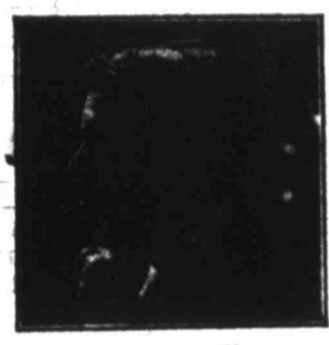

RAIN THROUGHOUT NORTHERN TEXAS

CONDITIONS IN THIS END OF THE STATE HAVE IMPROVED VERY GREATLY THE PAST WEEK.

WIDE STRIP IS COVERED

Nearly all of Texas North of Thirty-second Parallel Benefitted By Last Week's Rains.

Practically all of Texas north of the thirty-second parallel, and goodly bits of country south of that line, is now smiling and thriving as a result of last week's rains. Beginning almost at the western boundary of the Panhandle and sweeping across the State, the country way over in East Texas was benefitted and the entire northern part of Texas was visited.

"A streak of fat and then a streak of lean" was some writer's description of the crop situation in Texas about a week ago. Now the streaks are all fat, some fatter than others, but all pretty fat and prosperous. The recent rains went well into the black land belt and the cotton crop was wonderfully benefitted there.

The rains came at the most opportune time possible for cotton and corn. Especially is this true with regard to the latter crop, and it has been said that if the rain had been made to order for the corn growers of the State it could not have been more timely or more helpful.

In Wichita county, where over four inches of rain fell during the week, there is the smile of promise in every direction. This was already one of the "fat" counties, even before the wetness, and now it is in as good condition, agriculturally, as anyone could wish. A rain earlier in the year would have put the wheat average up several bushels to the acre, but even now there is little cause for complaint on that score.

The West Texas counties benefitted by the rain, so far as reports show, are: Potter, Hardeman, Foard, Knox, Scurry, Brown, Taylor, Baylor, Callahan, Shackelford, Jones, Stephens, Eastland, Palo Pinto, Wichita, Montague, Childress, Clay, and probably a number of others from which reports have not come.

For and Against Senator Bailey.
Glimmer Mirror: Senator Bailey seems to be taking a most independent position in his attitude in congress in relation to the tariff, and he is not alone. There are other senators who hold the same views, although they don't express their reasons quite as clearly. The democratic party today is a protection party, as is evidenced by the action of its senators in congress—it necessarily must be. The party today, no matter Senator Bailey says, what the platform is, is a tariff party and no matter what some of the most influential papers may say, there is no free trade party. The best and greatest good to the greatest number must be the deciding factor in settling the tariff in the present instance. Much that is being said in congress now is for political purposes, and for political effect.

Fort Worth Record: The democratic party is not now and never has been a free trade party, though many free traders have affiliated with that party. And it has not changed its tariff policy. It is still opposed to protective duties and in favor of revenue duties. Neither is the democratic party a free raw material party. Just now some people and newspapers appear to think that a senator or congressman must stand for protection or no tariff, while in truth there is a vast difference between a duty that will yield a revenue and the high protection rates advocated by the republican party. For instance, take the tariff on iron ore. A duty on ore has been levied by every tariff law in this country for a century and the rate in the pending bill, 10 per cent, is the lowest in the history of the country, yet unthinking and unfair critics of the majority of the democratic senators who voted for this rate, are charging them with having aided the republicans. These same democratic senators voted against the protective duty of \$7 a ton on iron and steel products, but having been unsuccessful were unwilling to give the manufacturers double protection by voting them free raw material. No, the democratic policy is unchanged. It is un-democratic newspapers who are trying to confuse the situation.

The Lily of Copiah.
New York Sun: According to a Washington dispatch in the World, Hon. Joseph Weldon Bailey will not be a candidate for the democratic nomination for governor of Texas next year. He admits, or is said to admit, that he "has no qualifications for the governorship." His last harvest of "vindication" was so scant that he 18-11 may be forgiven for not trying to raise

any more of it. Besides, Attorney General Davidson, who would be his opponent, is a resolute and powerful campaigner.

