If your taste runs to real estate, Ultra Magazine features in its December edition five homes in the Dallas area, priced from \$535,000 to \$1,700,000. The homes range from brand new, to over 30 years old, for those not wanting to have to put in their own lawn.

For the honest-to-goodness Texan, there is available a gold-plated watch in the shape of the state. There are no numerals on the watch. The illustration shows the time to be about "Ten minutes before Houston." We wouldn't recommend this gift for relatives outside our Republic's borders.

For the romantically inclined, Ultra offers a picnic basket for two, with everything from caviar on toast to a raspberry wine cake, a bottle of wine and privately-blended coffee. This gift advertised at \$250 delivered, but this may not mean to Parmer County.

"Sharper Image," in its new holiday issue, features a number of gadgets, for those so inclined. Among the items is the "Censorview," a computerized mechanism which allows you to program your TV set so your child may not watch a particular show. Of course, you may opt to just monitor the schedule, and save the \$200.

Also available is a three-piece suit of armour, right out of the 15th century. Comes complete with a matching sword, and priced right at \$2450.00. This item requires six to eight weeks for delivery, so scratch it for this Christmas.

"Ultra" had one other item which caught my eye: an 1877 U.S. three-dollar Indian gold piece in proof condition. This would be a collector's dream, since there were only 20 such coins minted that year. Also, due to the scarcity, the price was not quoted. But after all, if you have to ask the price....

Memorials Handy For Equipment

Have you ever tried to use a stethoscope? If you have, you know that the beat of the heart is not easy to hear, even when conditions are very quiet. Now, imagine using one on the side of the highway with people standing around talking and cars passing by. Or perhaps, think of listening in the back of a truck bouncing over a dirt road.

These are situations faced by ambulance personnel when trying to hear a pulse or take blood pressure after an accident, for the ambulance, no matter how well equipped, is still a truck at heart.

Because of the difficulties in using a stethoscope under noisy condition, Bovina Ambulance Service recently purchased an electronic stethoscope from money given as a memorial to C.R. Elliott. The new piece of equipment amplifies the heartbeat or sounds picked up by the bell of the stethoscope and makes it possible to better monitor a patient's vital signs under adverse conditions.

The memorial fund is a source of money for special projects, equipment that makes the attendants' job easier or more exact than it might be with standard equipment.

No amount of special equipment can replace well-trained crew members. For that reason, the Bovina Ambulance Service will teach an Emergency Medical Technician's course beginning in January. This class is necessary for ambulance crew members, but it also will help those who just want to know what to do when an emergency arises at home or on the highway.

