## BANK IS LOOTED; PEOPLE LOOK ON

### ROBBERS AT SHAWNEE CARRY LOOT THROUGH STREETS WITHOUT MOLESTATION.

## SUSPENDED FROM A POLE

### In a Sack They Carried Away \$1300 in Cash—Citizens Watch From Windows.

Shawnee, Kan., May 17.—With practically the entire population watching them from darkened windows and shady trees, two bandits walked out of Shawnee at 3 o'clock this morning carrying between \$1,200 and \$1,300 in cash, which they secured from the Shawnee State Savings Bank, after the safe had been shattered by three charges of nitroglycerine.

No one molested the robbers in the least and they were allowed to escape with the loot.

The robbers fled out of the bank carrying a sack which was suspended from a pole, and without the least trepidation marched beyond the city limits where they got in a buggy and drove toward Kansas City.

### Map Showing Land Renditions.

Fort Worth, Tex., May 18.—The Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association has just issued a Texas Map, showing by counties the average rendered value of land per acre, 1907 and 1908. It is issued for the information of property owners, tax assessors, boards of equalization and others interested in equalizing taxation as between the different counties. The explanatory notes on the map read in part:

The purpose of the map is to show comparative information of the average rendered value of land per acre as between the different counties in 1907 and 1908. The figures shown first in each county give the average rendered value of land in dollars and cents, per acre, for 1908 and the second figures give the same information for 1907.

It was first attempted to show the average assessed value of land per acre and the average true value of land per acre in each county, so that the tax assessor could have a practical basis for enforcing full rendition, but no official records were available showing the true value of land per acre in each county and the effort had to be abandoned.

A study of the map shows Ellis county to be the center of increase in the rendered value of land per acre, 1908 over 1907. This increase diminishes rapidly with the distance in all directions from Ellis county and as it nears the eastern, western and southern borders of the State it is lost entirely, without exceptions.

There are eight counties in the State that have increased their assessment \$10 per acre and over in 1908, as compared with 1907. There are sixteen counties that have more than doubled their assessment of 1907, compared with 1908.

There are thirty-six counties that show a decrease in assessment of land, compared with 1907.

The map is for free distribution and can be secured on application to the Secretary of the Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association in this city.

## WASHBURN APPOINTED CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSIONER.

By Associated Press. Washington, D. C., May 18.—President Taft today announced the nomination of W. L. Washburn for civil service commissioner, vice James Williams, resigned. Washburn was for years a civil service commission employee here and served as civil service commissioner in the Philippines under Taft.

The president also sent to the senate the nomination of Walter Clark, a Washington newspaper man, as governor of Alaska, to succeed Governor Hoggatt, resigned; also the nomination of Charles Hoag of Oklahoma receiver of public moneys at Woodward, Oklahoma.

## JAPAN WILL SEND WARSHIPS TO THE BEHRING SEAS.

## COTTON SEED CRUSHERS MEET AT MEMPHIS, TENN.

By Associated Press. Memphis, Tenn., May 18.—The Interstate Cotton Seed Crushers' Association convened in its thirteenth annual convention here today. Approximately 800 delegates are attending. The opening session was devoted to preliminary routine incident to organization, the addresses of welcome and the reading of official reports.

Governor Patterson welcomed the delegates on behalf of the State and Mayor Malone in behalf of the city. Responses were made by Joe Allison of Ennis, Texas, and J. G. Hamilton.

## NEW YORK BABIES FOR HOUSTON HOMES.

New Orleans, La., May 18.—A carload of a hundred infant boys and girls will reach Houston from New York Friday and will be distributed among families who have made application for the babies. Over five hundred applications for children were received from Houston and vicinity. Trained nurses are in charge of the car.

## SHAWNEE ELECTRIC CO. CHARTERED AT GUTHRIE.

Texas News Service Special. Guthrie, Ok., May 18.—A charter was taken out today by C. T. Edwards, who built the Dallas-Fort Worth electric railway, for the Shawnee Electric Railway Company with a capital of \$100,000. The company will build an interurban from Shawnee to Muskogee and from Shawnee to Oklahoma City. The total cost is approximately \$4,000,000.

