and bond plans. Empowering the railroad commission to order the maintenance of union passenger depots where more than one road operates and to require the maintenance of comfortable depots at all stations. Amending the teachers' certificate law. Providing for the completion of the penitentiary railroad into Palestine and declaring it to be the policy of the State that said road be sold as soon as possible. Lending the penitentiary board \$100,000 with which to resume operation of the iron furnace at Rusk. Providing a license of \$1.75 for hunting outside of county of one's residence or counties adjacent to such county, and of \$15 upon nonresidents of the State. Authorizing surety companies to form associations for the maintenance of rates subject to approval by the commissioner of insurance. Providing for the refunding of State bonds maturing in 1910. Prohibiting officers and directors of life insurance companies from receiving commissions contingent upon the writing of business, and providing for additional reserves to cover the assumption of extra hazardous risks. Providing that licenses for the sale of "frosty" shall not authorize the sale of such beverage in more than one place. Authorizing cities not operating under special charters to levy taxes for street and sidewalk improvements. Extending for two years the time in which lands sold for taxes may be redeemed. Providing that election contests may be appealed from the executive committee to the district court in vacation, and requiring that election supervisors shall see that the ballots of illiterate voters are properly marked by the judge of the election. Aside from the above, a number of independent district school district creating bills, judicial district changing bills and local road law bills were passed.

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THE MISSISSIPPI INCIDENT.
Captain John C. Fremont, commander of the battleship Mississippi, now ascending the famous stream of that name, gave expression to a sentiment that should shame out of existence the last vestige of sectional hate surviving the late unfortunate struggle between the North and South, when in response to a telegraphic request from the Charleston News and Courier as to whether or not, as commander of the battleship, he objects to the engravings of Jefferson Davis on the silver service to be presented to the vessel by the State of Mississippi, he replied: "The navy is without sectional prejudice, and its patriotism knows no bounds save those of the great country at large."

Commenting on this manly expression, the New York Commercial says: "The words of a patriot and a true American! And it is significant that he prudently avoided a direct personal reply to the question—'for whether he objects to the decorations on the service or not, he has no authority or jurisdiction in the matter; he commands the Mississippi today, but tomorrow some other officer of the United States navy may command her; and the gift is to the battleship—that is, the United States government—and the navy department alone can interpose

Let in the Air and Sunshine.

Churches should give more attention to ventilation during services. Thousands of people go home from church every Sunday with bursting headaches. Many, perhaps the vast majority, know not that the cause of their disorder is the breathing vitiated air that has been inhaled and exhaled so often until it is so foul as to be totally unfit to longer sustain animal life. In the great economy of nature this de-oxygenized air is the very life and sustenance of plant life, but should never be imposed on animals, much less sensitive human beings. If the temperature is not too high they seem to see no use in fresh air. The hundreds of Sunday School people have already used up practically all the life giving element in the air and all that remains is deadly poison to the human system. Instead of opening the windows to get a fresh supply of oxygen they remain closed as tight as possible with the result that many go home, virtually sick, from an experience that should have been refreshing only. In many churches this imposition is certain and so great that intelligent people go to church with positive dread, well knowing that they will go home with a headache. This is a trouble easily righted if the church authorities will only learn the simple lesson, that no public building should ever be used for the assembling of people without several windows being open, no matter what the temperature may be.

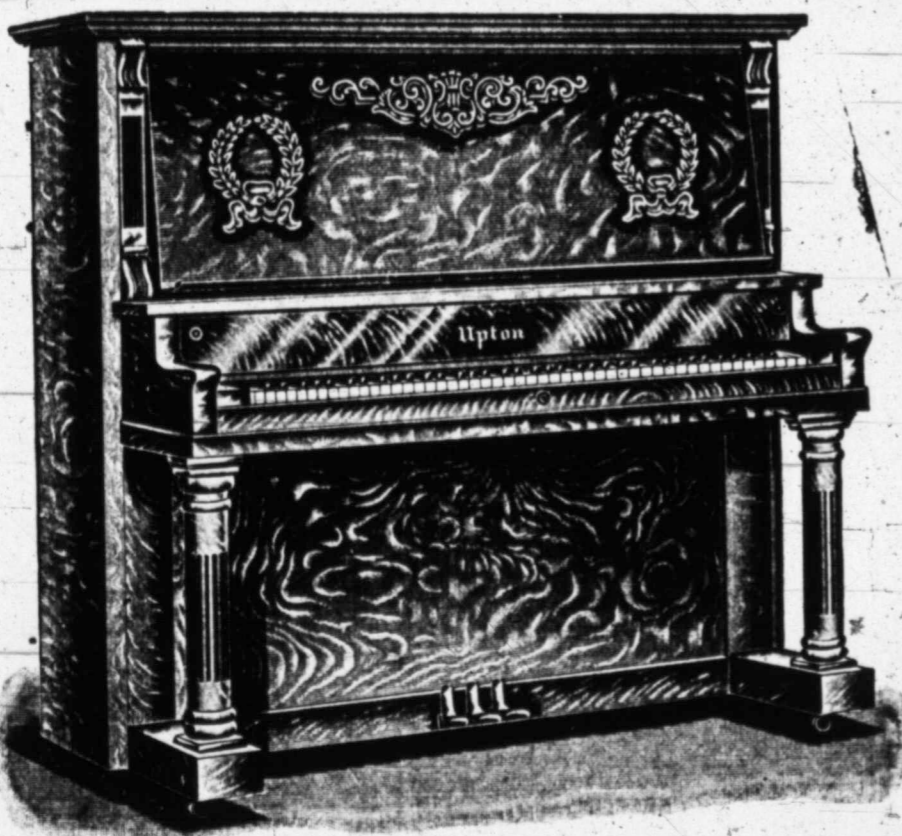

Wichita Mill and Elevator Co. Orders 370-Horse Power Gas Engine. On yesterday an order was placed with the Buckeye Engine Co., Salem, Ohio, for a 370-horse power natural gas engine which is to be shipped within the next sixty days, and which is to take the place and do the work of that concern's 275-horse power Corliss engine. On the arrival of the engine, or perhaps before, an extra engine room will be constructed in which the new engine is to be installed. At present the plant is using crude oil as a fuel, but the management figures that to substitute natural gas at 9 cents per 1000 feet instead of oil as a fuel will result in a great saving to the company. The milling company is the first manufacturing plant in Wichita Falls to adopt natural gas as a fuel, but others are contemplating making the change and doubtless will within the next year. The natural gas field is being developed and widened very rapidly, and from present indications it will not be a great while until manufacturing enterprises in this city will be given the opportunity of using natural gas at just about one-half its present price.