Mr. Bailey's amiable temper, gracious manners and perfect self-control are ill suited to heated political contests. He can and does display at Washington the decorum and dignity of the greatest American statesman that Copiah county, Mississippi, has yet produced. And it is scarcely a secret that his gifts may soon be diffused among the general public. We hear that the farseeing managers of the Chautauqua lectures, now the choicest field of our ripest statesmen, have prevailed upon him to prepare three lectures. The subjects are: "He That Ruleth His Spirit," "What I Know About Monopoly" and "Democratic Statesmen Who Have Helped Themselves."

It is an instance of that gentlemanly and peaceful frame of mind which Mr. Bailey's public life so nobly illustrates that no voice is raised to deny Mr. Bailey's assertion that he has no qualifications for the governorship. Still, by becoming governor, could he be elected, how memorably he would improve the senate.

The thousand forms which merely obstruct justice in the trial courts are supplemented by endless technicalities in the appellate courts, until reversals upon the most puerile grounds have become so common that they would be ludicrous were they not so sad in their far-reaching effects.—Childress Index.

If Governor Campbell had not been handicapped by that chicken court legislature, the state today would be ringing with praise for that good man. Campbell is a man big of brain, a true patriot and the Texas democracy has never had a better representative in the governor's chair. The enemies he has made among the state's two-bit politicians commends him to the party and its stalwart supporters.—Wise Messenger.

Senator Gore of Oklahoma. From New York World. Seldom, if ever before, has a legislative body witnessed so remarkable a feat as that performed by the blind senator from Oklahoma during the tariff debate Wednesday. In a rash moment Senator Lodge had cast doubt on some of Senator Gore's statements in regard to the large earnings of certain cotton and woolen mills of New England.

Knowing from personal experience how unscrupulously figures and facts are often cited in a running partisan discussion, the Massachusetts scholar may have felt entirely safe in challenging the statistics given offhand by a man deprived of the use of his own eyes. He misjudged his opponent. Depending entirely upon his memory Senator Gore covered his protectionist critic with confusion by repeating in detail from the report of the bureau of corporations of Senator Lodge's own State and the official figures covering the capitalization, surplus, net earnings and dividend rates of a large number of Massachusetts mills. He did the same with fifty cotton and woolen corporations. Probably no public man since Henry Fawcett, who became a postmaster-general in Gladstone's cabinet in 1880 after having been sightless for twenty-eight years, has possessed so infallible a memory.

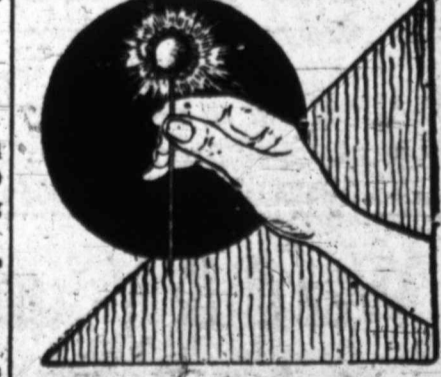

OLD CADIZ

Once Richer Than London, Its Chief Business Now Is Salt.
Of Cadiz, De Amicis said, "It is best described by writing the word 'white' with a white pencil on blue paper."
Under the noonday sun, seen from the lofty Torre de Vigia, the medieval watchtower in the center of the city, its buildings are dazzling and almost encircled by the blue sea. A long, narrow isthmus like the stem of a pipe leads from San Fernando, on the mainland. Cadiz rests on the bowl of the pipe—yes, a pure white meerschauum without coloring, though 3,000 years old.

Americans may justly regard this now decadent place with compassion, because it grew to greatness by its commerce with the new world—while Spain ruled the Americas—and then fell away into decay on the loss of the western possessions.
It was great before Rome was founded. And as late as 1770 it was wealthier than London. Commerce has ever been its life. Today its chief business is the production of salt for export. This humble staple, evaporated in countless shallow lagoons in wide spreading marshes, still keeps Cadiz in touch with the new world, as most of the salt is shipped to South America.
The natives pronounce Cadiz with "w" silent and "a" very broad—"Ca-di." That has always been its name, with slight variations. Its Phoenician and Tyrian founders called it Gadir, a castle of fastness. The Romans called it Gades. The Arabs had it Kadis.—Detroit News-Tribune.
