### EXTENSIVE SCOPE OF ASSOCIATION

ADVERTISING THIS SECTION WILL BE MAIN FEATURE OF WORK OF NEW ORGANIZATION.

### WILL PUBLISH BOOKLET

Advantages of Northwest Texas and Southwest Oklahoma to Be Numerously Set Forth.

Some idea of the extensive scope of the work undertaken by the Association of Commercial Clubs of Northwest Texas and Southwest Oklahoma may be obtained from the recommendations of the executive committee, which appear in full below.

Advertising will form the material part of the association's work, want ads being used liberally and booklets being planned. The sending of a representative to the North to induce settlers here is another innovation that is expected to be very successful. Later on, the running of special excursions into this territory may be tried and good results are anticipated.

Following is the executive committee's report in full:

To the Directors, District Association of Commercial Clubs:

Your committee appointed to outline the scope of work for the Northwest Texas and Southwest Oklahoma Association of Commercial Clubs met 25th, and in conference with several of the directors remaining over for the meeting, arrived at the following conclusions, which are submitted for your consideration:

First. That a forty-page pamphlet, not less than five thousand in number, and about 6x9 inches in size, be published under the direction of the secretary, one-half page of space being given free to each club affiliating with the district association signing for the specified dues for one year, to-wit: Five dollars monthly for each thousand of population represented and \$2.50 for each fraction of a thousand of five hundred or more, minimum assessment \$5.00 per month for any one club, all

additional space in the pamphlet to be charged for at \$25 per page; counties having but one club to receive one page free of cost, no town to have more than three pages. Each club will furnish photographs for illustrations to be used, also write-up, all copy to be passed upon by a committee to harmonize any conflicting of statements or errors. The write-ups should appear in alphabetical order of counties, then subdivided into clubs, where more than one, in the same order.

Second. That the secretary carry classified ads in known newspaper mediums in other States, a bulletin of inquirers to be mailed semi-monthly to each club, the pamphlet to be mailed to such inquirer by the secretary.

Third. That a representative be sent into the Middle States for a period of sixty days to work up prospectors, names of such to be forwarded to the secretary who will furnish each club with a list of same.

Fourth. That the general passenger agents of all roads entering the district be urged to attend the Mangum meeting with a view to the association securing special excursions on an equal tariff into our district the coming fall.

Summary: There is about \$300 per month revenue in sight according to the representation present at the organization meeting. Our secretary estimates that \$150 per month will cover the cost of advertising, stationery, stamps and conducting the affairs of the office, this amount being nominal owing to the utilization of the facilities at Wichita Falls at the cost of extra labor account district work.

Owing to the fact that literature can not be prepared under thirty to sixty days following the Mangum meeting, the remainder of two months dues, or something over \$300, added thereto, the difference between the cost of 5000 pamphlets (\$500) and the revenue received for extra space, or about \$150, (total \$450) should provide for the expense of a representative in the States for sixty days as aforesaid.

A limited number of pamphlets should be provided each club, the greater portion of the supply, however, to be mailed to inquirers and held for judicious distribution by the field representative.

Secretary Gohlke of the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce reports an inquiry correspondence from classified

ads during the winter months of 1909 as high as 800 letters per month at a cost of not exceeding \$100 per month. Fifty dollars per month in advertising for the association should result in a good foundation list of inquirers.

Your committee feels confident that procedure along above lines would be practical and that within ninety days confidence in the association will be established to the extent that the larger task of conducting special excursions into our territory can be carried to a successful ending. It is reasonable to believe that twenty-five to thirty clubs can be interested in the association in our district.

#### For Women and the Home.

Glycerine will stop a hinge from squeaking.

Cheesecloth is excellent for polishing glassware.

Never use a very hot iron on flannels or woollens.

Gently combing the hair will soothe and relieve nervousness.

A fork is better for mixing flour with milk or water than a spoon.

To make pastry light add a little lemon juice to the water when mixing.

Glass spoons are better than silver spoons for taking medicine, as they do not tarnish.

If wicks for lamps or oil-stoves are first starched and ironed they can be fitted much easier.

A teaspoonful of salt to a bucket of water will prevent dye running or fading from many colored materials.

The juice of a lime squeezed in half a glass of water with a little soda will often drive away a sick headache.

A bowl of hot milk taken immediately before retiring is said to be better for inducing sleep than any other drug.