Teams In Farwell Tournament

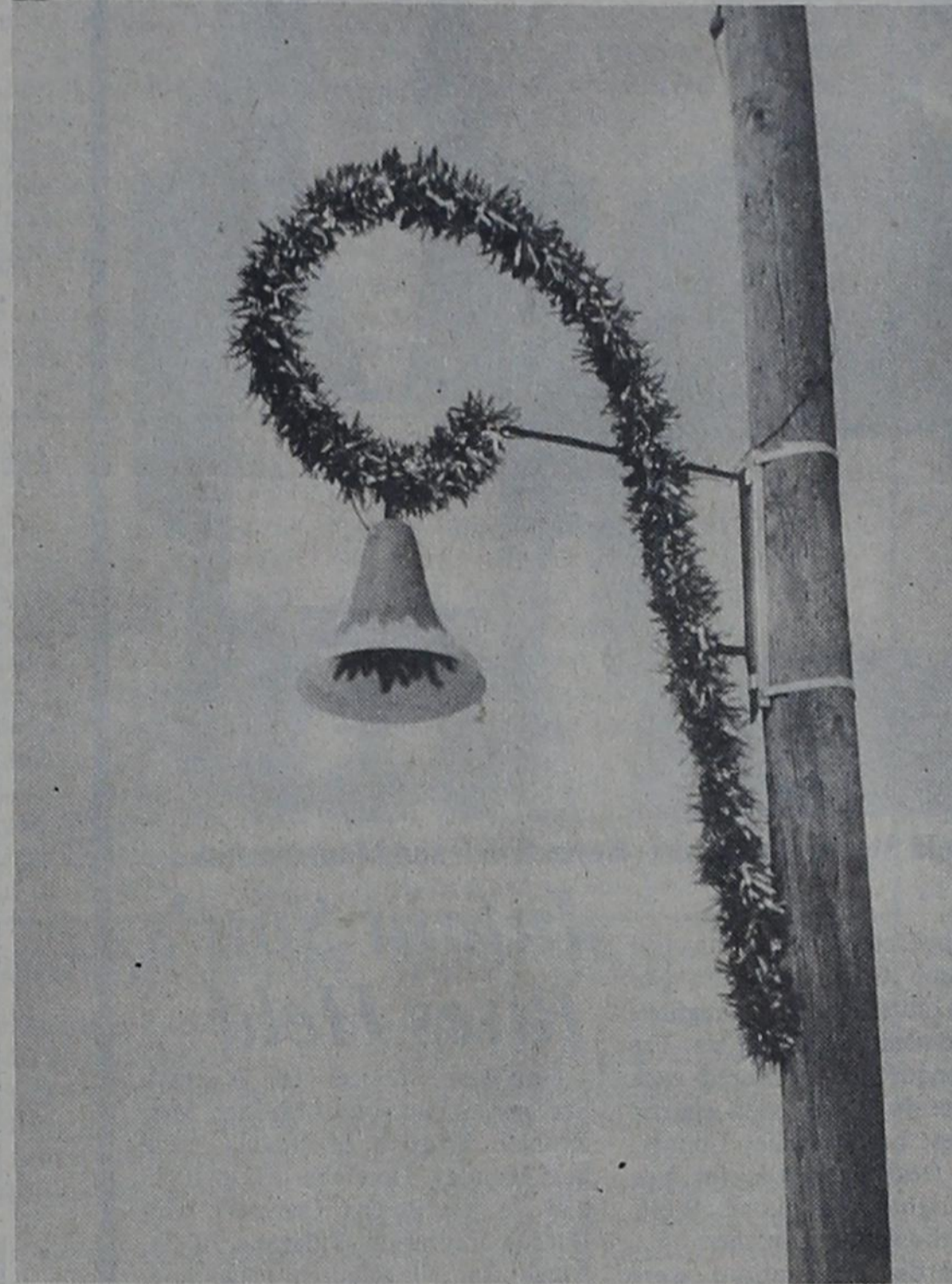

Twenty-five years after a group of South Plains District 4-H members gathered for the district's first Gold Star Awards Banquet, this year's group of top 4-H members from the 20-county area received their Gold Star honors Monday night, November 22. The ceremony had special significance for two families--two of this year's 41 honorees are children of two of the honorees of 1958.

Eight of that first group of 40 attended this year's banquet at the Coronado High School Cafeteria. Joining them in saluting the recipients this year were government officials, parents, Extension leaders, fellow 4-H'ers, educators and other community leaders.

The Gold Star Award is the highest honor presented at the county level in 4-H, and is based on achievement, service and leadership. Four-H is the youth development program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Taking special pride in the reunion were Borden Gray Jr. of Gail and Mrs. Olivia Worthen Robertson of Denver City. Gray was the 1958 Gold Star Boy in Borden County. His son, Glen, was the county's honoree this year. Mrs. Robertson was Hale County Gold Star Girl in 1958. Her daughter, Leesa, is Yoakum County winner this year.

Also back for the anniversary program were 1958 winners Nancy Beal Bowlin, Borden County; Lynn D. McDonald, Briscoe County; Darla Harris Shaw and Wayne Fowler,

Crosby County; Warren Mitchell, Floyd County and Elmer Freese Jr., Hale County.

This year's Gold Star recipients from Parmer County were Maureen Jesko, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Jesko of Lazbuddie and Kevin Owen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Owen of Farwell.

Noting the anniversary of the awards banquet, State Rep. Jim Rudd of Brownfield challenged the young winners to attend a similar function 25 years from now and show that they are still winners.

"You will be," Rudd said, "if during the next 25 years, and for the rest of your life, you practice ten qualities." He said these include positive self-awareness, positive self-esteem, positive self-control, positive self-motivation, positive self-expectancy, positive self-image, positive self-direction, positive self-discipline, positive self-projection and positive self-dimension.

As the Gold Star has five points, 4-H has at least five reasons to celebrate, the legislator told the group.

First, it is the largest youth organization in America, with more than five million members. The South Plains District has some 9,000 of these members, he noted.

