COL. OLIVER NORTH has had his "day in court," as the star witness in the Iran-Contra hearings. To the surprise of the congressional prosecutors, Col. North has emerged from the hearings as sort of a folk hero.

In fact, the public sentiment in favor of Col. North was running so high that the committee felt obliged to "back off" from the hard-line questioning during the last full day of North's testimony.

The congress has been so anxious to put the administration in a bad light, but the question has been asked "Why doesn't the congress investigate itself?" The following editorial ran in a recent issue of the Amarillo Daily News:

**CORRUPTION ON THE HILL**  
"The difficulty with politics is that there are no established principles."

"Napoleon Bonaparte, the French emperor, said that almost 200 years ago. But it aptly describes the attitude on Capitol Hill today.

"No fewer than 10 members of the House have been accused of ethical or legal misconduct, ranging from soliciting bribes and hiring 'ghost' employees to improperly helping a supporter under federal investigation. Two have been indicted--Harold Ford of Tennessee and Mario Biaggi of New York.

"In each case," complained Rep. Newt Gingrich of Georgia, "nothing was done by the only body within Congress...entrusted with the power to police the House. The ethics committee seems to protect the institution rather than police it."

"Gingrich then offered a bill to create an outside commission to investigate this pattern of corruption."

"Gingrich's colleagues hooted their disapproval, then rejected the plan by nearly a 4-to-1 margin.

"Why was the House, which has been so enthusiastic about hiring special counsels to investigate the administration, so reluctant to allow an outsider to investigate itself?"

"There is no ongoing pattern of questionable ethical conduct," insisted Julian Dixon, the California Democrat who chairs the ethics committee.

"That's a weak argument. Even if all 10 are innocent, at least 14 other members of Congress have been indicted during the past 10 years.

"Seven were involved in the Abscam bribery investigation--Harrison Williams, Raymond Lederer, Michael Myers, John Jenrette, John Murphy, Frank Thompson and Richard Kelly.

"The others--Charles Diggs, Daniel Flood, Joshua Eilberg, Claude Leach, George Hansen, Bobbi Fiedler and Harold Ford--were accused of various illegalities, including bribery, perjury and tax fraud.

"Twelve were convicted, and some served time in prison. Only two--Leach and Fiedler--were exonerated.

"And this list does not include others whose behavior has been less than admirable--for example, Gerry Studds and Daniel Crane, who had sex with teen-age aides, and Louis Stokes, who beat a drunken driving rap on the grounds of congressional immunity.

"If this is not a pattern of corruption then what exactly is it?"

"Critics also argued that Gingrich was motivated by partisan politics since all 10 accused are Democrats.

"It's true that Gingrich and his three co-sponsors are Republicans. But corruption transcends party lines. If 10 Democrats are in trouble today, it might be 10 Republicans tomorrow.

"The question is whether the House has enough faith in the integrity of its members--or enough commitment to purging those who have no business in public office--that it would allow an impartial investigation of itself. "Apparently not."

Her husband, C.W., had gone to the barn to water the horses. # Bovinian Hurt In Rollover

The Clovis Fire Department's rescue unit used the Jaws of Life to free a Texas man who was trapped in his pickup after hitting a tree east of the Clovis early Thursday morning.

Billy Shawn Cupit, 22, Bovina, was found pinned in the wreckage of his 1986 Nissan two miles east of Cook's Truck Stop on the eastbound side of U.S. 70-84 at 2:30 a.m.

Fire department rescue personnel had to use their Hurst extraction tool in order to free Cupit. He was taken by Texico Ambulance to Clovis High Plains Hospital where he was treated for

multiple fractures of his arms, legs and ribs.

He is the son of Bill and Chris Cupit of Bovina.

New Mexico State Police officer Allan Collier interviewed witnesses who said Cupit was traveling eastbound at about 65 to 70 miles per hour. They said he drove off the road onto the median two or three times and onto the shoulder at least once prior to leaving the roadway completely and hitting two trees.

"He was placed in custody for drunk driving," Collier said. Cupit will be required to appear before a magistrate judge following his release from the hospital.

# Lisa Schilling Gives Report On Tour

Lisa Schilling, daughter of Leon and Martha Schilling, and a recent graduate of West Texas State University, returned home on June 30 from a trip where she spent 37 days vacationing and touring 16 countries. Forty-seven people were on the tour.

They flew from Albuquerque, New Mexico to St. Louis, New York and from there to London where they were in flight overnight.

The next day they were shown to their hotels and became acquainted with their companions.

