His sense of justice enabled him to make a strong friendship with the Indians. of whom there were many in Texas. and although they were at enmity with the white men, they turned for advice and counsel to Captain Burnett. He was a personal friend of the chiefs of several tribes and on unmerous occasions was tendered signal honors when he visited the respective Indian reservations.

While the cattle and land holdings of Captain Burnet tare extensive, so are his oil interests. His land was among the first to reveal the presence



In the first place, a mistaken ide prevails as to the type and quality of animals to feed. It is true, in a rather broad sense only, that the most profitable animals to feed are the one which the farmer happens to have Feeding, of course, will help materially in securing a decent market for stock of poor quality, but the profit could be doubled by feeding animals with the quality. Quality, however without finish will not carry for o the market.