Second, it is youth and adults working together. The 14,000 volunteer leaders in Texas contribute more than \$14 million a year in time, energy and materials. And it is a program which involves members and families.

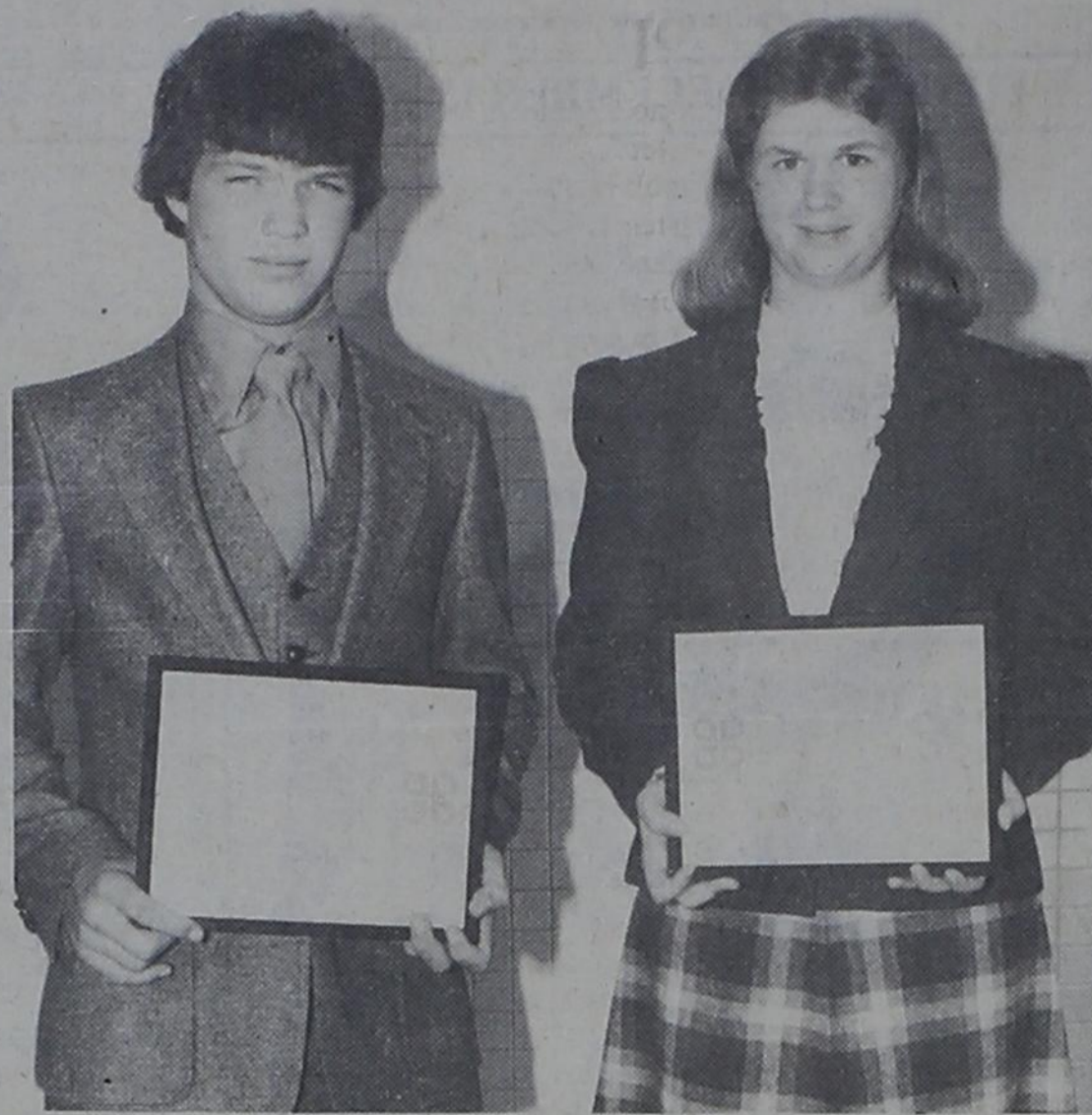
Third, it teaches leadership and citizenship.

Fourth, 4-H is a special cooperative effort between government and private community. For every dollar in government funds, through county Commissioners Courts and the Extension Service, 4-H receives five dollars in private support.

