Stale crackers are improved by placing them in a hot oven a few moments before serving.
A few drops of paraffine added to the blacking will materially aid in polishing damp shoes.
Fresh fish will keep over night if wrapped in a cloth wet soaked in vinegar. Beef may be kept in the same way.
Cut flowers will keep a week or two if placed in water in which a small quantity of saltpeter has been dissolved.
A spoonful of kerosene in boiled starch keeps it from sticking, but do not use enough to make it smell of the oil.
Fruit jars may be preserved from cracking if, before filling, they are placed on a folded towel, soaked in hot water.
Put a few grains of rice in the salt cellar to keep the salt from caking. As the cellar is shaken, the rice keeps the salt moving.
Bread crumbs are used to make poultices with in preference to the usual slice of bread. Crumbs and charcoal formed into a poultice will cleanse and disinfect sores.

Plates and dishes put into an oven or left on the range to warm, often crack. They should be dipped in hot water instead when being heated for use on the dinner table.
If the skin becomes dry and hot from the combined effects of sea water and the sun, wash the face with buttermilk two or three times a day. It has wonderfully soothing properties.
The brown streak around the neck, caused by wearing high collars, may be removed by using frequently the juice of cucumbers, or by tying thin slices of cucumbers about the neck before retiring.
A pretty garnish for cold meat is made by cutting lettuce leaves very finely with a pair of scissors. The strips should be no wider than a blade of grass, and will form a pleasing change from parsley.
Ivory knife handles which have become yellow from age may be whitened by being gently rubbed with fine sandpaper and then polished with a clean piece of chamois skin, until well polished.
White satin shoes may be easily cleaned at home. Stuff out the shoe in shape and rub it gently with a soft cloth dipped in methylated spirit, re-

peating the application until the shoes are perfectly clean.
Instead of putting food into the oven to keep it hot for late comers, try covering it with a tin and setting it over a saucepan of boiling water. This plan will keep the food hot and prevent it from becoming dry.
To clean an enameled bathtub, take a heaping tablespoonful of salt, moisten with turpentine and with it scour the bath; then rub it with a clean cloth. Before beginning operations take care that the tub is perfectly dry.
To remove freckles, take one ounce of lemon juice, a quarter of a drachm of powdered borax and half a drachm of sugar; mix thoroughly, and let it stand in a bottle for three days. It should be rubbed on the face and hands several times a day.

Wichita Falls, Texas, May 21st, 1906.

The following formula has been published in a number of papers as a sure destroyer of flies. Besides being a general nuisance, these pests do a great deal toward the spread of disease and should be killed out as much as possible.

It is important that the agency used to kill flies that get into your home be non-poisonous or not dangerous to human beings. Especially is this true in homes where there are children. A 7 per cent solution of bichromate of potassium made up with water and sweetened with sugar, and placed in shallow dishes throughout the house, will kill the flies and will not harm the children should they get hold of it. This is cheap and may be obtained at any drug store. A 2 per cent solution of cobalt chloride may be used. It is non-poisonous, but is more expensive and hard to obtain. Spraying ponds of water with kerosene will destroy the larvae of mosquitoes and used in the same way in garbage boxes will destroy the larvae of flies.

The rain yesterday morning was only a shower as compared to the one which followed it late yesterday afternoon—which was an old-time gully-washer and trash-mover. The farmers are now feeling good, and by using headers are confident their wheat and oat crops will yet make a tolerably fair yield. Corn and cotton crops also look very promising. There was too much rain last year for wheat and oats. This year the precipitation has not been what it should, but it may be better after all to have not quite enough rather than too much rain. There is an increased acreage over last year of both cotton and corn, and with a fair small grain crop and a "bumper" corn and cotton crop, the Wichita Falls country will make good this year.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE

By Associated Press.
Denver, Colo., May 21.—Among the reports presented to the Presbyterian General Assembly today was that of the Special Committee on Sabbath Observance. The report says that the battle for the maintenance of the American Sabbath the past year has been more aggressive than ever.

"Not only," says the report, "have the friends of the Sabbath met with concentrated opposition from interests which we always find inimical to the Sabbath, but the past year we have been saddened by the fact that in an important battle in New York State we have encountered the opposition of some ministers of the Gospel."

The report continues: "Various cities of the United States have been aroused concerning the Sabbath, as perhaps in no one year during the past half century. Chicago, Louisville, New York, Newark, Baltimore, Atlantic City and others have agitated this question of such vital moment to the municipality and the nation."

Conditions in several cities of the United States and in foreign countries are then reviewed and progress in several directions noted.