## \$250,000 BOND ISSUE OF W. F. AND N. W. REGISTERED.

Texas News Service Special. Austin, Tex., May 18.—The issue of \$250,000 five per cent bonds of the Wichita Falls and Northwestern railroad in lieu of temporary bonds, was registered today by the Secretary of State.

## NEW COMPRESS IS A CERTAINTY

### MACHINERY FOR NEW PRESS ORDERED FOR IMMEDIATE SHIPMENT.

## STOCK IS SUBSCRIBED

### Site Purchased and New Press Will Be Built at Once.

That Wichita Falls will have a second compress is a certainty. Announcement was made today that the machinery had been ordered for immediate shipment, the site purchased and \$31,000 of the capital stock subscribed.

The press was bought from the Webb Press Company and is of the latest type and of the largest pattern made. A part of the machinery is expected to arrive in about ten days and work will begin immediately. The platform will be 200x300 feet in dimensions.

The stock holders in the new enterprise are for the most part cotton firms doing business at this point.

### LUMBERMEN EFFECT COMPROMISE WITH RAILROADS.

Texas News Service Special. New Orleans, La., May 18.—It was announced today that the Texas lumbermen had reached a compromise with the southern trunk lines which they had sued for excessive rates on shipments. Several million dollars was involved, it was alleged, for overcharges. The roads will settle on a basis of seventy-five per cent. Southeastern Texans will profit by the compromise.

### STREET CAR COMPANY ORDERED TO DO SPRINKLING.

Texas News Service Special. Waco, Tex., May 18.—The city commission created a stir here this morning when it ordered the Citizens' Street Railway Company to sprinkle all streets on which its cars run. This will compel the company to sprinkle thirty miles of streets and it is protesting vigorously.

### Heavy Rain at San Antonio.

Texas News Service Special. San Antonio, Tex., May 18.—A heavy electric storm broke over this city this morning, accompanied by much rain. Cattle are reported killed by the hail east of here. Great damage was done to property.

### Heavy Damage at Nacogdoches.

Texas News Service Special. Nacogdoches, Tex., May 18.—A severe hail storm swept this section early this morning, damaging corn, stripping cotton and beating the crops into the ground.

### Heavy Rain at Denison.

Texas News Service Special. Denison, Tex., May 18.—The drought of several weeks duration was broken by a heavy rain here this morning.

### Damage at Van Alstyne.

Texas News Service Special. Van Alstyne, Tex., May 18.—Great damage is reported today, as the result of a storm which struck this vicinity last night. A heavy rain was accompanied by hail as large as hens' eggs. Small grain was damaged and peaches were beaten from the trees.

### Drought Broken at Gainesville.

Texas News Service Special. Gainesville, Tex., May 18.—An inch of rain fell here this morning and was the first downpour since November. The rainfall was general over Cooke county.

### BEAUMONT HORSEMEN ARE STIRRED BY HOUSTON'S ACT.

Worth, where he expects to hire all the track officials who are attending the meeting there. He says he will pay the freight on every horse coming from Houston.

## BELIEVED BOND ISSUES WILL CARRY

### MORE OPPOSITION AGAINST PAVING BONDS THAN WAS THOUGHT.

## SCHOOL BOND OPPOSITION

### Opponents, However, are Few—Bonds Expected to Carry by Good Vote.

At 2:30 o'clock this afternoon 165 votes had been cast in the paving bond election and 156 votes had been cast in the school bond election.

Votes were coming in at a lively rate at that hour.

More opposition than was expected developed against the paving bond issue, but it is thought the bonds will be voted by a safe majority.

From indications, a few votes will be cast against the school bonds.

### GOVERNOR WILL PRUNE APPROPRIATION BILL.

Texas News Service Special. Austin, Tex., May 18.—Gov. Campbell today indicated that he will trim the appropriation bill considerably, but declined to name what will suffer. The provision for the payment of the bonds due in July will likely be cut out, as the governor regards the clause superfluous, as the bonds provide for their own payment in lieu of a definite enactment to refund. Numerous special appropriations will suffer.

### ABILENE AND SOUTHERN MAY BUILD INTO MEXICO.

Colonel Morgan Jones, veteran promoter of railroads and himself a railroad builder, sees no reason why the Abilene and Southern road should not be extended south to connect with San Antonio and that region tributary to the western shores of the Gulf of Mexico.