The third day they were shown some of the finer sights of

London: Big Ben, the Tower of London, Picadilly Circus, St. Paul's Cathedral, Buckingham Palace and that afternoon they took a trip through Hyde Park on double-decker buses. They took time to shop in the fashionable areas of Knightsbridge.

The next day they took an excursion outside the city in the rich green countryside to Windsor Castle, the Queen's summer residence, Churchill's ancestral home, Blenheim Castle and Stratford-upon-Avon, Shakespeare's birthplace.

The next day the group took a cruise across the English Channel and arrived in Paris, "City of Romance." That evening they enjoyed a French dinner then drove along the grand boulevards past the city's illuminated monuments and fountains.

While in Paris, the group took a sightseeing tour that took them along wide tree-lined avenues and past elegant architecture--Arc de Triomphe, Louvre Museum, Eiffel Tower, The Opera, the Sorbonne and others. They then drove to Versailles, Louis XIV's sumptuous palace with its perfectly designed gardens and fountains and the Hall of Mirrors where the World War I peace treaty was signed.

Later that evening, they took a moonlight cruise down the Seine on a glass-topped "Bateau Mouché."

The group left Paris and went northward through Champagne country to Brussels, Belgium, the NATO and Common Market headquarters. They then went to Amsterdam, and had an exotic dinner with a choice of several spicy dishes from the former Dutch colony of Indonesia followed by a relaxing boat ride through the city's maze of tree-lined canals.

The next day they went to Volendam, a fishing village out of the past where traditional costumes are every day dress. Here they saw wooden shoes being carved and Edam cheese being made. They rode bicycles along the famous dikes.

They returned to Amsterdam and visited the world's largest diamond-cutting factory. In the evening they traveled past farms and thatched-roof cottages. They spent the night in a lovely country resort.

The next day the group enjoyed a picnic in the West German countryside and then headed north to the Baltic Sea for a ferry ride to Denmark and on to Copenhagen to join in the fun and fantasy at Tivoli Gardens--live theater, music, acrobats and rides at this world-famous entertainment center beneath the "midnight sun."

The next morning they took a sightseeing tour where they saw Hans Christian Andersen's famed Little Mermaid, the harbor area fish markets, Christiansborg

Palace and the dragon-spired Stock Exchange. Later, they toured the Carlsberg Brewery that included free samples. In the evening, they were invited to a sumptuous Scandinavian smorgasbord.

On the twelfth day of Lisa's tour, they left Denmark by boat for Warnemunde, crossing through the "Iron Curtain," and proceeded on to West Berlin, the island of democracy in the midst of communist East Germany. The next day's sightseeing included The Brandenburg Gate, 1948 Airlift Memorial, Olympic Stadium and the famous Wall dividing East and West Berlin.

Afterwards they saw a seminar on the Nazis with original newsreels featuring Hitler followed by a question and answer period with German officials and lunch by government invitation.

In the afternoon, they went through "Checkpoint Charlie" to view life on the other side of the Wall in East Berlin. That night they explored West Berlin's nightlife at the Kudorf, an underground network of pubs and discotheques.

On the fourteenth day, the tour group passed through East Germany, re-entering West Germany, and headed for Grimm's Fairytale Village of Alsfeld. They explored routes once traveled by troubadours and knights.

In Koblenz, where the Moselle and Rhine Rivers meet, they boarded a river boat and cruised past the notorious Lorelei Rock, terraced vineyards and castles nestled in the hills overlooking the Rhine. Lisa said this was one of the most beautiful sights on the trip. Then they traveled to Germany's oldest university town and had dinner of bratwurst, sauerkraut and beer.

The next morning, they climbed to the Palatine Elector's Castle for a fabulous view of the city, and to see the world's largest wine barrel--it holds 49,000 gallons.

They journeyed southward to the mysterious Black Forest, thick with evergreens and dotted with gingerbread houses. They then came to the largest waterfall in Europe, the Rhine Falls, before traveling on past Zurich, into William Tell Country.

The next day they hiked through the magnificent Swiss Alps and took a boat ride on Lake Lucerne. They traveled through more breathtaking Alpine scenery on their way to Liechtenstein, one of the smallest and wealthiest countries in the world. Their motorcoach climbed over one of the highest mountain passes in Europe. They stopped for a scenic picnic in Arlberg pass, then drove to Innsbruck, Austria, home of the 1976 Olympics.