On the Sabbath question, the committee recommends Canada's aim for 1906 as the world's motto:

"1. That no employer for gain shall demand unnecessary work on the Lord's Day of any employe."

"2. That no employe for gain shall willingly work at unnecessary work on any Lord's Day."

"3. That every person who works on the Lord's Day at any work of real necessity shall have a full day of rest that week; and that no persons shall be called upon to work on two successive Lord's Days."

In conclusion, the committee recommends the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, 1. That the authority of the Christian Sabbath is found in the law of God and confirmed by the Lord Jesus Christ.

Resolved, 2. That the General Assembly expresses its strong conviction that the sacred character of the Sabbath must be carefully and strenuously maintained, and to this end enjoins all ministers, officers and members of the Presbyterian church in the United States of America to exercise special care and faithfulness, and discourage holding funerals on that day.

Resolved, 3. That the General Assembly reiterates its strong and emphatic disapproval of all secular uses of the day, all games and sports, in civic as also in army and navy, all unnecessary traveling and all excursions, and urges upon all employers of labor and captains of industry to recognize the need of the laboring man for his weekly rest day, and thereby insure his greater efficiency and happiness and the greater prosperity of both capital and labor.

Resolved, 4. That the General Assembly urges on all families not to buy anything on the Sabbath, to plan for their servants on the Sabbath and to help them fulfill their religious duties, and to pay laborers so that they may have Saturday afternoon to make provision for the Sabbath.

Resolved, 5. That this Assembly heartily endorses the plan of the Saturday half-holiday and recognizes it as tending to the better observance of the Sabbath.

Resolved, 6. That the General Assembly hereby reiterates its emphatic condemnation of the Sunday newspaper and urges the members of the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America to refuse to subscribe for it or read it or advertise in it.

Resolved, 7. That the General Assembly respectfully requests the faculties of colleges and seminaries, if the way be clear, to omit recitations on Monday mornings, so as to leave the Sabbath free from the felt necessity of some of the students to prepare their lessons on that day.

The committee in other resolutions recommend further organization as to Sabbath observance; commend various organizations in their efforts to preserve in its purity the Christian Sabbath and recommend that at a stated time each pastor of the Communion preach a sermon on the subject of the Sabbath, and that at that time an offering be made for the work of the Lord's Day Alliance of the United States.

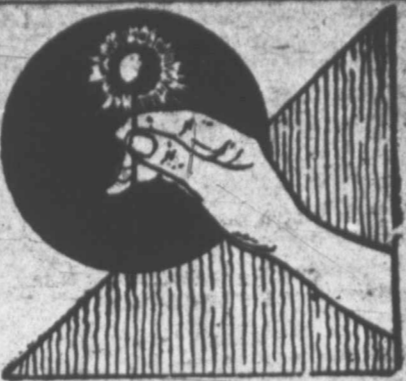

Notes From the Labor World.

Brandon, Canada, has a labor temple.

The Cigar Makers' International Union was established in 1864. The New York Typographical Society was founded July 4, 1869, by a handful of printers.

Three Kinross, Scotland, miners were each fined \$10 or thirty days in jail for having matches in their possession in a colliery.

A referendum vote is being taken by the Theatrical Stage Employees on the question of founding a monthly magazine in the interest of the order.

Concerted effort is to be made at the New Orleans convention of the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks to secure the meeting next year for Memphis, Tenn.

Secretary Morrison will have a label chart printed in pamphlet form, giving a reproduction of the various union labels endorsed by the American Federation of Labor.

The Fife Coal Company of Scotland has decided to make an experiment in the provision of bathing accommodations for their workmen. The Altken Pit, Kelly, where 1,100 are employed, has been selected.

The Farmers' National Union and other organizations of farmers are to hold conferences in the late summer and fall, and President Gompers will appoint to representatives of the A. F. of L. to attend such convention.

Efforts will be made for the re-affiliation of the longshoremen's organization of the Pacific coast with the International Longshoremen's Association, and also to bring about cooperation between the longshoremen and the Seamen's International Union.

The referendum vote taken in the Plumbers' Union on the proposition to pay a funeral benefit to a member on the death of his wife was defeated, not receiving the required two-thirds vote. The total vote showed 4,543 for and 2,376 against, being 69 short of the number required to carry.

During the International convention of the hotel and restaurant employes and bartenders' union the subject of the prohibition movement was discussed by representatives from all sections of the country, and many had already prepared resolutions relative to that matter. Many took part in the discussion.