Colonel Jones and Chief Engineer Jones left last night for points south to view the situation and to meet with other railroad men with the view of adding a few hundred miles to the line he now controls.—Abilene Reporter.

### THIRD INVESTIGATION OPENS THIS AFTERNOON.

Texas News Service Special. Tulsa, Ok., May 18.—The third grand jury investigation into the Oklahoma town lot fraud, involving Gov. Haskell and others, will begin this afternoon.

The government attorneys, witnesses and employes have headquarters at the Robinson hotel. There are sixty federal witnesses.

Haskell and his forces are at the Brady hotel. Both hotels have been dubbed camps of opposing armies.

Mr. and Mrs. F. T. Jenne, who reside on Red river, ten miles north of this city, have a brand new baby at their home, born to them on the morning of the 17th. The little one tipped the beam at 14½ pounds, therefore the proud parent has decided that he will grow to be a big man some day and has christened him William Howard Taft.

### Dunlap May Recover.

Texas News Service Special. Corsicana, Tex., May 18.—E. O. Dunlap Jr., who was seriously injured by his auto overturning upon him and whose death was expected, passed a fairly good night and it is stated that if complications do not set in he will recover.

### Mrs. Taft is Much Improved.

By Associated Press. Washington, D. C., May 18.—Mrs. Taft, who is suffering from a nervous breakdown, was much improved today. Dr. Delaney, after calling at the White House, announced that his patient had rested comfortably all night and was much better.

### Capt. Hains Taken to Sing Sing.

By Associated Press. New York, May 18.—Captain Peter Hains, who was sentenced yesterday on conviction of manslaughter for the killing of William Annis, left the Queens county jail today for Sing Sing prison, to begin serving a term of from eight to sixteen years.

Threatening clouds swirled and rolled across the skies this morning, but brought no rain, only blinding clouds of dust. A severe sand storm is reported from Vernon and other points on the Denver. No rain was reported this morning from any point on the Denver or the Wichita Valley.

## MAN LEAPED THROUGH PLATE GLASS WINDOW.

Texas News Service Special. Fort Worth, Tex., May 18.—J. D. Jones is suffering from a score of deep cuts today as the result of dashing widely through the Metropolitan hotel early this morning, racing through the dining room and leaping headlong through a large plate glass window facing Main street. The window was shattered and that Jones escaped from death is considered miraculous. Shortly before the accident happened he had an altercation with a companion in the hotel.

### Railroad Intangible Values.

A meeting will be called this week at a date not yet determined to perfect an organization.

### PRISONERS RELEASED ON ORDER OF THE CZAR.

By Associated Press. St. Petersburg, May 18.—Lieutenant General Stoessel and Admiral Nebogatof have been released from confinement in the fortresses St. Peter and St. Paul by order of Emperor Nicholas. The health of both men has been gravely affected by confinement in the prison.

## RICH ATTORNEY WAS MURDERED

Houston, Tex., May 18.—An investigation into the death of John Kennedy, a prominent and rich attorney, indicates positively that he met with foul play, according to an authoritative announcement today. A clue to the murderer has not been found, and the will is missing. He leaves an estate of two hundred thousand dollars.

### PETROSINO'S FRIEND ASSASSINATED BY BLACK HAND.

By Associated Press. New York, May 18.—Marked for death, the police believe, because he was a close friend of Lieutenant Jose Petrosino, of the New York police department, who was assassinated in Palermo, Poggio Puccio, a cigar maker, was assassinated early today on the threshold of his apartments on Seventy-Fifth street. He was killed by a bullet fired over a balustrade on or above the entrance to the building. The assassin escaped.

### \$1,500,000 Fire Loss at Akron.

By Associated Press. Akron, Ohio, May 18.—Fire in the seven-story Power block today practically destroyed the building and its contents, causing a loss thought to aggregate a million and a half dollars. Several girls who were employed in the building had narrow escapes.

Lawyer L. H. Mathis is now occupying a suite of rooms in the First National bank annex on Seventh street, having removed his office from the Kemp & Lasker block. Those having business with him will govern themselves accordingly.