They traveled through the Bavarian lake district past the

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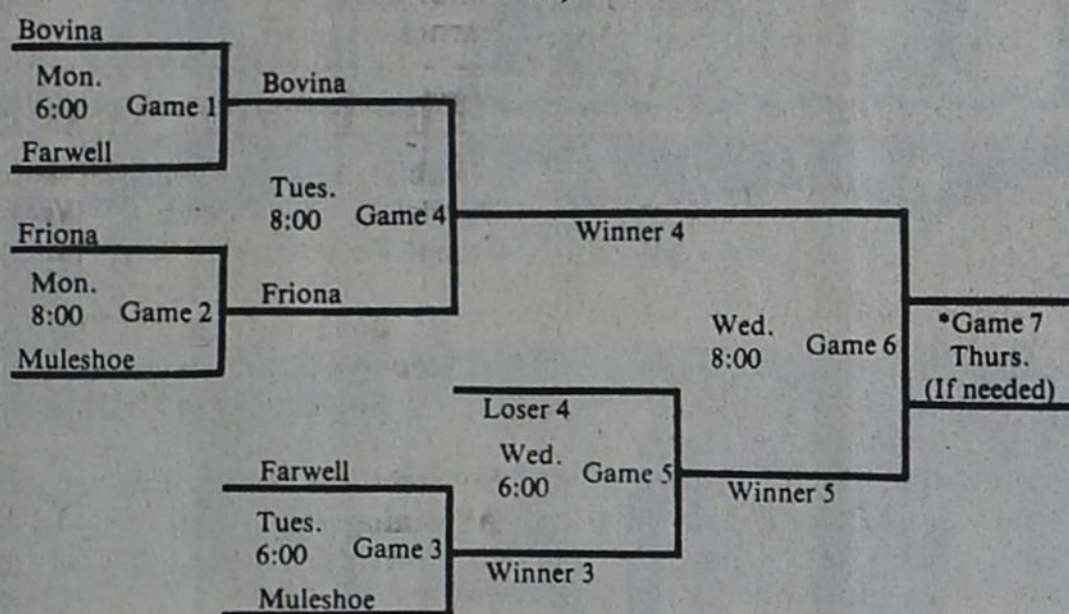

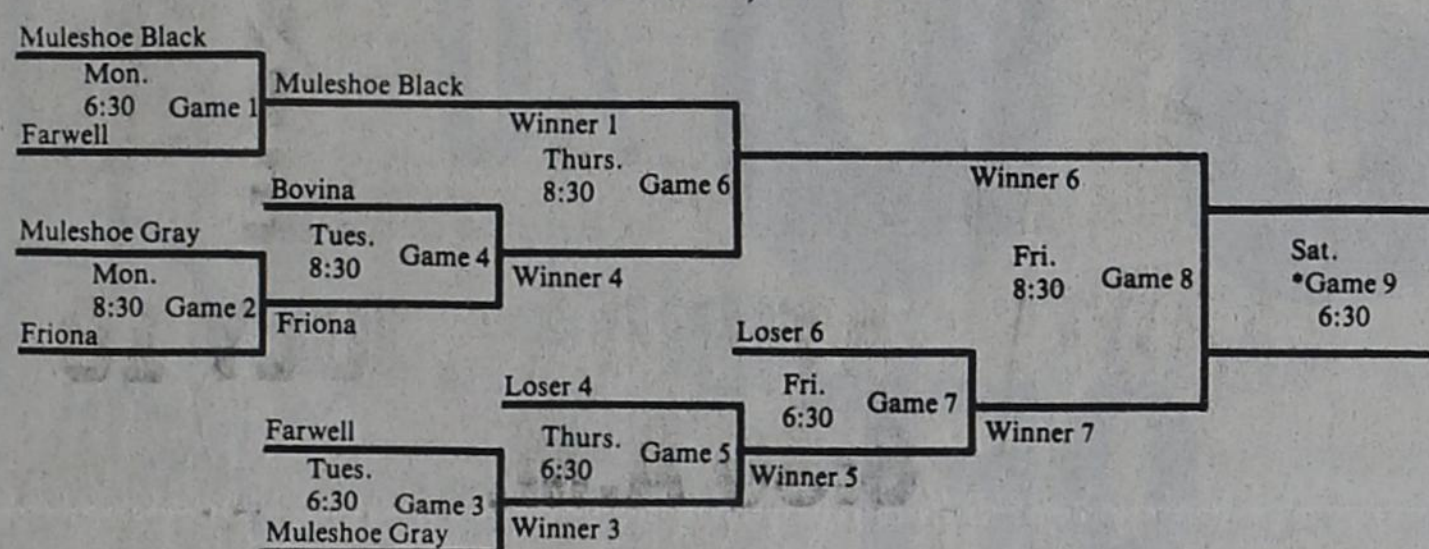

Zugspitze, Germany's highest mountain. They arrived in Oktoberfest, Munich, where they saw the Glockenspiel chimes and the famous beer hall Hofbraus. Among sights that day were the home of Hohensalzburg Fortress and the summer music festival, as well as Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's birthplace.

