WICHITA FALLS FACTORY PROPOSITION.

Wichita Falls is one of the liveliest propositions in the Southwest, and is not hesitating to bring into practical play her every natural resource, as well as every advantage of other good fortune. One of the latest attractions held up before the eyes of the manufacturer is 10-cent manufacturing gas. With this handy fuel at so low a price, and with railway facilities of the very best sort, there should be something doing in the line of the tin bucket brigade at Wichita Falls.—Texas Trade Review and Industrial Record.

If Wichita Falls turns down the paving bond issue such reference as is frequently being made as above will cease to be printed. These live wire references by newspapers and periodicals are valuable publicity assets and attract the attention of men who do things.

TOMORROW'S ELECTIONS.

At tomorrow's elections, which are to be held at the city hall, the ticket to be voted for in the independent school district election will read as follows:

For the Tax.
Against the Tax.
For the Issuance of Bonds.
Against the Issuance of Bonds.
In this connection it might be well enough to say that the district is allowed to levy 50 cents on the \$100 valuation an oil taxable property in it, and no more, and unless the tax is levied it will be impossible to have public schools.

A portion of this 50 cent school tax will be set aside to pay interest and create a sinking fund to pay off the \$60,000 worth of school bonds, which proposition is to be voted on at the same time and place as the 50 cents school tax proposition. Both propositions will be printed on the same ticket. If the school bonds are not voted and the school tax carries, the tax will be just the same as if the bond issue had carried, as it will require at least a 50-cent tax on all property in the district to maintain the schools, therefore those who favor the tax should also favor the issuance of the bonds, and make their tickets accordingly.

On the other hand, those who do not favor the issuance of the bonds, in order to make their votes count, should draw a pencil mark through the lines, "For the Tax" and "Against the Issuance of Bonds."

At the same time and place another election is to be held to decide whether street paving bonds to the amount of \$17,000, to draw interest at the rate of 4 1/2 per cent per annum shall be issued. These bonds are to be in denominations of \$1000 each and are to run for forty years. This ticket will be worded as follows:

For the Issuance of Bonds.
Against the Issuance of Bonds.
The voter will draw a pencil mark through one or the other lines, according to the way he intends to vote.

All qualified voters who are taxpayers (by this is meant those who pay taxes on real or personal property) are entitled to vote in both the school district and city elections.

The polls open at 8 a. m. and close at 6 p. m.

The election for the issuance of street paving bonds will be held in the office of the mayor and the school district election in the council chamber at the city hall.

To correct a wrong impression, the Times will say for the information of the voter that in the event the \$17,000 worth of street paving bonds are voted, the money realized from the sale of these bonds will be used for no other purpose other than for paving the streets where they cross each other, and where the alleys cross the streets. The owners of abutting property will be required to pay for the paving of the street to the center in front of their property, and unless they do this voluntarily, or for any cause do not see fit to comply with the ordinance there need be no fear that the city will put the paving down in front of their property and charge the expense of same to the property owner, for the simple reason the city is financially unable to do the work and carry the account on its books against the property for five years. In other words, property owners who do not wish to put down the paving will not be forced to do it.

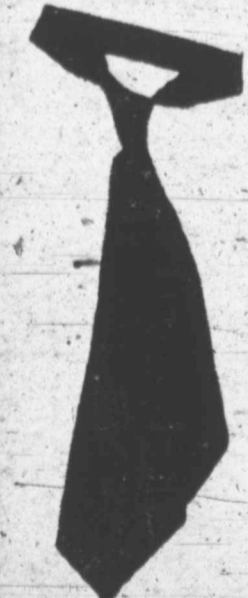

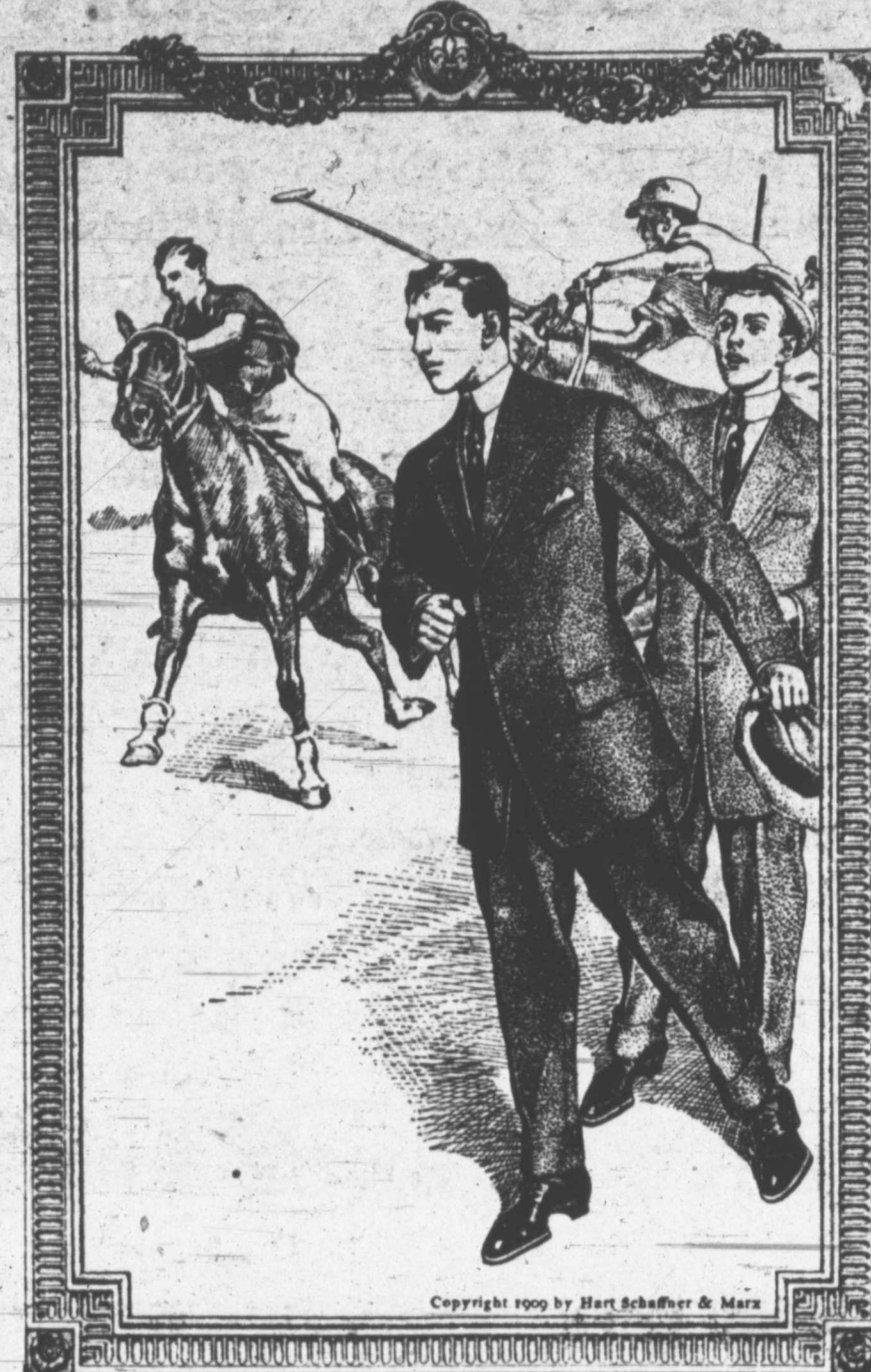