## SOUTHERN EDITORS MAKE HOUSE LAUGH

### OHIO CONGRESSMAN FAILS IN EFFORT TO DISCUSS MISSISSIPPI SILVER SERVICE.

## DISLIKED THE PORTRAIT

### Hollingsworth Opposed Davis' Likeness on Silver—Mississippi Editors Castigate Him.

Washington, D. C., May 17.—The vigorous, albeit vituperative effusions of a half dozen Mississippi country editors were today spread upon the minutes of the special session of the Sixty-first congress through the efforts of Representative Hollingsworth of Ohio on a question of personal privilege. Hollingsworth had remonstrated in resolution and in an interview against the "maudlin sentiment toward the South, lately shown up," which resulted in the people of Mississippi placing on the silver service to be presented to the battleship Mississippi the engraved likeness of Jefferson Davis, president of the Confederacy.

Representative Hollingsworth's objection appears to have kindled the fires of resentment in every country editorial sanctum in Mississippi, and the Ohio representative rose in his seat today with a handful of clippings, and in a voice trembling with emotion asked the clerk to read the assaults on his character, which he construed as serious reflections on his congressional actions.

### Laughter Greeted Editorials.

As the blistering epithets were read by the clerk in a solemn voice they were greeted with almost uproarious laughter from both republicans and democrats. Even Gen. Ketter, who still now and then fights the battle of the "Old war" on the floor of the house, smiled broadly as the reading clerk read among other things:

"An ass of the first magnitude."  
"Perhaps one of Sherman's bums who robbed the defenseless men and women."  
"Contemptible little whelp."  
"A political nonentity from Ohio."  
"A pale-faced luminary."  
"A pusillanimous pigmy from Ohio."

### Turned Down by Cannon.

Representative Hollingsworth appeared to be alone in his indignation, though there was promise of a few fiery speeches. Hence both sides of the chamber felt relieved when Speaker Cannon announced that in the opinion of the chair the criticisms, although appearing harsh, do not constitute a reflection on the gentleman's official character, and hence are not privileged.

## DEVOL HEARS NEW RAILROAD RUMOR

PAPER AT THAT PLACE SAYS ROAD TO NORTHEAST IS BEING PLANNED.

### ADA OR OKLAHOMA CITY

Said to Be the Objective Point—Exact Route is Not Yet Determined.

A contributor to the Devol (Okla.) Dispatch says he has it upon good authority that a new railroad is projected out from that place to be known as the Wichita Falls and Northeastern.

The Dispatch goes on to say:

The exact route of this road is not yet fully determined. We believe Walter and Duncan are prospective points.

This route has been inspected and it is probable that the road will cross Deep Red near Fuller's bridge.

If the survey sustains this casual examination from this point it is believed that the survey will bear a little to the south of a direct line to Walter, in order to get a suitable crossing on Cache. From Walter, Duncan seems to be in more direct line for the road, though we hear Comanche favorably spoken of as a proper place for crossing the main line of the Rock Island.

The survey will then run to a point midway between Duncan and Davis. The attorney for the Wichita Falls route has been in Davis more than once in the interest of this road.

This being known, together with other information which we are not permitted to give out, makes us feel sure that the objective point is either Ada, or Oklahoma City, the latter place being talked of now and every place wants railroad connection with it. If the people of Oklahoma City, who have proposed this line to Wichita Falls, fail in their endeavor, it is certain this road will turn north near the west end of Carter county and take the proposed route of the Frisco and run through Lindsey and Washington counties.

The W. F. and N. W. is now at work on its extension from Frederick to Altus. The contracts are let for the grading for the entire distance, the material being already in the yards.

From Altus this road will likely continue to Mangum. The surveyors are now busy on this line. When completed to Mangum they will be brought back long enough to make the W. F. and N. E. for 50 or 75 miles.

While it is no part of this article, yet it may interest some to know that the W. F. and N. W. will continue out of Mangum in an almost northerly direction.

It is their present intention to connect the county seats of the western tier of counties, if proper inducements are offered. It is not impossible that heavier bids by Elk City and Woodward may draw them east of this route.