Fifth, 4-H has something for everybody, with a vast array of projects and opportunities.

Hance Named Best Inflation Fighter

When it came to fighting inflation in the 97th Congress, no member of the House of Representatives did a better job than Texas Democrat Kent Hance, according to the National Association of Realtors (NAR).

The NAR evaluated 40 roll-call votes taken during the 97th Congress, and, with the help of computers and economic models, gave each member of Congress a "grade" on their "Economic Report Card." The 40 votes used in the survey measured a member's voting record on such issues as slowing the growth of federal spending, reducing the federal government's deficit, boosting new home construction, and reforming the Tax Code.

Hance was given an "A" by the NAR.

If Hance's votes had set government policy, said the NAR, consumer prices would have decreased in

1981-82 and mortgage interest rates would have fallen by more than six percent. Hance's voting record on inflation was the best of the 435-member House of Representatives, said the NAR.

The NAR also said Hance's voting record would have added more than 150,000 jobs in Texas over the past two years and Texans would have realized an increase of \$2,200 in household income.

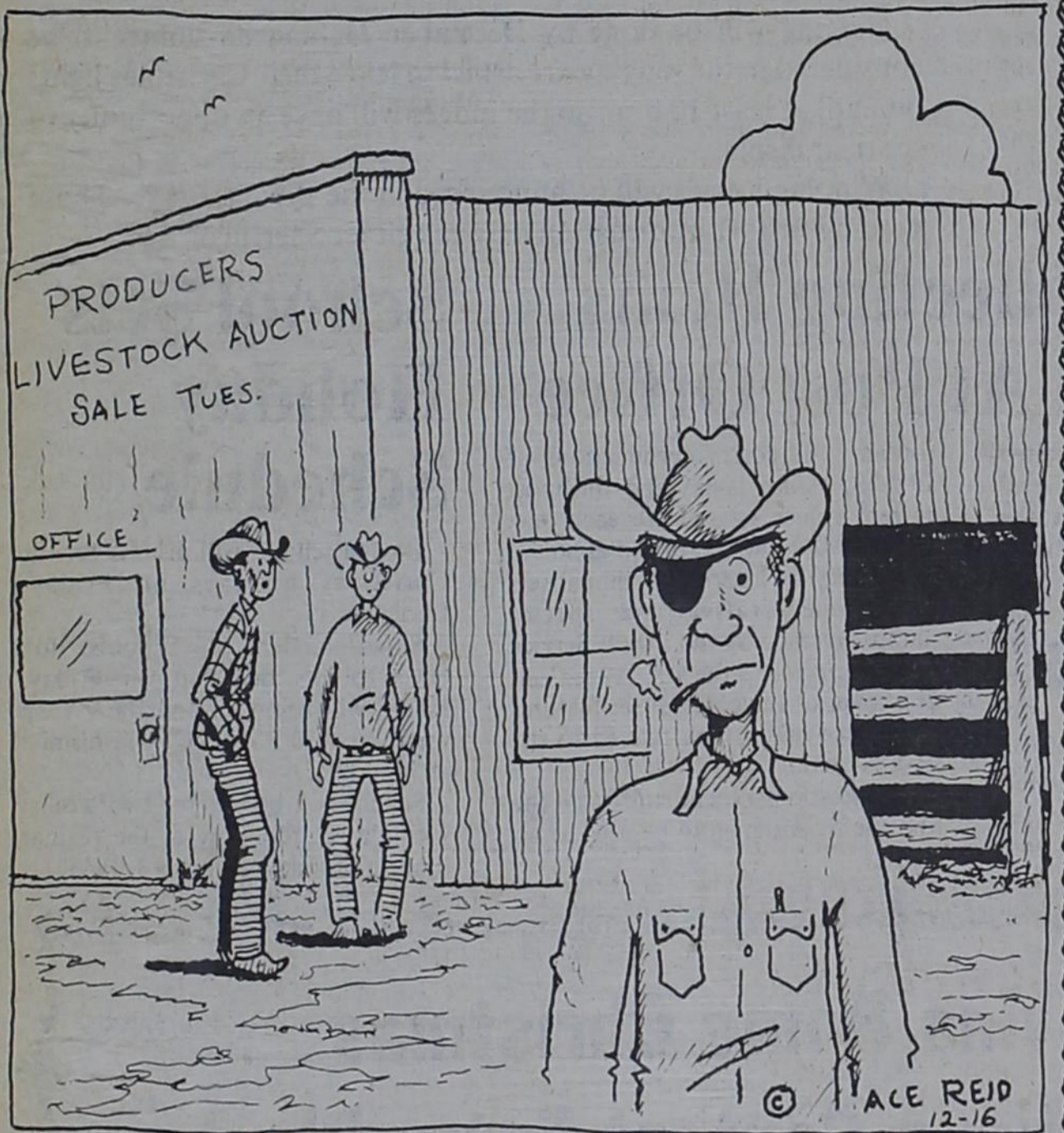
Housing starts in Texas would have increased by more than 80,000 units in 1981-82 if Hance's votes had become public law, said the NAR, and commercial and industrial construction in Texas would have increased by \$1.1 billion.