One of the best remedies for burns consists in a mixture of three parts of olive oil and one part of creosote. It should be applied frequently.

A bowl of clean water placed near the bed of an invalid will not only purify the air of the sick room, but induce sleep by moistening the air.

An excellent preventive of sea sickness is said to be to eat a little dry toast, dipped in Worcestershire sauce when the symptoms of the trouble appear.

To securely seal an envelope use the white of an egg. An envelope sealed in this manner cannot be opened like a gummed envelope by steaming it over boiling water.

A mustard plaster should never be allowed to blister the skin. If it does an extra thickness of muslin should be placed between it and the skin.

When you boil milk grease the saucepan with butter before putting in the milk. This will prevent the forming of the granules on the bottom of the saucepan, that are so difficult to remove.

Never rinse white lace in blue water under the impression that this will improve their color. Real lace should be finally rinsed in skimmed milk, which will give to it the soft cream tint, so much admired.

If light must be kept burning in the sickroom, it is better to burn a candle or a night lamp. An ordinary lamp or gas flame consumes a great deal of oxygen and vitiates the air more rapidly than a smaller flame.

Instead of throwing away the peels of oranges and lemons used in the household, put them in the water pails on the washstand. They will give the water a delightful perfume and soften it till it is nearly equal to rainwater.

**Baptists Meet in Portland.**  
Portland, June 25.—Two thousand delegates and visitors, representing the Baptist churches in thirty-six states are gathered in Portland for the annual meeting of the Northern Baptist convention, the sessions of which will continue during the next six days.

Many leaders of the denomination are included in the attendance. During the week there are to be meetings of all the various organizations of the Baptist church, among them the home mission society, the missionary union, the Baptist brotherhood and the Baptist publication society.

Numerous topics of general interest and importance such as the need of a national divorce law, are scheduled to come up for discussion. Reports will be presented showing the work of the year among the various church organizations. These reports will show that nearly \$2,000,000 was raised by the Northern Baptist convention for the carrying on of its work during the past twelve months. Of this amount about \$500,000 was raised by the women of the denomination.

The presiding officer of the convention is Dr. Harry Pratt Judson, president of the University of Chicago. Dr. A. C. Dixon of Chicago, President Emory B. Hunt of Denison University, Dr. Noor of Newton Theological Seminary, Dr. J. S. Dickerson, editor of the Baptist Standard, and Dr. P. S. Henson, late pastor of Tremont Temple, Boston, are among those who will have a prominent part in the proceedings.

## THE CAMEL

Characteristics of the Patient, Strong and Useful Animal.

As far back as the middle of last century General von Moltke in his descriptive letters from Asia Minor had many good words to say about the camel. "This animal," he said, "can carry a burden of nearly 600 pounds and is used by the nomads and Arabians in taking their women, children, old men, tents, food, water, etc., from place to place. It is able to withstand a march of ten days without drink, and a fifth stomach ever reserves a drink for its master in an hour of extreme distress. The hair of the camel is used for clothing and tents. The milk and flesh are healthy. It exists on the most miserable food, such as grass and thistles. Such are the characteristics of this patient, strong, defenseless and most useful of all animals."

A camel is never relieved of its load from the beginning of the journey to its end. It eats, walks and sleeps under its burden, often for weeks at a time. The training of a camel is no easy matter, as it takes about three years to teach it to bend the knees in order to be loaded and unloaded.

While as the time passes the camel will not be able to withstand the keen competition of the new railways which are piercing every part of Asia Minor, yet, thanks to the power of tradition over the Turkish inhabitants of the country and their fondness for these animals, the caravan routes today are still able to hold their own side by side with the Anatolia, Cassaba and Aden railways. Hundreds of camels pass over the caravan bridge into the city of Smyrna every day, and in the market place in front of the mosque of Mohammed at Constantinople many camels may still be seen.—Philadelphia Ledger.

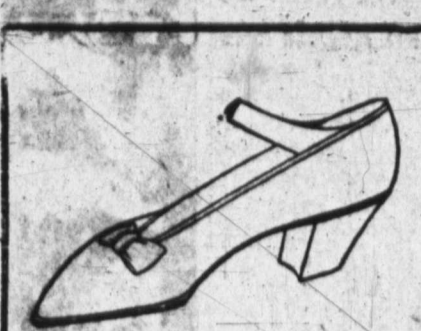