Devol at the junction of two so important routes, the one penetrating the wheat fields of Kansas and the other coming from the woodlands and mines of the Choctaws, ought to be, and in fact cannot help being an attractive point, situated as a gateway for immense traffic over these lines into Texas affords evidence of superiority over most any other point in southern Oklahoma.

The people of Devol are to be congratulated on their location and future possibilities, but these as a matter of course will call for sacrifices and effort upon the part of the people and at the proper time they will be informed as to what will be expected of them.

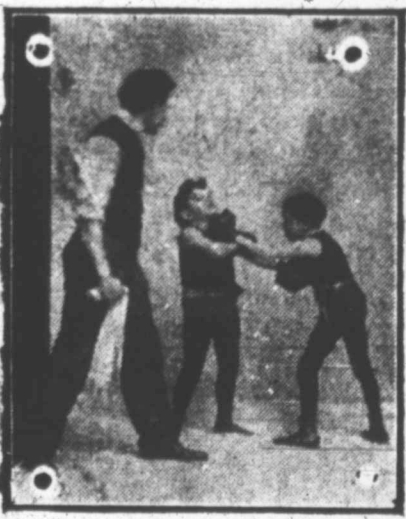

### WORLD'S GREATEST LOG HOUSE.

Care Had to Be Exercised to Get the Logs For Seattle Exposition Building Small Enough.

"And it is further specified and agreed that the logs for the said colonnade shall be of Douglas fir and shall be provided and furnished by the said party of the second part and that none of the said logs shall be of a diameter greater than five feet and the party of the second part hereby agrees further that the bark upon the said logs shall be whole and without scar or blemish other than natural blemish," etc.—Extract from the contract under which the Forestry Building at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition was constructed.

Seattle, Wash., May 18.—The whole front of the Forestry Building at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition is a colonnade, or rather a pergola of huge fir logs, not one of which is 'o' a greater diameter than five feet.

The task was not to find in Washington's woods logs which were large enough, but logs which were small enough. This last was so difficult a task that it was found necessary to specify the limitation in the contract so that the contractor could not take the first thing in the line of a giant tree that his hand should fall to.

In every one of the 124 huge logs of the colonnade there is sufficient clear lumber to build a five-room bungalow, with enough in the rough left over for a woodshed and something in the way of a fence. It is the largest log house ever erected.

Any one of the big sticks will tip the beam at 50,000 pounds, and under each is a pier of reinforced concrete. They are forty feet high and extend across the whole front of the structure, which is 320 feet. All of them were cut within a radius of fifty miles of Seattle and they were handled into the exposition grounds over a railroad spur constructed for the purpose.

During the exposition the structure will house the State's forestry exhibit, the manufacture of lumber being Western Washington's chief industry. To help out the display the United States government building has installed in the building the only timber testing plant in the west and this will be allowed to remain when the exposition is over.

When the fair is at an end, the forestry building will go to the State university by which it will be used as a forestry school. And it will also prove a valuable asset to the City of Seattle as a scenic point for tourists for the building is set with a background made up of beautiful Lake Washington, the snow-capped mountains and a tumble of forest upland transcending in its grandeur.

All parties trespassing on Lake Wichita will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law. Parties wishing to catch fish with hook and line will be allowed that privilege by getting an order to the Lake watchman from

### Urges Planting of Broom Corn.

Oklahoma is to have a larger acreage in broom corn this year than ever before. That fact alone makes it necessary to say that Oklahoma's experience with this crop has been eminently satisfactory. It is stated that practically every farmer in the northwestern part of the state, which is a semi-arid section, will grow some broom corn. Some of last year's crop was sold a few days ago at the rate of \$140 a ton, and it is said that bids of \$100 a ton are already being made for this year's prospective crop. Broom corn is said to have yielded the growers at the rate of from \$30 to \$40 an acre.

Nowhere are conditions better for growing broom corn than in West and Northwest Texas. They are better than they are in the northwestern part of Oklahoma, and yet Oklahoma grows vastly more broom corn than Texas does. For some reason not apparent the people have persistently ignored this crop. That it may be grown with more profit than comes from several of the crops which engage greater attention is generally admitted. It is not ignorance of the possibilities, but, seemingly, a reluctance to change the direction of one's energies that is the cause of this backwardness. In Oklahoma the crop is being bought on the farms, for the demand seems to be growing faster than the supply, so that it is not only a profitable crop, but one easily disposed of.