The next morning, they dressed in miner's clothing, traveled through the Berchtesgarden salt mines and crossed an illuminated underground lake by raft. Later they visited the filming site of the "Sound of Music." They visited a 12th-century castle where they spent the night. 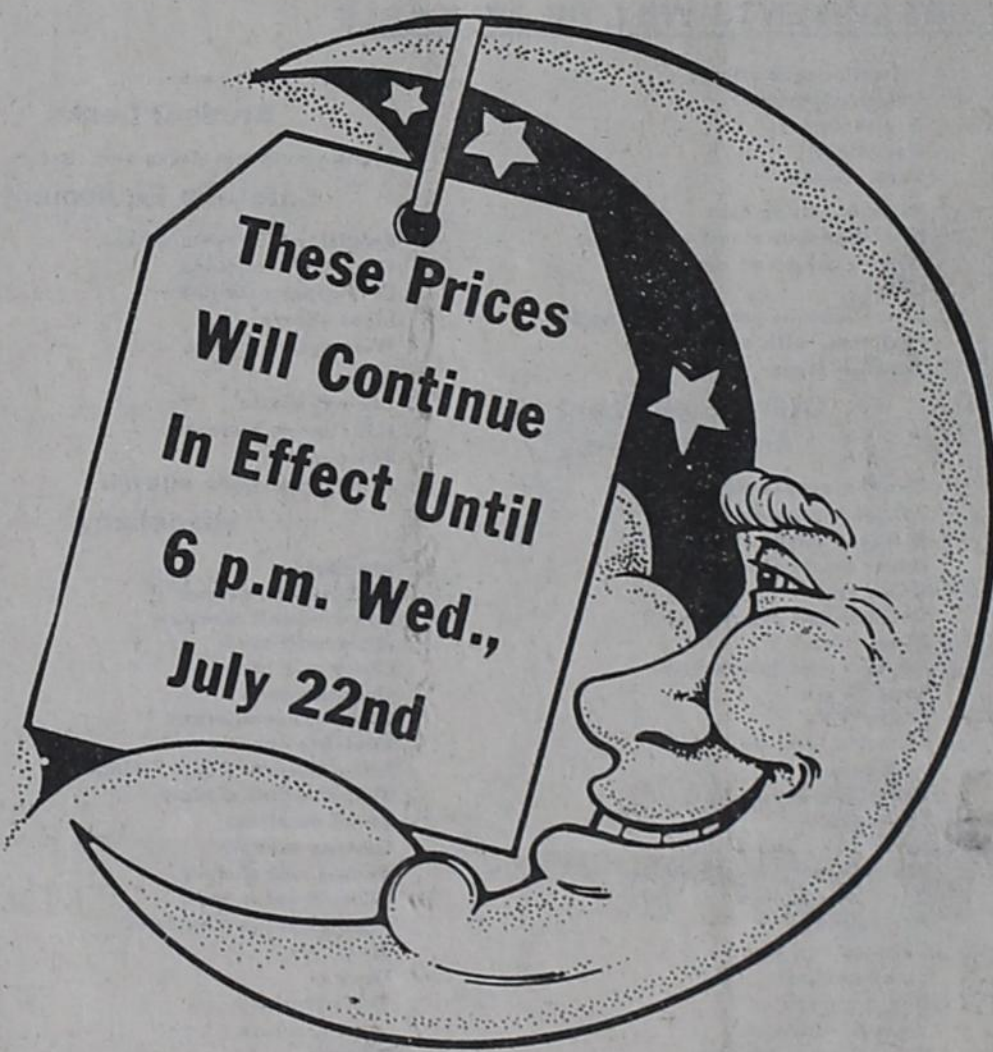

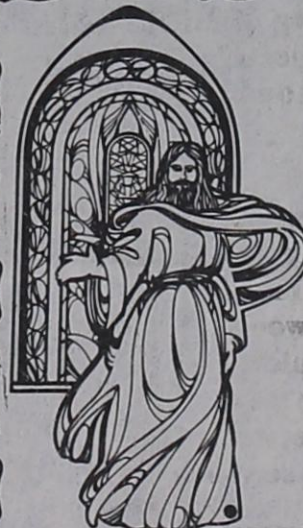