A mutual industrial and commercial fund has been established in the north of France, with a view to guarantee its members against the pecuniary consequences of an unjustified strike. The only risks guaranteed are those resulting from conflicts suffered by the members insured in the organization.

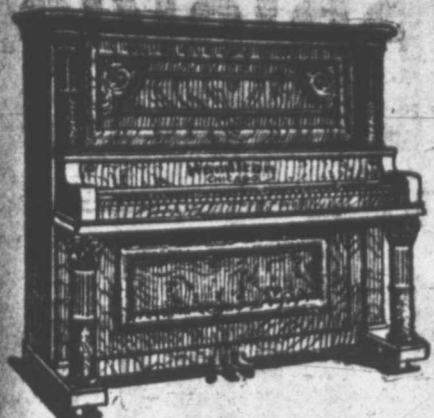

AN INDIAN MURDERER.

His Fearful Punishment by a Primitive Mexican Tribe.

A REAL MONTE CRISTO

The Tragic Career of Picaud, a
Cobbler of Paris.

HIS RISE TO GREAT WEALTH.

Thrown into Jail by Secret Enemies,
He Was Left a Fortune by a Fellow
Prisoner—Released, His Scheme of
Vengeance Brought Him Death.

That romantic creation of the brain
of Alexandre Dumas, "The Count of
Monte Cristo," had a counterpart in
real life in France in the last century.
This is the tragic story:

In 1807, when Napoleon was at the
height of his power, Francois Picaud
was a sturdy young journeyman cob-
bler of Paris, full of health and ani-
mal spirits and happy in the love of
Marguerite Vigoureux, a young girl
of his own station in life. On the eve
of his marriage hidden enemies de-
nounced him to the imperial govern-
ment as a spy. He was cast into pris-
on, where he remained, forgotten by
the world, for seven years.

Among his fellow prisoners was a
wealthy Milanese priest, who treated
him like a son and bequeathed to him
7,000,000 francs on deposit in the Bank
of Amsterdam. Furthermore, this ec-
clesiastic told Picaud the secret of a
hiding place in Italy where were con-
cealed jewels to the value of 1,200,000
francs and specie amounting to three
millions.

When the empire was overthrown in
1814 Picaud was one of a vast num-
ber of political prisoners throughout
France who were given their freedom.
He proceeded to gather the priest's
treasure and to plan vengeance upon
his enemies. Who they were he did
not know.

Disguised as an Italian priest, he suc-
ceeded by bribing the least guilty of
the conspirators and discovering the
entire story of his undoing. The lead-
er in the plot he learned was one Lou-
pain, who had married Marguerite
Vigoureux, prospered and become the
proprietor of one of the handsomest
cafes in Paris.

Picaud went to the capital and under
a suitable disguise obtained work as a
waiter in Loupain's establishment.
Fellow servants there were Guilhem
Solari and Gervais Chaubard, who,
with Loupain, had denounced Picaud
in 1807. The pretended waiter was
not long in bringing his vengeance to
a consummation. Chaubard was the
first victim of his wrath. His body,
pierced by a knife, was found on one
of the bridges over the Seine. Lou-
pain was disgraced, reduced to pen-
ury and finally stabbed to death in the
Tulleries gardens. Solari was poison-
ed and died in frightful convulsions.

But speedy retribution overtook the
implacable avenger. One night Picaud
was seized, bound and borne to an
abandoned quarry. In the darkness a
terrible voice said:

"Picaud, what name are you passing
under now? Are you still the priest
Baldini or the waiter Prosper? You
wished for revenge. You have sold
yourself to the powers of hell. Ten
years you have given to the pursuit of
three wretches you should have spared.
Me you dragged down to perdition.
The diamond by which you bribed me
was my destruction. I killed him who
cheated me. I was arrested, condemn-
ed to the galleys and escaped only
after years of torture. My one thought
has been vengeance on the priest Bal-
dini. You are in my power. Do you
know me? I am Antoine Allut. How
much will you pay for bread and wa-
ter?"

"I have no money," groaned Picaud.
"You have sixteen millions. These
are my conditions: I will give you
something to eat twice a day, but for
each meal you must pay me 25,000
francs."

However, the cupidity of the prison-
er proved stronger than his hunger.
He underwent terrible suffering with-
out any signs of yielding until his
captor, goaded to fury at the prolonged
obstinacy, threw himself upon Pi-
caud and stabbed him to death.—Book-
man.

Cardwell as M. P. for the city of Ox-
ford and when returning from his can-
vass said: "What do you think, Card-
well! Not one of your constituents

strongish adjective.