The News believes that it would be worth while for the newspapers in the Panhandle to boom broom corn.—Dallas News.

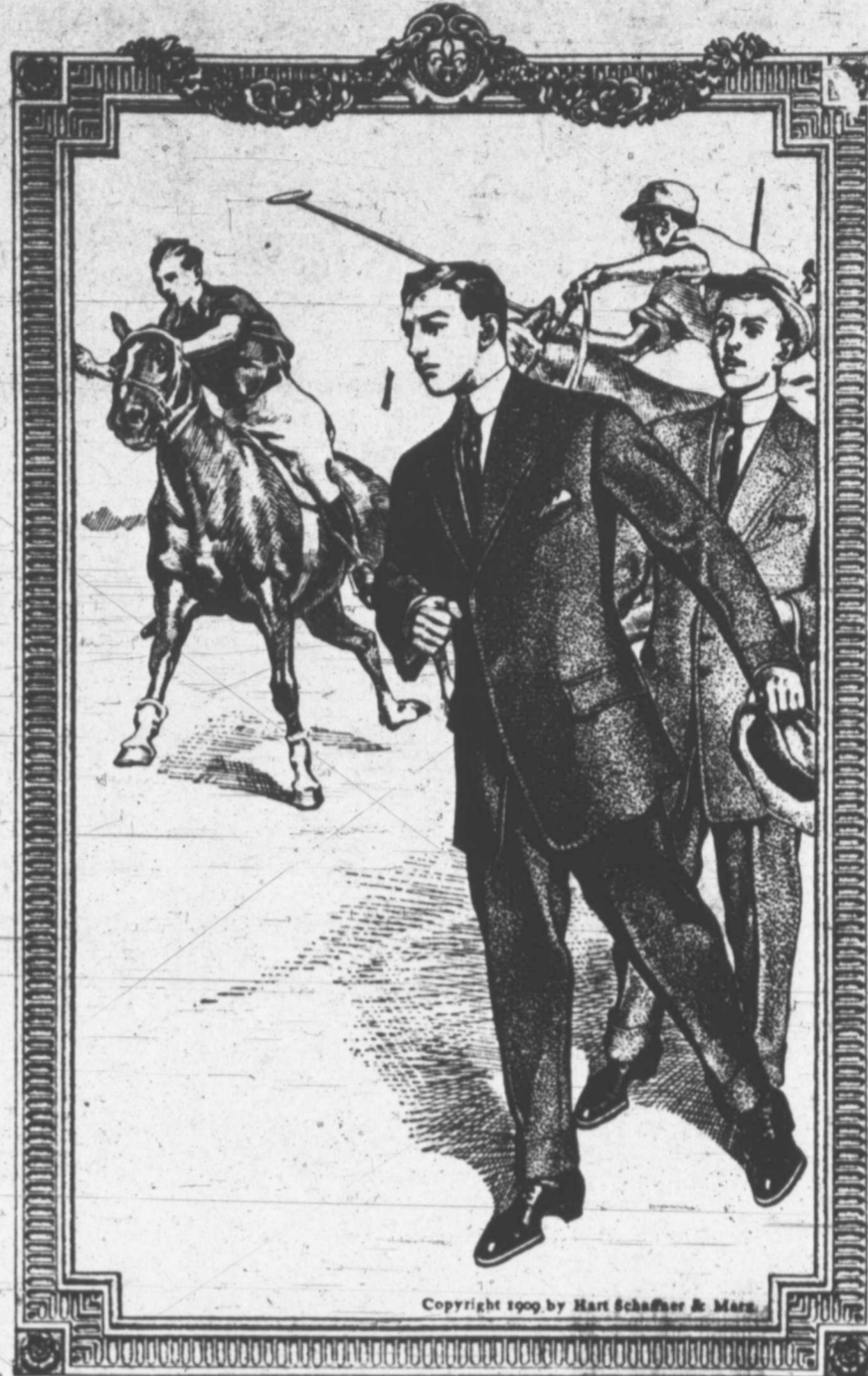
