



The movements of the atmosphere that give us different kinds of weather all invite the ex\_ penditure of an immense amount of energy in the form of heat. Such energy comes to us from the sun, and, its varying egects depend main ly upon the varying positions of the

has no heat of its own. It merely perience. gives off into space that which it re ceives from the sun, and a small fraction of this reaches the earth. The amount of heat we receive from very delicate instruments. It is so exclessively minute that whatever ef fect it may have upon our atmos\_ phere must be completely swamped and obliterated by the enormously greater effects of solar energy.

It is true that the pull of the moon and the sun upon the atmosphere produces a tide in the atmosphere much like the tide in the ocean. But this, too, has been measured, and it is found to be insignificant compared with the alternate expanding and shrinking of the atmosphere due to heating by day and cooling by night -the "heat tide", so to speak. 