The NAR said the economic models used to assess the economic impact of the 40 votes are the same models used by the Congressional Budget Office and the Administration.

FIRST AID FOR EYE INJURIES

Funeral services were conducted in Tulia Monday for Hansford F. (Wee Boy) Hutto, 61, who has relatives in the Bovina area.

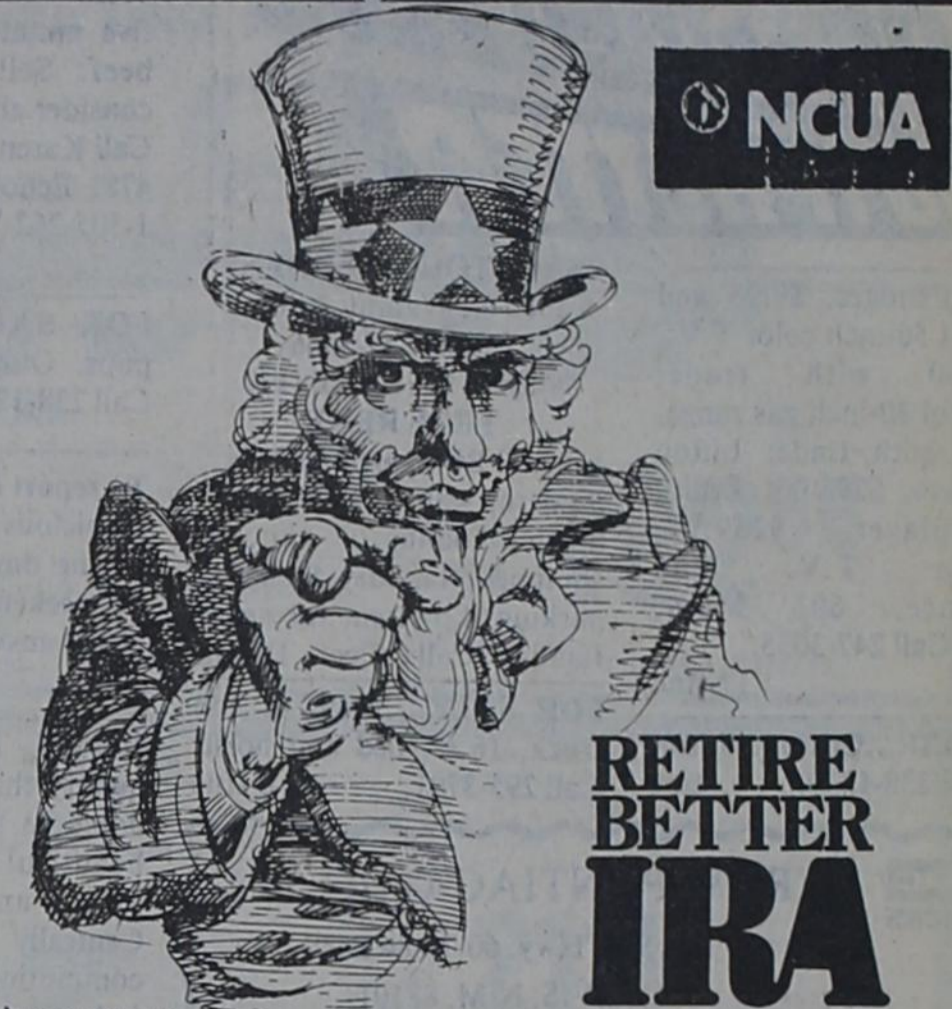
